SONS In the Service

Served on Repair Ship
ABOARD THE AJAX, IN THE PACIFIC (Delayed)—James P. Jones, machinist's mate, first class, Hereford, Tex., and fellow crew members of this huge repair ship had reason to take pride in the Fleet units that took part in the occupation of Japan, because some of those ships couldn't have been in that historic operation if it hadn't been for the jack-of-all-trades efficiency of the men of the AJAX.

From the Marshalls to the Carolines, the Philippines and Okinawa, the AJAX sailed with the Navy's men-o'-war, ready to handle any assignment from making false teeth for an uncomfortable sailor to fashioning steel plates for the flight deck of an aircraft carrier.

Because of the wide range of her facilities, the AJAX, just before the Okinawa campaign,

was assigned all battleships, cruisers, tankers, transports, supply ships and miscellaneous auxiliaries, in the greatest concentration in the history of the Navy. Yet the huge repair ship never failed to meet a completion date on a major ship.

Served on Carrier Hancock

Grady W. Wilson, Jr., 21, seaman, first class, Hereford, Tex., had chalked up, with other crewmen of the aircraft carrier USS HANCOCK, as impressive a record as just about any ship of the Fleet, before "calling it quits" in the Pacific and returning to the States for Navy Day.

Though "FIGHTIN' HANNAH" looks peaceful enough now at her moorings in home waters, her appearance belies a hectic career of ten months in the battle zones, during which her planes destroyed 723 enemy aircraft, 14 warships and 31 merchant ships. Her anti-aircraft guns have 10 "no'ches" for that many attacking planes knocked down.

Commissioned in April, 1944, the HANCOCK wasn't ready to join the 3rd Fleet until October, 1944, but from that day, she left the Japs reeling from

Wake Island to Hokkaido. Included in her fighting itinerary were Okinawa, Formosa, Luzon, Iwo Jima, Tokyo, Honshu, Kyushu, Hokkaido, Leyte, Hong Kong, and Kobe Harbor.

The HANCOCK is credited with downing the last Japanese plane attacking Allied Naval forces in the war.

The Regular Army
FRAMINGHAM, Mass., Oct. 27—Tech. Sgt. Willard Turnbow of Hereford was one of the first detachment men at Cushing General Hospital to reenlist in the Regular Army. Sworn in by the hospital recruiting officer, Tech. Sgt. Turnbow is now completing his eighth year of Army service.

Entering service in December, 1937, Turnbow spent two years at his first station, Ft. Warren, Wyo., and from there was sent to Ft. Meade, Md., where he completed six months of duty and reenlisted, serving then at camps in Virginia until 1942, when he was assigned to Ft. Devens, Mass.

Sgt. Turnbow's overseas service since the beginning of the War includes ten months in Iceland and 26 months in England, where he was a medical supply sergeant at the 49th Station Hospital. His decorations include the European service ribbon, Pre-Pearl Harbor ribbon and Good Conduct Medal.

He returned to the States in September, 1945, and after a 45-day leave reported this month to Cushing, where he is employed in the Property Supervisor's Office.

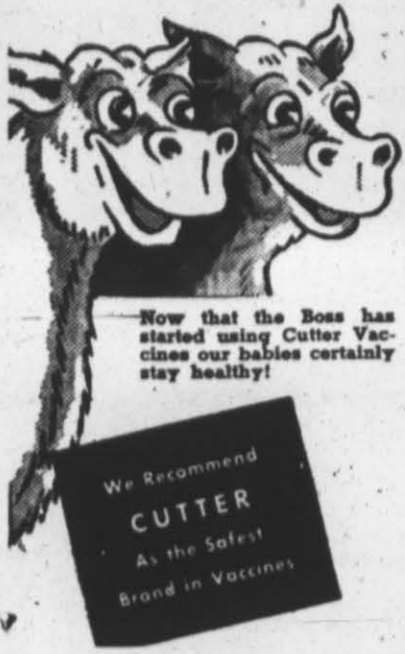
