IDA has new goals, directions

th are thanks, in part, to the efforts of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Angela Lamb, who heads TDA's office in Amarillo, told the Hereford Lions Club on Wednesday about TDA's programs that help push products from the field to processing and sell processed goods all over.

"When I joined TDA in 1982 our main job was to put posters in grocery stores telling people to 'Eat More Beef' or 'Eat More Flour," Lamb said. There is still in-store and point-of-purchase selling, but TDA has varied its program to meet the needs of producers and processors.

"We are very involved in economic development," Lamb said. She outlined how Harold Dillehay came to TDA with the idea for Panhandle Milling, a flour mill north of Dawn that opened in 1987.

"We did a marketing survey, asking every flour buyer within 150 miles if they would use the flour if it were available," Lamb said. "Most of said they would because their transportation charges would be cheaper if they bought it from Harold."

TDA also did profitability and feasiblity studies for Panhandle Milling, and uncovered financing sources.

"These services are free," Lamb said. "And they're confidential. We don't share the information with anyone else.'

Lamb said TDA has also worked with Azteca Milling, which is considering Hereford as a site for a corn mill that could be a huge

boost to the economy "We provided them with some marketing information and showed them our corn growing areas," Lamb said. "They wanted somewhere that had a steady supply of corn that wouldn't be as subject to a bad year because of drought. With our water supply for irrigation, they don't have to worry about that. They'll have a steady flow of product."

Lamb detailed other programs, including the Country Crafted program that supplies sources of Texas handmade goods to buyers for major companies, and the Taste of Texas program.

Taste of Texas is used for foods grown and processed in Texas. TDA representatives travel across the country to major events to promote Texas-made products.

"Because of a booth we had in Boston they are now serving picante sauce and chips at Fenway Park in Boston," Lamb said. "We have beef and wine and other products from Hereford and things from all over the state at the booths, and you'd be amazed at what we do, what we're able to sell to people because of our Taste of Texas program. It's a very important project.'

In the next few weeks (at least we a straight face. hope it's in the next few weeks) you'll be seeing some subtle changes in the Hereford Brand as we enter the newfangled computer age.

The newspaper industry has been through a lot of changes in the past few years, and this is the latest move.

10 years ago, it would have been ordinary to see or hear a Linotype or similar machine at work in a newspaper building. The Linotype machine was a single step up from what Gutenberg invented seven centuries ago: movable type on a printing press.

The Linotype machine took the process a step further, using molten lead, millions of mechanical parts and one heckuva lot of clacking to set type one line at a time.

What we're using now is "cold type." It's an early version of the computer age. Call it the old-fangled version, a version that was a tremendous change in the way type was set.

That's cold type as opposed to the hot type of molten lead. No longer are printer's devils being "initiated" like they were in the old days, when they were told to pick up a lead ingot

by a Linotype operator trying to keep


Usually, the ingot had cooled just enough to have the color of cold lead. It was still hot enough to leave a fairly permanent brand on the hand of some unsuspecting boy.

We use diskettes and other things associated with computers, but we also use special paper and chemicals and all kinds of stuff that are getting more and more expensive all the time. You could buy two cars a year with what we're spending for this stuff. You could buy my car twice with what we spend each month on paper and chemicals.

So, to heck with that. We're going to buy some not-too-fancy computers that will save us some money, eventually, and at the same time bring you a better product.

'Course, the better product may not be readily apparent. There'll be a learning process as we learn what the computer can do easily and what the computer won't do at all. And the times we learn the computers can do it if we'll just give it the proper com-

It could be interesting. Our main goal is to make things better for us and for you.

FBI drug sting began

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) - The FBI says a sting operation that began in a small suburban Buffalo storefront knocked out a massive American and Sicilian Mafia drug operation that was selling millions of dollars worth of heroin in the United States and cocaine in Italy.

Although the international food trading company set up by agents three years ago never handled any drug shipments, it allowed the FBI to establish contacts with organized crime operations in the United States and Italy, G. Robert Langford, special agent in charge of the FBI's Buffalo office, said Thursday.

As a result of the investigation which broadened to include FBI offices nationwide, the FBI and Italian authorities have charged more than 200 people in a multimillion-dollar heroin importation and cocaine distribution operation involving Sicilian Mafia figures and the Gambino crime family in New York.

A total of 68 people were charged in the United States and 133 in Italy as a result of a three-year FBI undercover operation in which agents traveled to Italy and posed as buyers who discussed making major drug purchases, the FBI said.

