The election, which drew 209 voters, was held despite legal action questioning the district's constitutionality. The measure passed by a 126-83 margin.

The commissioners accepted the election results in accordance with state law, issuing orders to validate the vote and create the district.

The election drew 38 absentee ballots, with 19 being cast for and 19 against the measure. In election day balloting, Precinct 1 returned 37 votes for and 25 against, Precinct 2 passed the district by a 15-10 margin and Precinct 4 passed the issue by a 47-16 count.

Precinct 3 was the only one not to approve the district, voting 13 against to 8 for.

Commissioners will now appoint a four-member board to staggered terms of one or two years to administer the district. District voters will elect board members after the original terms expire.

The board must be in place in time for an April 4 meeting.

The election was challenged just before Aug. 5 by Jim McMorries, who claimed that it was unconstitutional to not allow persons to vote in the election if they owned land in the county but lived in the Hereford city limits.

The original court challenge was turned down by an Amarillo state district judge, but McMorries has indicated he will continue the challenge in higher courts.

On the Juvenile Board, Simons said the new budget provided for a full-time Intensive Supervision Personnel. The position would be funded by a \$30,000 grant from the state Simons said. The reasoning behind the move was that each juvenile sent to Texas Youth Corrections costs the state about \$33,000 per year. Deaf Smith sends about five juveniles to TYC each year, Simons said.





THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. (AP) Dallas Cowboys rookie quarterbacks Troy Aikman and Steve Walsh rarely threw deep in Sunday's 20-3 preseason victory at San Diego, a trend that could continue all season, Cowboys coach Jimmy Johnson said Monday.

"Some of the things we're going to do with our young quarterbacks will be somewhat conservative at times," Johnson said. "We feel like it's better to go that route and win that be spectacular and take a chance on a bunch of sacks.

"The bottom line is to win, not throw deep passes."

Aikman started the game and played the first half, completing 8 of 11 passes for 67 yards and one touchdown. His longest completion was 13 yards and he never tried a deep pass attempt.

Walsh played the third quarter and completed just 2 of 8 passes for 22 yards. He tried one deep pass, an incompletion.

Johnson said that after reviewing tapes of the Cowboys' victory, he was pleased with the effort of his two quarterbacks.

"I think we were able to see how they are going to respond to pressure-style defense," Johnson said. "San Diego kept after us for three quarters-plus. I thought are quarterbacks kept their poise and did a good job in handling the blitz."

Johnson said he would stick with his play of rotating the quarterbacks. Walsh will get the starting nod and play the first half this Saturday at the Los Angeles Raiders. Aikman will play the third quarter and third-stringer Babe Laufenberg will play the fourth

"We've got to evaluate players over a period of time, not just in one quarter or a few plays," Johnson said.

Johnson said he thinks the victory, his first since taking over for Tom Landry as the Cowboys coach, will have a positive effect on

his team. "Obviously this is a better situation than had we not won," Johnson said. "The players feel good and the working very hard. They have a great attitude but the more you win, the better your attitude is going to be."

Johnson did say he was disappointed with the penalty problems that bothered his second-team offensive line. He also mentioned tackling problems by his defense. The Chargers outgained the Cowboys 347-206 in total offensive yardage.

"Realistically, when we look at the tapes, we've got some short-comings," Johnson said. "That's obvious to anybody who has seen the Cowboys play. There are a lot of areas we need improvement in. But I was pleased with our effort."

The Cowboys reported no major injury problems and are hopeful that starting defensive tackle Danny Noonan will be able to play in Saturday's game. Noonan sat out the Chargers game with a groin

The Cowboys also reported that ticket sales are ahead of last year's pace. About 13,800 tickets are left for the Cowboys' only preseason home game against Houston Sept. 2; at this time last year the Cowboys had 18,600 tickets available. For their first three regular-season home games, the Cowboys are 12,000 tickets ahead of last year's pace.

Pickens postpones decision

AMARILLO (AP) - Oilman and corporate raider T. Boone Pickens Jr. has decided to postpone until the end of the month his decision whether to run for governor.

Pickens, head of Mesa Limited Partnership of Amarillo, is planning to move to Dallas and for the past several months has been considering running in the Republican

gubernatorial primary next March. The oilman, who recently gained notoriety with his abortive effort as the largest shareholder to get on the board of directors of a Japanese automobile headlight maker, had said earlier this year that he planned to make a decision on the gubernatorial race by Aug. 15.

But Pickens would like a little more time and now plans to announce his intentions probably early next month, his secretary, Sally Buford, said Monday. Pickens was out of town Monday and unavailable for comment.

Pickens said earlier this summer he would weigh several factors before deciding whether to throw his hat into the ring: responsibility to unitholders in his Mesa Limited Partnership, responsibility to members of his nationwide shareholders' rights group and his 20 percent stake in Koito, the Japanese headlight company.
