Memories still vivid of stormy night in '71

April 19, 1971 was a night that few Hereford residents would ever forget. Shortly after midnight, seemingly out of no where, it struck, leaving a seven mile path of disaster.

Friday marked the 20th anniversary of the Hereford tornado that destroyed 20 homes and whatever laid in its northerly path.

The final damage estimate was \$2.5 million. The storm also caused about 20 minor injuries.

"The tornado came out of the south headed in an almost due north pattern," said tornado victim Bob Campbell. "Our house was on the south end of town. It was called South Ave. K. because it eventually ran into Ave. K."

"That night my aunt was here visiting. My mother and I were watching the clouds. I went out to look. The night was hot, still and not much wind, but a lot of lightning. I went inside and told them that if they wanted to go to the cellar we had better go.

"My cousin Cliff Jones and his two girls came out because they didn't have a cellar. Cliff and I were sitting on the steps of the cellar talking. It started to sprinkle and then hail and we barely got down the steps and closed the door before it hit."

"We heard a horrible noise that I will never forget and then we felt the pressure change. It was really weird."

Dudley Bayne was city manager at the time of the disaster and lived on Star Street, which was most heavily damaged.

"There had been storms in the area all night," Bayne said. "Back then the weather service was located in Kansas City. About 11 p.m. we were all at the civil defense building. We had just received the all clear from the weather service telling us all the storms had passed."

"When we got the all clear, we closed up shop and went home. Later that night we heard a noise and I got my family up and in the hall with one mattress over them and went for another when a tree limb came

through the window. I still have scars from that."

Bayne said the city employees were out immediately after the storm doing their job.

"We are always being told to practice for disaster, but there is no way to practice something like this," the former city manager said. "After the storm the employees were out checking their jobs."

"The first thing we had to do is make sure the water pumps were working. Everyone knew to check their job. There were no broken main lines or fires."

"Members of the fire department did a tremendous job. They checked houses to make sure no one was trapped."

It took crews at least 10 days to clean up after the devastating tornado.

"People from all over came to help clean up," Bayne said. "The clean up could have taken longer if we didn't have the help. A magnet crew came in to pick up the nails from the

Paper project meeting called

A public meeting to discuss a project on making paper out of milo stubble will be held Thursday night at the Bull Barn, it was announced Friday by John Sherrrod, chairman of the industrial development committee of Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce.

Sherrrod said a presentation on the benefits of the project and its impact on the economy will be given at the meeting, beginning at 8 p.m., and all interested citizens are invited to attend.

A \$14,000 grant to complete a study on the project has been received from the Texas Department of Agriculture, but the grant must be matched by local funds. Sherrrod

pointed out that the involvement and support of county and area citizens is vital to the project.

"All of the money contributed to the project will be used for research and to produce a sample run of paper. No funds will be used for salaries," said Sherrrod. He said the industrial committee hopes to raise more than \$14,000 for the project "to show what we can accomplish on our own and to arouse enthusiasm for other industrial development programs."

The industrial development committee decided last week to call a public meeting and ask for citizen support, rather than to seek funding just from major businesses and

'Pride Today for Proud Tomorrow' Beautification weeks underway in Hereford

"Take Pride Today for a Proud Tomorrow" is the theme of a citywide Clean-Up Campaign, sponsored by Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce and the City of Hereford. It is scheduled to start Monday and continue through May 4, with all citizens of the community urged to participate in the beautification project.

"Our beautification committee would like to ask for everyone's help to emphasize taking pride in our community," said Mike Carr, executive vice president of Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce.

"In order to attract new businesses and new residents, it's important to be attractive. We urge each business and resident to check and do what needs to be done to make their surroundings more attractive," Carr added.

Citizens are urged to clean up their yards and alleys and paint-up and fix-up during the special observance.

As an aid in getting rid of unsightly objects or litter, the City of Hereford will be operating two "brush" trucks on Saturdays the next two weekends (April 27 and May 4)

A new ordinance goes into effect May 1 which will prohibit placing certain items in the city's trash receptacles. Such items as tires, building materials, furniture, mattresses and box springs, appliances, automotive engines, parts, wheels, etc., will not be picked up under the new ordinance.

City Manager Darwin McGill said the city hopes to clean the alleys of such items and "get a fresh start" before the ordinance goes into effect. He said the city also encourages

citizens to haul as many of such items to the dump as possible.

McGill said the city is cooperating with the chamber's beautification committee in the clean-up campaign by operating the trucks the extra days. The trucks will attempt to cover the entire city on the two Saturdays, but they may not go down the same alleys twice. If there is an unwanted item in the yard, it should be taken to the dump or placed in the alley by next Saturday.

Carr said the chamber is "very appreciative" of the many groups who are cooperating in helping to beautify Hereford. He praised the three Kiwanis Clubs for currently maintaining four locations. "We would like to challenge other groups to adopt areas for beautification," he said.

Mauri Montgomery, chairman of the beautification committee, said he hoped the campaign awareness time "might serve as a springboard for our town to begin a year-around effort to make our community more presentable."

WATCHES AND WARNINGS

•Severe thunderstorm watch: There is a good chance that severe thunderstorms, including heavy rain, hail, lightning and heavy wind will develop. Usually issued for a large area.

•Tornado watch: There is a good chance for development of strong thunderstorms, with conditions expected to be favorable for the development of tornado-producing storms. Usually issued for a large area.

•Severe thunderstorm warning: A severe thunderstorm, likely containing heavy rain, hail, dangerous lightning and/or heavy wind is approaching an area. Usually issued for a small area (one or more counties).

•Tornado warning: A tornado has been sighted or detected by radar. Immediate precautions should be taken. Usually issued for one or two counties, and sometimes for a particular city.

Severe Storms

NOW, before you need them, is the time to:

- Locate a storm shelter if you do not have one.
- Store a good supply of candles, matches, batteries and flashlights, a transistor radio and batteries, and bottled water.

How to stay abreast of weather and warnings:

- The three major Amarillo TV stations (4, 7 and 10) compete viciously to get accurate weather info on the air first.
- KPAN (860 AM, 106.3 FM) for local weather; KGNC (710 AM) in Amarillo is the area's "key" station for watches and warnings.
- The Weather Channel (Hereford Cablevision Ch. 16) has warnings directly from the National Weather Service.
- If a tornado is approaching, nine strategically-placed sirens in the city will be sounded.
- The Hereford Emergency Operations Center will broadcast warnings over Hereford Cablevision, overriding the sound on all channels.

What happens when severe weather may take place

- A team of local spotters, including the Hereford Fire Department, sheriff's deputies and the Department of Public Safety, are deployed to several locations in the county.
- All storms are monitored closely by the National Weather Service office in Amarillo and the three television stations (which have more sophisticated radar than does the NWS). The monitoring includes reports from local spotters and lightning monitoring towers throughout the Panhandle.
- Depending upon the likelihood of tornadic activity, a storm chase team from Texas Tech University will be in the area to track the storm.

institutions, said Sherrod. About 3,000 letters about the meeting have been mailed to residents in Deaf Smith, Castro and Parmer counties.

Making paper from milo and other farm crop residue is a proven process. The local study was initiated about two years ago by Ken Rogers. It could provide a very large economic benefit for this area, says Rogers,

including additional income to farmers, savings on water, and providing more jobs.

The chamber committee pointed out that the project is being supported by TDA, Baylor University, Texas Tech University, National Grain Sorghum Producers and Texas Grain Sorghum Producers associations, and the University of Miami of Ohio.

streets. My crew came and picked me up in a four-wheel drive Army transport truck and by the time we got back to city hall, all the tires were flat because of all the debris.

"The city, county and Department of Highways all pitched in and cleaned up free of charge. We were out of power for three days, but the light company and the telephone company did a fantastic job. Crews from around the Panhandle literally worked around the clock trying to restore the power."

Bayne said that fatalities and injuries were probably spared because of the time of the storm.

"If the tornado would have happened during the day" he said, "I'm afraid that there would have been people out trying to see what was going on, instead of going to the shelter."

"The storm came and when we saw the power lines snapping, it was already here. Debris was scattered everywhere. We had just put up a new fence and it blew away. We never found the fence or any part of it. We don't know where it went."

Betty Koelzer was a photographer for the Hereford Brand at the time of the storm.

"We lived on Ave. J. at the time, but our house wasn't damaged," Koelzer said. "When the sirens went off, we went to the center of the house and after it was over we went to look at all the damage."

"I remember grabbing my camera and walking from our home down the street. We had to be careful because of all the fallen highline wires. I took rolls and rolls of film."

"It was exciting to be working in something that was such a big deal for Hereford. I have never been close to a tornado or to damage caused by a tornado. I guess my adrenalin was pumping and I wasn't afraid of what I would find, but excited to see what I would find next."

"The next day Charles Seale took me up in his airplane to take pictures. The aerial view was most exciting for me. I could get more of a grasp on the extent of the damage. I had an excellent pilot for the job."

Koelzer found that all the rescue workers were accommodating and helpful.

"During the clean up, I found the workers very kind and accommodating," she said. "There was a lot of tension, but everyone worked together well."

"It was a good time to work for the paper. It kind of gave me a reason to be there. I remember wanting to hurry up and process the film and get the paper ready."

Koelzer said that a lot of people rallied together to help one another.

One of the men busy that night helping was J.W. (Jap) Dickerson, the plant engineer at Deaf Smith General Hospital.

"I was fire chief at the time of the tornado," said Dickerson. "We got the alarm that there was a tornado on the ground from the sheriff's office. The assistant fire chief went to the station and I went the hospital because the power generators had already kicked on."

"After I checked on the power plant, I went outside and it was a dead calm. You know something is going to happen when it is that calm."

"The tornado came down and hit a few houses and kind of skipped from different sides of the street, never staying down on the ground."

Patients in the hospital were moved into the hallway to avoid being hit with flying glass.

"The hospital is divided into two sections, the east and west," Dickerson said. "After about an hour, the generator that services the east end shut down. We had a patient on a respirator at the time and needed power. The public service crew came out and in about 28 minutes had us hooked onto another working power plant on New York Ave. and we had our power."

"It is amazing that in such little time, we had so much help. In what seemed like minutes, maybe it was really hours, Muleshoe came down with a generator."

Dickerson said the hospital was lucky that the tornado seemed to pass over, leaving it untouched.

"We were lucky, we didn't lose anything."

About 20 patients visited the hospital for various tornado-related injuries, but none were serious, he said.

"Everyone worked together. We had a few problems, but it all boiled down to organization."

As a leader in the fire department, Dickerson worked extensively in the clean-up.

"We first had to secure the area from looters," he said. "We checked all the houses to make sure everyone was accounted for. After that, we started the clean up. There were so many nails in the streets that we had to clear a path for emergency vehicles to pass. If we wouldn't have, every car would have had flat tires."

Dickerson has seen three tornados, but adds, "It is not something I would want to do everyday."

Perhaps the home hardest hit by the storm that caused an estimated \$2.5 million in damage was the Earnest Langley home.

"We sustained \$52,000 worth of damage to our home," Langley said. "The damage to our home was the most extensive in town. It took five months to get it repaired so we could moved back in."

"We were in bed when the storm hit," said Helen Langley. "After we got the all clear, we just went to bed. I was awoken by a terrible noise and I told Earnest that something had happened. I got up and glass covered the kitchen floor."

"My mother and dad were down and staying in one of the rooms receiving the most damage. She (mother) heard the noise and woke my dad to tell him to cover his head. Rafters from the roof fell on them, but the only injury was a cut on my dad's arm. We were lucky. Our daughter Carolyn was still at home, but wasn't hurt."

"Before we went to bed, Earnest had smoked a cigarette and put the ashes in an ash tray beside his chair."

When we went into the room, the chair was gone and tree limbs, trash can and all kinds of debris had blown into the room through the glass doors. We looked at the ash tray and not a single ash had moved. We never saw the chair again. We don't know what happened to it."

"We went into one of the bedrooms and the mattresses were still on the bed, but we never saw the bedding again."

The Langley family was grateful for all the help and community support.

"The Catholic ladies came and helped us back our things so we could move out," Helen said. "The Red Cross brought sandwiches and coffee for the workers."

"When I looked at the mess and debris in the back yard, I thought we would never get it all cleaned up. With the help of high school boys and a few trucks, it was cleaned up the next day. Everyone was willing to help. All the services were free. No one asked for money, they just wanted to get things back together again."

"One of our friends had a four bedroom house that was vacant and she let us live there as long as we needed to."

Debris from the Langley home was found as far as 14 miles away.

"We had a lot of damage, but we were fortunate that we didn't lose any furniture," she said. "It didn't rain after the tornado so our furniture was spared. We didn't lose any of our belongings, besides the chair."

The Langleys won't forget the events of April 19, 1971. Earnest kept 48 pages of memorabilia in his scrap book of the event.

"Every time our grandson comes over, he wants to see the pictures of the tornado," Helen said. "It was eerie."

Although the event took place 20 years ago, the memories are as vivid as the day it happened for those involved in the Monday morning tragedy. April 19, 1971 has taken its place in Hereford history, never to be forgotten by those who lived through the storm.

Schwarzkopf comes home from Saudi

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) - Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf bid farewell to allied forces today and headed home, saying the United States had completed its mission in the Persian Gulf.

As he boarded his military jet at Riyadh Air Base, he turned at the top of the steps, saluted and waved to the crowd that included a Royal Saudi honor guard.

Asked if he had any plans to enter politics when he retires this summer, the military commander of Operation Desert Storm replied, "None." There has been speculation he might run for the Senate from Florida.

"I'm going to go home. That's what's next for me," he said.

His plane flew off to Cairo, where he planned to stop briefly to thank Egypt's government and military officials for their support in the Gulf War. Egypt committed thousands of troops.

After the brief stopover, he was flying to Tampa, Fla., the U.S. Central Command's headquarters in the United States.

Although American troops have entered northern Iraq to help Kurdish refugees, the U.S. force in the south is rapidly withdrawing and Schwarzkopf said, "There's no question in my mind that we completed our mission."

City prepared for severe storm season

It has been 20 years since a tornado has inflicted major damage in the Hereford area, but that doesn't mean the county has been immune to tornadoes.

Twisters have inflicted scattered damage to places around the county over the past 20 years, and there have been several "near misses" of Hereford.

Hereford Fire Marshal Jay Spain, who is also the county's civil defense coordinator, optimistically hopes there are no severe storms this year--"I just have a feeling," Spain said--but that doesn't mean he and his crews are any less prepared for severe storm season.

Last week, Spain led his volunteer firefighters and others through an annual brush-up course on storm spotting, the procedures when a

tornado is actually sighted and moving toward Hereford, and what to do after a tornado strikes.

All of the planning has been laid out in a thick emergency operations manual compiled three years ago by Spain, but all of the planning in the world won't help if the community doesn't know what to do in case of a tornado warning for the city of Hereford.

"Everyone should have a place to go, especially if they live in a trailer," Spain said. "They need to find a neighbor that will let them share their shelter if they can, and it would be great if they got their own shelter."

Spain said the time to begin going to a shelter is not when a warning of an imminent strike (an up-and-down tone on the city's siren warning system) is issued, but when the first warnings are issued. When the county is placed under a tornado warning, no

matter what the location of the tornado and direction of travel, is the time to begin getting to shelter or other place of safety.

"If they can't get to a shelter, then the best place is in an inside room away from glass and windows, and with something heavy like a mattress over them," said Spain. "One of the problems of getting into a bathtub is if you have glass doors on it. The glass causes problems."

