WE are faced with a serious shortage of meat for the civilian population. The current mean sugation is not pecunar to any local area. The problem is national in scope.

GOVERNMENT REQUIREMENTS

PORK: 50%, approximately, of dressed weight.

LARGE DECREASE COMPARED WITH LAST YEAR

Government figures indicate a decrease of 38% of civilian meat supplies is expected during this quarter (January to March, inclusive), as compared with a year ago. The decrease will vary on the different types of meats.

It is also estimated that during the second quarter of this year (April to June, inclusive) a decrease of 35% is expected.

Few people realize how much beef, pork, lamb and veal must be set aside by meat packers operating under federal inspection to be purchased by the Government for the Armed Forces and for Lend-Lease. As of February 20, 1945, we are required to set aside:

SEEF: 60% of choice, good, and commercial steers and heifers, except extremely light weights.
70% of all utility steers, heifers and cows.
80% of all cutters and canners.

LARD: 75%, approximately, of production in accordance with recent order.

M., the enemy came back

This time, the HOVEY took a direct, fatal hit from an aerial torpedo. Before the abandonship order was given, the crew members had the satisfaction of day. seeing their attacker go down in flames from the fire of a sister minesweeper. But the HOV-EY was sinking fast, went down, in fact, three minutes after the order to abandon had been issued by Lieutenant Ben N. Cole, U. S. N . R., of Charlotte, North Cerolina skipper of the ship.


