Due to a change in bookkeeping systems, statements will be ready on the morning of Sept. 3, instead of on the first. Mr. Hedrick also announces that the bank will observe Monday, Sept. 3, as a Labor Day holiday.

Return to "God's Time" Predicted By Worley

Declaring that one of the first things Congress will do when it reconvenes will be to return this nation to "God's time," congressman Eugene Worley addressed residents of Deaf Smith, Farmer and Castro Counties last Monday night in a public meeting at the POW Camp auditorium.

"I don't know what each of you people have read about German war atrocities," Worley said, "but they are just as bad as they were pictured, and then a lot worse." Worley, who recently returned from a tour of German prison camps said he believed it impossible to picture the extremes to which the Nazi went in handling political prisoners.

Worley described the Nazi V-2 bomb as one of the most destructive weapons of the war, placing it second only to the Atomic Bomb.

"I shudder to think what would happen if an atomic bomb were dropped on Hereford," Worley said.

Baptists May Start Mission Church Here

The mission revival meeting sponsored by the First Baptist Church is drawing good crowds, and Rev. R. S. Sparkman of Dallas will continue to preach at 8:30 o'clock each night this week.

Teacher Lack Threat to Rural Schools

"The trustees are working and I'm worrying," reported County Supt. Fred W. Baird this week concerning the approaching opening of Deaf Smith County rural schools.

The principal cause for worry, according to Judge Baird, is the lack of teachers in two of the three rural schools scheduled to open on Sept. 4. A full faculty is signed up at Walcott, where last year's teachers, Mrs. Mattie Davis and Miss Grace Taylor, will return. But one teacher is still lacking at Summerfield and no teachers have yet been hired at Westway. Mrs. Taady Legg, who has taught at Summerfield for a number of years, will again be on the faculty this year.

The only other rural school in the county will open at Dawn on Sept. 18.

In addition to the teacher shortage, a lack of bus drivers looks like a possible hindrance to the cause of education in the country communities. The county operates 20 buses, Judge Baird said, and approximately one-third of these are still without drivers.

Just One Month More to Re-register Cattle Brands

Cattlemen who have not yet re-registered their brands since the 1943 legislature passed a law calling for re-registration have until Oct. 1 to put the brands on record, it was announced this week by Robert L. Thompson, county and district clerk.

The law passed in 1943 cancelled all brands then on the record books but gave owners until Oct. 1, 1945 to claim the brands they were then using. Most brands have been re-registered, Mr. Thompson points out, but some brands have not yet been claimed.

If the brands are not claimed by Oct. 1, they may be claimed and filed by anyone desiring their use, Thompson says.

New REA Line Slated for Four Counties

Verbal approval for the construction of 213 miles of additional line was secured this week by the Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative, Leo Forrest, manager, announced today. The new line construction, all of which received pre-war approval, will extend over the four counties served by the local electric coop., Forrest said, and will include both new lines and extensions to present lines.

Fiesta Highlight Of Potato Month

Planned as a climax to the local observance of "Hereford Potato Month" a Potato Fiesta is scheduled for Saturday afternoon and night, to feature the talents of the Spanish-American potato workers now in Deaf Smith County. Sponsor of the event is the Texas Plains Potato Growers and Shippers Association, and Elmer Patterson and Glenn Boardman are in charge.

The Fiesta will be held at the courthouse starting at 8 o'clock announced earlier this week, and will feature Mexican folk dances and music typical of the good neighbors to the south. According to Mr. Boardman, the event is planned partly as a gesture of appreciation toward the approximately 2,500 workers, who have carried out the potato harvest here this year.

Dove Season Opens Saturday, Sept. 1

The dove season opens Saturday in the Panhandle and what the state game commission has designated as the entire "North Zone" of Texas, a region extending from the deep East Texas counties as far south as Shelby County to the far western counties of Reeves and Pecos.

The season on mourning doves in this territory will remain open from Sept. 1 to Oct. 30, both days inclusive, with shooting hours extending from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Bag limit has been set at ten a day of either or both species (white-wings and mourning doves) and the season on white wings is Sept. 13 to 23 inclusive, in the Rio Grande border counties.

Shotguns must not be larger than ten gauge, and must be permanently plugged to three-shell capacity.

