Final approval of a project which will aid the US Bureau of Reclamation in determining the feasibility of importing water to the High Plains was given this week to the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway.

The project will determine the yield and production response of sugarbeets and corn to various combinations of fertilizer and irrigation. The study at the Foundation is a part of the five and a half year research study assigned to Iowa State University by the Bureau in 1967.

The Foundation is one of several institutions cooperating with the University throughout western United States in compiling detailed information for the Bureau's study.

Purpose of the study is to develop better correlation between physical soil characteristics and crop yields under given conditions of irrigation in a wide range of geographic locations.

According to the arrangement approved this week, the Foundation will conduct 20 varying irrigation and fertilizer test plots each on sugarbeet and corn. Attending the meeting at the Foundation Tuesday to approve the study were Alan Kleinman, economist, Iowa State University, and Bureau representatives, H.A. Schweers, Austin; George Loomis, Amar-

illo; Robert Vadar, Denver and Robert Struthers, Denver.

Mrs. Fred (Connie) Hedgecock will also teach third grade at Mary DeShazo. She has taught third grade for two years in the McLean Public Schools.

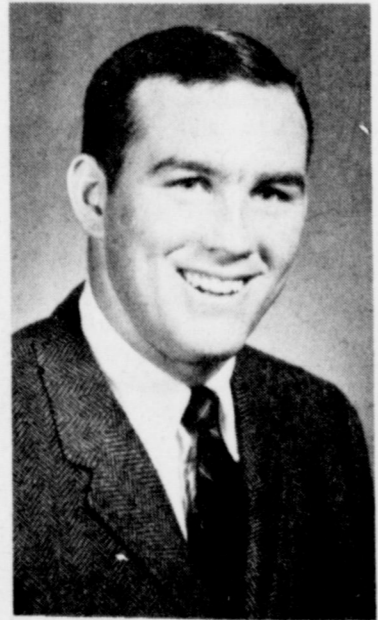

Break-ins At Antenna Co. And Journal

Two break-ins were investigated by members of the city and county police Thursday afternoon and Friday.

The first break-in, or break-out rather, was reported by the Muleshoe Antenna Co. at mid-afternoon Thursday. Merlin Neal of the Antenna Co. reported to the Bailey County Sheriff's office that the company had been robbed, apparently during the noon hour Thursday.

As officers reconstructed the burglary, apparently when the company was closed for the noon hour, someone was hidden inside the building. After the office closed, they robbed the cash register of \$121 and left the building by the back door. The door had to be pried open before the intruder could leave.

At 2:30 Friday morning, city police officer Forist Williams making routine rounds of the alleys during the night, found the rear door open at the Muleshoe Publishing Co. He reported that the door was closed approximately one hour earlier on his rounds. Investigating, Williams found nothing appeared to be disturbed inside the building.

Friday morning Sheriff Dee Clements and Deputies Bob Henderson and Corky Green made further investigation at the newspaper office after footprints were found apparently matching those of the burglar who robbed the antenna company.

Investigation into the break-ins is continuing.

New Industry For Memphis Says Price

SPECIAL FROM CONGRESSMAN BOB PRICE-- Congressman Bob Price was informed today that the Hall County Industrial Foundation Memphis, Texas, has signed an agreement with an industry to build mobile homes at Memphis.

The contract has been let to start ground breaking this week on a 50,000 square foot building. The mobile home building firm plans to employ 50 employees to start and work up to 70 to 100 employees.

The payroll will amount to approximately one-quarter million dollars.

The gross sales are estimated to be approximately \$4,000,000 a year. They will build 1,200 to 1,500 units a year. The mobile homes will be two-to-three bedrooms, completely furnished and will sell for between \$3,000 and \$10,000 each, off the dealers lots.

Dogs, Dogs, Dogs And More Problems

Dogs are commonly known as "man's best friend." For some, that can be changed to "man's worst enemy" or "how to make enemies with your neighbors."

Although local police officers wage an almost endless battle with stray dogs and not so stray dogs weekly, both untagged and tagged, but all reported to officers as running loose and digging up yards, chasing children, and various other things.

