About one hundred and fifty acres of wheat belonging to Mr. F. H. Oberthier was damaged while the alfalfa on the Welliver and Pollock farm was badly damaged. On the farms of Messrs, Hasson and Smith the hall was severe.

In other sections of the state there was considerable damage done. In Claude, Texas, several houses were wrecked and one person injured. The rain of the past few days has been general on the Panhandle and the outlook for good crops is good. Following account is given of the Claude storm by a special to the Dallas News:

Claude, Armstrong Co., Texas, June 5. Sunday night at 8 o'clock several restdences were demolished and many other taken from their foundations by a severe windstorm that swept over this section. Numbers of outhouses, includtroyed. Mr. and Mrs. Friday's home received no injuries. Herry McCurtis' home was demolished into kindling and the family was later found on the prairie unhurt. Mr. Grumkes new barn was shattered and two mules were killed. The windows were broken out in the Palace Hotel.

Any person failing or refusing to comply with the provisions of this ordinance after being notified so to do by authority of the City Commission shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any sum not to exceed Twenty Five Dollars, Each day any person shall fail or refuse to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, after being notified so to do shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 6. It is hereby made the duty of the owner of any lot North of the railroad track in the city of Hereford to cause to be removed therefrom all scraps of metal and accumulations of junk whether deposited thereon by himself of another. Any person failng or refusing to comply with the provisions of this ordinance after being notified so to do by authority of the City commission, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed Twenty Five Dollars. Each day any person fails or refuses to comply with the provisions of this ordinance after being notified so to do shall constitute a separate offense. Provided, that this ordinance shall not apply to adealer in junk and scrap iron, who is storing the same on his own premises, not within the fire limits; nor to a blacksmith or tinner maintaining a pile of scraps on his own premises not within the fire

These indicate that static electricity is the cause of the great majority of these accidents." The electricity, may be produced in a number of ways by the operation of the machine during the threshing process and under certain conditions will readily inguite the dust-laden atmosphere within the thresher. It is generally agreed that before this can take place the dust must be fine and dry and to a state of suspension, but the exact conditions necessary to bring about an explosion have not been definitely determined. This uncertainty, it is said, is a strong argument for equipping all threshers with the preventive devices already named.

The best method, the investigations indicate, for carrying off any static electricity that may be produced is to connect wires from all moving parts on the machine to one wire and ground that wire. This is the method that has been adopted in the system recommended by the department specialists. In this sys tem the common wire or conductor is grounded through a rod which should be driven at least three feet into the ground, which should be kept well moistened. There are connections to this conductor from the shaft of the cylinder, from the shakers, from the entire sieve, and from the metal casings of the stacker fan. 

TEXAS FEVER is caused by a germ transmitted by the tick. As in Anthrax, there is rapid pulse, breathing, high fever with nervousness, loss of appe tite and constipation or diarrhoca. The blood is pale and watery in Texas Equer while in Anthrax, the blood is dark, frequently a tarry black.

BLACK LEG is also caused by a germ and affects usually young cattle. Rapid pulse and breathing with high fever are generally present. As the name suggests, there is a swelling of the leg. This swelling, when pressed or pinched, gives a peculiar feel or sound due to the small pockets of gas and fluid formed under the skin. If the skin over the swelling be cut, these pockets along with the blackened spots may be plainly seem In Anthrax the swelling usually occurs under the chin, neck of belly, does not contain these pockets or gas, does not give this peculiar feel or sound or pressure, and is filled with a thick yellow fluid.

MALIGNANT OEDENIA in the animal is similiar to blood poisoning in man, and is caused by a germ infecting a wound, It produces a swelling ano fever and other symptoms similiar to Black Ley and Anthrax. The swelling may appear at any point on the body

Careless breeding and poor feed and care will produce scrub hens that lay small eggs. These when fresh and with clean, sound shells bring in western markets from three to ten cents a dozen less than large eggs of the same quality. small eggs bring the same price as dirty eggs. In a case of small eggs taken at random from a carload, an average dos en of the small eggs weighted eighteen

It is astonishing to go to a large egg receiving depot and see the enormous quantities of dirty eggs sent to market. These dirty eggs are sorted out by the shippers before being sent to the eastcarload. There are eggs covered by eggs bring three to ten cents a dozen

There are comparatively few rotten eggs in the early spring but in hot weather there are often carloads where only three eggs out of a dozen are fit to eat. In a shipment of eggs in hot weather from a Kansas point, where the case was opened a live chicken was found that had hatched after the eggs were packed. Some farmer did not have quite enough eggs to fill out a case and had taken some from under a setting hen that was soon ready to take off a brood.

The first step to take in improving the quality of the egg is to get rid of the "roosters." All eggs sent to market should be infertile. Males should not be allowed with the hens except when rs are wanted for hatching and then only with the hens whose eggs are to

A fertile egg will often start to germinate in the hen's body before it is laid. After the egg is laid, the embryo, unless killed, will grow any time the temperature gets to seventy-four degrees or

When the facts are considered, it is easy to see why there are so many spoiled and poor eggs on the markets. The germ in a fertile egg will grow during the week that it is kept in a warm EGGS ARE TO BE EATEN. In an extended investigation made in Kansas by was a total loss of forty-two and a half per cent of all fertile eggs marketed and that two-thirds of this loss was made

Hens will lay as many eggs and some times more without the males and the eggs will cost less. Eggs laid by hens that have no males with them contain no germs to be developed and therefore withstand the heat. They are much slower to become stale or decay from other causes.

On the farm, the young cockerels should be marketed as soon as they reach a weight of one and a half to two pounds. One pen can be fenced and hens and cocks intended for breeding can be kept in it during the hatching season. After that is over the hens can run with the rest of the flock and the male birds that are desirable to keep for breeding another season can be kept in the pen, the same as fowls are kept in towns,

Dirty eggs can be avoided by clean marters and plenty of nests. In muddy imes keep the floor of the poultry house well bedded with clean litter. One of the chief causes of dirty eggs is too few nests. A hen lays a clean egg and leaves the nest, another hen gets in the nest and stepping around in it before she sets down fouls the clean egg laid by the first hen. Wet straw in the nest often stains the eggs a dirty yellow. Do not wash eggs. This injures their keeping qualities.

Eggs kept in a damp moldy place and eggs smeared over from brokes eggs develop rotten spots. The farmer should keep eggs in a cool dry, dark place. A cool, dry cellar is a good place, Eggs are damaged quickly in a damp cellar or in a warm pantry or kitchen. Eggs should be gathered daily in n hot weather. They should be placed

as soon as gathered in a cool dry place on the road to

Most farmers need to change their stock and secure hens that will lay a uniform quality of good sized eggs that, refrigeration, was \$28.34. The net when properly taken care of, will grade as "firsts."

Moldy feeds and overfeeding are likely to produce eggs with a bad flavor. Eggs absorb bad odors from vegetables, oats or chaff that are molded or damp are likely to absorb bad odors or flavors Eggs should never be placed against gathered in a tin pail. The metal is likely to make a spot on the shell where it touches the egg.

To make good sales it is first neces sary to produce a good article. Then to find a buyer who will pay for quality. A poultry raiser who can be depended on to furnish regularly large, fresh eggs can usually get three to five cents a dozen above top market price by selling to a grocer who has the best trade in the nearest large town. Where several reliable poultry raisers ship their eggs together they are in a position to hunt nd supply a high priced market, whether it be ten or 1,000 miles distance. The poultry raiser in a small town in eastern Colorado did this and found a high rieced market in central New Mexico.


