The City of Hereford is forced to ace a 5-year-old underground storage tank at McKinley nd New York avenues because the lexas Water Commission originally aid the tank seeped gasoline into a water well adjacent to it.

The Hereford City Commission voted at its meeting Monday to accept bids for a new \$5,000 storage tank costing \$43 more than having the current tank installed again.

City manager Darwin McGill said re-installing the present tank would be cost-prohibitive.

'We knew when the Water Commission made us dig up the tank, we couldn't put it back. We'd have to recoat the tank and redo the fittings which would end up costing us just about as much as getting an entirely new one."

Residents of the Coneway Subdivision first noticed a peculiar, crude oil taste in their water this April.

When the Water Commission and the State Health Department found traces of ethylbenzene (ingredient of gasoline) in the water, the Commission forced the city to excavate the 1,500-gallon tank or dig test holes which would cost \$12,000 to \$15,-000.

We even filled the gasoline tank up to the top and let it sit for a week, and the level of it didn't drop a bit," said Ted Coleman, water production crintendent. That dung was only

This is the only well where we've had problems," said McGill. We check our wells each week (on a rotation basis, 30 in all), but it wasn't the testing that found what we think is crude in the water-it was the residents. Fortunately, it was not one of our better wells."

As for the excavated gasoline tank, the city will either use it as an overhead storage tank near the city incinerator or dismember it.

Coleman said he was anxious for the Water Commission to find the

"Hopefully we can get this leak located because we have two other water wells across the draw at the country club that might get contaminated if the (Water) Commission waits too long," Coleman said. /

At the city commission meeting, Commissioner Paul Hamilton said he feared the city would be liable not only for any leaking of the city's own underground gasoline tanks but for those abandoned underground gasoline tanks once belonging to private businesses.

In other business, the city commission:

--Voted to grant a 2-year, 100 percent building tax abatement to Whiteface Ford Lincoln Mercury.

-Elected to stay with the city's current Texas Municipal League workman's compensation insurance and with Lone Star Agency insurance for property and liability insurance. -- Voted to alter the wording to read "museums and churches" instead of "nonprofit organizations" concerning organizations being able to place signs off the premises.

WASHINGTON(AP)--Most current \$13 billion farm program Midwestern and Southern farmers cost will have to be cut next year as believe economic times on the farm have grown worse in recent years needed to help the government reach and don't want the government to its deficit-reduction target. cut spending for farm programs -- a · view that seems certain to run headon into harsh budget realities.

A survey released last week by Rural Voice, a non-profit policy group created by Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Patrick Leahy, D.Vt., found that three out of four farmers believe the government is spending the right amount or too little on farm subsidies.

At the same time, outgoing Ag Secretary Richard Lyng predicted that as much as \$3 billion of the

part of the \$30 billion or so in cuts Farm programs and defense

spending are the most frequently cited targets for cuts when Congress returns next month.

The survey of 270 farmers, conducted in August and released at a Capitol Hill news conference last week, found that while they believe government spending on farm programs should not be cut, nearly three out of five believe the government makes poor use of the money it does spend on farmers.

Bock's sports Did Shoeless Joe get a bum rap?

Granted this is somewhat premature, since A. Bartlett Giamatti will not move into the baseball commissioner's office until April 1, but if he needs some food for thought over the long, cold winter, he might consider this one.

After 68 years in baseball purgatory, it may be time to take a look at reinstating Shoeless Joe Jackson.

Remember that in one of his first acts as commissioner, Peter Ueberroth welcomed Mickey Mantle and Willie Mays back into baseball's good graces. That was a widely applauded act, especially welcome in baseball's current penurious period, since it cost nothing.

Shoeless Joe might not generate the same headlines, but for Giamatti, an academician and historian by training, the case might be appealing. And the price of reinstatement would be the same as Mantle and Mays. Nothing.

Jackson was implicated in the 1919 Black Sox scandal, charged as one of eight Chicago players who took bribes to throw the World Series to the Cincinnati Reds. If Jackson was a fixer, he went about the task in a most peculiar manner, batting .375 as the Series' leading hitter and making no errors in the eight games against the Reds.