If you're caught out in the open, almost anywhere is better than in a car.

"A lot of the people who died in the Wichita Falls tornado in 1979 were in their cars," Spain said. "Ideally, you want to get into a ditch or some other low place if you can."

In fact, one of Spain's worst fears is that hundreds of Hereford residents could panic if a mid-afternoon tornado struck.

"What worries me is that everyone will want to go to the schools and pick their kids up," Spain said. "Then we'll have all those people in their cars and no telling what might happen. The best thing to do is not worry about the kids. The school people will take care of them. Everyone just needs to get to shelter."

In most cases, by the time a tornado warning is issued Spain, volunteer firefighters, sheriff's office personnel and Department of Public Safety troopers have been out "spotting" storms, looking at clouds for danger signs, for several hours. They are in constant radio contact with each other, and can communicate with the National Weather Service office in Amarillo.

"We have several places we all go to get the best vantage point on these storms," Spain said. "We try to stay on pavement, because it won't do you any good to get stuck, and we usually work from the southeast side of a

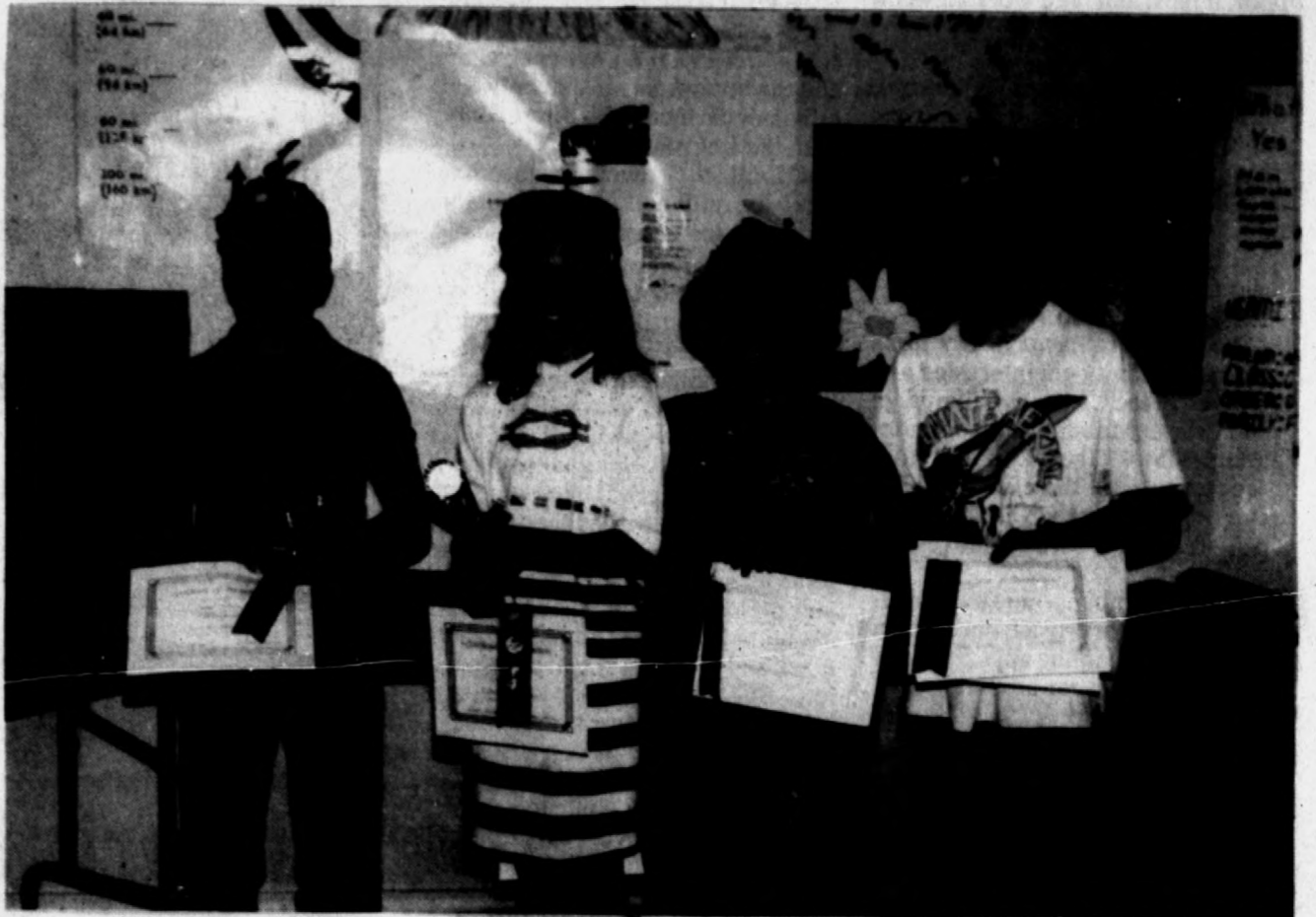
storm, because that's where you usually get the best vantage point. It doesn't always work that way, but that's the average."

Anytime a severe weather watch (thunderstorm or tornado) is issued, Spain notifies fire department and hospital personnel. "Sometimes they'll issue a watch at 2 p.m. and there won't be a cloud in the sky, but

they know there could be something develop," Spain said. If it's during the day, all schools are notified, and both Hereford nursing homes are warned.

Hereford residents are also notified in various ways, including local and regional radio and television, NOAA Weather Radio and The Weather Channel, Channel 16 on Hereford Cablevision.

When a warning is issued, it is disseminated those ways plus a special broadcast from the Emergency Operations Center at the fire department. When a tornado warning is issued for the city, the radio operator there can override the sound portion of all channels to issue warnings. Plus, the sirens are sounded only when the city is in danger of being struck.

State looking for answers

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Education Agency has two words of advice for those who are anxious to know just how the new school finance law will work.

Be patient. "While many questions can be answered, many cannot," interim Education Commissioner Thomas Anderson told school districts in a letter.

He even warned them that a large number of questioning telephone callers would tie up the very staff members who are determining how to implement the law.

The agency has been "flooded" with calls from school officials who are making plans for next school year, Anderson said.

He said TEA would send out budgeting worksheets and other information as it is developed, and likely will conduct workshops later.

Agency officials already have met with representatives of the State Property Tax Board, and state school board and administrator groups.

"I think there are a lot of unanswered questions in a lot of people's minds as to ... how things will work," said Margaret LaMontagne, director of governmental relations for the Texas Association of School Boards.

The school finance reform law is meant to meet a Texas Supreme Court order to even out education funding available to school districts.

The court has twice, unanimously, ruled unconstitutional the current \$14 billion-a-year system that relies on state aid, local property taxes and some federal money.

School districts' dependence on their own local property tax revenue now results in huge funding disparities.

The new law is designed to significantly narrow the gap by shifting hundreds of millions of dollars in local property tax revenue from wealthier to poorer school districts within new education taxing regions.

It is estimated to cause \$992 million to \$2.1 billion in local property tax increases, and cost \$1.3 billion in additional state aid over the next two years.

School officials are asking how the education taxing regions will work, and how to manage the five additional class days mandated by the law, Anderson said.

Under the law, which will be effective next school year, the 188 new taxing regions are drawn largely along county lines.

Local property tax revenue generated at a new minimum effective tax rate - which starts at 72 cents per \$100 property valuation and climbs to \$1 in four years - will be shared among school districts within each region.

Trustees appointed by each region's school boards will oversee the transfer of money.

"It's a county operation, and so that's a change in the way of thinking for a lot of people," Anderson said. "I think there's some difficulty in adjusting to that change in thinking."

Ms. LaMontagne echoed him, saying, "The county education district is a brave new world in government."

The law also lengthens the school year to 180 days by eliminating five teacher training days.

However, school districts must offer 40 hours of staff development during regular hours of teacher service. The law says the commissioner will develop guidelines on that new requirement.

"Almost all of them (school districts) have set school calendars. They have to go back to the drawing board on that," Ms. Montagne said.

Easing TEA's burden is that a number of elements of the school finance system have not changed, Anderson said.

There still is a basic allotment per student and additional funding for those who cost more to educate.

School districts are guaranteed a certain amount of money for a particular tax rate - up to \$1.45 under the new law. The state makes up the difference for school districts who cannot raise the guaranteed amount through local taxes alone.

Rich and poor school districts have said they are contemplating whether to challenge the new law. State District Judge F. Scott McCown, who is overseeing the case, has said he presumes the law is constitutional but will consider any challenges.

Anderson said the agency must go ahead and implement the law unless McCown tells the state otherwise.

But he added, "It's not going to happen overnight. It's going to take a little while to get all the answers."



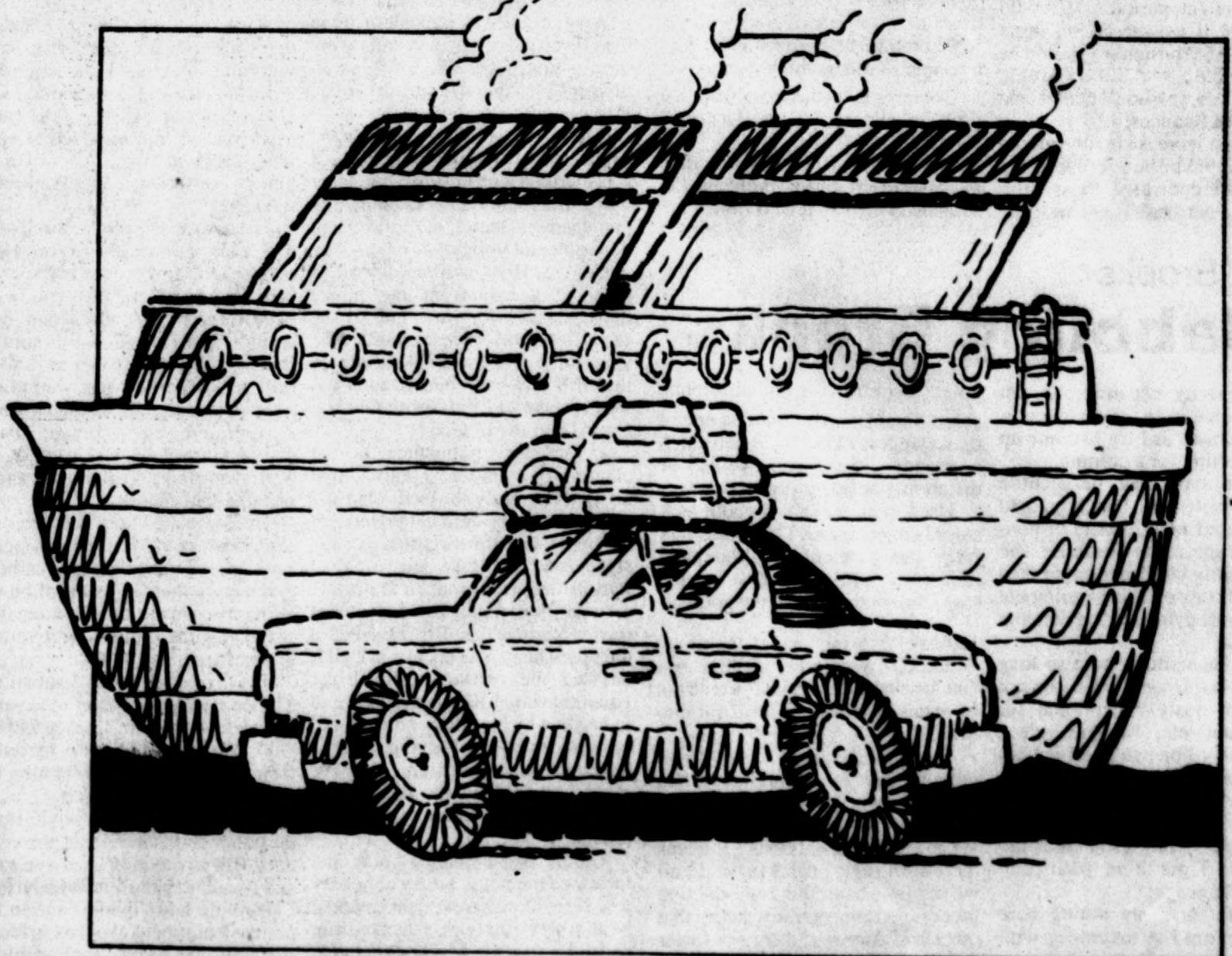

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Hereford Bull

That feller on Tierra Blanca Creek says one thing about being poor, honest and hard working is that nobody envies you.

Three old men were discussing the ideal way of dying. The first, age 80, said he'd like crash in a car going 80 mph. The second, age 87, said he'd take a crash in a plane going 400 mph. "I've got a better idea," said the third, 90, "I'd like to be shot by a jealous husband!"

We hope that most of the folks in the community get interested and involved in the Clean-Up Campaign which starts Monday and continues through May 4. The City of Hereford is cooperating in the effort will use extra time for trucks to haul off stuff that's accumulated around homes and in alleys.

As the chamber points out, this is not a once-a-year project, but a matter of having pride in the appearance of our community year around.

With the \$4.6 billion revenue shortfall for a current services budget in Texas, you know our state leaders are trying to cut costs.

Wrong! The state's top three officials have boosted their own payrolls by almost \$2 million a year, according to a recent article in the Dallas Morning News.

Gov. Ann Richards, while calling for a streamlining and major overhaul of all departments, has added 30 employees to her staff since taking office in January. Aide stated that the \$1.5 million, or 21 percent, payroll increase was necessary for the governor's office to scrutinize other state agencies.

Over in the senate, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock has not added employees, but those working on his staff have seen some substantial raises. Increased pay, while making some parttime positions into fulltime ones, has raised his office's salary by \$335,200 a year.

House Speaker Gib Lewis kept his staff at 18, but the annual payroll for his office grew by \$152,000 since the last legislative session.

How many of our readers have seen a raise in the past two years? A lot of Texans—especially those with non-government jobs—are struggling to survive. Even many of those whose salaries are paid by tax funds, locally, are making it without raises.

The state projects an increase of \$5.7 billion in revenues for the coming budget period. It would appear that if we are taking in an additional \$5.7 billion we should be able to handle a \$4.5 billion deficit. If you think so, you don't understand government finances.

From that increase in revenue, an estimated \$3.6 billion is federal aid and it's all dedicated to specific programs, like health and welfare.

In addition the state has obligated \$450 million to pay back loans from retirement systems and the state's "Rainy Day" fund. Add on the new school reform program and others, and the bottom line is that only \$1.5 billion of the increase is discretionary with the Legislature.

Of all the revenues the state receives, only half of it is available for discretionary spending. The rest is dedicated by the constitution, state or federal mandates.

While only half of all state revenue is available as spending money, four out of five dollars in tax revenues are available. Guess who will make up that \$4.6 billion shortfall? If your answer is the working taxpayers of Texas, you learned the lesson.

Since 1978 there has been a steady increase in the demand for state services, such as highways, education and prison systems. The state has about reached the limits on sales taxes and property taxes, so what is left? Bullock has said the logical and natural source of new tax revenue is the income tax.

The state has a big selling job to do if it convinces people to accept a state income tax. It appears it would have to be linked to a decrease in property taxes before most Texans would consider that alternative.

How bad is the state's financial situation? Texas Weekly, as Austin-based weekly newsletter, says if the state were a \$25 billion-a-year private outfit, we'd be in Chapter 11!