Substantial amounts of imported heroin were sold to the Gambino Mafia family in New York, which allegedly arranged for nationwide distribution, according to a complaint filed in the case in Philadelphia. Some of the heroin was passed to buyers in U.S. pizza parlors. Other drugs were concealed in wine shipments.

One of those arrested in the police roundup was Giuseppe Gambino, a nephew of Carlo Gambino, the late reputed head of the Gambino crime family.

A complaint filed in Manhattan against 28 people alleged that the organization "obtained cocaine in the U.S., transported the cocaine over to Italy, exchanged the cocaine for heroin, so the cocaine was sold in nd the heroin w U.S.," U.S. Attorney Rudolph Giuliani said.

"This is the largest example so far of the Mafia's involvement in cocaine, which is something that was unheard of a few years ago," Giuliani said.

"They were selling kilos of heroin for approximately \$200,000 a kilo; they were trading in multi-kilo quantities," said James Fox, assistant director of the FBI's New York office. "There were millions and millions of dollars."

What had started as an independent FBI probe of drug trafficking in Philadelphia, code-named "Iron Tower," was coordinated with the Buffalo probe when some names of suspected traffickers turned up in both, said the FBI.

The State Department said Saturday it denied Arafat a visa because he encourages and condones terrorism by the Palestine Liberation Organization. Washington has said it does not object to the assembly shifting to Geneva and would participate in debate there.

An assembly vote on the move would likely come early next week. Arab diplomats and U.N. officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, said passage was assured.

A rally originally planned to welcome Arafat on Thursday turned into a protest outside the United Nations, with about 400 people, including Palestinians and a few dozen anti-Zionist Orthodox Jews, denouncing the visa denial.

Waving PLO flags and pictures of Arafat, the demonstrators chanted "Long Live the PLO!" Most of the Palestinians wore red or black checked head scarves, a PLO sym-

Holding anti-Zionist banners were ultra-Orthodox Jews in long black coats and wide brimmed hats, with traditional sideburn curls and beards. They oppose the concept of a Jewish homeland.

The Orthodox Jews Against Zionism believe God has forbidden the Jewish people to have their own

Arab diplomats said they would move quickly to shift the General Assembly to Geneva in mid-December. U.N. and Arab sources said the Geneva session would be held the week of Dec. 12-16.

The diplomats and U.N. officials said a General Assembly vote on the Geneva move could come Monday.

Arafat has said he wants to explain the new position taken by the PLO's Palestine National Council in its recent meeting in Algiers. The council, the PLO's barliament-in-exile, implicitly recognized Israel's right to exist, accepting key U.N. resolutions on the Middle East calling for negotiations with states in the

New lawmakers arriving early

The orientation session, which ends today, is a baptism into the complexities of state budgets and bureaucracies as well as some words of wisdom from senior lawmakers.

"Keep your ears open and your mouths shut," adivsed House Speaker Gib Lewis, D-Fort Worth. Asked later when the freshmen could reverse that, Lewis said, "About midway through the session.

Gradually." Twenty-six House members and five senators, two of whom are moving up from the House, will be taking their seats on Jan. 10, the opening day of the new session.



Tide blows out Aggies in Hurrican

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) - "See you in September, maybe," said Texas A&M's Jackie Sherrill as Alabama's Bill Curry celebrated a 30-10 "Hurricane Bowl" victory and a "contract in concrete" through 1992.

Sherrill departed the locker room in a huff when he was peppered with questions about his future after Thursday night's loss to his alma

Texas A&M president Dr. William That's not even a question." H. Mobley is investigating charges against Sherrill that "hush" money was paid to former player George Smith during an NCAA probe that cost the Aggies a chance at a bowl

game. The NCAA said it won't act on this allegation until the A&M in-

vestigation of Sherrill is completed. Sherrill fooled the rumor mongers again after the game. Several television stations reported he would resign. Sherrill didn't resign, and refused to shed any light on whether he will stay at Texas A&M.

"You guys want to talk about football, then talk football. I didn't even talk about all this with the team. Someone asked: "Will you be

coaching at A&M next year?' "I guess you don't want to talk

about football, evidently you don't," Sherrill said. "Good luck and I'll see you in September, I guess," and he

Later, he talked recruiting on his call-in radio show, saying to one caller, "The big thing we have to do is replace some of our defensive players, particularly in the defensive line."

