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## AROUND A Town

Sights and Faces Seen

Carl Gilliland was greeting the New Year Monday morning by recalling some of the short-lived enthusiasms of the past and pointing the obvious moral that it does not pay to get excited about anything. For instance, Carl recalls that Hereford has had three different cotton "booms" the first in 1904 when a lot of cowboys turned farmer planted cotton near Hereford but just never did get around to picking it. And since there was plenty of wind that winter, Carl declares that the prairies between Here and Amarillo were white with Hereford cotton, which eventually ended up in the Amarillo city limits.

On the other hand, Uncle Andy Thomas says he just can't help getting excited and enthusiastic. But he's not facing a victim to oil excitement right now, although he is following the progress of the Humble Well with his "doodiebug" which showed some important activity around the middle of November.

For the most part, however, a New Year simply meant a new determination on the part of Hereford residents to work a little harder than in 1944 and a fervent hope that the best of (Continued on Page 12)

### Dizzy, Busy Year Closes For Hereford

A dizzy, busy year just closed for Hereford and Deaf Smith County, and despite the fact that the year was characterized by the greatest prosperity since 1918, most local people will probably remember it for other things than the record wheat, grain sorghum and potato crops. In 1944 war casualties claimed steadily. Sixty percent of total war casualties in the American forces have occurred since D-Day, and the record was reflected in an increase in Deaf Smith County casualties. As 1944 drew to a close, Hereford people had had a rude jolt from the over-optimism which swept the country after the breakthrough of Allied Armies in France and most local people were facing 1945 with grim determination to do (Continued on Page 12)

### Takes Three Months for Letters from Germany

The first letter they have received since Oct. 16 from their son, Lt. George Jones, arrived on New Year's Day for Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Jones.

Lieutenant Jones, who was shot down over Germany on Dec. 20, 1943, is a prisoner in Stalag Luft I. Excerpts from his letter, written July 16, follow.

"I received a parcel the 13th of this month with six cartons of cigarettes but haven't received any letters yet. I'm getting along just fine, the Germans took us swimming about a week ago and we really did enjoy it. We have been having rabbits from our garden for sometime now. We have had a few fairly hot days but most of the time we have fairly pleasant weather. This is far enough north that we don't get any extremely hot weather."

"Who's Who" is published through the cooperation of more than 600 American universities and colleges for the purpose of giving national recognition to outstanding graduates. The names of students are selected by a committee on the basis of all-around achievement in collegiate activities.

Brumley has been a reporter, manager and editor of The Battalion, A & M student newspaper. He has served as lieutenant colonel and executive officer of the corps of cadets and as a cad secretary of the senior class, in addition to making an excellent scholastic record. He has been active in student affairs and has been a leader in obtaining student government at A & M.

A 1941 graduate of Hereford High School, Brumley served as sports editor on the Whiteface Roundup, was president of his freshman and sophomore classes and served for two years on the high school student council.

### Hereford To Have Large Part In Panhandle Industrial Show

Hereford and Deaf Smith County will have one of the main exhibits at the Panhandle Industrial Conference to be held at Amarillo at the Herring Hotel on Jan. 24 and 25; and success of the exhibit will depend largely on the cooperation of Hereford people. It was announced this week at the Hereford Chamber of Commerce Office, E. B. Posey, secretary-manager, urges any farmer or town resident who now has any outstanding specimen of locally produced raw products to contribute a sample for use in the exhibit.

Wheat, grain sorghums, alfalfa, potatoes, onions, squash, turnips and carrots are just a few of the products desired, Posey said, pointing out that shortage of gas and tires will prevent Chamber of Commerce representatives from making a systematic search for outstanding specimens of local products and that gathering of a good collection will depend for the most part upon the help of local people. The products may be turned in not later than Jan. 20, at the county agent's office, at the Chamber of Commerce office or at the office of J. B. Elliston.

The Industrial Conference, which is sponsored by the Amarillo Globe News, is being held for the purpose of acquainting industry with the natural resources of the Panhandle territory, with the ultimate aim of creating wider markets for the agricultural and mineral products of the area.