Recently, a city police officer was called to settle a dispute over a dog and neighborhood children across the street in a location in Muleshoe. The first person who called said her child had been bitten by a neighbor's dog. She said her neighbor had threatened her. When the

dog owner was contacted, he told police the neighbor had threatened his children. Fact is, as the man was informed, children have a right of way in city streets, and even though a dog is licensed and tagged, it does not have a right of way in city streets, according to the city dog ordinance. The ordinance requires all dogs to be tied or confined within a fence or other structure on the owner's property.

"Unlicensed animals found running at large shall be taken up by the Chief of Police or his representative, and impounded in a suitable animal shelter, which shall be under the

An animal unclaimed at the expiration of the prescribed period shall be disposed of at the discretion of the Chief of Police except as hereinafter provided in the cases of certain animals.

under given conditions of irrigation for improved methods of evaluating the productive capacity of irrigated farmlands in the western United States. Commissioner of Reclamation Floyd E. Dominy said, "We are confident that this study will yield new concepts and methods that will improve Reclamation's procedures in land classification and economic analysis of irrigation projects."

Director of the Foundation, Dr. Tom Longnecker, stated, "We are pleased that the Bureau and Iowa State have decided to place this research project here at the Foundation since it permits us to expand our irrigation fertilizer research to include sugarbeets and corn as well as cotton, grain sorghum, wheat and soybeans. More efficient use of water is the objective of these studies."

This is the purpose of the study. Fast annual reports on cotton, grain sorghum and cotton also will be considered in completing the University study.

This shows the depth of the Reclamation economic and feasibility study into providing supplemental irrigation water to the High Plains. The University study is to be completed in February of 1973.

ownership is known to the Chief of Police or his representative, such animals need not be impounded, but the Chief of Police may, in his discretion, cite the owners of such animals to appear in court to answer to charges of violation of this ordinance."

"Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not to exceed two hundred (\$200.00) dollars, and if such violation be continued, each day's violation shall constitute a separate offense."

So the dog problem continues, with literally hundreds of unlicensed dogs (and licensed dogs) roaming the streets of Muleshoe, turning over trash containers, occasionally biting children and causing hard feelings between neighbors.

Texas 4-H Roundup In June

COLLEGE STATION, -- The number of head of livestock will be small but participants in the Texas 4-H Roundup, scheduled for June 3-4 at Texas A&M University, will include some 1,800 4-H Club members.

The 4-H members will come from every section of the state and the only livestock involved will be that used in judging and demonstration contests. State 4-H Club leaders say that in addition to the 4-H members approximately 250 county and assistant county Extension agents and adult 4-H leaders, 200 Friends of 4-H and contest donors and 30 members of the board of directors of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation will participate in planned activities for Roundup.

To help insure a safe vacation and summer driving, the sergeant suggests that you have the following items on your car safety checked:

1. Check the tires for worn and cut spots.
 2. Check the steering and wheel alignment.
 3. Check all lights and mirrors.
 4. Check springs and shock absorbers.
- And as a final reminder the driver should be prepared for "DEFENSIVE DRIVING."

County Agent Gives Tips On Hay Crops

With adequate rainfall, Bailey County livestock producers have an opportunity to produce plenty of high-quality hay for their cattle, says County Agent

J.K. Adams. The two main factors which determine hay quality are: the amount of fertilizer and lime it receives and the age of the crop when it is harvested.

A soil test is the best way to determine the amount of plant nutrients needed to produce abundant amounts of hay crops. With abundant rainfall,

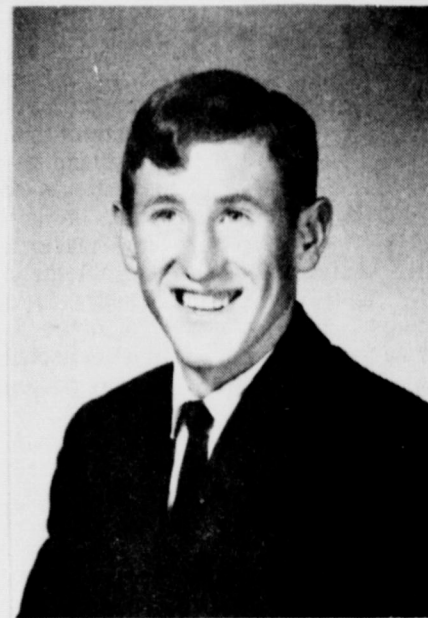
additional amounts of fertilizer will be needed to equal the quality of hay crops of normal years. Although nitrogen influences protein content, phosphorus, potassium, and other nutrients also help improve protein and the quality of hay.

