## New Water Mains Being Installed South of Tracks

To provide protection from fire to manufacturers and business firms south of the railway tracks, 1,200 feet of new water mains are being installed this week by the City of Hereford.

The new mains are of six-inch pipe running on South Main Street, along west of New York Avenue, and other points south of the tracks. A new fire plug is being placed at the intersection of New York and Lee Avenue, across northeast from the golf course, offering protection to Fraser and Consumers; the fire plug by Pitman Elevator also being moved south to the intersection of New York and South Main, offering protection to Backard, several oil companies and to Pitman.

The new six-inch water mains replace three-quarter-inch pipe which offered practically no protection against fire. The improvement is being made at an estimated cost of \$1,500—which the City is paying without the use of bonds against future indebtedness.

### SCHOOL KIDDIES WILL RECEIVE FREE CANDY AND NUTS AGAIN

Hereford will officially welcome Old Santa on the afternoon of Wednesday, Dec. 21, when merchants of this city play host to thousands of boys and girls. The Christmas Tree party will again be sponsored by the Lions Club, but will be made possible by business firms.

## Bippus Rites Said Friday

### BIPPUS SCHOOL BEARS NAME OF PIONEERS IN THIS COUNTY

Funeral services for Mrs. Elizabeth Pfoefle Bippus, 75-year-old pioneer resident of Deaf Smith County, were held from the Baptist Church in Canyon, Friday morning, and interment was made in West Park Cemetery, in Hereford.

Mrs. Bippus was born at Golden, South Dakota, January 24, 1862, and on March 14, 1881, married George Bippus at Odessa, Russia. On April 14, 1886, the couple came to America to make their home, first settling on a homestead in Campbell County, South Dakota. However, in 1910, they joined a general westward movement and came to Texas, settling on May 3, 1910, in Deaf Smith County in the north portion which is now known as the Bippus community.

### Came Here In 1910

At the time the Bippus family came to this section Hereford was an undeveloped hamlet—and the country in the northwest part of the county was chiefly ranch lands. They chose this place to make their home, however, and resided there down through the years. Mr. Bippus was accidentally killed on August 28, 1914, while working in his fields—and Mrs. Bippus continued to reside on the home place until a few years ago, when she moved to Canyon, where she made her home until her death. ## Red Cross Drive Likely To Meet \$350 Quota Here

With Red Cross Roll Call tabulations still incomplete, it was announced today that Deaf Smith County will likely meet its quota of \$350. Reports from only two rural areas had been made, according to D. H. Alexander, who is acting as chairman in the absence of Mrs. Alexander.

"Present tabulations show that around \$300 has been raised in Hereford," he said, "and when the communities report it is likely that the \$350 quota will be passed by the county." The annual roll call drive closed Thanksgiving Day, but Mr. Alexander said that any persons wishing to contribute might place their membership by calling the Chamber of Commerce office in the City Hall.

## Wheat Loans Now Available

Applications for government wheat loans must be made by Dec. 31, 1938, it was announced today by T. F. McCollister, who has charge of loans in the county agent's office. "Any producer can borrow on stored wheat, either on his farm or in the elevator," Mr. McCollister stated. "The loans are made for a period of seven months and the government guarantees the elevator and storage charges."

Under the present arrangement the farmer who borrows on stored wheat gets the advantage of any advance in the market, he said, whereas, in case of a decline in price the government stands the loss. He said that applications for loans by producers in Deaf Smith County can be made through the Loan Supervision office in the agent's office in the court house up to Dec. 31. At the present time loans on No. 1 dark, hard wheat are 52.4 net, and No. 2 dark, hard wheat at 52.4 net; other loan prices vary downward with the grade of the wheat. (Continued on Page 12)

## Tolley Lauds People After Touring Area

### WASHINGTON OFFICIALS INSPECT 'COMEBACK' OF THIS SECTION

"After all, it was the people—and the faith those people held in their country that has enabled Deaf Smith County to make such an enviable record in combatting wind erosion and in remaking the county during the past three years," declared Dr. Howard Tolley, Chief of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics in Washington, when he addressed a small group here, Monday night.

Dr. Tolley, who will be remembered as former administrator of the AAA program in Washington, came to Hereford with a group of national and regional government men for the purpose of inspecting Soil Conservation practices in this area. Has Heard of Area

"For a long time, I have heard in Washington about Deaf Smith County," Dr. Tolley said, "and I have wondered how so many programs—wheat allotments, Soil Conservation, a wind erosion district, AAA, and all the others—could be put together to make sense."

"After traveling more than 41 miles northwest of town where I saw some country in bad shape, and other land improved—I believe I know how the farmer felt when the dust quit blowing."