Voters Favor Reallocation, 3 Amendments

Deaf Smith County voters Saturday overwhelmingly endorsed the proposal for reallocation of county tax funds and also went on record as favoring three of the four constitutional amendments submitted to the people. The vote for tax reallocation was 194, with 39 opposing the measure.

Local reaction to the constitutional amendments reflected the reaction of the state as a whole, as Texas voters in general supported the three amendments which carried in Deaf Smith County. And the proposal to raise the salary of legislators, defeated here by a vote of 181 to 52, was also turned down in the state-wide returns.

Results on the other amendments showed local voters favoring the soldier vote amendment by 198 to 34; the vote to increase the number of supreme court judges was 131 for to 96 against; and for the amendment to permit old age assistance payments up to \$20 a month, Deaf Smith County citizens voted 154 in favor to 79 against.

Overseas Mailing Period Announced

Despite the end of actual hostilities, many Hereford servicemen and women will again be spending Christmas in foreign lands, and the Post Office Department this week issued the reminder that Sept. 15 through Oct. 15 is the mailing period for Christmas boxes to Army personnel overseas.

During the mailing period requests from addressees are not required, and the senders of such packages should write "Christmas Parcel" on the gift package.

The rules for size, packing, etc., are the same as in the past. Each parcel shall weigh not more than five pounds and be no more than 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. Not more than one Christmas package shall be accepted for mailing in any one week when sent by or on behalf of the same person. Packages for overseas must

OPA Office Goes on 40-Hour Week Basis

New hours were announced this week by the local rationing office in compliance with an order from district OPA headquarters putting all local offices on a 40-hour work week.

Employees of OPA will hereafter observe all legal holidays and will work five eight-hour days, Monday through Friday, inclusive. Saturday will no longer be a work day and all overtime pay will be eliminated according to the district order.

The local office will hereafter stay open from 8 until 5 o'clock and will be closed from 12 till one for lunch.

The Labor Day holiday will also be observed here, according to the announcement, which states that the office will close on Friday afternoon, to reopen on Tuesday, Sept. 4.

Hereford People Are Uninjured In Littlefield Road Crash

Mr. and Mrs. Mark Hanna and grandsons, Tim and Pat Corbett, escaped without injury when the car driven by Mr. Hanna was involved in a side-swipe collision with a car driven by a Negro on the highway just east of Littlefield on Wednesday night, Aug. 15.

The Hannas were enroute to Lubbock to visit a daughter. Mr. Hanna stated that glare from headlights caused the collision, which did serious damage to his car.

Well Connected At City Water Plant This Week

Hereford's water troubles are over, Mayor E. S. Ireland reported this week, stating that a good well has been connected at the old City Water Works and that the water has been turned into the mains to bring the supply up to normal.

The new well pumps a thousand gallons a minute and this flow is added to that of the old well which pumps between 800 and 1,000 gallons a minute.

Concerning the new well in the east part of town, Mayor Ireland states that the well itself is complete and that the job of pouring concrete on the underground reservoir and sand trap is underway this week, with construction of a well building and pump house scheduled to start soon. The actual connecting of the new well will depend upon when a booster pump can be purchased, and no assurance of securing this pump in less than five months can be secured. However, the pumping equipment might be ready earlier, depending upon the speed of reconversion in the plant manufacturing the pumps.

Material is ready to start work on the sewer lines and water mains, but no work will be done on the water mains until all work on the new well is completed.

With the peak summer irrigation load passed, and thanks to rains which came at an opportune time, danger of a serious water shortage is over, according to the city report.