Hay plants should be harvested before the crop matures.

For example, Johanson-grass, sudan hybrids, and other grasses which produce seedheads should be harvested before the seedheads form. Crops such as Coastal bermudagrass should be harvested when the plants are 25 to 28 days of age. Giving special attention to harvesting good quality hay will mean extra dollars next season when hay is fed, says Adams.

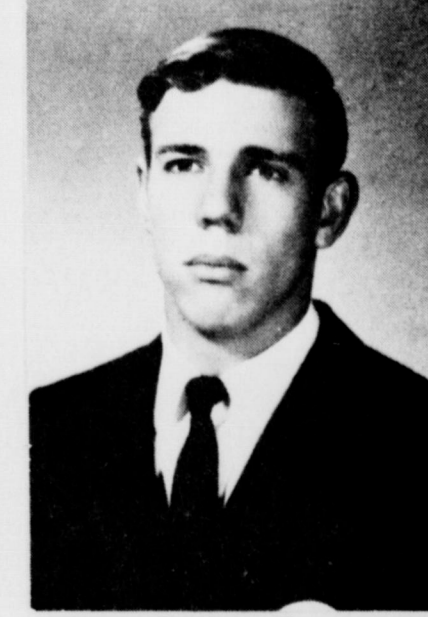

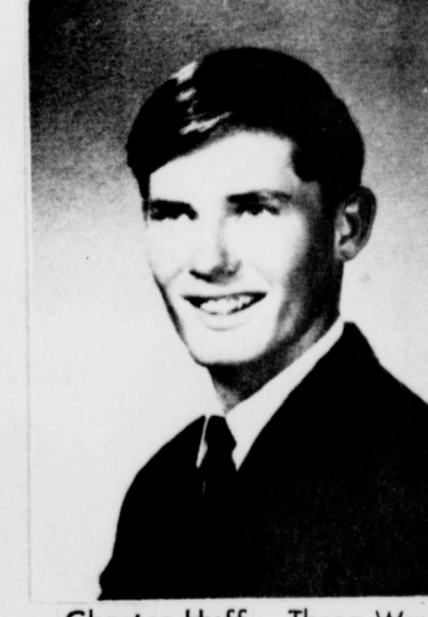

Justice & Fees

The case of Justice Abe Fortas may, ironically, produce good results for the nation. Revelation that the man whom Lyndon Johnson tried to make Chief Justice had accepted a fee of \$20,000 from the Wolfson family (Louis Wolfson is in jail), returning it eleven months later, has focused national attention on several undesirable conditions.

Fortas is not the only Justice to accept fat fees. When he was confirmed in 1968 some opposed his confirmation because he had accepted a \$15,000 fee raised by a wealthy business man for teaching a seminar course in Washington. Last October it was revealed that Justice William Douglas had been receiving \$12,000 a year from the Albert Parvin Foundation, which Senator John Williams (R-De) said had links with gambling interests in Las Vegas. And at the time the story of the \$20,000 fee from the Wolfson family broke, Justice Douglas was on a trip to Brazil with his wife, paid for by a Brazilian law school.

These events surely indicate the need for a pre-confirmation requirement of all nominees to the Supreme Court that they live on their \$60,000 salary and other normal income, the origin of which was established prior to service on the high court. Senator Williams also proposes a law which would revoke the tax-exempt status of any foundation offering public officials fees.

Badly needed for some time has been a requirement that all nominees to the highest court be judges with trial experience. While Congress is on this subject, these three reforms should be effected at the same time, for it is ludicrous that Supreme Court Justices need not have prior experience as judges and it is a poor practice, at best, to have them accepting fat fees from various sources which could compromise their impartiality.

