

Proclamation by the Governor of the State of Texas

TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

WHEREAS, the war situation is in a critical stage, requiring every ounce of human endeavor on the part of those on the home front; and

WHEREAS, the young men of this state are fighting and dying on far-flung battle fronts-from Europe to the islands of the Pacific and in the Far East, on land, on the sea and in the air; and

WHEREAS, it is not only the privilege but the duty as well, of every American to serve the cause of humanity to as great extent as possible; and

WHEREAS, it is our common aim to contribute to the welfare of our sons and daughters in the armed forces, wherever they may be; and

WHEREAS, the American Red Cross is serving our fighting forces the world over, bringing them the comfort and cheer that we ourselves would like to give them. At the same time, the Red Cross is prepared to aid us, here in our own State, in the event of disaster;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Coke Stevenson, Governor of Texas, in cooperation with the national observance of March as Red Cross War Fund Month, do hereby proclaim the period March 1-31, 1945, as

RED CROSS WAR FUND MONTH

in Texas. All citizens of this State are called upon to support the 1945 Red Cross War Fund to the limit of their ability by contributing to the Red Cross through local chapters. The Red Cross must carry a greater burden this year than ever be fore in its history to meet every demand placed upon it.

Mrs. Beavers First Block Captain To Report on War Fund

Mrs. Hall Beavers admits that she had absolutely no opportunity for high pressure salesmanship when she went out to collect Red Cross donations in her block Tuesday.

"I didn't tell them-they told me-about Red Cross and its important work," says Mrs. Beavers who was the first block captain in Hereford to make a report on war fund donations.

There were 22 persons in Mrs. Beavers' district, which included the 400 blocks on Miles and North Main and the 100 blocks on West Fifth and West Fourth. Total donations amounted to \$124-or an average of more than \$5 per person.

"If other blocks in Hereford and all the rural communities place during the fighting around will keep up a similar high average, the county will have no difficulty in raising \$10,900," Red Cross spokesmen commented.

ing the emergency. The parents of the little girl expressed their sincere gratitude