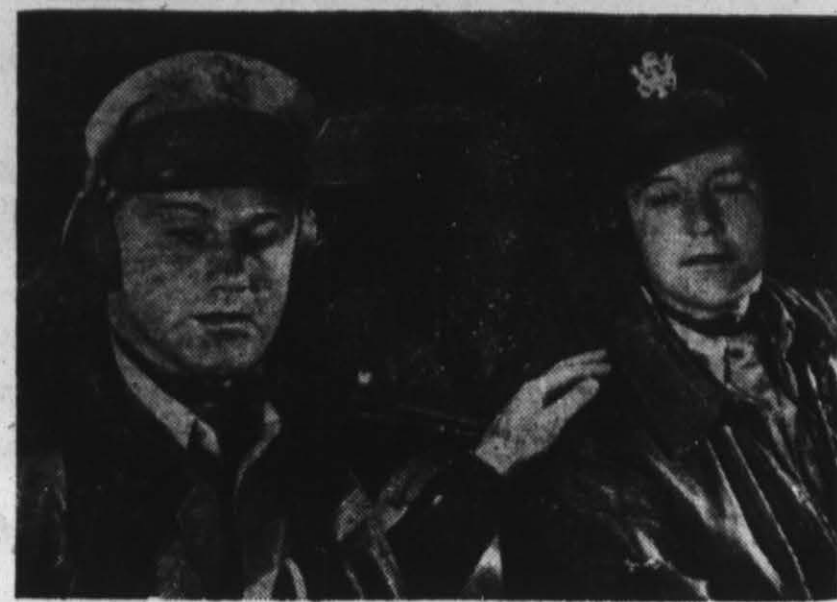

Veterans Get Preference Under New Civil Service Commission Plans

Following the same policy which is being urged for private employers, the Federal Government this week announced a program of civil service preference for returning war veterans and displaced Federal workers.

"Although there are certain to be reductions in the war agencies of the government," the Civil Service Commission announced, "Many openings will develop as a result of expansion of some agencies and as a result of persons now in the Federal employ returning to private industry. The new program is designed to result in filling these vacancies—speedily—with returning veterans and displaced federal workers. Whenever there are insufficient of these groups in a particular area to meet civil service demands, applications will be solicited from the general public; but until such a shortage is shown to exist, Federal jobs are being held for veterans and displaced federal workers.

The principal points in the program of the Civil Service Commission are:

1. Applications for employment from disabled veterans of World War I and World War II, and from non-disabled veterans of World War II who file within one year of their discharge from active service or from hospitalization, will be received at any time. These veterans will be assigned numerical ratings. Their names will then be entered on the Commission's lists of eligibles in such a manner as to give them the ratings to which they are entitled under the Veteran's Preference Act of 1944.

2. Except where needs of the Service absolutely require it, no further applications will be received from other persons who are not now a part of the Federal Service.

3. Where Federal employees are scheduled for discharge, arrangements will be made immediately for representatives of other agencies that are hiring new personnel to interview those about to be discharged. Where the appointing officers decide that persons interviewed meet Civil Service Standards, they will be authorized to hire such employees on the spot without prior approval of the commission.

4. When present federal employees are not rehired immediately by another agency, they may file, within 60 days, an application for reemployment, be assigned numerical ratings and upon passing the required examination have their names entered in the proper order on the commission's list of eligibles.

The Civil Service Commission emphasizes that it will be impossible to rehire all the employees soon to be discharged by the various war agencies. Government, as an employer, like all other employers must give first consideration to those who were uprooted from their normal civilian pursuits and called to the actual defense of the nation.

OPA Explains Present Status of Tire Rationing

New passenger car tires will continue to be rationed largely on the basis of occupational driving needs, although rationing of all farm-impliment and industrial type tires ended August 20, the District Office of Price Administration has announced.

"The critical tire shortage has only been emphasized by the cancellation of gasoline rationing—applications for tires have increased 20 percent in many counties," according to Rationing Executive Wm. G. Williams.

Predictions of an early end of tire rationing have made many applicants feel that local Boards were discriminating against them if their application was turned down. Local Boards must hold tire certificate issuance within their quotas and the end of the war brought no increase in quotas, Williams said. "If you need any proof of the scarcity of passenger tires, just try to find one of the popular sized ones," he pointed out.

Under the new eligibility system, certificates for new tires may be issued for use on the following:

1. Passenger cars used for occupational purposes. Board quo-

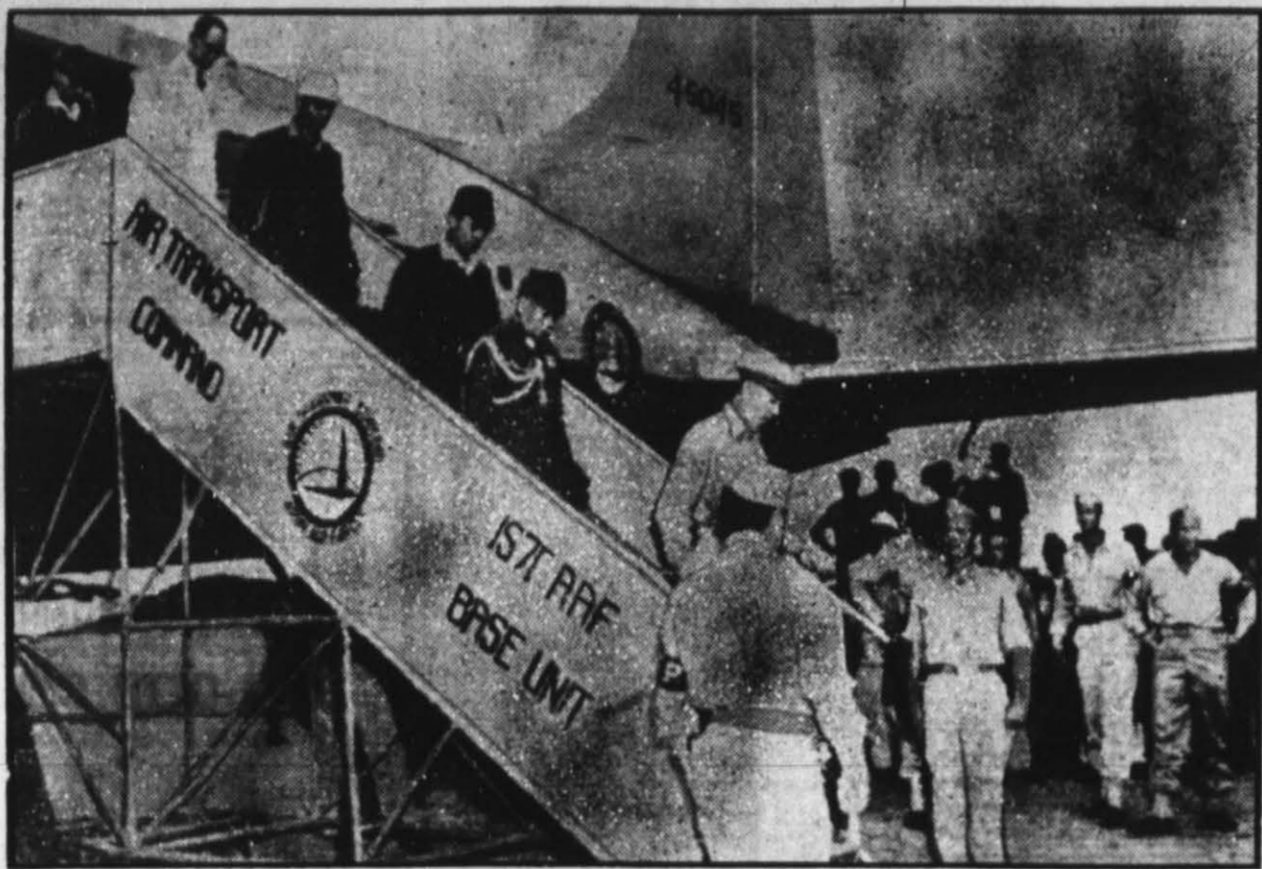

Loneliness, Longing for Home Reflect in POW Art Exhibit

What do prisoners of war do after they have finished their allotted work? Many have wondered about the Prisoner of War Camp at Hereford, about the prisoners themselves and what they do with their spare time. That loneliness and longing most of the time was evident in an exhibition of art held at the camp last week. Handcraft, sculpture and paintings were shown revealing at once a yearning for the homeland through intensity of expression. The entire exhibition was very well arranged and one wondered if adequate space and appropriate lighting had been available just how much artistic ability in organization could have been displayed. The hand of the real artist was there for much of the work shown was by artists with years of study behind them; but the amateur had his place too, for some exhibits were the work of those who had gained their first artistic knowledge while behind barbed wire.

Most of the paintings were memory-pictures of their beloved Italy. One picture captured the spell of Venice with her reflected lights and her sil-

ence, one painting of an old church displayed a technique of the kind of tile-painting which is used for decorations in modern interiors. Gay riotous color was found in a street scene in Italy on market day. Hillside and streams were worked out with painstaking accuracy, and all with patient skill as the artist lived again in an Italy at work and play and prayer.