Dr. Tolley pointed out that he had always dreamed of a unified movement between the people, the state, federal and county governments toward fighting wind erosion, and said that Deaf Smith County comes the closest to answering his dream of any point he has visited.

"However, I do not think the problem is completely solved," he declared. "Another long drought and the situation can again become serious."

### Showed Much Interest

Dr. Tolley expressed a genuine interest in discovering what this area most wants and needs, and during the meeting asked several questions of A. R. Bateman, county agent. He also asked Geo. Muse for a brief history of the county, and was more than interested in information indicating people who reside here are working to save and improve the land—while non-resident land owners are among the last to work toward general improvement of the area.

Other speakers who were introduced and acknowledged the occasion with brief responses, were Dillon I. Meyer, assistant Chief of Soil Conservation Service, Washington; Dr. F. F. Elliott, chief of program planning division of AAA, Washington; H. H. Fennell, region. (Continued on Page 12)

## AMERICAN LEGION TRIES TO RETAIN BUILDING FOR THIS AREA

Workmen this week started tearing down the CCC barracks which have stood in the State Park, adjoining Hereford, since the spring of 1935, when the CCC Camp was located here.

The present crew of workmen are members of the Memphis CCC Camp and are working under the direction of Capt. F. W. Maxwell. Under the present plan nine of the 12 barracks are to be torn down, while three will remain for further disposition. However, changes in the present set-up are possible. The buildings belong to the U. S. Army, and two have been designated for material with which to construct wash rooms in Fandhandle CCC camp; two more have been assigned to the National Park Service; others will go to the Soil Conservation Service, and three will remain here for future disposal.

At the present time 25 men are stationed here to dismantle the barracks, and an additional 50 men are expected to be sent here next week. They expect to have the work completed by January 1, 1939.

Despite previous efforts on the part of Deaf Smith County to secure five of the buildings for recreational and educational structures, it appeared this week that none of the buildings would be assigned to the county, due to priority given government agencies over city and county political divisions.

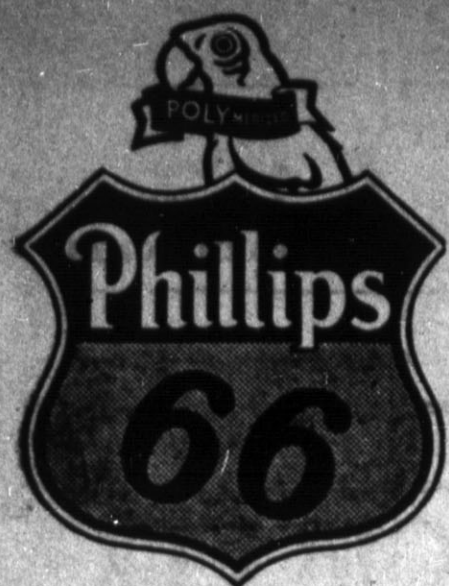

Rea as co-hostess, Nov. 18, at 2:30, for a demonstration on the making of Neufchatel cheese, given by Mrs. Boeskin, who stated the cheese was made from 2 1/2 gallons of clean, whole milk at a temperature of 78 degrees F., to which 1 1/2 pint of starter or 1 1/2 pint of clabber milk free from gas holes. Stir well, add 6 to 8 drops of liquid rennet or 1/2 to 1 1/2 juncket tablet mixed well with cold water before adding to milk. Hold at a temperature of 78 degrees F. for 15 to 18 hours. At this time 1 1/2 inch of whey will show on top of milk. Carefully dip off curd and place in a cloth to drain several hours without disturbing. Then at this point work curd to the center of cloth until curd is drained off. Fold cloth and press for several hours with a weight, equal to 3 gallon buckets of water. After curd has been pressed you should have 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 lbs. of cheese. Work smooth and add a heaping teaspoon of salt and mix well, then put into containers.

Neufchatel cheese may be served plain, with ground pimentos, or chopped pickles or nuts. Olives are often added to give a variety.