From Congressmen BOB PRICE

The decision by the House Republican Conference and the Research Committee chaired by Congressman Taft to reactivate the Task Force on Agriculture and Rural Affairs is to be applauded. The leadership is to be commended for its full awareness that the problems of the farm, the rural community and the metropolitan areas cannot be isolated or separated.

The related activities of people living on farms and in rural areas provide jobs for approximately one-third of this nation's citizens and provide the food and fiber for all. Agriculture by itself represents America's largest industry, employing more people than the steel, auto, utilities and transportation industries combined. Agriculture is American Industry's biggest customer.

The House Republican leadership feels it intolerable that our farmers continue to operate on a deficit basis, with farm debt increasing at a rate of about 10 per cent a year while income has remained almost constant. Farm production expenses are expected to again outdistance the gain in gross farm income this year.

It is equally intolerable that the average person on a US farm today has only three-fourths as much income as the average nonfarmer, and that all of rural America, with a little more than one-fourth of the nation's population, should have almost half of the nation's poor and more than half of the country's inadequate housing. Not to tackle these problems simultaneously and equally energetically with those of urban areas would be but to defer additional problems for the metropolitan areas at a later date.

In responding to the Republican leadership's call, we on the Task Force on Agriculture and Rural Affairs pledge to explore every possibility for the encouragement of sound economic growth and development on the farm and in the countryside. Rural America, with most of nation's land area, has the human and other natural resources needed by all in the years ahead.

FAIR CREDIT REPORTING ACT



I am sure that you have heard or have read of individuals who have been denied a new job, a life insurance policy, or simply basic credit because of an erroneous credit report. To protect individuals against credit reports that are arbitrary, malicious, or erroneous, I introduced L.R. 10139, the "Fair Credit Reporting Act," on April 15, 1969.

The purpose of my bill is to provide to individuals the right to "due process" in credit rating transactions. That is, it protects a person's right to be advised what information is contained in his credit report. Further, it gives him the right to correct any false information and to submit an explanatory statement for other information of public record that adversely affects his credit report. There is also a specific clause protecting the individual's right to privacy by limiting the collection of information to that which is essential to his credit rating.

Basically, my bill would affect only credit reports made by credit agencies which operate in interstate commerce or make use of the facilities of interstate commerce. It would not, therefore, have any impact on merchant-to-merchant credit inquiries within a community. Further, the Federal Reserve Board would be empowered to oversee the operation of the law. However, attempts to block disclosure by denying that an agency has made a report on an individual would be prohibited.

LABELING IMPORTED MEATS

On Monday, April 21, I introduced H.R. 10350 to amend the Federal Meat Inspection Act to require that a label with the words "imported or 'imported in part'" be affixed to any package containing meat or a meat food product until delivery to the ultimate consumer. This bill is the same as the amendment to the Federal Meat Inspection bill which I offered in the House Agriculture Committee last year. This amendment had enough support to pass on the first vote but was narrowly defeated upon reconsideration of the entire bill.

It is already required under law that a label showing the country of origin should appear on meat imported into this country. However, when a processor reduces this imported meat or cuts it into parts, later to be sold to the ultimate consumer, the meat loses its identity of the country of origin. It is at this point that I hope to strengthen the regulation so that the ultimate consumer, who is usually the housewife, is assured of the product being purchased.



John Tower United States Senate COMMITTEE ON ARMED SERVICES

President Nixon this week passed the 100-day mark of his administration. Earlier he declared that the new reigns of government firmly in hand.

The President has correctly taken the view that it is more important to gauge the effects of his administration after a year or longer in office. But there seems to be a habit in this country of making a preliminary evaluation at the end of a president's first 100 days in office.

In reviewing the first few months of the Nixon administration, it is important to look at some of the things which Mr. Nixon has not done as well as his more positive achievements.

As my colleague and Senate Republican leader, Everett Dirksen, noted recently, "the lack of drama has been part of the achievement" of the early days of the Nixon administration.

It is my opinion that the majority of those who voted for Mr. Nixon last fall, looked forward to an attitude of calm in the White House. They wanted the decision-making process to be more thorough, more carefully considered. They wanted many of the new imaginative programs which had been started in recent years, to be re-studied and re-structured so as to reduce waste and increase effectiveness.

