

Retention of Rank Offered to Reenlisting Vets

Pointing out that the peacetime army offers advantages that few other jobs have, Major Robert G. Gibbons, in charge of recruiting for the West Texas U. S. Army Recruiting District, this week repeated some of the advantages offered to men who reenlist in the Army.

According to Major Gibbons, men enlisted prior to Feb. 1, 1946, will be enlisted in the grades specified as follows:

Men honorably discharged and enlisted within 20 days after the date of discharge will be enlisted in the grade held Mattie Mae Swisher, director; at the time of discharge, permanent or temporary, whichever is higher.

Men honorably discharged on or after May 12, 1945 and be-fore Nov. 1, 1945, will be enlisted in the grade held at the time of discharge, provided enlist-ment is effected prior to Nov. 21, 1945.

Men enlisted in the categor-ies described above will be given the same date of rank held at the time of discharge.




Too many poultry raisers in Deaf Smith County have been buying "bargain chickens," says Miss Sadie Lee Oliver, CHDA, pointing out that the result of the "bargain' is often turning time." out to be low egg production.

During the month of October, Miss Oliver conducted a demonstration on dressing chicken, and she states that a large percentage of the chickens used in the demonstrations not only were non-layers but never could have laid an egg. For some time, Miss Oliver says, the West Texas Feed and Seed Co. in Hereford has been giving the pullorum test to poultry flocks and it would pay every poultry raiser to have his flock tested and then get rid of infected chickens.