If you want to be successful, you have to understand the language.

For instance, "My committee has decided..." really means: I managed to chat with one committee member just before the meeting. Here's more statements...and the real meaning:

We explored all possible solutions to the problem: Everyone talked too much.

A great deal of additional work will be necessary before the proposal can be acted upon: No one understands it.

I will report on the matter more fully at the next meeting: I forgot that I should have done something about it before today.

The results were inconclusive: Nothing was accomplished.

While no agreement was reached, we feel that definite progress was made: Nobody budged an inch.

It is suggested that the wisest course...: Here's what I think.

It is widely accepted that...: At least one other person agrees with me.

Therefore the consensus is...: And a couple of others think so, too.

This concludes the appraisal of the problem: We absolve ourselves of all future responsibility.

It is hoped that this will stimulate increased interest in the problem: Let somebody else do it next time.

April 9

Corpus Christi Caller-Times on free trade:

Unions fear the loss of jobs. U.S. environmentalists worry that a surge of industry in Mexico will worsen already bad pollution problems. Mexican industrialists, who benefit from protectionist rules, worry about competition. So do U.S. agricultural interests. And there is Mexico's long-term fear of domination by the Colossus of the North to overcome.

These objections are entirely understandable - but it's important to put the debate in a larger context, to project it beyond petty parochial concerns. In the long term, free trade between the United States and Mexico would work to the benefit of those nations, freeing up energies which have long been pent up. And, by no means least, it would represent a counterpoise to the coming economic unification of Europe. It's a goal both President Bush and Mexican President Carlos Salinas de Gortari must pursue with unrelenting intensity.

April 12

The Dallas Morning News on Soviet disarray:

Just a couple of months ago, an optimistic assessment of the chaos that has gripped the Soviet Union went this way: "The civil war won't last long."

That was before Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev's archrival, Boris

Yeltsin, won approval for increased powers of the Russian presidency and the election of that post by popular vote. Before Soviet coal miners went on strike, ... Before price increases went into effect without the anticipated stocking of bare state store shelves ... And before (last week's) vote of independence by the parliament of the Georgia republic.

Mr. Gorbachev's response to these latest events - a package of "anti-crisis" measures including a moratorium on strikes, rallies and demonstrations, as well as a halt to "other political actions that might destabilize the political situation in the country" - could very well determine how soon the civil war will start. ...

There is very little the U.S. or any other country can do other than to point out to Mr. Gorbachev that he is swimming against the tide.

The Dallas Times Herald on global warming:

The report of the National Academy of Science on global warming is a green light for action. Experts and officials on almost all sides of the issue now agree that warming is a serious and urgent emergency. The most valuable wisdom of the report is finding that the industrial economies of the world have it in their power to save the planet by attacking the warming issue aggressively now.

There must be no mistaking the heart and center of the report, however. For some years now, the debate on global warming has centered on the issue of whether it's really happening and whether it's bad. The answers are yes and yes. Those issues, in fact, are no longer in question.

The question now is what to do about it. We suspect the search for effective solutions will call upon the wisdom of both camps, low-tech and high. The point now is that the planet and life itself are in the balance. There is no more important question.

Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor:

I am writing this letter to report on the progress of my husband, Bill Hubbard, and events that have transpired since his accident more than seven months ago, including my termination, Dec. 17, 1990, as an officer for the Hereford Police Department.

This letter is only to explain the events that led to my termination. It is not written with hostility, but rather with disappointment in our city management, chief of police, and departmental policy.

Sept. 5, 1990, was my day off. I received a call from the police department informing me of an explosion where my husband, Bill, was employed. I was also informed that Bill had been burned and was enroute to Deaf Smith General Hospital at the time.

I met the ambulance at the emergency entrance. I learned that he was severely burned over 79 percent of his body, and that most of the burns were third degree. He was stabilized and then air-lifted to Parkland Burn Center in Dallas. I arrived shortly after Bill did. It was then I learned that Bill also had a collapsed lung. The doctors in Dallas advised me of how critical the situation was. Bill was not expected to be alive by morning. I did a lot of praying, and a lot of crying. Things happened so fast, I couldn't believe it. I was told by the head burns doctor that Bill had a two percent chance of survival.

Chief Brush called me and informed me not to worry about my job. He assured me everything would be all right on that end. I thanked him and did not worry. My thoughts were here in Dallas. I called the police department regularly to check in and give an update on Bill's condition.

The doctors were amazed that Bill lived that first night. They tried to prepare me for the "shocking" days ahead. Nothing could prepare me for the "horror" of what I saw when I looked down at my husband that first time.

His face was swollen at least three times its size. His eyes were hidden by the swollen flesh. When I looked at the huge mass of dripping, ugly tissue, I thought nothing so horrible could ever survive. It was a terrible nightmare. Each minute he lived was a miracle. A respirator breathed for him. He was fed through a tube; drugs were given intravenously to attempt to keep his blood pressure above a dangerous level. Other

drugs, including morphine, were detrimental to his threatening situation.

The second day, I was approached by doctors and advised of a decision that I had to make. That was, to let him go painlessly, or use aggressive types of treatment to save him. I was also informed that some of the drugs used to keep him alive could have serious side effects. I could not let him go, so we went for the alternatives.

His arms and legs were sliced open to release pressure and restore a lost pulse. One finger was amputated, then later another. The following days turned into weeks and then months. Bill continued to survive frequent set-backs such as kidney failure, blood infections, wound and lung infections. He also combated a ruptured eye cornea, heart dysrhythmia, and major skin grafts. He was taken off the respirator after four and one-half months.

He was moved from intensive care the first week of March. He is facing a cornea eye transplant and has been given more than 250 pints of blood. He has been in the hospital more than seven months, but he is alive and gradually getting better.

In November, 1990, I submitted a letter to the police chief requesting an indefinite leave of absence without pay. This should be in my record. I then received a letter informing me that I must return to work by Dec. 17, 1990 or I would be replaced. I told the police chief that I could not return until Bill was out of intensive care, and I couldn't put a time limit on that. I sincerely hope that no one in the police department ever has to face a traumatic experience such as this. I would much rather be working than going through this mentally and physically exhausting experience.

The Dallas Police Department has stood by me all the way. Lots of the officers have donated blood for Bill; several officers have visited at the hospital and taken me to lunch, and they included me in "Santa Cops." The citizens of Hereford have been just as loyal. I thank God for the community Bill and I live in, and the people there sharing the hurt.

I hope our city develops a policy for our officers in the event this kind of unfortunate circumstance should happen to any of them. It is a shame that a family tragedy can turn into an even greater tragedy by loss of employment.

El Paso Herald-Post on U.S. Supreme Court ruling on federal bank regulators:

... We are all indebted to the Supreme Court for its recent, little-noticed unanimous decision barring the disgruntled owners of failed savings and loans from suing federal regulators who seized their thrifts.

Had the court ruled otherwise, the consequences could have been catastrophic. With 132 similar suits on the docket nationwide, the Justice Department estimates that the government would have faced \$3 billion in extra liability. Worse, the thrift bailout would have been slowed even further. ...

... Thomas Gaubert, who brought the suit decided by the court, owned a Texas thrift that caught the attention of federal regulators. They finally seized the institution in 1985, deeming it all but insolvent, thanks to Gaubert's mismanagement, which is still under investigation.

But Gaubert ... asserted that at the time of the seizure his thrift was healthy. Only after regulators took it over, he says, did it become insolvent. Its doors were finally closed in 1987, costing taxpayers \$400 million. Gaubert ... had sought \$25 million in damages. ...

(W)ith this decision, the Supreme Court has ensured that Gaubert and others of his kind are similarly barred from meddling with the public purse.

Lubbock Avalanche-Journal on the 'LBJ Law':

The Legislature ought not tamper with the state law that allows Texans to run for national office and the U.S. Senate at the same time - the so-called LBJ Law.

True, the provision will, at any given time, help one party while hampering the other. In the long run, however, the public benefits.

How? Already, two Texans have used the double-candidacy authorization to bolster their political stock - and that of Texas - on the national scene.

Under the 1959 law, then Sen. Lyndon Johnson ran on the 1960 ballot both as a Democratic candidate for vice president and as an incumbent for the U.S. Senate. So did Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, also a Democrat, in 1988

... Now, with Republican Sen. Phil Gramm being mentioned as a possible presidential candidate in 1996, the House has tentatively voted to repeal the LBJ law. Republicans call the repeal legislation a "get-Gramm" bill.

Democrats who endorsed the repeal measure - and several key ones declined to do so - should remember that what goes around, comes around

... The House has to vote once more before the repeal bill goes to the Senate. We hope better judgment prevails then and that this measure, with all its implied mischief, is shot down.

Fort Worth Star-Telegram on Dallas can ordinance:

If a homeless guy approaches you and asked for \$240 to pay for an illegal garbage-collecting ticket, you must be in Dallas, Texas, U.S.A. Where else in this solar system would the police issue citations to penniless people for rummaging through trash bins for aluminum cans?

That's what they did in Big D for a while - until the word got out locally and nationally, leaving egg on the municipal face.

In an effort to repair the damage, some of Dallas' deeper thinkers hit on the idea of recycling the homeless out of the can-collection business. Energas announces May rate increase

Energas Company Friday notified the 66 incorporated communities on its West Texas distribution system that the company intends to implement an increase of approximately six percent in its overall revenues, effective May 24, 1991.

The annual increase to an average residential customer would be approximately \$27.72 per year, or 7 percent. This is based on the average of 96 Mcf of natural gas per year. The company's request also proposes an increase in service charges.

About 211,000 customers are affected in an area extending from Pampa, Hereford and Lubbock, Midland and Odessa. Such customers include all sales customers who are not on irrigation or special industrial contracts with the company. The rate request will not affect customers in Amarillo, Dalhart, Channing, Fritch, Sanford and Ozona.

By law, Energas is entitled to recover its cost of service through its rates and charges to customers.

Those costs include cost of gas purchased for distribution, operation and maintenance expenses, depreciation expenses, taxes and a reasonable rate of return on the rate base.

The overall rate of return being requested by Energas in the current filing is 12.13 percent. The last rate adjustment filed by Energas for the West Texas system was in 1984, and the subsequent increase of approximately 17 cents per Mcf was effective Nov. 1, 1984.

While Energas has been able to hold cost increases to a level well below general inflation rates since the last rate request, the increased investment in plant additions made since 1984 and operating cost increases have created the need for additional revenue, said Eugene A. Ehler, president of Energas.

Ehler noted that the company has been successful in its effort at cost containment. "The company has worked diligently to contain its operating and maintenance expenses to a level that is well below the rate of inflation for the period. These efforts are largely responsible for the company's ability to operate nearly seven years without a rate increase."

Governing bodies of the 66 communities in the West Texas system will be provided with additional information from Energas as support for the rate increase request.

In its application to the cities to increase its rates, Energas has proposed an effective date of May 24, 1991. However, the cities have the authority to suspend the operation of the rates filed for a period not to exceed 90 days beyond this date in order to provide more time to study the filing.

"We feel the rate request is necessary and that the company has

demonstrated a commitment to hold costs down," said Ehler. "Energas is prepared to meet with representatives of the 66 communities at the earliest convenient time to discuss the filing."

"Through the years, Energas has worked very closely with the communities it serves, and we have

been able to resolve any differences in rate matters. We are proud of the Energas record of reliable gas supply, dependable and prompt service, and our record as a utility business that has been able to maintain customer rates among the lowest in the state," he said.

BAG IT

On April 15, Hereford Mayor Wes Fisher, and City Commissioners Emory Brownlow, Wayne Winget, Irene Cantu, Terry Langehennig, Tom LeGate and Silvana Juarez signed a proclamation endorsing the "Don't Bag It" Lawn Care Plan as a method to reduce the amount of yard waste being hauled to the city's landfill, and to reduce the amount of water used on city lawns.

Experts say that up to 20-25 percent of the total waste entering landfills comes from yards. In the spring and summer months this amount can be as high as 50 percent. In addition to the landfill space taken by grass clippings, this increased amount of material must be picked up, hauled and properly disposed of by city employees. This labor and cost could be channeled into other areas to meet city needs.

The Deaf Smith County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is sponsoring a "Don't Bag It" program kickoff meeting on Monday, April 22 at 7:00 p.m. in the Banquet Room of the Hereford Community Center for persons wanting to learn more about the "Don't Bag It" Lawn Care Plan. At the meeting, the basic techniques used in the plan will be discussed and information on fertilizing, mowing and watering will be addressed.

Also, at the meeting applications will be taken from persons interested in having demonstration yards. Demonstrators will be furnished free soil testing, fertilizer and assistance in return for following the "Don't Bag It" plan. Demonstration yards will be selected based on location, type of turfgrass and willingness to follow the program.

Dennis Newton, Deaf Smith County Extension Agent is available for civic, clubs, garden clubs, youth groups, church groups, and any organization interested in learning more about the program.

Basics of the plan are provided below. Details on mowing heights, fertilizer rates and fertilizer application dates are provided in a free brochure available in today's Hereford Brand, at the city hall, or the Deaf Smith County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service located in the courthouse. Call 364-3573 for more information.

Watering: During the driest periods of the summer, lawns usually require one inch of water every five to six days. Most hose sprinklers put out one-fourth to one-third inch of water per hour. So to apply one inch of water will require watering for 3 to 4 hours. If water runs off before one inch is applied, turn the sprinkler off for about an hour, then continue watering. The best time to water is in the early morning.