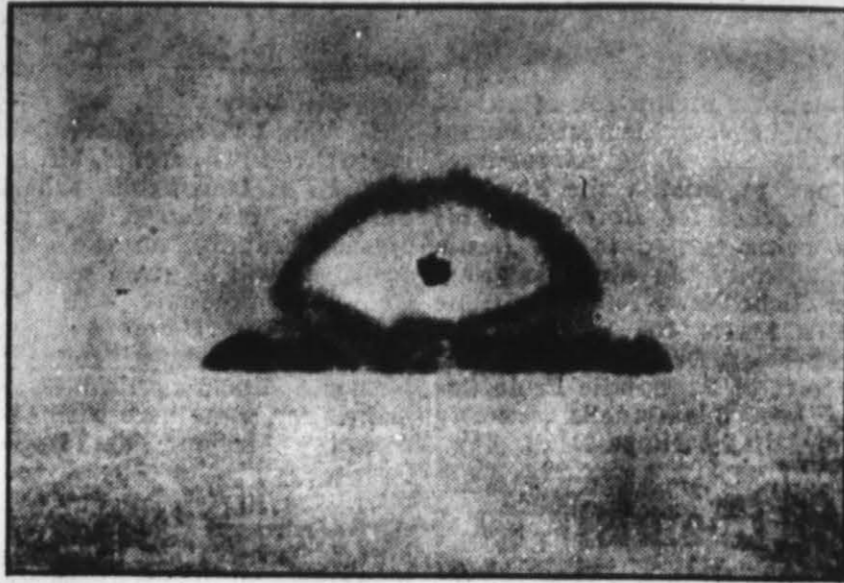
Some of the work reflected the atmosphere of the Prisoner of War Camp. Some drawings and paintings expressed the desolation felt by the prisoners, the endless sadness of the plains, while others caught the glory of a West Texas sunset or the peaceful quiet at the end of day.

Much enjoyed were the portraits reproducing the likenesses of fellow prisoners, each revealing contrasts in the individual style of the painter. Not easily forgotten were the pieces of sculpture, especially the heads which were produced in detailed precision by those who excelled in that line. Some reproductions of famous paintings were included. For example, a good copy of Rembrandt's "The Man With the Bronze Helmet," was seen.

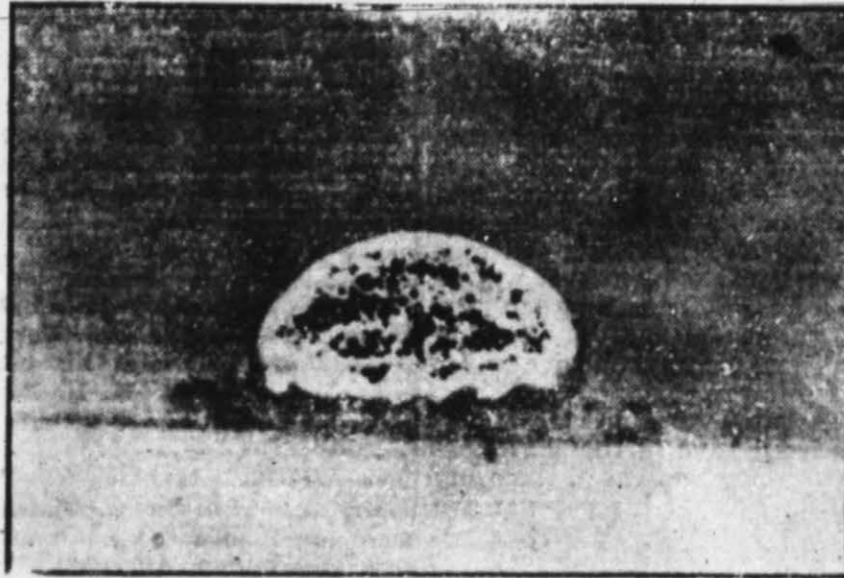
Water color of still life, black and white, sepia and woodcuts were arranged in groups containing similarly outstanding examples of the prisoner's artistic expression in various media from the time when he first found himself behind that high and forbidding fence. The thought of happier days with their children at home must have been uppermost when the gay little caricatures in the toy section were fashioned. And when that colorful collection of "Mr. Mickey Mouse" figurines eventually reaches Italy some little boys and girls are going to have an opportunity to see what American children like.

