Demonstration Shows Feasability of Projects-Other Crops Make Good.

In beginning any new project, especially among people accustomed to stock raising and farming by uncertain and haphazard methods, a kind of "hit and miss" process, the feasability of irrigation must be clearly demonstrated before many will be-

The one farm which is not only attracting attention at home, but abroad, is that of the McDonald Company.