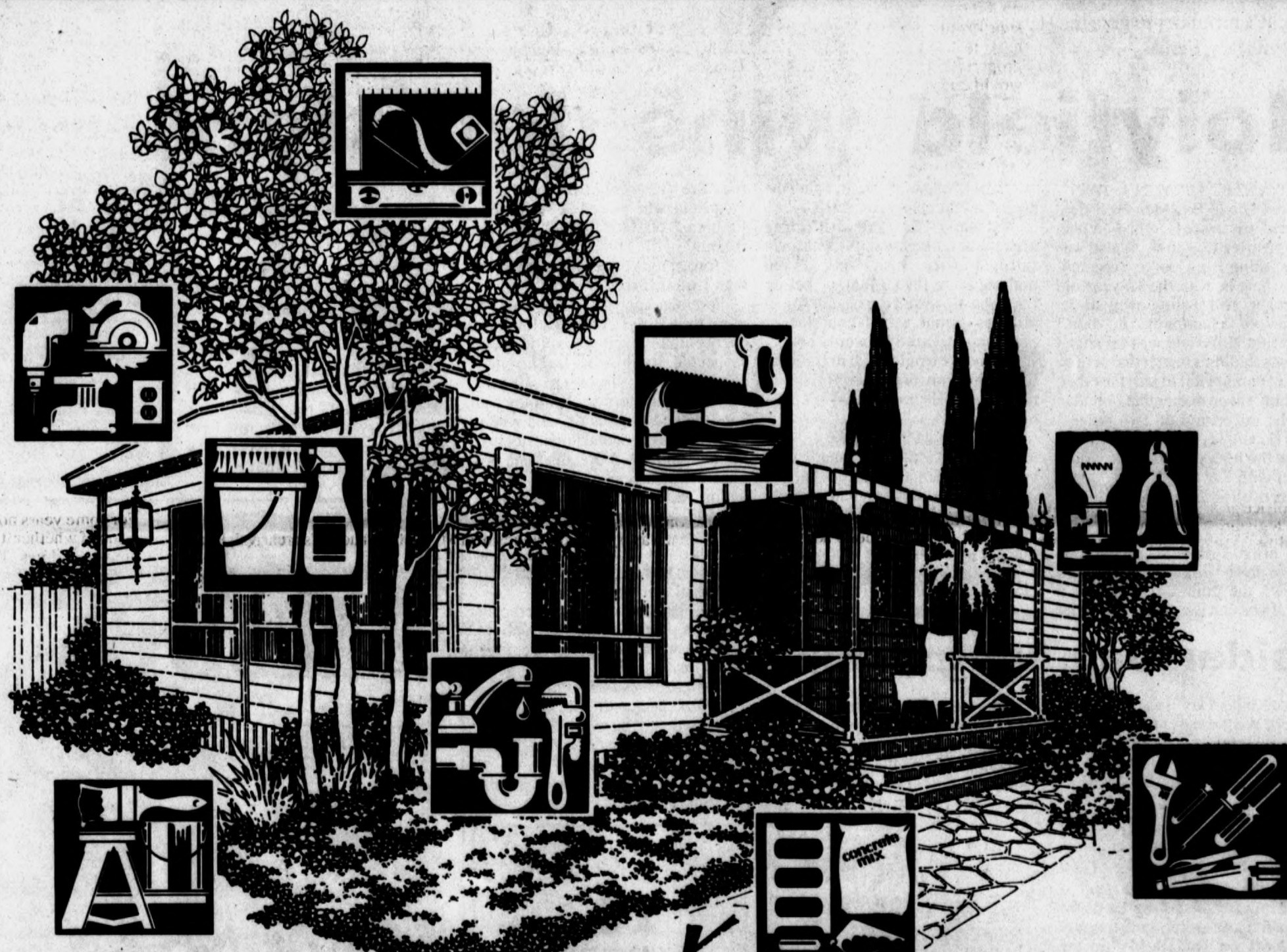
Mowing: For optimum results, mow every five to six days instead of once a week. This shorter interval between mowings may be of concern to many. But over the entire summer from mid-April to mid-October, the average

home lawn would have to be mowed only six to ten more times. Remember, you don't have to bother with the grass catcher, or worry about hauling or bagging the clipping. Surveys conducted in the Fort Worth area for three years have indicated that persons actually spend less total time mowing more frequently than they did prior to adopting the "Don't Bag It" program. As a rule of thumb, do not remove more than a third of the leaf surface at any one time. Grass clippings left on your lawn will not contribute to thatch, but will return valuable nutrients to the soil.

Fertilizing: The ration of nutrients in the fertilizer, and the rate and

frequency of application all affect how fast grass grows. Fertilize only so the lawn can grow at a reasonable rate and still have good color. For slow, even growth, use a fertilizer containing either sulfur-coated urea or ureaformaldehyde as a nitrogen source. Lawns in Hereford will have to have applications of iron to combat the iron chlorosis that is prevalent in high calcium soils. This iron can be applied as iron sulfate or iron chelate, both foliarly or in dry form.

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Holyfield wins decision

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) - The last thing Evander Holyfield expected was to see George Foreman standing after 12 rounds. It also was the last thing Big George expected.

But there he was, the 42-year-old challenger, still wailing away at the 28-year-old champion. It didn't matter that Holyfield was far ahead on points. It didn't matter that neither man had enough left to hurt the other.

It didn't even matter that Foreman won the last round on two judges' cards. He already was a winner, even though the heavyweight title would remain with Holyfield.

"I proved to the whole world you don't have to be ashamed of being a senior citizen," Foreman said Friday night after losing a unanimous decision to the unbeaten Holyfield. "He had the points, but I made a point. If you can live, you can dream.

"I came within inches of being the heavyweight champion."

Not really. The fight wasn't close after the seventh round. But Foreman fulfilled what many considered nothing more than a fantasy before the fight. He tested the champ for 36 minutes, about a half-hour longer than many figured he would last.

"I knew I would have to fight the best fight of my life," said Holyfield, now 26-0. "He proved that at 42 it's not over."

"Who would think, at 42, George would be able to go 12 rounds with me and fight at such a furious pace?"

Holyfield did more than enough. The cards read 116-111, 117-110 and 115-112. Holyfield was stung several times, especially in the second, fifth and seventh, but he never seemed close to going down.

"The toughest part was the

pressure George put on me," said Holyfield, who earned \$20 million to Foreman's \$12.5 million. "He made me move a little more than I wanted. He forced me to take more punches than I wanted to."

Foreman, carrying 257 pounds, 49 more than Holyfield, had a lot more energy than even he could have suspected. In his 24 fights since coming back from a 10-year retirement, the former champion had hand-picked opponents who rarely pushed him beyond one or two rounds. Indeed, Foreman had not gone the distance since 1977, when he lost to Jimmy Young in his only other 12-rounder.

That fight, which Foreman claimed was followed by a religious experience, sent him into retirement and to the life of a preacher.

In his latest sporting life, Foreman has been preaching that age should not be a barrier. He did more to prove that in losing to Holyfield than in all his comeback victories combined.

"We kept our dignity and there was no retreat," he said. "We proved that the age - 40 or 50 or 60 - is not a death sentence."

It will be several months before Holyfield is seen back in the ring. His

manager, Dan Duva, estimated a Holyfield-Mike Tyson fight wouldn't happen before then.

"If Mike Tyson is listening, we want to fight," Duva said. "If Mike Tyson decides to go another way, we won't lose any sleep over it."

Neither Holyfield nor Foreman will lose any sleep over their performance at the Convention Center. They satisfied the crowd and the pay-per-view audience by providing a fight, not a farce.

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Chandler named AD at WT

CANYON, Texas (AP) - Sounding more like a fund-raiser than an athletic director, Mike Chandler, an assistant athletic director at Texas A&I, was named Friday to lead West Texas State's troubled sports program.

"Raising the funds we need to run this program will be a big challenge," Chandler said at a news conference. "And I will say this, it's not going to be a job I'd do by myself. We are going to ask volunteers and the coaches to help mobilize the support we need."

Chandler, 32, signed a three-year contract at \$48,000 a year, said West Texas State President Barry Thompson. Chandler faces the task of rebuilding an athletic department embroiled in controversy.

An audit by the state in October showed the school might have dipped into state and federal funds to bolster the school's sports programs, which were losing about \$1.2 million yearly.

School officials say West Texas State has fallen more than \$2.2 million into debt largely because of overspending in athletics.

Chandler listed a number of priorities including naming a soccer coach, a sports information director, and bringing football and baseball back to campus by the fall of 1992.

Chandler said he also would try and find a conference for West Texas State to play in. The Buffaloes were dropped from the Lone Star Confer-

ence after Thompson cut the school's 80-year-old football program last fall as a way to save money.

Thompson, who took over as president less than a year ago, stressed the importance of raising funds after announcing Chandler's appointment.

Thompson said the athletic department needs to raise \$100,000 a year in order to maintain its status in NCAA Division II.

But Thompson said football may not be the only sport to go if proposed House budget cuts in state services - including \$4 million less for West Texas State - are carried out.

"I eliminated football last fall, and we would have to eliminate all other intercollegiate athletics," Thompson said. "We have no choice."

Chandler said he realizes the peril facing the school's sports programs. "We'll just have to hope the cuts are not as drastic as they appear to be."

Thompson, in his first-year as president at West Texas State, dropped the school's 80-year-old football program on Dec. 21, 1990, in effort to stop the hemorrhaging budget.

Chandler received his bachelor's degree from Baylor and a master's degree from Howard Payne University.

Control home pests

Q. - The 65-year-old house I recently purchased has some bad floor joints. New wood framing members were placed beside the old. The old floor joints are peppered with 1/4-inch holes. They are thoroughly tunneled full of wood dust.

I tore down some of the worst floor joints with my hands and saw several insects that looked like silverfish. What can I apply to kill the insects and prevent further damage? Someone recommended coating the framing with used motor oil.

A. - Your description sounds like the work of powder post beetles rather than silverfish. Silverfish, though a common pest, do not eat or damage wood. Powder post beetles, however, do.

The beetles lay their eggs in cracks and crevices in the surface of the unfinished wood. After the eggs hatch, the larvae feed and tunnel through the wood, reducing it to a powdery residue. Just prior to emerging from the wood, the newly formed adult beetles chew small round holes (1/32nd- to 1/8-inch diameter) in the wood surface. Shortly after emerging, the beetles mate and lay eggs, occasionally depositing them in the opening of an old exit hole, and reinfesting the same piece of wood.

Those joints that have extensive damage have been infested by several generations of powder post beetles. It's very possible that the floor joints were infested before being used in constructing your house.

Definitely do not use motor oil to coat the joints. The motor oil would create a fire hazard and produce unpleasant odors in your basement.

Controlling active infestation is best handled by a licensed pest control operator using either liquid treatment or fumigation. Both methods present potential environmental hazards and should be administered by a professional. While this may be costlier than attempting the job yourself, it should also give you a guarantee that the beetles will have been destroyed.

You should also check to see that the replacement joints have not become infested from the older ones beside them. If they have, then you may have to replace these as well, but only after you are certain that the

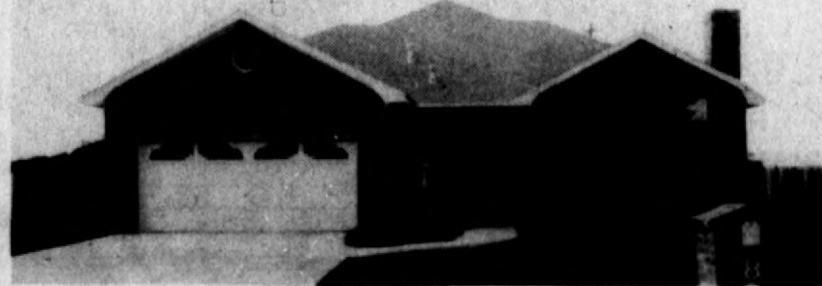
problem has been solved permanently.

The coloring agents or pigments used in early paints were largely earth-based. For example, some reds came from iron oxide, yellows from ochre, black from lamp black, and blues from cobalt. Because of this you never got the same color twice. So a painter had to prepare a big enough batch of paint to complete the

job on hand to ensure uniformity of color.

(Many old-house restorers long for the rather uneven look of old, milk-painted walls. One company that still makes milk paint the old-fashioned way, using earth-based pigments for a truly authentic look is The Old-Fashioned Milk Paint Co., Box 222, Groton, MA 01450).

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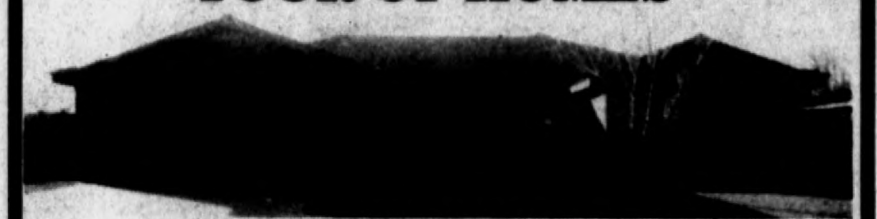
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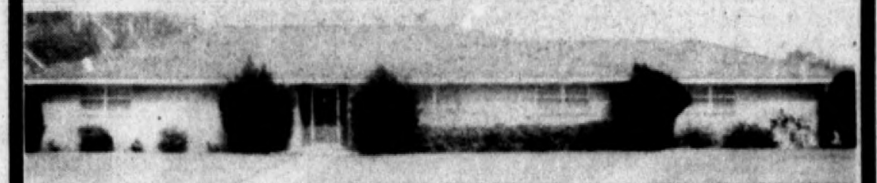

Cowboys trade for top draft choice

IRVING, Texas (AP) - The Dallas Cowboys now have the No. 1 choice in Sunday's NFL draft, but will select Notre Dame wide receiver Rocket Ismail only if they can sign him to a contract by the start of the draft, majority owner Jerry Jones said.

The Cowboys acquired the top draft choice Friday from the New England Patriots, dealing away one of their own first-round selections, a second-round pick and "other considerations."

"We're very excited about the prospect of holding the No. 1 overall selection in the draft," Jones said. The Cowboys also have the No. 12 and No. 14 picks in the first round, as well as two picks apiece in the third and fourth rounds.

The Cowboys have the first pick for the second time in three years. Dallas used the 1989 pick to take quarterback Troy Aikman.

In simultaneous news conferences Friday afternoon, the Cowboys and

Patriots announced the deal, which would allow the Cowboys to take Ismail if they decide to do so.

In anticipation of the possibility Dallas might obtain the first pick, Norv Turner, the Cowboys' new offensive coordinator, spent the better part of Thursday studying Ismail on Notre Dame game tapes, envisioning his 4.29-second speed over 40 yards.

"He gives you that big-play capability with reverses, screens and throwing downfield," Turner said. "He's a guy people are going to get nervous about. The dimension of the big play is a factor in every game."

But although Ismail is considered the cream of the draft pool and he says he is eager to play for Dallas, that doesn't mean the Cowboys automatically will issue Ismail uniform No. 25 when they go on the NFL's 15-minute draft clock for the first pick at noon EDT Sunday.

Jones emphatically said the Cowboys won't draft Ismail unless they can agree on contract terms first.

When Johnson was asked if there is a self-imposed deadline for having Ismail signed, he said: "12:15 Eastern Time Sunday."

If the Cowboys don't sign Ismail, they likely will turn toward defensive tackle Russell Maryland, who played for Johnson at the University of Miami; cornerback Todd Lyght; linebacker Mike Croel; and offensive tackle Charles McRae.

Now that the Cowboys have the first pick in the draft, they can legally begin contract negotiations with as many players as they choose. They began doing so Friday, getting in touch with McCrae's agent, Don Yee.

Jones might be able to accomplish his pre-draft intention of signing all first-round players by Sunday night.

Cowboys player personnel director Bob Ackles and minority owner Mike McCoy already had preliminary discussions Friday with Ismail's representatives, Ed Abram and Louis Duvernay. McCoy did not rule out the possibility of a face-to-face meeting today.

Although the Cowboys received calls from Denver and Atlanta, two teams interested in trading up for the No. 1 pick, Cowboys officials said their intention is to sign Ismail.

If not, the Cowboys could draft another player with the first choice

or trade down for an additional second-round pick or a player. Atlanta has the No. 3 pick and Denver the No. 4 pick Sunday. Cleveland has the second pick.

"As you've found out with the Cowboys, anything is a possibility," Johnson said.

In the 26 months that Jimmy Johnson has been the Cowboys' head coach, he has made 26 trades, including those that sent running back Herschel Walker to Minnesota and quarterback Steve Walsh to New Orleans for draft choices and players.

The first-round choice traded to the Patriots was the No. 11 pick, which the Cowboys obtained from the Vikings in the Walker trade. They gave up their No. 14 pick in the

second round, the 41st selection overall.

Jones refused to divulge the "other considerations" involved in the Friday's trade, but Sam Jankovich, the Patriots' chief executive officer, said New England will be able to choose two players next week from a pre-determined list of current Cowboys players or a draft choice for next year.

"It'll be players, not draft picks," Jones said later Friday. "That will be determined in the next few days."

The Dallas Morning News quoted an NFL source as saying the Cowboys gave the Patriots a choice of three veteran players from a six-player list that included linebackers Eugene Lockhart and David Howard and

cornerbacks Ron Francis and Robert Williams.

Lockhart said he would consider retirement if he is included in the trade.

