



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

Hostage Release

Plan Revealed

ATLANTA (AP) - A plan that might have freed the American hostages only days after they were taken captive in Iran was rejected by President Carter because it involved cooperation with the Palestine Liberation Organization, a former White House counsel says.

The rejection came after plomatic meetings in Austria and in Israel, where government officials warned against the approach, Robert Lipshutz said Thursday.

In Tel Aviv today, Israel's former Defense Minister, Ezer Weizman, confirmed that he had warned the Americans off the idea. "The story is true," Weizman said. He told The Associated Press that the plan to approach the PLO "didn't look good to

The Israelis also said there was no way the hostages could be rescued by a commando raid, Lipshutz said.

To Succeed Suares

MADRID, Spain (AP) - Spain's governing party today nominated Deputy Premier Leopoldo Calvo Sotelo to succeed Premier Adolfo Suarez, who resigned amid growing criticism. But he may not be able to hold the government coalition together, and King Juan Carlos may have to call a general election.,

The king was expected to consult with political leaders today on Calvo Sotelo's nomination. If Juan Carlos approves it, the nomination will go to the lower house of Parliament for confirmation or rejection.

Calvo Sotelo, an economic expert and former minister for relations with the Common Market, is regarded as an open-minded politician with good contacts among Western European leaders.

MCALLEN, Texas (AP) -Nine farmworkers will be tried Feb. 25 on trespan sing charges in connection with their takeover last week of Mayor Othal Brand's office.

The nine, including six Mexican nationals, pleaded innocent Thursday before Municipal Court Judge Howbert Steele.

Steele refused to accept a plea bargain arrangement reportedly agreed to by the

The defense lawyer then said her clients would plead innocent to the charges.





Cookbooks make very good reading material, even when you know you aren't going to make all those delicious-sounding dishes. Lots of people who collect cookbooks aren't dedicated cooks; they just like to read the recipes. .

Browsing through one of my books the other day I found a recipe for a different kind of meatballs that sounds so good I thought somebody would like to try it.

It is one that Joyce Lomas contributed to a Beta Sigma Phi cookbook some years ago, and it goes like this:

HAM BALLS

- 1 pound smoked ham 1^{1/2} pound pork
- 2 cups bread crumbs
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1 cup milk

SAUCE

- 11/2 cups brown sugar
- 1/2 cup water & 1/2 cup vinegar
- 1 tsp. dry mustard Stir until sugar melts and
- pour over balls.
- Mix all ingredients and form into meatballs. Cover with the sauce and bake at 275 degrees for 114 hours.

These quantities would make a lot of meatballs, and for a family dinner it might be better to halve the amounts. It does sound good, doesn't it?





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PUC Approves Nickel-a-Month Phone Increase

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -Consumer groups are praising the Public Utility Commission for holding Southwestern Bell to a nickela-month increase for most residential customers. Bell officials, however, say they might sue.

PUC's Wednesday order gives Bell a \$114 million increase. The company wanted \$326 million, including a \$1.25 monthly increase for most household customers.

Bell officials immediately talked about fighting the PUC order. Vice President Paul Roth said Bell might take the case to court or quickly file for another rate jump. "(It) is simply not enough," he said.

Carole Barger, attorney for Consumers Union and the Association of Community Organizations for Reform Now, said, "We're very pleased."

"The commission showed more concern for residential ratepayers than they ever have before," she said.

The new rates, effective within 30 days, include a fivecent monthly increase for residential customers in large Texas cities, including Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Waco and Corpus Christi.

Under the PUC order, residential customers in the smallest cities served by Bell (including Cameron, Carrizo Springs, and Cotulla) will pay a 55-cent monthly increase. A 30-cent rise was ordered for a group of cities including Alice, Bay City, Huntsville, Pampa and Kingsville.

Military Chief Says Allies Need Broad Global Policy

WASHINGTON (AP) -The nation's top military chief said today the United States and its allies must develop a broad "global" strategy and increase their strength to counter Soviet elsewhere. 'The Soviets must be con-

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tinually faced with the cermove against U.S. or allied interests risks a conflict that could be wider in geography, scope or violence than they are prepared to deal with," threats in the Persian Gulf or said Gen. David Jones, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff

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"In particular, they must tain prospect that a military be convinced than an infringement on our vital interests in southwest Asia would trigger a confrontation with the United States that would not be confined to that region," Jones said in a 128-page report to Congress.

The Joint Chiefs chairman called for actions to "broaden our strategic focus beyond nuclear deterrence and a relatively handful of theater and regional contingencies," such as defense of western Europe and northeast Asia.

Jones stressed that he was not advocating "either automatic, unrestrained intervention" by the United States in every brushfire or a U.S. role as the world's policeman.

He made clear, too, that he expects European and Asian allies to join in such a broadened global strategy to confront the Soviets wherever they may raise a major menace to their collective security.

"The U.S. cannot and should not carry the sole burden" for the increase in military strength for this purpose, Jones said.

At the same time, he indicated some concern that the NATO countries and Japan have not yet rallied to meet what he views as a rising Soviet threat.

Jones said that deploying an advanced bomber "should be a top priority among the new strategic initiatives that we need to pursue in the days ahead."

Jones' called for a new bomber which can penetrate Soviet air defenses in the latter part of the century.

DEAR POLLY - An excellent way to keep eye glasses and their frames sparkling clean is to wash them in sudsy water and dry with a cloth towel. This is especially important for the new plastic lenses that are more easily scratched when wiped dry with a paper product. - HELEN

DEAR POLLY - When synthetic under garments begin to look dingy, I use tea to dye them a nice, beige color. Use enough water to cover the garments, place a family-size tea bag in a large pot, bring the water to a boil and let simmer for a few minutes. Remove the tea bag and let the water cool, as you would not want to put garments into boiling water. Put the garments in the warm tea and let them stand until they are a shade darker than desired. They will be lighter when – JEANETTE

Polly's Note: I would stir them every so often, so the color is evenly distributed.

DEAR POLLY - My Pointer is for those who do not use bacon very often. Cut the strips in an entire package into small pieces and fry them all at once. Place on paper towels to drain off the fat, then put in a tightly closed plastic bowl (or foil) and keep in the freezer. Use as needed. - LILLIE

DEAR LILLIE - A friend of mine always does basically the same thing, but cooks the bacon in the oven, as it does not seem to shrink as much and cooks more evenly. She also doesn't cut the length of the strips. - POLLY