The attitude of calm and deliberate decision-making has already shown itself to be a hallmark of the Nixon administration. I both expect and hope that it will continue to be. Now let me turn to specific action -- and some non-actions -- which the Nixon administration has taken during its first few months of operation.

First, Mr. Nixon has not widened the war in Vietnam. His administration has worked steadily both in Paris and in South Vietnam to secure an honorable peace. We do not yet know how effective these efforts will be, but the Nixon administration is giving the bombing halt announced by President Johnson every opportunity to be productive. At the same time,

the Nixon administration is fostering considerable improvement in the combat capability of the army of the government of South Vietnam. My recent visit to South Vietnam made it clear to me that the combat capability of the ARVN troops is indeed showing substantial improvement. Now we must exhibit patience while maintaining a firm position to see whether the North Vietnamese are actually ready to negotiate a lasting peace.

The second most important battle in which the Nixon administration is engaged is the one against inflation. In this area Mr. Nixon has taken several positive steps. He has reduced the fiscal 1970 budget request by \$4 billion. He is urging extension of the 10 per cent federal income tax surcharge to January 1, to be followed by a surtax of only 5 per cent. And he has offered a tax reform package which includes the proposed abolition of the 7 per cent investment tax credit. I am uncertain at this time whether abolition of the 7 per cent investment tax credit would be the best course. But I know that we must take steps to combat the rising cost of living and I commend President Nixon for taking positive steps.

Recently President Nixon faced his first sudden international crisis when North Korean aircraft shot down one of our EC-121 intelligence planes while over international waters. This was an unprovoked attack and may have been calculated to test the new administration. To President Nixon's credit, his reaction was one of firmness coupled with restraint. He avoided any knee-jerk reaction which might have proved detrimental in the long run. Yet he made it clear to the North Koreans that they could not make a second similar attack with impunity.

Early in his administration, President Nixon made an 8-day European tour to assure our friends there that European views would be fully and fairly considered by this nation in activities of vital European interest. Before that tour, many Europeans had begun to fear that United States world policy was being formed with little regard for our European allies. Mr. Nixon's tour reversed that feeling and in the process strengthened the North Treaty Organization.

The Nixon administration has now begun to send its legislative proposals to Congress. First, the President appropriately took the time necessary to formulate sound proposals. Among these proposals are: increased efforts against organized crime; promotion of postal officials on the basis of merit rather than politics; a re-structured program for aid to the cities; the safeguard anti-ballistic missile system designed to protect our nuclear deterrent capability, and a proportional electoral reform program.

Overall, it seems to me that President Nixon has brought to the White House a new attitude -- an attitude of responsibility -- which is being welcomed by the majority of Americans. The President is not offering panacea programs. He is offering sound and capable leadership.

The Sandhills Philosopher

I was out here on this Johnson grass farm yesterday wandering around seeing if there's any likely spot here for building one of those ABM's, after all, you can't rely on the accuracy of a gunner, foreign or domestic, and a guided missile aimed at some metropolitan center or even at Muleshoe might just as easily sail by this place. My theory is that if the world ever gets into a guided missile war, the things are all going off like children's sky-rockets in all directions and it may be years before anybody knows who won. Won't even know which country is supposed to feed the other.

You mean to say scientists are like psychiatrists? I don't suppose there ever was a murder trial since psychiatry was invented where you couldn't get one psychiatrist to say the accused is sane, another to say he's insane.

I suppose it's still true that with all the scientific information available, a man still has to rely on horse sense, and that doesn't always work as I've seen a lot of horses as loco as some people.

A man hardly knows where to turn, but I will delay working the piece of land where I figured it would be a good place to put an ABM until the country reaches a unanimous decision on the matter. It ought to have a good stand of timber on it by then.

Senator Eugene J. McCarthy has publicly announced that he believes Senator Edward M. Kennedy (D-Mass) is the best bet for the 1972 Democratic presidential nomination. The Minnesota Senator made an unsuccessful bid for the 1968 nomination.

