As in past years, the bag limits are two cock pheasants daily and four in possession. One foot must remain attached to the carcass until it reaches its final destination.

Only the colorful cock pheasants are hunted; the hens are off limits.



Leno jabs at Bush, Quayle

WASHINGTON (AP) Comedian Jay Leno got the VIP treatment from President Bush at the White House, but it didn't keep him from cracking jokes at

Bush's expense. Leno, who'll succeed Johnny Carson next year on "The Tonight Show," had private audiences at the White House on Thursday with both Bush and Vice President Dan Quayle, a frequent butt of Leno's jokes. Bush also took him on a tour of the Christmas decorations in the executive mansion.

Leno regaled both with quips about the Democrats, including New York Gov. Mario Cuomo's new public service campaign: "A mind is a terrible thing to make

And he told Quayle that he was providing less material these days for the late-night comedy circuit.

But shortly after leaving 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, Leno had a National Press Club audience in stitches about Bush's recent shopping trip to a J.C. Penney's

"That kind of made me laugh. He bought socks for his grandchildren for Christmas. He thinks he's unpopular now. Wait until Christmas morning," Leno said.

Leno told Quayle how Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., reacted to the news of his nephew's acquittal in the Palm Beach rape case. "PAR-TY! PAR-TY!" Leno bellowed.

Leno said his jibes at Quayle were "just jokes.

"I said it was nice to meet him. He kind of smiled. Actually, I said I haven't been doing many Quayle jokes lately," Leno said.

"Most of the jokes I do are political jokes. They're not personal jokes," Leno said in an interview. "I don't do jokes about Marilyn Quayle or even Barbara Bush because they're not elected officials."

At the press club, he said ex-Ku Klux Klansman David Duke would be his favorite political target "if it wasn't so pathetic."

The recession is good for comedy too, he added.

"More people have lost weight and kept it off under the George Bush economic plan than the Jenny Craig plan," the comedian said.

Leno also got to meet outgoing White House Chief of Staff John Sununu, whose travels and travails Leno often lampooned. Sununu wanted to know where Leno will get his material now.

Sununu may have spoken too

Leno sat through 10 minutes of White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater's daily briefing, then raised his hand to ask: "Any connection between Sununu resigning and Pan Am going under? I mean they both happened about the same time.'

Fitzwater joined in the general

New Commonwealth gains members Soviet Union continues to disintegrate

MOSCOW (AP) - The leaders of agency reported. five Central Asian republics today agreed to join Russian President Boris Yeltsin's new commonwealth, abandoning the Kremlin and turning a cold shoulder to Mikhail S. Soviet Union.

The move appears to give irrestible momentum to the commonwealth and verge of resigning.

The leaders of Kazakhstan and the Turkmen capital, the Tass news joining.

Soviet republic, is the only Commonwealth of Independent States non-Slavic territory with nuclear on Sunday to replace a central weapons.

"We understand the drive of the Gorbachev's hopes of preserving the leaders of Byelorussia, Russia and Ukraine to create in the place of previously shackled republics, a commonwealth of independent further corners Soviet President law-governed states," the five Gorbachev, who already was on the republics said in a statement according to Tass.

Today's decision leaves only four predominantly Muslim republics of relatively small republics outside the Kirgizia, Tadzhikistan, Uzbekistan commonwealth - Georgia, and Turkmenistan made the decision Azerbaijan, Armenia and Moldavia. during a meeting in Ashkhabad, the All have said they are considering

Russia, Ukraine and Byleorussia Kazakhstan, the second-largest formed the still-loosely defined government whose power swiftly eroded in the wake of August's failed

coup by hard-line Communists. The commonwealth will face the same economic morass bedeviling the Kremlin, with severe food shortages predicted during the dead of winter. But Yeltsin has said the commonwealth will do away with a central bureaucracy resistent to radical market reform the republics want to implement.

U.S. officials, some of whom have expressed concern that hardship could lead to all-out civil strife and a loss of control over the Soviet nuclear arsenal, on Thursday announced a new aid effort. The White House said President Bush would hold an international conference early next month to coordinate humanitarian assistance to the Soviet Union.

On Thursday, the Russian Parliament overwhelmingly ratified the commonwealth agreement, and Gorbachev told reporters he would quit if the republics clearly chose the commonwealth over his plan to reconstitute the country as a loose confederation with a central government retaining some power.

Yeltsin, in a short, plain-spoken address to the Russian legislature before it gave its approval, said the commonwealth represented perhaps "the last chance" for preserving order and cooperation among the republics.

The commonwealth would make each of the republics fully independent, although they would have joint control over nuclear weapons. The Byelorussian capital Minsk would be the home of the commonwealth's coordinating body, which has not yet been created or even defined.

Yeltsin announced Thursday that he had the support of the Soviet military, and Moldavian President Mircha Snegur said after meeting with the Russian president that his republic had a "positive attitude" toward the new formation.

In a rambling interview Thursday with Soviet reporters, Gorbachev edged closer to resigning, saying "The main work of my life is done."

He pledged to accept the decision of the republic parliaments, but added: "I am convinced that we are now making the biggest mistake since the beginning of perestroika. ... We are destroying a state when it needs to be reformed."

In what sounded much like a farewell statement, Gorbachev said "a great deal befell my fate" and took pride that "I have managed - not without mistakes - to push through the main ideas of perestroika."

Nieman outlined the progress of the project, from its inception by representatives of local governing bodies to work now being accomplished by committee members who are assembling information to put into a proposal for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

"Whatever your perception might be of having a prison in the county, the fact remains that the construction of prisons is now the number one growth industry in the state," Nieman said, "and prison sites provide a

Rathburn said. Lawrence Bromley, 32, died Wednesday night of multiple wounds after the shooting on the parking lot

Rathburn said one drug suspect was apparently shot to death by Bromley after the man pulled a weapon in an attempt to rob the detectives.

The undercover officers, Bromley

and Catherine Hall, apparently were supposed to be in the front of the

vehicle during the buy, Rathburn said. "When the officers arrived at the location they were both seated in the front of the car," Rathburn said. "After the suspects arrived, Officer Bromley got in the right rear seat."

Rathburn identified the two drug suspects as Frederick Henry Moore, 21, and Jerry B. Taylor, 17, who was

Moore pointed an assault pistol at the officers, Rathburn said. A struggle ensued, Bromley pulled his weapon and fired three times, the chief said.

When the backup officers got the signal that things were going badly, the signal that the officers were being robbed of the money they had to purchase the narcotics, they rapidly approached the vehicle," Rathburn said.

"They saw some muzzle flashes inside the car (and) the officers believing that the suspect was firing at the officers, the other officers fired into the car.

"A number of shots were fired by Bromley and another man in the three different officers and the final

Officer Bromley died of gunshot wounds at that time," Rathburn said.

The police chief said all shots were fired by the undercover officers and the suspect did not fire any shots. Ms. Hall, who jumped from the car, was not hit. Counseling was offered to the

officers involved in the shooting, who were suspended from active duty, Rathburn said. Bromley, a 10-year veteran of the

force, was taken by ambulance to Parkland Memorial Hospital, where he was pronounced dead.