Later Friday, New England sent its No. 1 pick of the second round, the 28th pick overall, and the 18th pick of the fourth round to Houston for the Oilers' first-round selection, the 17th overall.

The Patriots first agreed to send the first and 28th choices to Dallas for the 11th and 14th and future considerations, Jankovich said. Then Johnson, whom Jankovich hired as head coach at Miami, suggested that the teams keep the 14th and 28th picks and that Dallas include the 41st.

Jankovich said he agreed to that because he wanted to use the 28th choice in the deal with Houston.

Oilers look to draft to improve defense

HOUSTON (AP) - The Houston Oilers will be looking toward defense in Sunday's NFL draft.

While the run-and-shoot Oilers last year led the NFL in total offense and quarterback Warren Moon was second to Buffalo's Jim Kelly in passing, the defense had trouble getting the ball in the hands of its offense.

"We'd like to get stronger on defense so we can get the offense back on the field," General Manager Mike Holovak said.

The Oilers ranked 11th of 28 NFL defenses last year and likely will look first at cornerbacks because of the losses of former starters Patrick Allen and Steve Brown.

"We have no critical needs, we're just looking to make the ball club stronger," Holovak said.

The Oilers on Friday traded their first round pick, 17th overall, to New England for the Patriots' second round pick, the 28th overall.

Holovak said he doesn't expect the quality of players to be much different between No. 17 and No. 28.

"I've said all along the key to the draft is what you do after the first round," Holovak said. "We've now got seven of the first 101 picks."

"We feel that one of the players we want will still be available when we make the 28th pick," Holovak said. "I'm hoping against all hope that we'll be able to get two of the guys we really want in the second round."

Ohio State cornerback Vince Clark and Illinois cornerback Henry Jones, who also can play safety, reportedly top the Oilers' list.

"There's a lot of good defensive backs out there," Holovak said. "Deep down, I prefer a corner over a safety, unless the safety really stands out. It's easier to move a corner to safety than it is a safety to cornerback."

The Patriots, who earlier Friday gave up the No. 1 pick in a trade with Dallas, gave Houston one of their four fourth round selections, although which one has not been decided.

If the Patriots do not deal the fifth pick in the fourth round to Denver, it belongs to the Oilers. If that trade is made, the Oilers get New England's third pick in the fourth round, 100th overall. The Oilers have the 101st choice, which is their regular pick in the round.

As it stands, the Oilers have the 28th, 38th, 44th, 71st, 79th, 100th and 101st picks in the draft's first four rounds.

The Oilers traded away their sixth round pick to the Philadelphia Eagles for quarterback Don McPherson.

The Oilers traded for McPherson last season when backup quarterback Cody Carlson was a contract holdout. Carlson is unsigned again this year but Coach Jack Pardee isn't worried.

"At quarterback we feel real good," Pardee said. "Everybody keeps trying to give us a quarterback (in trades). I'd be more inclined to look at a developmental quarterback, if any."

Dee Thomas is the lone backup at cornerback for starters Cris Dishman and Richard Johnson and Pardee also is looking for more safeties.

"This area is our most pressing need," Pardee said. "We lost Brown and Allen, and (Terry) Kinard is getting old. I'm sure we'll go for a defensive back fairly soon."

The Oilers already helped themselves defensively with Plan B free agents. They signed free safety John Hagy from Buffalo, defensive end Robert Banks from Cleveland, and wide receivers Richard Johnson from Detroit and Cedric Jones from New England.

Other areas that might attract Oiler interest are both lines. The Oilers expect defensive tackle Jeff Alm to play more this season and Pardee could move Ray Childress back to defensive end.

"This is just not a great year for defensive linemen, we'll certainly look at some but we don't have a high enough choice to get the good ones," Pardee said.

The Oilers have one of the best offensive lines in the NFL, anchored by Mike Munchak and Bruce Matthews.

"I'm sure we'll go for an offensive lineman, I just don't know how high," Pardee said. "There's a little age there too."

Dean Steinkuhler, Don Maggs, Munchak and Matthews all will be 30 years old this season.

The Oilers, who lost kicker Tony Zendejas to Plan B, won't look to the draft for a kicking prospect to compete with Teddy Garcia, who replaced Zendejas when he was injured last season.

"We're looking for a kicker but not through the draft, we'll go the NFL route," Pardee said.

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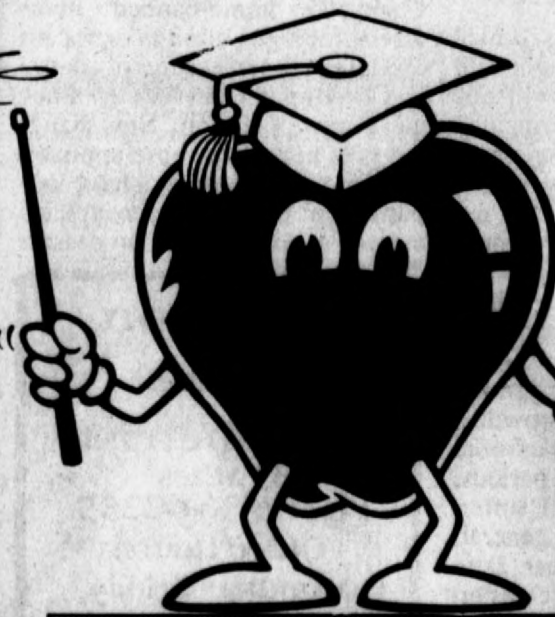

Extension News

When it's time for spring cleaning, an important room to keep in mind is the kitchen where food is stored, prepared and eaten.

The kitchen needs to be kept clean and food must be stored safely. Start by checking the refrigerator and freezer to make sure safe temperatures are maintained for storing perishable foods. An appliance thermometer can be used. The refrigerator temperature needs to be between 34 degrees and 40 degrees Fahrenheit. The temperature will vary somewhat in different parts of the refrigerator so check for the coldest places to store most perishables like meats, dairy products and eggs. The freezer should register 0 degrees F. or lower. Keeping the refrigerator and freezer clean will help maintain safe temperatures. Clean and defrost insides, and clean lint and dust from the motor and refrigerating unit. Check door gaskets for tightness.

Any spoiled foods or those which have an expired "use-by" date should be discarded. Mold on any meats, soft or semi-soft cheese, fermented dairy products such as sour cream or yogurt signals that need to discard these products. If hard cheese has a small mold growth, substantial trimming of the mold from the cheese can save it. Heavy mold growth on a small portion of cheese may not be worth the risk. Throw it away. Also, clean up any spills in the refrigerator. These encourage bacteria growth.

Check freezer foods. While frozen food stays safe for extended periods, the texture and flavor will suffer. Rotate frozen foods and, in general, use within six months to a year. Date all items so rotation will be easier. Packages with frost inside or with

freezer burn will probably show loss of quality.

Check the cabinets and pantry. Ideally, foods should be stored in the coolest cabinets in the kitchen. Heat speeds up deterioration of foods.

Avoid storing foods near sources of heat such as range, oven, dishwasher or hot water heater. Also, don't store foods under the kitchen sink where water and pipe connections encourage pest and rodent entry.

Check pantry items such as flour, spices, cereals and grains for signs of insect infestation. If you see little black bugs, throw the infested products away. Clean the storage area and sanitize. Store these types of goods in air-tight containers. Moldy breads should also be discarded and not eaten.

Check cans and jars for rust, dents, cracks, leaks or bulges. Don't taste any suspicious foods. Throw them away. Again check "used-by" dates. Set up a system of "first-in", "first-out" to ensure the use of oldest foods first. Generally, it's best to use canned goods within one year, especially home-canned items. Check for signs of pests or rodents and take proper measures of control.

Check appliances for cleanliness and proper operation. Now may be the time to replace those appliance parts or repair those you have been putting off. Cleanliness for appliances such as can openers, processors,

slicers, blenders, etc. is important to help prevent cross-contamination of foods with disease-causing bacteria. Be sure you have a good supply of clean dish rags and sponges. These items harbor bacteria very well.

Spring may be a good time to do a thorough kitchen search and cleaning, but habits established on a regular basis to keep foods and the kitchen safe are one good way to maintain food quality and safety, and get the most from the food dollar.

CCA membership drive currently underway

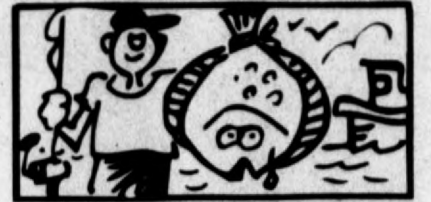
The public is invited to join the Hereford Community Concert Association during its annual membership drive which is being conducted through April 27.

For years I couldn't go to a sports event, a grocery store, a restaurant or a movie for fear I'd have an attack. The law degree I had struggled so hard to acquire was of no value because it was nearly impossible for me to work outside my home.

I became addicted to tranquilizers and tried every anti-depressant on the market. Nothing worked. In fact, the drugs produced deeper feelings of anxiety and insecurity. What turned my life around was meditating, going to support group meetings and reading books in the library on anxiety and phobias. A certain magic takes over when people who share the same problem get together to help each other. Please print this letter for those who are now where I was five years ago. -- Feeling Fit in Indiana

on clothes. Pow! Out of nowhere it hit me. I thought I was dying. I went to a doctor who said, "You're in excellent health," and sent me to a psychiatrist. The psychiatrist said, "You don't need me. You need a support group." And that's where I finally got well.

CHICAGO: Thanks to your column, Ann, I now know that I am not the only one who has panic attacks. I hyperventilate, my heart beats a mile a minute, I get dizzy and then hot and cold, all the while afraid I'll pass out and people will think I am drunk. I've already made an appointment with a doctor for a complete checkup. If I'm OK, I'm

going to look up a self-help group. Thanks a million.

PALM SPRINGS: Approximately 24 million people in the United States suffer from anxiety disorders. Fewer than one out of four seek treatment. There are self-help groups in every state and in Canada. One that is extremely effective is Phobias Anonymous. Between the Covers

In the book *Growing Up Isn't Hard To Do If You Start Out As a Kid*, Dr. David Heller focuses on six basic subjects: marriage and dating, parenthood, food, worldly possessions, work and the trials and tribulations of growing up itself.

Dr. Heller, a psychologist, has an uncanny ability to get children to talk, to gab and philosophize with a freedom they rarely display round adults. With the assistance of several public school systems, Dr. Heller found hundreds of children, between the ages of four and 10, who wanted to share their ideas about every day life. The result is a book brimming with perceptive wisdom as well as laugh-out-loud humor and startling insight.

The book will reawaken the child in each of us that loves to laugh and poke fun and that envisions life as a glorious playground in which we can be ourselves. Some of the questions and answers are: Q: "How would the world be different if people didn't get married?" A: "There would be a lot of kids to explain, wouldn't there?" from Kelvin, age 8. The court proceedings leading up to the settlement were so bitter that a negotiator was called in to mediate all legal discussions.

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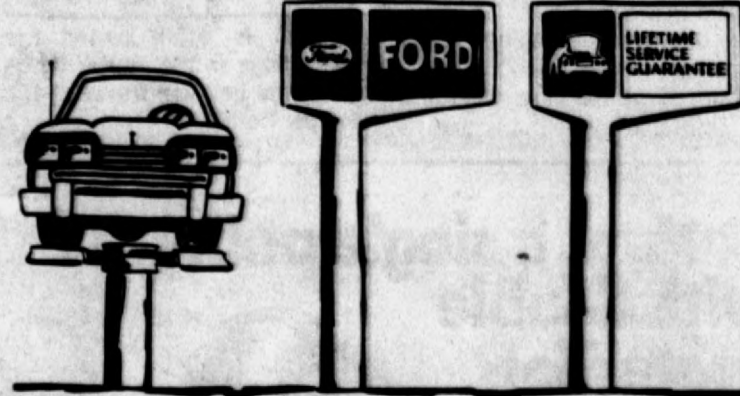

Get second opinion before jumping into surgery

Warning: Shopping may be dangerous to your financial health.

When you think you're taking advantage of low prices and "good deals," others may be deviously taking advantage of you.

Some stores try to entice you by running "clearance" sales that never seem to end. When you call an airline about its "new low fare," it's not uncommon to find the inexpensive seats all sold, but others available at higher prices.

Whether it's minimum-cost health care insurance, low interest bank loans, or discount telephone services, do as a magazine article recently admonished it readers: "Don't Get Ripped Off--Get Smart."

You owe it to yourself to get and understand all the facts. Comparison shopping is fundamental, and that's true whether your prospective purchase is an automobile or health care services. If, for example, your doctor recommends surgery for treatment of a non-emergency medical problem, you may want to get a second opinion.

Surgery of any sort is an unpleasant event for most people to contemplate. Take the case of foot surgery. Podiatric physicians also

look upon surgery as a last resort, and generally exhaust all avenues of conservative medical treatment before recommending surgery.

Most foot surgery can properly and safely be performed in a podiatrist's office or clinic; if it is more complex, it will be done in a hospital outpatient setting, or with a short hospital stay.

The correction of ingrown nails, bunions and hammertoes; removal of warts and soft-tissue benign tumors; and tendon operations comprise the bulk of podiatric medical surgery.

There is no good reason for a patient to be overly concerned about surgical scars. The stitches are sometimes visible while healing proceeds, but others are beneath the surface of the skin and don't have to be removed.



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1991 year to dress

East coast, west coast - and all points in between - fashion-savvy career women bent on dressing for success will be reaching into their closets this spring for a dress. When combined with a jacket it's the power suit of the season, according to fashion directors nationwide.

"This is the year of the dress," says Joan Kaner, senior vice president and fashion director of Neiman-Marcus, based in Dallas. "It's the No. 1 trend of the season and will sell across the board in all our stores around the country."

In California, where the climate is warm and the atmosphere more casual, "sleeveless dresses will have easy acceptance," says Kaner. In New York, on the other hand, "most women will want the cover-up of a jacket."

Either way, you get a lot of added mileage out of a dress, explains Kaner. "It can stand on its own, or you can team it with a matching jacket or coat, which gives it all the versatility of a suit with the bonus of a dress."

One of the best-selling shapes is the body-skimming chemise, which is '60s-inspired in a Jackie Kennedy kind of way, particularly when teamed with short white gloves and structured handbags. There's also the billowy trapeze dress, a popular shape for coats as well. Marc Jacobs, the designer for Perry Ellis, has a group of cap-sleeved dresses and swing coats in pastels.

Ideal for the office, these silhouettes are figure-friendly. "Chemises, A-lines and trapeze dresses will be welcome because of their easy fit," explains Pat Morren, fashion director for Joslins in Denver.

Jackets frequently take the long route, with just a hint of dress peeking out. "The jacket seems to look better over shorter pieces underneath," notes Wilmer Weiss of I. Magnin in San Francisco.

Calvin Klein, whose collection concentrates on the dress-plus-jacket formula, likes jackets that land below the hip to just above the dress hemline.

Typically jackets remain long, even when combined with skirts.

Anne Klein II has a long silk tunic jacket in multicolor floral silk, \$252, with matching tank, \$92, and khaki pull-on skirt, \$170 at I. Magnin.

When it comes to hemlines, microscopic runway lengths are best left on the runway. With a nod to reality, department stores are filling up their racks with dresses that are considerably longer. "The real fashion customer will look for a length 1 1/2 inches above the knee," says Lavelle Olexa, senior vice president of fashion merchandising at Lord & Taylor in New York.