Fixer.

The word suggests an evil, conniving, wiseguy. Jackson was none of those things. He was instead the quintessential innocent, an illiterate country boy, who depended on raw talent to excel. A fixer requires more guile than Jackson, who was unable to read or write, could have mustered. He was a lamb, consumed by the wolves who surrounded him.

"He got a bad rap," says Donald Gropman, author of Jackson's biography, "Say It Ain't So, Joe." "He was totally defamed by history. It comes down to whose word do you take, his, or admitted fixers who were granted immunity to testify? In

any planning meeting for the fix." There seems little question that funny business went on in the 1919 Series. It was so poorly executed that everybody there seemed to know something was going on. But were the villains in the piece the players who were promised payoffs - some were delivered, others were not - or owner Charles Comiskey, who treated his employees like so many field hands? In any event, Jackson appears to have been swept along in

the rush to judgment. Shoeless Joe steadfastly denied his involvement and, in fact, won partial clearance in a civil suit he filed against Comiskey for back wages in 1924. He was awarded two years of pay and the jury said it found him in no way involved in the fix.

If you were fixing the Series, hough, Jackson would have been a good man to have on your side. He was arguably the most talented natural hitter of his time, compiling a career batting average of .356 for 13 major league seasons, topped by .406 in 1911, his first full year. Jackson did not, however, win the batting championship that rookie season, because Ty Cobb hit .420.

Gropman said Jackson's involvement with the fix was promoted by Chick Gandil, one of his teammates and an early conspirator. "To make it work, they had to have the best pitchers and the best hitters," he said. "They had the pitchers, Eddie **Cicotte and Lefty Williams. Jackson** and Eddie Collins were the best hitters."

Collins, though, was something of an outcast on the team, college educated and paid decently by Comiskey. So Jackson was the guy. "The gamblers believed he was in," Gropman said.

Was he really, though?

Well, in the film version of Eliot Asniof's gripping account, "Eight Men Out," Cicotte is shown cutting off a throw to the plate, an apparent bonehead play that allowed a Cincinnati run to score.

The man who made the on-target throw that Cicotte felt obliged to inany event, nobody ever placed him at tercept was Shoeless Joe Jackson.

Texas, Cubs make nine-player trade

STANFORD, Cal.(AP)--He was praised for his recruiting, but the team's inability to score when it got close to the goal line was Stanford University Coach Jack Elways's downfall.

Saying it was time for "new direction," Elway, whose Cardinals had lost four out of the last five seasons, was fired Monday after-1000.

The not-so-surprise announcement by Stanford Director of Athletics Andy Geiger came just two weeks after the Cardinal wrapped up a 3-6-2 season.

Elway, who came from San Jose in 1984 after Paul Wiggin was fired following a 1-10 season, has been praised for his recruiting effort at Stanford, particularly the past three seasons. Every starting skill position player on offense returns next season, and five of them are sophomores or freshmen.

But Elway repeatedly was criticized during the season for Stanford's inability to score points after the team got close to the goal

While at Stanford, Elway compiled a 25-29-2 record. The Cardinal





However, dried fruit may contain as much as 70 percent sugar by weight, or more than many cookies and as much as some candies. As a result, you get a fair number of calories along with your minerals.

Some modern processors have also added sulfite preservatives to light colored fruit, such as apples, peaches, pears, apricots and golden raisins, to keep them from turning brown.

Asthmatics and other sulfitesensitive people should be sure the dried fruit they are eating is sulfite free. The Food and Drug Administration requires that dried fruit which contains sulfites be clearly marked. Since dried fruits are among the most heavily sulfited foods on the market today, it is important to check.

On the whole though, dried fruits are a delicious way to satisfy a sweet tooth and gain some great nutritional bonuses. Just eat them in moderation and consider these fruits as a welcome Christmas gift. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

ASK DR. LAMB

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am so discouraged. My 18-year-old son has developed the filthy habit of chewing tobacco. He is a handsome, healthy young man, but this habit ruins it all. He is very athletic and loves baseball. I think all those baseball players chewing tobacco is the real reason he chews.