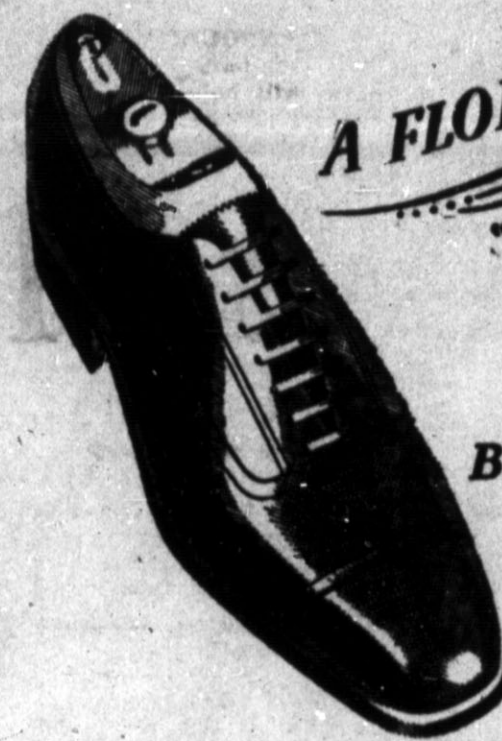

## Selling The Surplus

By T. C. RICHARDSON, Secretary Breeder-Feeder Association

Cotton and wheat are bringing disappointing returns. Both are sold as raw products, for both require factory processing before they can be consumed. The farmer has no choice (outside the small amounts of cotton he can use for mattresses and quilts, and whatever wheat he uses for seed or feed) but to sell them in raw form at the market. He does have a choice in the matter of selling feed grains and forage.

Feed grains and forage do not all have to go to a distant and costly factory for processing into

two to tuff at once.

form for human consumption. Livestock and poultry are the machines, the farm is the factory. At present prices a bushel of corn in a hog's hide will bring more than double what it brings on the market.

With a surplus of feed on hand the farmer is interested in selling it to the best possible advantage. The type of feed, the proportion of grain and roughage, and the pastures available, determine the sort of livestock best adapted to the circumstances. If there is a high percentage of grazing on pastures or crop residues cattle or sheep are indicated. The same is true if the feed crop consists largely of grain sorghums which carry a large proportion of good roughage. You want to sell the whole crop, not merely the grain part of it.

Dairy cattle will usually pay most for green grazing and silage with the concentrates necessary to balance the ration. Beef cattle and sheep come next in the utilization of silage and pasturage, and unless the grain supply is sufficient to fatten them out for market, stock cows and ewes are better for the purpose than feeder calves or lambs.

When grain predominates in the feed supply hogs and poultry offer the best outlet. Roughly speaking five pounds to six pounds of grain (whole and in mash form) will produce a dozen eggs, or a pound of turkey. Four to seven pounds of sorghum grains (depending on the protein supplement used and feeding practices) will make a pound of pork on foot. Ten bushels of corn for which Texas farmers were being paid 25 to 33 cents at harvest time, with proper management would become 100 pounds of pork worth twice to three times the cash grain price.

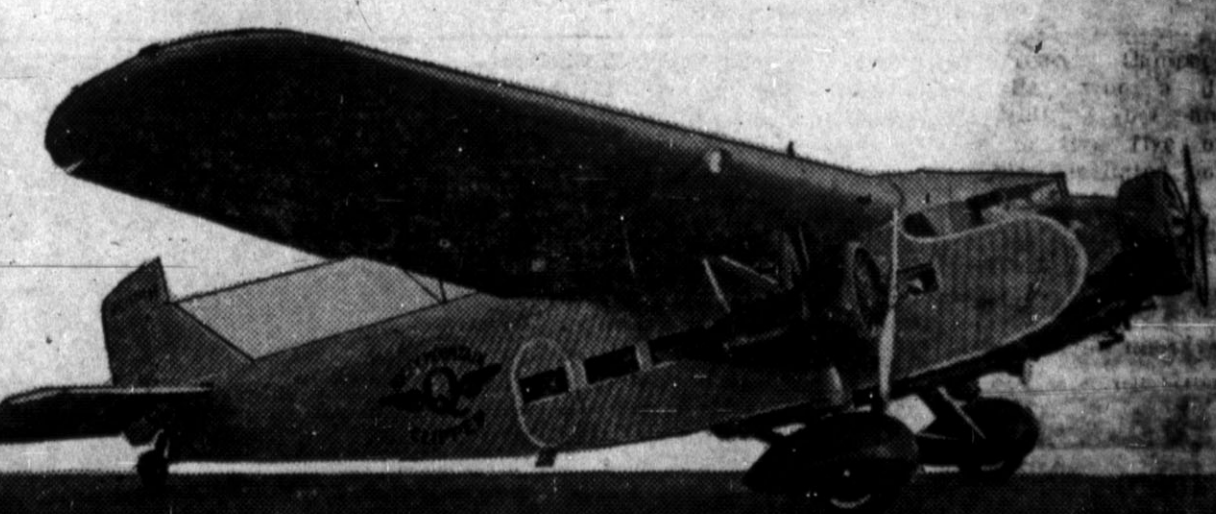

"Since the bottom shelf is the coolest," further continued Miss Oliver, "it should be used for keeping meats or other foods that spoil easily. Foods can be arranged on the cellar shelves so that a balanced meal can be selected from a row of shelves."