Weiss of I. Magnin agrees. "For the most conservative offices keep your hemlines at the knee or above."

On the other hand, notes Weiss, "those who can afford to be more daring in their office environments can go even shorter." How high dare you go and still be taken seriously in the boardroom? Around four to five inches above the knee, Weiss says.

Hemlines also fall prey to geographic location. "On either coast you have a lot more leeway than in the South or Midwest, where there's a tendency to be more traditional in style," says Kaner of Neiman-Marcus.

City shorts can help you skirt the hemline dilemma. "They'll be appropriate in some office situations because of their fullness," says Olexa. Keep them conservative, to the top of the knee, she advises. Treat

them like a skirt and wear them with heels.

City shorts in serious colors like navy and taupe add to the business-like appearance. Lord & Taylor has Liz Claiborne Collection's navy linen walking shorts, \$68, with jade linen jacket, \$136, and a short sleeve lime or iris silk T-shirt, \$68.

I. Magnin has Katherine Conover's taupe rayon city short suit with short sleeve jacket and pull-on pant, \$278 for the set.

Whatever you choose, go for color, sizzling or floral. "The two most important issues for career dressing this season are the dress and color," advises Olexa. Hot pink, orange and green blaze an incendiary trail through the spring '91 collections. "A bright accessory or jacket updates your look and allows you to be a little more creative in the office," she says.

Bill Blass' basic suit of the season is a vivid all-over floral double-faced wool sleeveless semi-fitted dress with matching jacket with notch collar, about \$4,500. A silk crepe long sleeve chemise in white with pink dots is about \$1,600. Both are sold at Saks Fifth Avenue, I. Magnin and Neiman-Marcus nationwide.

If economy is your goal, you can stretch your budget by taking your cue from residents of cities like Denver and San Francisco, where volatile weather conditions encourage more versatile wardrobes.

"Colorado doesn't really have spring except in magazines," explains Morren of Joslins. "We have winter and summer, and it can all happen in the same day or by driving a few miles." Morren's strategy: black and winter white can be worn throughout the year, as well as wool knit, jersey, gabardine, silk and angora blends.

Lightweight wools are a best bet for Neiman-Marcus' Joan Kaner. "As I travel around the country," says Kaner, "I can wear that fabric twelve months out of the year. The versatility of thin wool gets to be almost universal."

"In San Francisco, where I'm based," says Weiss of I. Magnin, "our weather changes quickly, so a lot of women opt for year-round suits. And the new dresses with coats are ideal."

Weiss also likes slim trousers, in go-with-everything neutral shades like taupe, navy, black and white.

The best update for this season's wardrobe? You won't be sorry if you opt for investment-worthy accessories such as this season's patent leather sling pump - "a must-have," says Weiss.

-Less is more: For a three-day business trip, all you need is one suit, two shirts and three ties. The valet service can clean the first shirt, and it will look different with a different tie. Shirts of white, light blue and ivory make the most sense; ties in solids, stripes and paisleys provide variety without loudness. Choose

colors that match so you can make as many combinations as possible from the fewest items.

-The man in the beige flannel suit: Experts in international business know that certain colors elicit emotional responses and when traveling on business to foreign countries or other unknown locales, subtle and neutral tones inspire confidence while suggesting individuality and creativity. The man in the grey flannel suit won't offend anyone, but he won't make much of an impression, either. Avoid loud or excessively bright colors or patterns, and opt for a wide variety of rich, deep shades.

-Aromatic etiquette: The same thing applies to wearing fragrance. When traveling internationally, consider general preferences around the world. For instance, Europeans prefer and expect a bold fragrance while Americans prefer a subtler scent. To be comfortable yourself, and to avoid offending your foreign colleagues, choose a scent that is fresh and clean, and wear it liberally. Avoid spicy fragrances.

-Packing scent: There's no shortage of men's fragrance forms, but you only have to pack a few essentials. Try using a scented talc instead of cologne or after-shave for doing business with strangers. David Feldman has published a series of **Imponderables**. He finds answers to questions like "Why are tennis balls fuzzy?" and "Why do doctors tap on our backs during physical exams?"

I really got a kick out of reading his latest publication entitled **When Do Fish Sleep**. Here's a few of the questions which were posed to Feldman and the answers he sought from professionals and lay people.

Q. What do restaurants that specialize in frogs legs do with the rest of the frog?

A. Restaurants buy only the legs of the frogs. What suppliers of frogs' legs do with the rest of the frog is too gruesome to even contemplate.

Q. What are dimples and why do only some people have them?

A. Dimples are a generic name for indentations of the skin. They are produced when muscle fibers are attached to the deep surface of the skin, such as in the cheek or chin. They are most likely to appear where the skin is most tightly attached to the underlying bone. So all this time when we've envied those with dimples we didn't realize that they were exhibiting an anatomical flaw!

Q. Why don't migrating birds get jet lag or do they?

A. No, birds don't seem to suffer from jet lag. But then again they don't suffer from airport delays, crowded seating, inedible airline food or lost luggage, either.

Birds, unlike humans, don't try to fly from New York to Australia in one day. Some migrations can take weeks. Birds don't stretch their physical limits unless they have to, such as flying over a large body of water.

Q. Why do dogs have black lips?

A. According to veterinarian Dr. Peter Ihrke, pigmentation helps protect animals against solar radiation damage. However, not all dogs have black lips.

Q. Why do golf balls have dimples?

A. Dimples in the balls provide greater aerodynamic lift and consistency of flight than a smooth ball.

Q. Why do we have to close our eyes when we sneeze?

A. Dr. G.H. Drumheller of the International Rhinological Society said, "We close our eyes when sneezing to keep the eyes from extruding. When a person sneezes, all body functions cease. Tremendous stress is put on the body by the sneeze, especially the eyes.

Q. Why don't queen-sized sheets fit my queen-sized bed?

A. The sheet industry has experienced problems with fitted sheets for all sizes, not only queen size. The problem is primarily due to the fact that mattress manufacturers have been increasing the depth of their mattresses. As one tries to get an edge on the other, they outsize them by half an inch. There are no standard mattress depths.

Q. Why does your whole body ache when you get a cold or flu?

A. When a virus enters your bloodstream, it releases several compounds that mount your body's defense against infection. Interferon, interleukin and prostaglandins are among the body's most valuable compounds. They raise a fever, shift the metabolism and increase blood flow to areas of the body that need it.

The aching and other symptoms seem to be the "price" that's paid for mounting a defense against the infection.

Q. Why do cattle guards work?

A. Cows are afraid to walk where their feet can't get solid footing, not because they are afraid there are demons underground shooting BB pellets between the bars of the cattle guards.

Q. How does the Campbell Soup Co. determine which letters to put in their alphabet soup? Are there an equal number of each letter?

A. A Campbell spokesperson says the company makes two sizes of letters for their soups and that the company does not discriminate against any letter. All are equally represented.

Q. Why do fingernails grow faster than toenails?

A. Trauma makes nails grow faster and we use our fingers more than we do our toes, therefore, toenails don't get the stimulation that fingernails do. Besides, circulation is much more sluggish in the feet than in the hands.

Q. How does a gas pump "know" when to shut off when the fuel tank is full?

A. A sensing device, located about one inch from the end of the nozzle, does nothing while fuel is flowing in the gas tank, but is tripped as soon as fuel backs up into the nozzle. The sensing device tells the nozzle to shut off.

Q. Why don't birds tip over when they sleep on a telephone wire?

A. The secret to birds' built-in security system is their specialized tendons that control their toes. As the bird sits on its perch, its weight stretches the tendons so that the toes flex, move forward, and lock around the perch.

Q. Why do roaches always die on their backs?

A. When a roach dies, its legs stiffen and the cockroach falls on its side. Because most roaches have a flattened body form with narrow sides, the momentum of the fall rolls them on their backs.

Q. What causes bags under the eyes?

A. There are four main reasons...heredity, fluid retention, aging and too many smiles and frowns.

Q. Why do we seem to feel worse at night when we have a cold?

A. Nasal obstruction, produced by a great variety of conditions, usually seems worse to a patient when he is lying down. This is because tissue fluids and blood tend to pool in the head more when he is recumbent than when he is standing.

Q. Why do so many cough medicines contain alcohol?

A. No, it isn't true, despite the fact that hairdressers say it is.

Q. Why do Kellogg's Rice Krispies snap, crackle and pop?

A. Milled rice is combined with flavoring, sugar, vitamins and minerals and then hot air dried. During the drying process, bubbles form in each puff. When the consumer adds milk to the cereal, the puffs swell and causes a strain on the remaining crisp portion, breaking down some of the starch structure and producing the famous "snap, crackle and pop."

Q. Why do we dream more profusely when we nap than we do overnight?

A. According to sleep experts, we dream just as much at night as we do when we take a nap. However, we recall our afternoon nap dreams much more easily than our dreams at night.

Q. Why do two horses in an open field always seem to stand head to tail?

A. Horses, unlike people, don't bother to make the pretense of listening to what companions have to say. And also, unlike humans, horses have tails. Rather than stand around face-to-face boring each other, figures the horse, wouldn't it be more practical to stand head to tail? This way, with one swish of the tail, a horse can rid its body of flies and other insects while knocking the bugs

off of the head of the other horse.

The noon meal taken care of, Bishop pours a cup of coffee and pauses to chat with a reporter at the kitchen table. Gov. Ann Richards rushes through the kitchen on the way to the car, slowing down long enough to hand Bishop the March issue of Bon Appetit magazine. Page 70 is marked with a note: "Sarah, great-sounding dinner, particularly the snapper...A."

Bishop accepts the article with enthusiasm. It's the first menu suggestion she's received from the governor. In the few months Richards has been in office, the governor has been so busy there has been little time for culinary communication, Bishop says. And there is no spouse in this administration to consult with about menus.

"All I knew was she liked everything," Bishop says.

With that food freedom, Bishop has planned the menus with the veteran assistance of mansion administrator Anne DeBois, who keeps a file of guests and menus, and caterer Megan Bowman, who works part time in the kitchen. "We look at the functions for the week and work back from there," Bishop says.

"Most of the input I get from the governor is when she likes things. She comes in and tells us the food was good..."

Bishop said she had planned to leave when outgoing Gov. and Mrs. Bill Clements did. But she decided to apply for a job with the new governor. She couldn't resist the new challenge. The Richards administration has brought a change in menus from traditional to trendy.

The Clementses favored continental meals such as lamb or beef tenderloin, usually with a sauce, rice, potatoes, wheat rolls and ice cream. They ate at set hours and entertained more at dinner than lunch.

"The Clementses were easy to work for. If they didn't like something, they said so. They were also very appreciative."

During the Clements administration, the mansion's two ice cream makers saw lots of action, says Bishop. "The Clementses were big ice cream fans; they especially liked the burnt sugar ice cream."

Mrs. Clements, however, was very cholesterol-conscious. "But it's difficult to fix the type of food we need to serve here and avoid cholesterol."

With the Richards administration, mealtimes and menus are less structured. The governor is not much of a breakfast person, so Bishop sends muffins - blueberry-carrot, apple, banana bran - to the office with her.

The big meal for this administration is lunch, and the menu is often creative. A recent luncheon, for instance, featured spinach and fennel salad, and won ton-ravioli stuffed with Oriental chicken served over leeks with a cream sauce. Dessert was strawberry shortcake.

Everyone ate everything on the won ton-ravioli plate, Bishop says. "That's my gauge. The plates come back really clean 98 percent of the time."

Because the governor is a recovering alcoholic, Bishop no

longer cooks with alcohol, often using vinegar and lemon juice instead for sauce reductions.

The almost daily luncheons include a salad, entree and dessert. Not much bread for this administration, although focaccia (savory Italian flatbread) was on one March menu.

Desserts, prepared daily, tend to be homestyle: Brownies, blueberry-carrot picnic cake, spice prune cake, apple cake ("the governor likes apple cake"), apple crisp and fruit tarts.

Fresh is the focus of the menus. DeBois says, "We've never opened a can in this mansion or served a frozen vegetable except spinach, or produce from the mansion garden that we've frozen ourselves." Mansion administrator for the past eight years, DeBois keeps track of the estimated \$3,000 monthly food-and-beverage entertaining budget, which comes from private funding.

The mansion garden is one of their assets. "It's wonderful," says Bishop. "Last year we had a great tomato crop. We made three huge batches of tomato sauce for the freezer."

Bishop's job includes more than cooking. It's whatever the governor needs in the way of food from preparation to service, whether it is for a special event for 300 or a legislators' luncheon for 12.

And her work is not all good food and glamour. She scrubs grills and does dishes. Even though there are two automatic dishwashers in the well-equipped kitchen, there is no commercial pot washer.

Bishop has been in the mansion kitchen since 1986, when she began as a part-time prep cook for parties under the late chef Larry Adams. She's never been to chef's school.

"I'm an artist," explains Bishop, 30. Reared in Houston, she came to Austin a dozen years ago to study at the University of Texas, where she received a degree in fine arts.

Now food is her medium, and it's one she took to quickly. "I have such a feel for food that I know when it's going to work," says Bishop, who picked up hands-on experience working under Adams. She also gained culinary knowledge from chef Raymond Tatum, while running the pantry Jeffrey's Restaurant.

"I like Raymond, do not use recipes. I'm of the dump-and-pour school of cooking," she says.

For Bishop, there was one hesitation to being mansion chef: "The Bohemian, or artist side of me, is reluctant to commit to 40 hours a week."

So she signed on for 20 hours, which has increased to 30-plus. Days may begin at 7 a.m. or end at 10 p.m., but most of the time she tries to get out of the kitchen by mid-afternoon. (She still waits tables at Jeffrey's, mostly on weekends, crediting it with helping overcome her shyness.)

Bishop does not do all the cooking alone. She relies on Bowman, a local caterer, for help with everything from creative menu collaborations to parties and dinners.

One of their greatest challenges is that the numbers change constantly for meals and events at the mansion, sometimes several times in one day.

As a buffer, Bishop and Bowman cook a few extra portions for the staff. If unexpected guests show up, the staff eats sandwiches.