I would like to know why baseball players chew, and I hope you will say something about how harmful it is. I realize that chewing may not be as dangerous as smoking, unless I lose control and become violent, but surely it can't be healthy.

DEAR READER: Baseball players have been chewing tobacco since the sport was first organized in 1845, originally to throw spit balls. Drs. Gregory Connolly, C. Tracy Orleans and Michael Kogan of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health recently reviewed this problem in baseball players. They point out that Babe Ruth, who dipped snuff, chewed tobacco and smoked tobacco, died at age 52 from throat cancer, while Honus Wagner, one of the most famous shortstops of all time and an outspoken critic of tobacco, died at age 81.

Chewing tobacco and snuff are significant hazards to the teeth and gums and can cause cancer of the mouth.

He still gets pain in his lower abdomen. What are the chances of this happening again? My son had to have a polyp removed from his lower rectum when he was 6. Is this related to diverticulosis in any way? DEAR READER: Yes, diverticulosis

does occur at an early age, but it is rare. It is usually said the incidence of diverticulosis increases after age 30 until half the people in the U.S. who reach 80 have these little pockets of the colon.

When diverticulosis occurs at an early age, it seems to be associated with more complications. It sounds like your husband had an infected diverticulum (pocket) and these can perforate. Such a complication is much like appendicitis and surgery may be required. Today, when possible, if surgery is required, the segment where the pockets are located is removed and the ends of the colon sutured together all in one operation. If that can't be done for some reason, a temporary colostomy is done, as in your husband's case.

Usually, the diverticula are in one segment of the colon. If this is removed, it is unlikely that a complication such as bleeding or perforation will occur again. But that

doesn't mean discomfort will not occur. Many doctors think the discomfort is related to spasms of the colon that may have been a factor in causing the original diverticula.

Despite his young age, the management is the same as if it had occurred for the first time when he was 50. I have discussed this in my Diverticulosis: Pockets of the Colon, remove unwanted excess skin.

Your son's polyp is an entirely different problem and should have nothing to do with diverticulosis.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am 58-year-old woman, and a few years ago I weighed 177 pounds. I went on a diet and got down to 110 pounds. Needless to say, the inside of my legs and my stomach are all flab. Is there any exercise I could do to tighten the muscles, or am I at an age where exercise would not work?

DEAR READER: Exercise is not likely to correct such a problem at any age if you lose 37 percent of your body weight. I am asked this question rather frequently. About 95 percent of the people who lose weight regain what they lost and often add more pounds. You might be one of the 5 percent who keeps the fat off. But that is the reason I usually don't recommend any drastic measures until a person has kept the excess weight off at least a year.


You cannot exercise the skin. Once it is stretched, it is like an over-stretched balloon. It never gets back to its original shape. If you are young, you may be lucky and the skin in time will undergo enough changes to take up some of the slack. You can tighten up your muscles, but that "flab" is probably skin, not muscle or fat.

What's left? Exercise can increase the size of your muscles under the skin, and that helps, but you can't expect to develop 67 pounds of new Special Report 94, About muscles. That leaves surgery to

before placing orders, be sure to follow some important shopping tips.

Don't be short-changed by con artists selling merchandise through the mail or over the telephone. While most mail order and telemarketing companies are legitimate, some fraudulent ones are only interested in making a fast buck. To protect yourself, check the company out with your Better Business Bureau before placing an order.

Watch out for exaggerated claims or unrealistically low prices for merchandise. Read catalog descriptions carefully - is it wood or plastic? Diamond or glass? Also, compare prices for similar products in your area.

ped the merchandise.

The rule now allows the recipient of a C.O.D. package to pay the charges with a check made payable to the sender. Consumers can later stop payment on the check if they think the goods have been intentionally misrepresented. Keep in mind, some banks charge a fee for cancelled checks.

Of course, some mail order problems pop.up when consumers fail to fill out order forms correctly. Don't forget to fill in you rname and address! Also check for a cut-off date on orders-if you miss it, delivery may not be guaranteed in time for the holidays.

Keep a copy of the ad or brochure when you place an order. Also, jot down the date you placed the order and the number of your check or money order. Remember, never send cash through the mail.