"Light makes fats rancid and takes the flavor out of fruits. Therefore, foods should be stored in a dark place."

Mrs. Al Werner described a ventilated pantry which she had seen. Miss Oliver reviewed briefly the year's work and gave out some bulletins to those who had not received them.

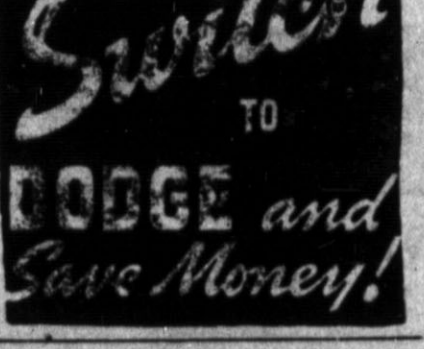

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## Using Up The Feed Crop

Someone has described a well-managed industry as a sort of perpetual motion, in which the processes of production are continuous throughout the year. The factory which runs only a few months and stops its machinery, closes its doors, and lays off its workers for weeks or months at a time has to make higher profits during its operating time or go out of business. The farm which loafes between crop seasons is in the same boat of inefficiency.

With the exception of the sub-tropical portions of the Southwest, where marketable crops may be harvested the year round, there is only one way of providing profitable use for the available labor and keeping the farm factory running twelve months in the year; and that is by keeping livestock and poultry in connection with crop production. Live-stock and poultry grow while the farmer sleeps, and use much that would be lost without them, while crops await the season. The only perpetual motion farm therefore is a balanced farm, where plants and animals work together in their natural relation, each supporting the other.

With a surplus of feed on hand above normal needs, a good many southwestern farmers this year will have to decide the best use to make of it. There are plenty of pitfalls for anyone who undertakes a new enterprise without previous experience, and this is particularly true in "going into" livestock or poultry business on a commercial scale right out of a cotton patch.

Notice that we said "going into" not "growing into" the business, for there is a vast difference. We Americans like to do things in a big way, and the temptation is great to start with a big herd of dairy cows, a large flock of sheep, a carload of beef cattle or hogs. Those who go in with a bang too often go out the same way, and then say the business is a failure.

With pastures and roughage, and a small amount of grain, raising dairy cattle from calf-hood to milk-cow age carries about as little risk for the beginner as any livestock enterprise. W. R. Hancock of Earth county tells of wintering 20 head of grade Jersey heifers on pasture, about two bales of hay per day, and a light ration of oats and cottonseed cake. They cost him an average of \$30.50 and sold when fresh at \$35 to \$50.

If pastures are available for summer, and the operator intends to finish them the second fall and winter, beef calves may be wintered on cheap feed and pastures. It has been found that weight loss during winter on pastures alone costs a good deal more to gain it back than it would have cost to hold it by supplementing maintenance ration sufficiently to keep the animals gaining slightly.

If there is a great amount of grain to be sold the preference should go to fattening for slaughter or feeding for heavy milk production or eggs. On the average, farm however, under average conditions, stock cattle or sheep are safer for the beginner than buying feeders and finishing them for the killing market. Feed ewes and heifers, fed and cared for through one winter, begin to pay off within a few months, and require less time and less technical knowledge of feeding than slaughter animals.

No conceivable farm legislation and no predictable set of circumstances promises to make cash-crop farming profitable again. Wise farmers are acting accordingly, by setting up some combination of crop and livestock suitable to their particular circumstances, which will utilize their land and labor to a better advantage and greater profit.

"Perpetual motion" on the farm is more easily attainable than in the factory for life goes on without artificial power. The natural cycle of plant and animal life is the answer. "God's plan," as an East Texas negro farmer calls it.

## Terraces Are Proving To Be General Success

Amarillo, Texas.—Farmers of the Texas Panhandle are finding that terraces are a good investment. Not only do these broad-based, level structures aid in checking erosion, but they also tend to increase crop yields. Many farmers cooperating with the soil conservation service demonstration areas report that terraces have more than paid for themselves during the first year by increasing crop yields.

Terraces already have been constructed on more than 100,000 acres in the Soil Conservation Service demonstration areas in the Texas Panhandle, and several

thousand additional acres will be terraced during the winter, the farmers report. Thousands of more acres have been terraced in the nine Wind Erosion Conservation Districts in the Panhandle, and hundreds of farmers are building such structures in other parts of the state not included in the areas, it is reported.

Properly constructed level terraces will hold practically all the rain water on the ground where it falls, thereby allowing the moisture to soak into the soil where it is available for crop use instead of flowing down the slopes to cause gulying and sheet erosion.

Water backed up behind the terraces results in an even distribution of moisture over the field and a more uniform crop stand.