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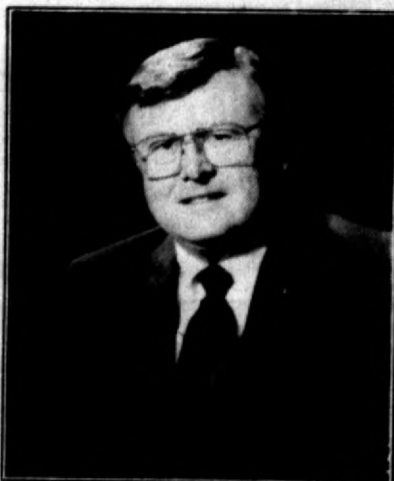

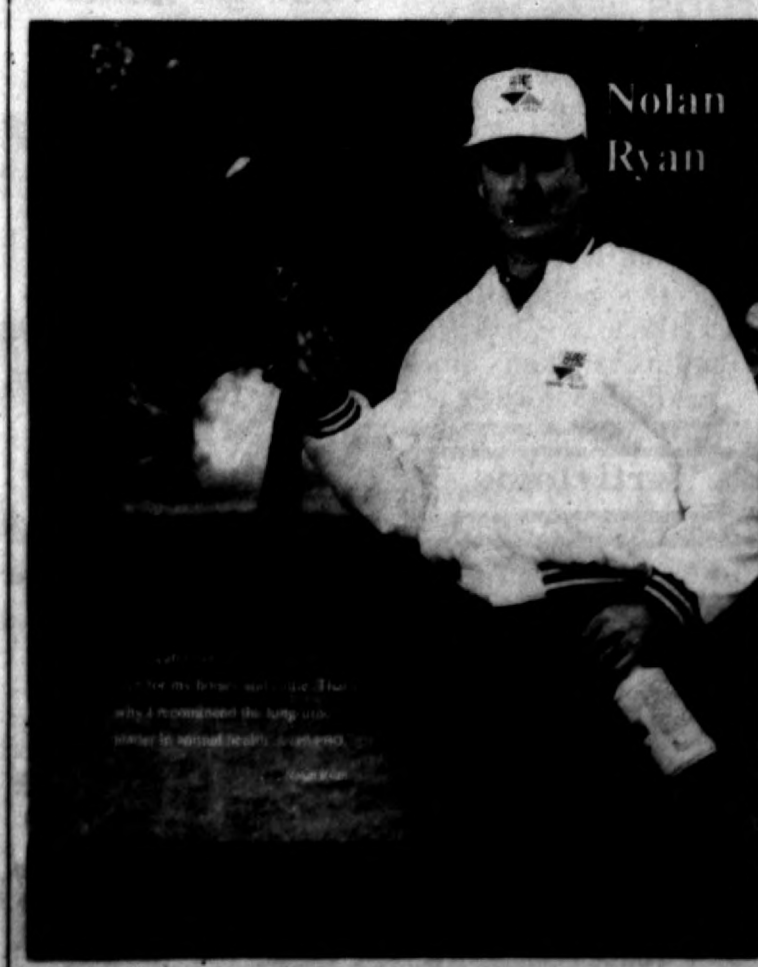

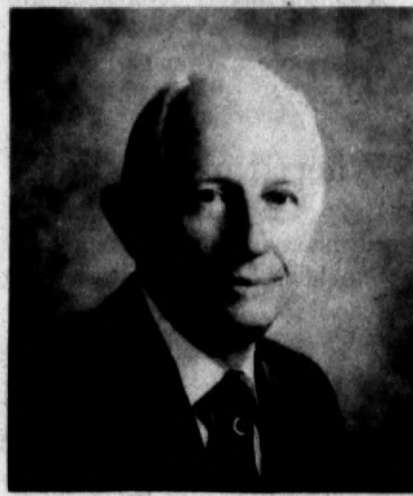

Education At A Crossroads

Many Americans are giving our public educational system a failing mark in preparing today's students for tomorrow's workforce. According to a recent Roper poll, 75 percent of the respondents believe the public school system is failing. In addition, 91 percent express concern about the quality of public education in their communities.

Most business owners agree. Recently, I observed several focus group research projects that were conducted with small business owners. They were outspoken in their condemnation of the public school system. Many complained of hiring high school graduates who could not read, do basic math calculations or take simple measurements.

As we move toward a high-tech service-oriented workforce, the problem is likely to compound. Tomorrow's technology-based jobs will require higher skill levels and place even more demands on our education system.

Many economic development experts cite education as a top

factor in business relocation and retention decisions. Michael Bourn, executive director of the Amarillo Economic Development Corporation, agrees. "We must place a higher emphasis on education, as communities and as a nation. Education is our ticket to attracting and retaining quality companies who will provide stable employment," says Bourn. "What we are likely to see in the future is a tendency to make more and more relocation decisions on the basis of educational quality."

Where Do We Start?

Who is responsible for beginning the turnaround in our educational process? Should the federal government set the standards? Should each state accept the leadership role, or is it up to each public school system?

The answer is that we all have to become involved. Every business owner, his or her parent, school system employee, housewife, worker, retired person and student must take an active role in rebuilding our educational leadership.

As America grew to dominate the world economy in the first half of this century, there was a strong focus on education. Tax dollars were channeled to education; school administrators and teachers were respected and children were encouraged to get a good education. Many parents sacrificed so their children could get a better education than they had received themselves.

To regain our educational excellence and our competitiveness in a world economy, we must once again place a higher emphasis on education. We must help every person understand the importance of education to our nation's economy. We must educate ourselves about the value of education.

A Role For Business

According to the Roper poll, most Americans believe that businesses should be more involved in the educational process. Seventy-two percent feel business should recommend needed improvements. Sixty-five percent believe business leaders should run for school board positions. More than 80 percent believe that businesses should make employees available for classroom teaching. They also believe that the business community should finance technical education and provide new equipment and technology.

I do not wish to go on record as an advocate for businesses throwing dollars indiscriminately into the educational process. However, I do believe that the business community needs to make an investment in its future workforce. This may take the form of direct involvement on school boards and advisory committees, participation in the classroom and providing capital for needed enhancements.

To grow and prosper, every business community needs bright, well-educated talent. However, according to some studies, up to 90 percent of the top half of high school graduates leave their local communities. They go elsewhere to seek employment and additional education. Only the lower half of the graduating class remains to fill critical job vacancies with local employers. Therefore, we must ensure that all graduates have a strong, fundamental education.

Businessmen and women must cooperate in the educational reform. We must be willing to invest time, effort and finances in our future workforce. Together, we can strengthen our educational process and guide it from the crossroads to the right road.

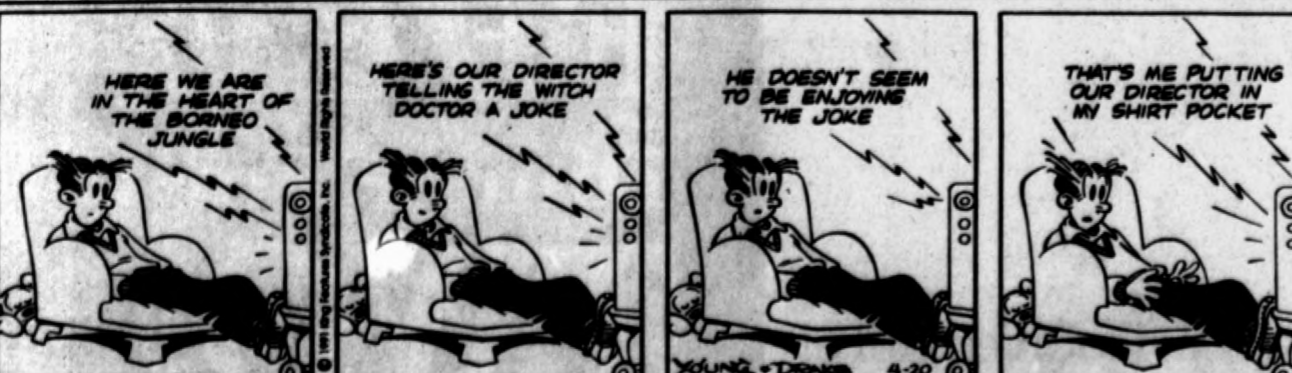

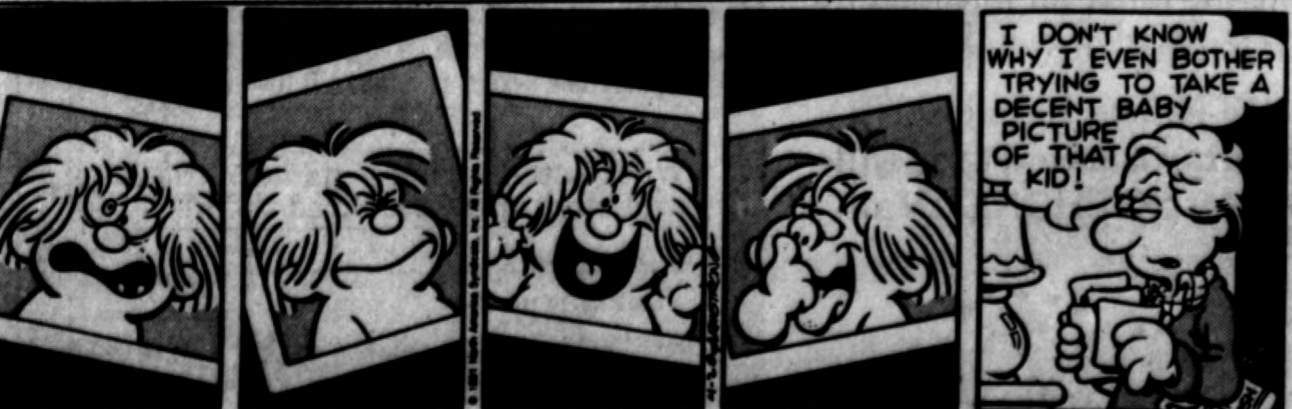

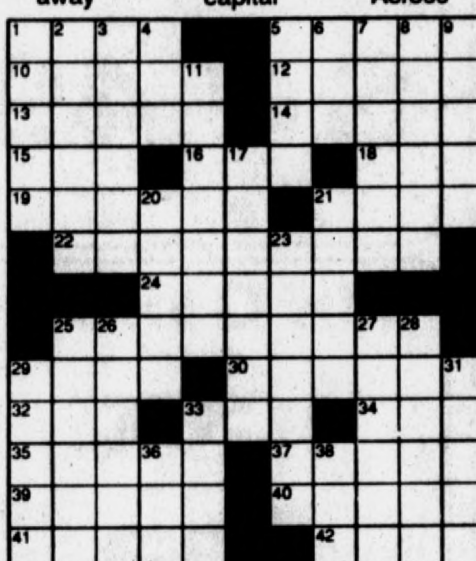

Many suffer from chromium deficiency

Most Americans don't get enough chromium in their diets, a nutrient that studies show is important in maintaining blood sugar levels and preventing heart disease.

Research indicates that most Americans have a chromium deficiency. The diets of nine out of 10 people tested in a U.S. Department of Agriculture study contained less than the minimum daily requirement of 50 micrograms.

"Chromium keeps insulin levels in check by making hormones more efficient at regulating blood sugar levels," said Dr. Mary Kinney Bielamowicz, nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "It helps normalize blood sugar when it's too high or too low."

"Chromium certainly plays a role in heart diseases," according to USDA researcher Dr. Richard Anderson of Beltsville, Md. "It decreases total cholesterol and increases HDL (high density lipoproteins) cholesterol, reducing the

risk of a heart attack."

Anderson, who has been conducting chromium research for 15 years, is currently working on a study that shows health improvements in subjects who were given a chromium supplement. His research findings will be published this year.

This study and others show that when people receive a chromium supplement their glucose metabolism definitely improves, Anderson said. No American diet contains enough chromium unless it is being supplemented, he noted.

"However, a supplement of any kind should only be recommended by a physician," nutritionist Bielamowicz said.

In one study, Anderson looked at the self-selected diets of 32 people ages 25 to 65 in 1985. Samples of all foods and beverages consumed for seven consecutive days by each subject were analyzed.

"The majority of daily diet samples contained between 10 and 40 micrograms of chromium," Anderson said. "More than 90 percent of the daily diets were well below the suggested safe and adequate intake of 50 to 200 micrograms."

Although this particular study was conducted six years ago, Anderson said, a series of other studies have found similar results.

Researchers believe that food processing and chromium-poor agricultural soil are the reasons people are not getting adequate amounts of chromium.

"Insufficient dietary intake of chromium leads to signs and symptoms similar to those associated with maturity-onset (adult-onset) diabetes and cardiovascular disease," Anderson said.

When there's not enough chromium in the system, insulin function can become impaired. The body compensates by producing more insulin, which can result in high blood levels of insulin known as hyperinsulinemia-associated with hypertension, high blood cholesterol and other cardiovascular risk factors.

People most at risk for chromium deficiency include diabetics, older adults, athletes and women in childbearing years, Bielamowicz said. Exercise, pregnancy and diets high in simple sugars are known to increase chromium losses.

Another study conducted by Anderson showed that the biggest rise in insulin levels and, consequently the greatest loss of chromium, results from eating sugars.

"Chromium intake is not only based on the foods you eat, but the amount of sugar you consume," Anderson said. "Simple sugars do increase chromium loss."

"We rarely eat just one sugar," according to Bielamowicz. "Glucose and fructose are the two most common sugars in our diets. The high-fructose corn sweeteners found in many prepared foods and soft drinks are nearly half glucose, and table sugar is composed of both sugars. The more insulin we secrete to process sugars from a meal, the more chromium we use and lose."

The best way to conserve body chromium is to avoid foods high in simple sugars, he said.

"Getting the minimum suggested intake of chromium a day through a fairly well-balanced diet is difficult enough," she said. "Most people don't."

Few foods provide more than 10 to 15 percent of the minimum suggested intake of chromium, Bielamowicz noted. Some breakfast cereals provide more than 25 percent.

Liver, wheat germ and brewer's yeast are good sources. Beverages such as beer and wine pick up chromium in the refining process.

Three of country music's top stars have been recruited to host *The 26th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards* Wednesday, April 24, on NBC. Clint Black, Kathy Mattea and George Strait will emcee the gala, which is the granddaddy of all country awards programs.

Scheduled to perform are Strait, Mattea, Garth Brooks, Reba McEntire, The Judds and The Kentucky Headhunters. All are nominated for awards. Strait, Brooks and McEntire will vie for entertainer of the year honors; Mattea is a top female vocalist nominee; The Judds will compete for vocal duet honors.

Also nominated for entertainer of the year is the inveterate Dolly Parton. Parton, incidentally, has teamed up with Ray Benson, head of the Grammy-winning band Asleep at the Wheel, for a new NBC movie filming in Austin, Texas.

Taking the Kentucky Headhunters to task in the top vocal group category will be Alabama, vying for its sixth award, *Restless Heart*, *The Desert Rose Band* and *Shenandoah*.

Sadly, the biggest occurrence Wednesday may be the last performance of The Judds. The mother-daughter team shocked the music world last fall after a tearful Country Music Awards ceremony when they announced Naomi Judd is suffering from chronic hepatitis.

"Our life is a soap opera," Wynona, the younger Judd, has said. To be sure, The Judds have trod a rocky road paved only in recent years by Grammy success.

Naomi Judd was born the daughter of a filling station owner and a housewife in the small town of Ashland, Ky. She rarely remembers her parents ever going out by themselves. Their chil-

dren were their lives, said Naomi, and "we were the Waltons." Things changed when she was 17 and her 15-year-old brother, Brian, was diagnosed with cancer. Much of the Judd's time was spent on the road seeking treatment for their son. Meanwhile Naomi was left home to attend school and care for her younger siblings.

The death of Brian ultimately tore the Judd family apart. To escape the tension at home, Naomi married a local boy named Mike Ciminella. The week of her high school graduation, she gave birth to Wynona.

Although she "loved motherhood," Naomi "hated marriage." After the birth of her second daughter, Ashley, she divorced her husband. What followed was a long train of jobs (she worked two or three at a time to support her girls), three moves from coast to coast and back again, school, and, finally, a nursing career. In the meantime, her relationship with her oldest daughter remained tempestuous. It seemed all Wynona wanted to do was play her guitar and sing songs. Naomi wanted her to do something with her life. On a whim, the two began singing harmonies together and discovered it was a way to bridge the gap.

Then the miracle happened. A chance meeting with a producer at the hospital where Naomi was nursing led to an audition and a contract with RCA. The rest is history.

What will happen to The Judds? After the awards, Naomi intends to take a rest from the entertainment business, with Wynona, 26, continuing on. Like always, you can bet The Judds will hang together and hang tough.