Curry was like someone on death row who got a reprieve call from the governor. An Alabama alumni group was reported to have a \$2 million trust fund to buy out his contract,

The "governor," in this case, was Alabama interim president Roger Sayers, who announced nine hours before the game that Curry's contract "wasn't for sale" and would be

honored for the next three years. The Crimson Tide, apparently relaxed with Curry's future secure,

dominated the Aggies. "With the way our program is being looked at, we made a step upward," Curry said. "You have to

realize how close we are to having a great season." The game itself was almost a sideshow to the rumors concerning

the two coaches. Alabama's David Smith threw two touchdown passes and Philip Doyle kicked three field goals for 20thranked Alabama, which will play Army in the Sun Bowl on Christmas

The Aggies, who finished 7-5, had called this makeup game their bowl. dubbing it the "Hurricane Bowl" after Alabama failed to show on Sept. 17 when the game was threatened by Hurricane Gilbert.

Alabama players had some fun with the idea of this being a bowl

"This was a really big win," tailback Murry Hill said with tongue in cheek. "We won the first, the only existing Hurricane Bowl. That's quite a feat."

A&M running back Darren Lewis gained 128 yards on 24 carries, his 10th straight game over 100 yards.

He finished the season with 1,692 vards, second-best in Southwest Conference history to the 1,744 by Earl Campbell of Texas in his Heisman Trophy-winning season of 1977.

Alabama's Derrick Thomas, the Butkus Award winner as the best inebacker in the nation, crippled A&M's passing game with four sacks

and a fumble recovery.

"All the hype about the game was great," Thomas said. "I think it really fired us up."

Doyle's three field goals gave him 19 for the season, two more than Van Tiffen's school mark in 1965.

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TAC takes big stand on drugs

PHOENIX (AP) — Track and field athletes have taken their strongest stand for an out-of-competition drug

esting program.
At The Athletics Congress convention late Thursday night, the Athletes Advisory Council adopted a resolu-

tion supporting such a program.

It is designed according to guidelines proposed by the U.S. Olympic Committee and as required by the International Amateur Athletic Federation, the world gover-ning body for the sport. The IAAF passed an out-of-competition testing rule last year.

However, the IAAF has yet to fully implement the rule throughout the world. Instead, it has asked each federation for ideas on individual implementation. So far, only the Scandinavian countries, led by Sweden, have adopted out-of-competition testing.

The IAAF rule provides that an athlete who is requested to submit to doping control by a responsible official must do so whether such a request is made during or outside of competition. Failure to comply constitutes a breach of IAAF rules and the athlete will be treated as if he or

she had tested positively for drugs.

The athletes said those who would be tested would include the top 25 U.S. performers in each event beginning with the 1968 annual performance results and those who subsequently enter the list under updated lists provided each month by TAC, and athletes who receive financial assistance through any amateur sports organization.

Under the resolution, athletes would be given 24 to 48 hours notice

before testing would be conducted. Testing would be for steriods, masking agents, diuretics, stimulants not including cold medicines, and other training- and

performance-enhancing compunds. The athletes' committee said it

supported the creation of an indepen-dent body which would be the ex-clusive custodian of test results.

The committee also said that a voluntary out-of-competition program would be instituted immediately to cover the period between the consideration of the proposal on Saturday by the General Session of TAC and by TAC's board of directors

at its next meeting in March.
"This is a fantastic start to give credibility to our sport and to our athletes — to say to the rest of the world, that we in the U.S., and paricularly our athletes, are concerned with what we want to do," Cassell,

TAC's executive director, said.

There had previously been some concern about the legality of such a rule, but Peter Alkalay, TAC's legal counsel, assured the athletes there should be no problems.

"This is a fantatic start ... terrific," he said. "I think it could be supported legally."

One of the athletes who helped

draft the resolution was Edwin Moses, two-time Olympic gold medalist in the men's 400-meter intermediate hurdles. Earlier Thursday, Moses said that the drug issue wouldn't be cleaned up until random, out-of-season testing was im-

In addition, Moses had said that the testing in track and field - and in all other Olympic sports in the United States — should be done by an independent agency, rather than the national governing bodies.

He said that if out-of-season testing was approved, that it must be random, not strictly voluntary.

"It would not be effective otherwise." he said. "It would be a waste of money."

Currently, drug testing among track and field athletes in the United States is conducted only during national championship meets and at selected event.
