Under the self-insured program, Holder. The S and R Benefits prescriptions be made subject to the \$300 deductible with employees paying 20 percent and insurance coverage paying 80 percent above that amount.

"This is going to cost us. I don't want anyone to be deceived," Judge Simons said to commissioners.

He was referring to greatly increased claims whic will be paid because prescriptions are not subject to a deductible.

Prescription coverage was not the only instance in which commissioners decided against Holder's recommendations and in favor of the employee. The most dramatic example came in a discussion over hospice care. Holder recommended that commissioners drop the current \$20,000 ceiling to \$10,000.

Democrats, reaching for advantage in the politically charged war on drugs, seek today to finalize a tentative agreement with the Bush administration to boost the president's anti-drug plan by \$900 million.

"The American people wanted more than the president requested, and this gets more," Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., told reporters in outlining the plan Monday night. "It's not a final solution, but it's a good first step Popadiuk said. toward fighting the war on drugs.'

The compromise anti-drug figure would be \$900 million more than Bush sought in his Sept. 5 speech to the nation, and \$3.1 billion more than is being spent on anti-drug programs in the current fiscal year. Congressional Democrats had criticized Bush's request as too little to make headway against the drug

Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, said the agreement would "substantially improve the president's drug package" and added he was "gratified that the

While the compromise figure went a little less than halfway of the increase - \$800 million would be devoted to drug treatment, that Democrats said were most seriously underfunded in Bush's outline.

Hatfield sought to minimize any Democratic advantage from the accord by pointing to Bush's leadership in proposing the antidrug package in the first place.

'This is a bipartisan war," Hatfield said, adding that he expected many Senate Republicans to support the compromise package. "The Democrats don't have any greater degree of support for the drug war than the Republicans."


The okapi, whose forelegs look longer than its hind legs, is a shy animal that stays in remote areas.

What is a heart attack?

muscle that pumps blood. It has its own blood vessels, the coronary arteries, that nourish it and keep it

In most cases when a heart attack occurs, fatty deposits (composed mostly of cholesterol) have lined the coronary arteries. As these deposits build up, they progressively narrow the arteries and decrease or stop the flow of blood to the heart. When there's a decreased flow of blood to the heart, the heart muscle may be damaged, but when there's a complete blockage of the flow of blood so that the heart can't get the oxygen and foot it needs, a own way of compensating for the part of the heart may actually die. This is a heart attack.

A heart attack most often results when a blood clot forms in a narrowed artery and blocks the flow of blood to the part of the heart muscle supplied by that artery. Doctors call this form of heart attack a coronary thrombosis, coronary occlusion or myocardial infarction.

Ventricular fibrillation is an uncoordinated twitching that replaces the smooth, measured contractions that cause blood to be pumped to the organs of the body. In many cases, if trained medidcal professionals are immediately available, they can get the heart beating again by using electricla shock and/or drugs.

If the heart can be kept beating, and not too much heart muscle is damaged, small blood vessels may gradually reroute blood around the blocked arteries. This is the heart's clogged artery, and it's called collateral circulation.

The key to surviving a heart attack is promptly recognizing the warning signals and getting immediate medical attention.

How to Recognize a **Heart Attack**

When a person has these symptoms, it's natural for him or her to deny what's happening. No one

The human heart basically is a dying part of the hear t may trigger wants to think that he might be having a heart attack. But before you shrug off the symptoms, it's important to know that more than 300,000 heart attack victims died before reaching the hospital last year, many of them because they refused to take their symptoms seriously.

What should you do if you think you might be having a heart attack? If you're uncomfortable for two minutes or more, call your local emergency medical service (EMS) immediately. If the EMS isn't available, get to a hospital offering emergency cardiac care as soon as possible.

Know in advance which route from home or work will take you to the hospital the quickest. You might even discuss your possible choices with your doctor. Another option is th call your local American Heart Association and ask which recognized emergency medical service and hospitals cover your area. Keep emergency information where you can find it easily and develop a "buddy system" with someone you know.

When people are hospitalized because of a heart attack, they often become depressed and anxious about whether they'll be able to resume full physical, social, professional and sexual activities. Usually there's no cause for worry. Unless the heart attack was extremely severe, most heart attack victims in time and with the proper care can function as well as they did before their heart attack.



DEAR DR. LAMB: I had my second bypass three months ago. I am confused about olive oil. Should I use it? The hospital nutrition department told me not to use it. I read a new book about cholesterol by a TV doctor and he says to use it.

My neighbor, who is a native of Greece and raised on nothing but olive oil, just had a heart attack at age 45.

Please tell me about olive oil and margarines made from safflower oil. I had my first heart attack and bypass 16 years ago at age 45.

DEAR READER: There is a lot more to preventing heart disease than whether you use olive oil or not. Actually, some of the news stories touting olive oil were based on studies that didn't even use olive oil. It pays to read the original research

reports.

"good for your heart." Many of the studies that claim to have shown that olive oil — or some other unsaturated fat — decreases your risk of heart attacks only show that limiting your saturated fat intake does help lower the risk in a population being studied. Certainly too many calories of any food that leads to being overweight is

harmful and all fats — olive oil included — contain nine calories per gram — the highest source of calories of any foods.

I would agree that olive oil is far superior to fats that contain a lot of saturated fat, which includes beef fat, butter fat — as found in whole milk, butter and cheese — coconut oil, palm kernel oil and palm oil. But the reason is because olive oil is low in saturated fat. Many other oils share that characteristic, including safflower oil, corn oil and soybean oil.

I have discussed the various fats in foods and provided tables that list the saturated, monounsaturated and polyunsaturated fat content of common fats in Special Issue 32-02, Fats and Oils in Food, which I am sending you. Others who want this issue can send \$1 with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it to THE HEALTH LETTER/32-02, P.O. Box 19622, Irvine, CA 92713.

The choice of margarine depends on what oils it is made from and specifically how low in saturated fat it is. None of the vegetable margarines contain cholesterol.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I have a paralyzed diaphragm. I have endured extensive testing, probing, myograms, CAT scans and other tests. Nothing has been done to alleviate this condition. Scant suggestions were made as to what might be done. I cannot lie prone in bed. I must sit up in a straight chair at all times — even sleeping in the sitting position. Is there any treatment for this condition?

DEAR READER: Perhaps. Recently I had another question about one side of the diaphragm being paralyzed, which is less of a problem. When both leaves of the diaphragm are paralyzed, the flaccid diaphragm is easily pushed up into the chest by the abdominal contents when you lie down. That prevents your lungs from expanding normally and prevents adequate respiration.



They'll have the security of knowing that once high school is completed that the Army's training and educational benefits are waiting in the wing," said recruiter Staff Sgt. Jaime Cruz-Torres of the Canyon Army Recruiting Office.

In June, Private Hernandez will report to Fort Jackson, S.C., for basic training, then to Fort Gordon, Ga., for infantryman training.