Actor again reprises role as Abraham Lincoln

For the third time in his career, two-time Oscar-winner Jason Robards portrays the 16th president of the United States, Abraham Lincoln. Sunday, April 21, on ABC, Robards travels back a century to Gettysburg in *The Perfect Tribute*, based on the short story by Mary Shipman Andrews.

Sharing the spotlight with Robards is young Lukas Haas, who viewers will recall starred in the telefilm *The Ryan White Story* and played Kelly McGillis' son in *Witness*.

Haas plays Ben Blair, a Southern boy on a desperate search across country and across enemy lines to find his brother, a wounded confederate officer played by Campbell Scott (*Longtime Companion*).

A chance meeting between the boy and the most powerful man in the country occurs as they both, in despair, wander the streets of Washington. Ben mourns the loss of his brother; Lincoln, the loss of a nation.

Robards first played Lincoln in the ABC movie *Flame and Ice* in 1955. With him to the movie set he brought a new two-volume set of Lincoln's letters and speeches, a gift his wife had given months before he had auditioned for the film.

"I've always been fascinated with him," said Robards of Lincoln, who in his day was the most unpopular president in American history. So fascinated was Robards that less than 10 years later he played the president again on a *Hallmark Hall of Fame* special. Coincidentally, Robards' father, Jason Robards Sr., starred in *Abraham Lincoln* in 1930, although not in the title role.

Also starring in *The Perfect Tribute* are Katherine Helmond (*Who's the Boss?*), Oscar-winner Jose Ferrer (*Cyrano De Bergerac*) and Ed Flanders (*St. Elsewhere*).

Helmond's character, a wanderer since the death of her three soldier sons, helps Ben make his way from Atlanta to the Yankee capital. Ferrer plays Edward Everett, the celebrated orator and key speaker at Gettysburg. Flanders is Charles Warren, a newspaper publisher.

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Mets play Montreal Sunday on ESPN

The New York Mets bring their new scrap-and-win style of baseball to ESPN primetime Sunday when they take on the Montreal Expos in a National League East confrontation.

The Mets lived and died by the long ball in the latter part of the 1980s, winning two division championships and a World Series. But when manager Davey Johnson was replaced by former Met All-Star Bud Harrelson after the team got off to a slow start last year, the personality of the Mets also began to change. One year later, the whole team focus has shifted from power to speed with the acquisition of players like Vince Coleman and Hubie Brooks.

Coleman, who roamed center field in St. Louis for six seasons, has led the National League in stolen bases six straight years, while Brooks gives the Mets the clutch line-drive hitter they've been seeking. Factor in four pitchers who were among the league's top five in strikeouts last year, and the new-look Mets could rival the slugging bunch that won the 1986 series.

Montreal, on the other hand, is trying to build a winner from within the organization. The Expos used 15 rookies in their lineup at different times last year including Rookie of the Year runner-up Delino Shields and nominees Marquis Grissom and Larry Walker. On the plus side, Montreal led the National League with 235 stolen bases and posted the league's top ERA.

'Chernobyl' explodes on TNT

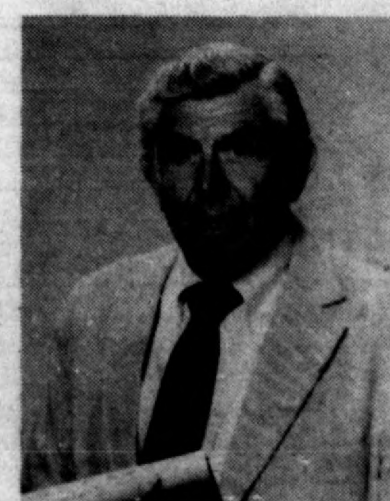

Dinosaurs, a new half-hour comedy series, is the latest idea of Jim Henson Productions in conjunction with Michael Jacobs Productions and Walt Disney Television. Capitalizing on the dinosaur craze, the show delves into dinosaur domesticity in the prehistoric suburbs of 60 million B.C.

The "cast" of *Dinosaurs* consists of live-action figures brought to life at the Henson Productions Creature Shop in London. 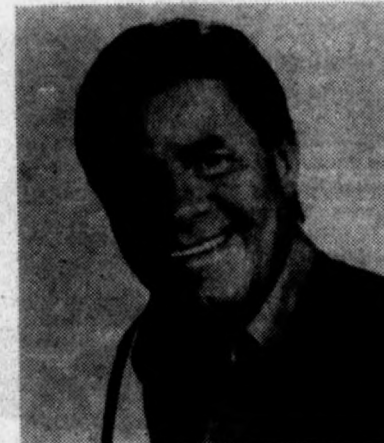

Comedian Jerry Lewis is on location in the Arizona desert, working on his latest film. The film, *Arrow-Tooth Waltz*, also stars Faye Dunaway and Johnny Depp. Lewis has appeared in 53 films since making his movie debut in *My Friend Irma* with Dean Martin 42 years ago.

In some ways the "Indian War" is still being fought. Tom Mauchachty-Ware, an Indian dance champion and musician, was hired to provide the authentic melody played throughout the ABC miniseries *Son of the Morning Star*. The NBC World Premiere movie, as yet untitled, is about a singer whose chance at stardom is smashed when she is suspected of murdering her abusive lover.

Gary Collins will not be returning to host the Miss America pageant this year. The reason for Collins' departure was not clear, although a press release from Collins and the Miss America Organization said the decision was mutual. No replacement has been chosen.

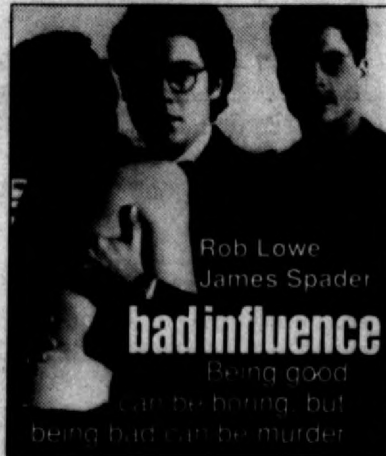

DEFENDING YOUR LIFE: Starring Albert Brooks and Meryl Streep. With a cameo appearance by Shirley MacLaine. *Defending Your Life* is droll, amusing, and pleasant. If this is damning with faint praise, just consider how few truly amusing films there are today. At dusk on his birthday, advertising executive Daniel Miller (Albert Brooks) heads off alone in his new convertible, determined to make the next decade of his life much better than the last, when ... he runs smack into a bus.

The next thing he knows, he's in Judgement City - defending his life. During the nine-day trial, the state of his afterlife will be determined. If he is found deserving, he will proceed to heaven. If not, he will be returned to Earth for another lifetime until he gets it right. The burning question debated by Miller's defense attorney (Rip Torn) and his prosecutor (Lee Grant) - and debated much too long to keep the movie flowing - is: "Was Daniel Miller a victim during most of his life, or was he just weak-willed?"

Brooks, who also wrote and directed the film, is teamed up with a fine ensemble cast: Meryl Streep, his *Judgement Day*, new-found true love; Rip Torn, his wily defense attorney; and Lee Grant, his overzealous prosecutor. While there is a terrible blandness in this movie, to both Brooks the actor and Brooks the director, the film does have an unusual (and witty) point-of-view, born from (former stand-up comedian Brooks' own strange observance of life. There is one, "laugh-out-loud", very funny vignette with Shirley MacLaine. Meryl Streep (seemingly just out on a lark) has a wonderful time giving the audience a good time as the almost perfect, luminous, joy of Brooks' new found life. Rip Torn's blustering humor does give the movie a little momentum, but someone forgot to tell Lee Grant the movie was a comedy. Summary: This one may be funnier remembering than when you are seeing it. Rated PG. Take the

Oscar nominated (Supporting Actor, *Broadcast News*) Albert Brooks, is well-known for his highly personal films, for which he also holds writing, directing and acting credits. They are:
REAL LIFE: (1979) Also starring Charles Grodin. Albert Brooks' fans will eat up this tasty satire (sorry about that pun) parodying an unrelenting PBS series that put the day-to-day life of an American family under the microscope. In Brooks' film, the typical family comes hilariously unglued under the omnipresent eye of the camera. Brooks mockingly uses his own name as the pompous director who tries to turn the family's "normal" daily activities into a documentary on a par with *Citizen Kane*. Again, Brooks the director, and Brooks, the actor, deliver a film that

contains quality, ensemble acting. The script, however, eventually falters. But, not before a healthy number of intelligent laughs are produced. Rated PG. **Two Boxes**
MODERN ROMANCE: Also starring Kathryn Harold and Bruno Kirby. Here Brooks confirms his considerable talent with a very funny comedy, filled with insight. Love, it seems, is not a many-splendored thing for everyone. To Robert Cole (Albert Brooks), a self-indulgent, narcissistic Hollywood film editor, it is sheer torture. In this entertaining, and often hilarious comedy, Brooks plays a world-class neurotic who is obsessively devoted to Kathryn Harold, but unable to maintain a normal relationship with her. Thanks to Brooks' neuroses, their romance has the stability of Mount St. Helens. Excellent ensemble acting (a hallmark of Brooks, the director), and a quick, flowing script make *Modern Romance* a real pleaser. Rated a mild R. **Three Boxes**

LOST IN AMERICA: (1985) Also starring Julie Hagerty and Gary Marshall. Called, a "yuppie Pilgrim's Progress," *Lost In America* is another cockeyed look at life in America through the Kaleidoscopic eyes of Albert Brooks. Albert Brooks' fans will understand the self-indulgence of the script, but others will be put off by his egomaniacal style. The almost-too-close-to-the-truth story concerns an upwardly mobile young advertising executive who is passed over for a promotion he expected. So, he quits, packs up his wife in a Winnebago and goes exploring America. What happens in the film, and to Brooks and his wife, would be a nightmare to most people. But, in spite of the pain, it is a funny, odd look at life. Part of Brooks' genius is seeing people in a very original way. He is an inventive filmmaker and he does make us laugh at ourselves - in spite of ourselves. *Lost in America* is Brooks' funniest and best film. Rated R for profanity and adult situations. **Four Boxes**

 Exercise for Health
 Maintaining an active regular exercise program can do much to make you look and feel better.
 Exercise will relieve stress and help you to relax and sleep better. It helps to maintain a normal weight. Exercise, done in moderation, does not increase the appetite.
 People who exercise regularly have a greater bone density, which offers some protection from developing osteoporosis.
 A major benefit from regular exercise is the protection from heart disease and other chronic diseases. To strengthen your heart through aerobic exercise, first you must determine your "target heart rate". To calculate your heart rate subtract your age from 220. Multiply this number by .85 to .75. Example: a 30 year old target heart rate would be 220-30=190 x .85=124 beats per minute.
 To develop a strong heart muscle, you should exercise enough to get the heart rate to the target zone for 30 minutes three times a week. The length of time at that target heart rate should be approached gradually. Don't expect to maintain the target for 30 minutes when you first start your exercise program.
 One very important health note is to be sure and check with your doctor before beginning any exercise program.

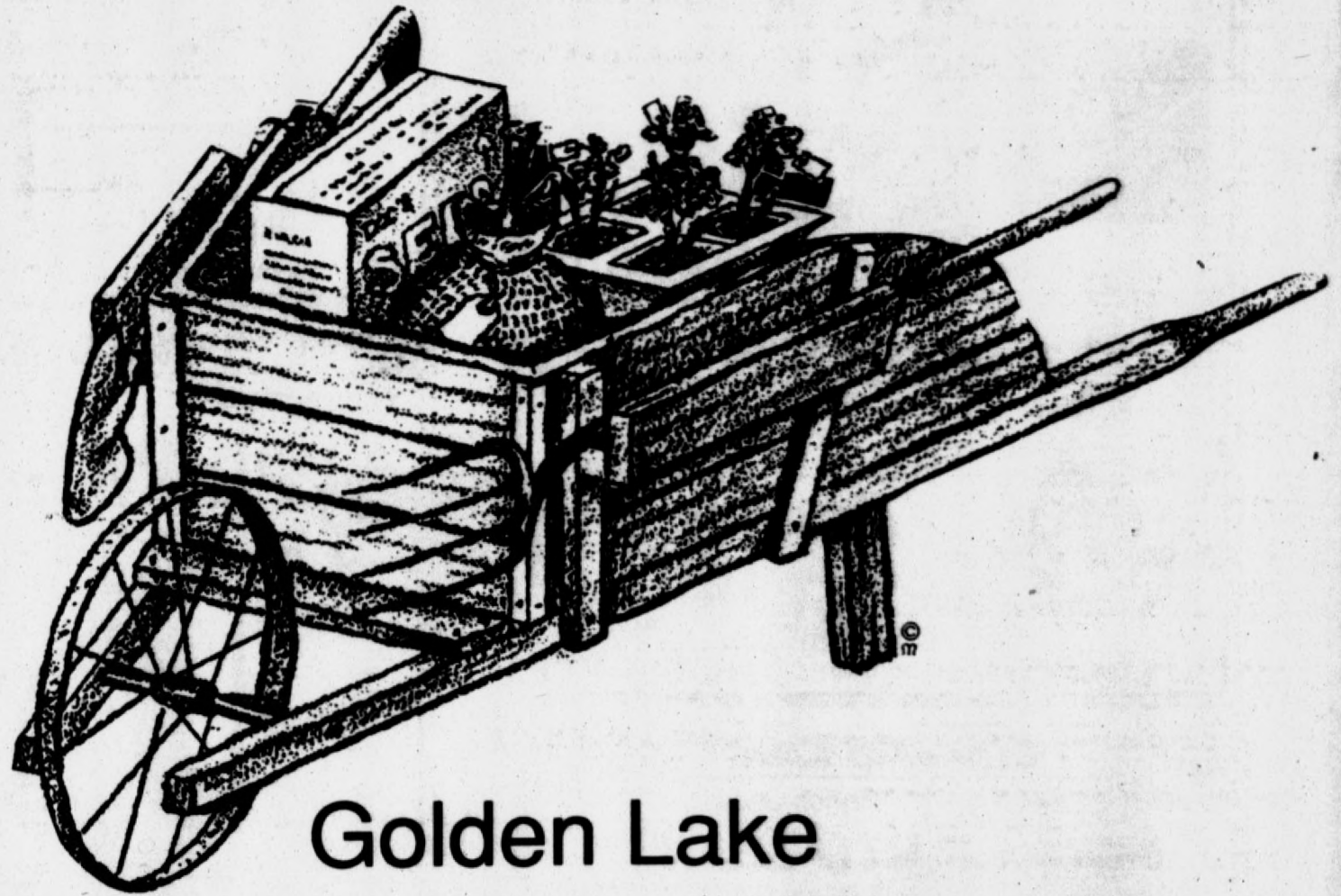
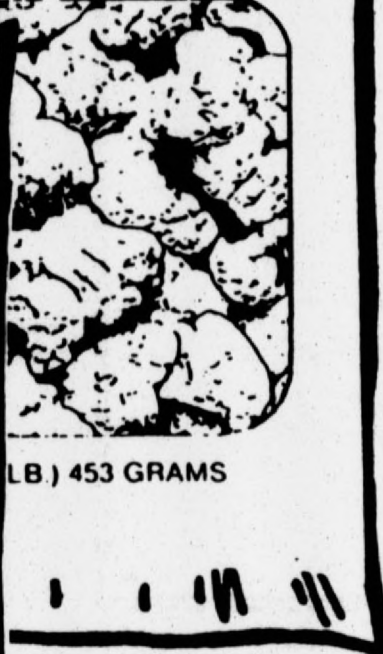