The prisoners themselves acted as guides and interpreters, explaining how little material

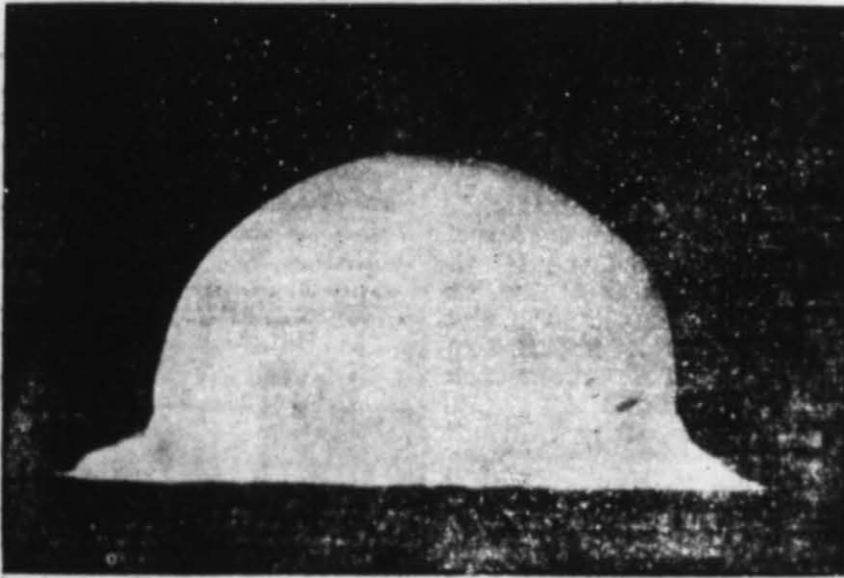
First Test of Atomic Bomb

be packed in boxes of metal, wood, solid fibreboard or strong corrugated fibreboard; and each box must be tied securely with strong cord, preferably by four separate pieces, two lengthwise and two crosswise, knotted at the crossings.

Boxes should contain sufficient cushioning material so that contents will be tightly packed to prevent any rattling or loosening of the articles within the parcels.

In addition to the already approved construction, the REA is seeking forty more miles of new lines, according to Forrest. He adds that there is also a definite prospect for approval of the building of a new sub-station in Castro County, just off the pavement on Highway 51; and if this project is approved it will be possible to connect 50 more wells on the REA lines and general service on all lines will be improved.



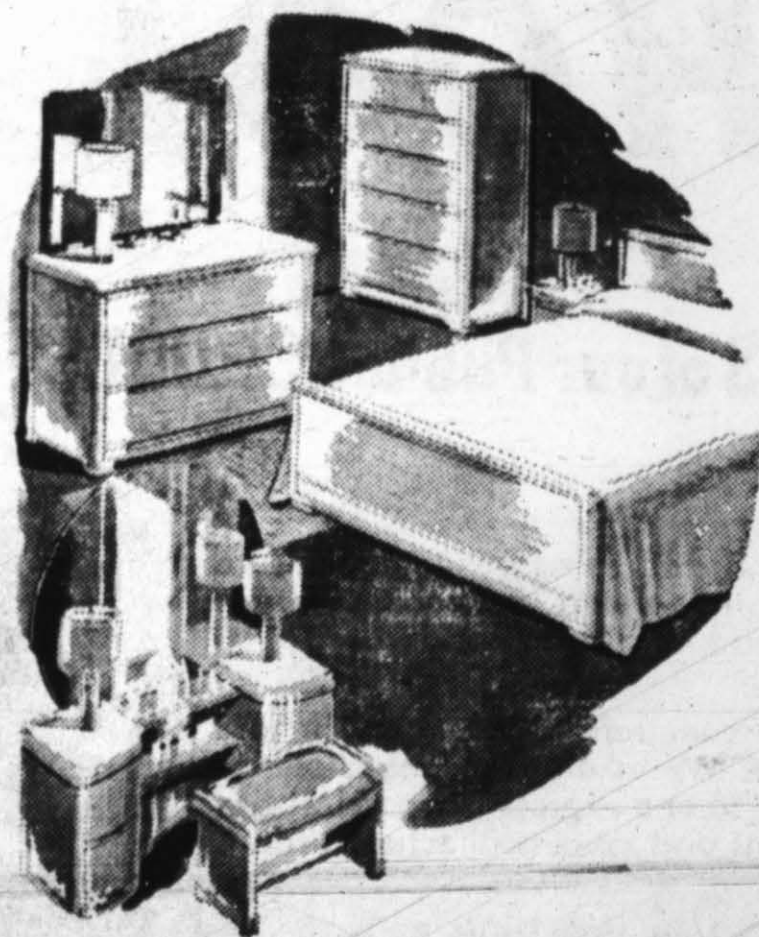