TO SINK GAS BOMB

An Army plan to haul 27,000 tons of obsolete chemical warfare gas bombs overland by train and then sink them in the Atlantic has been termed by Congress as possibly unsafe. The Army insisted that with proper handling and packaging there would be no danger from the gas bombs.

Within a few weeks thousands of young Texans will trade their classroom chores for a three month turn in the world of work. Perhaps in our affluent society the students are earning money for those extras or for money to buy that car. Contrary to the practice followed by quite a few employers, students or any employees who work for a short period are subject to the same withholding, social security and other employment taxes for both the employee and the employer, that apply to regular employees. Even if you are only going to work a short time, you must take your employer your social security number and fill out a Form W-4. Don't forget to get your W-2 on the job at the end of the summer, or by January 31. Taxes withheld during the summer spend quite well during the spring term of school. However there is one little chore--you must file a tax return for the government to know that you are due a refund of part or all of your tax withheld during the summer.

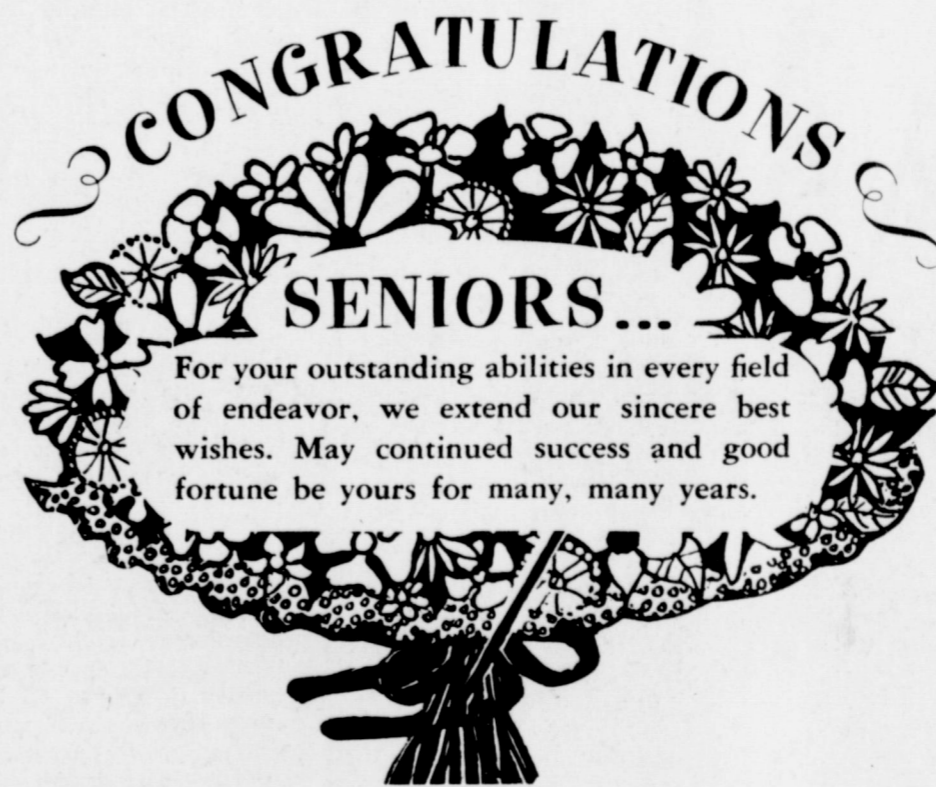
VETERANS Q's and A's

Q--My husband has a heart condition which developed in service. He was able to work until three months ago when he had a heart attack and the Veterans Administration awarded him 100 per cent disability. The doctor says that he will never be able to go back to work. With two children in college, I will have to work to help support us but I don't have any training. Can the VA help me?

A--Possibly. VA education assistance is available to the wives, sons and daughters of veterans who are determined by the VA to be permanently as well as totally disabled. For a maximum of 36 months, the VA will pay a wife, son or daughter up to \$130 a month for full-time institutional training. Q -- I was retired from the Air Force last April 30 because of physical disability. am I entitled to VA compensation payments as well? A -- There is a prohibition against simultaneous receipt of service retirement pay and VA compensation. You may elect to receive whichever of these benefits is the greater.