In addition to the display of raw products, Hereford plans an educational program to be featured at the conference, with Hereford water to be served to all visitors, and with talks by County Agent A. R. Bateman and by A. W. Erickson, professional crop reporter, who will discuss Deaf Smith County soils. Bateman will tell of the grain sorghum production in the county and of prospects for future development.

### Prize Sheep Imported Here From Montana

Prize sheep of the Columbia breed were unloaded here last Friday by Herman Neff, who plans to establish a registered flock in this area. The shipment included 51 ewes and one buck, all shipped from Kallspeil, Montana, 85 miles from the Canadian border.

The sheep, although not fully grown, averaged 175 pounds after making their long trip. Each of them are registered and Mr. Neff says are considered outstanding in quality. The Columbia breed has an open face, approximately two pounds more wool and produces more mutton than average sheep, being one of the largest breeds on record. Columbias were developed at the Idaho experiment station, DuBois, Ida., and at the present time are difficult to secure.

### Withholdings Generally Higher in New Year

Effective Monday, employers began withholdings from their employee's wages under the new tables set up by the individual income tax law of 1944, and according to the Department of Internal Revenue, tax payers will note several changes during the year.

The new withholdings will mean greater taxes for some, less for others, with a middle group seeing little change. In the end, however, it will mean that most taxpayers will pay more taxes for the same earnings than they did last year and that their withholdings for 1945 will more nearly equal the tax bill that they will owe.

Congress has ruled that instead of amended declarations or original declarations first due on Dec. 15, final income tax returns for 1944 may be filed on Form 1040 by Jan. 15 and thus clear up all 1944 tax matters.

### COLLECTOR DOES FIGURING

With just a few entries, all taxpayers who earn less than \$5,000 a year and who have less than \$100 a year of income other than wages, may use Form W-2 as their income tax return. They don't even have to figure out the amount of tax they owe, because the Collector of Internal Revenue will do that for them.

The collector will use tables which give the taxpayer automatic deductions for taxes, interest, contributions, etc., amounting to ten percent of his income. If he has overpaid through the withholding he will get a refund.

### SEPARATE RETURNS

Because of the complications of the Texas community property laws, husbands and wives may not file separate returns on Form W-2, even though both have incomes. They must file jointly (and joint income cannot exceed \$5,000 when Form W-2 is used) but the collector will figure the tax jointly or separately, whichever is to the taxpayers' advantage.

### To file separate returns, husbands and wives must use Form 1040.

That form has been so altered that it may be used as a short form by those whose incomes, jointly or separately, do not exceed \$5,000. It includes a tax table, the same one that will be used in figuring the tax on Form W-2, which credits the taxpayer with deductions of ten percent of income.

### CHILDREN'S EARNINGS

Form 1040 also must be used by those taxpayers who have income of \$100 or more from which withholdings were not made, and by those whose deductions exceed ten per cent of their income.

Even though a person did not earn enough in 1944 to be liable for income tax, he should file a return if he had any wages from which withholdings were made. That is the only way he can obtain a rebate of the tax withheld.

ization: the alternative is no world security at all," says the World Alliance for International Friendship Through the Churches. The Alliance, com-

posed of many leaders of churches throughout America, urges the United States government to give assent to the proposals, and to permit its representative on the Security Council to pledge its quota of armed forces necessary for the prevention of aggression.

"The threat of conscription as a permanent peacetime policy strikes at the heart of religious liberty," says the American Friends (Quaker) Service Committee, Philadelphia. "Wherever conscription has flourished, freedom of conscience has narrowed down to a mere theory, and religious groups like the Quakers and Mennonites have been forced to migrate or have remained to wither away into an ineffectual remnant. . . . During the coming weeks conscription will be extolled as a panacea for all our ills. It will be argued that compulsory military training will improve our health, inculcate discipline and patriotism, stimulate industry and trade, relieve mass unemployment, uphold the peace, and, above all, save us from attack. The fact is that the army serves no constructive purpose that's civilian agency cannot serve to better advantage. But the issue is deeper than these arguments of expediency. Military conscription is a blow to religious liberty, the cornerstone of our democracy."

### School Bus Use Limited, ODT

School buses may not be used  
 to transport students to athle-  
 tic games, state or county fairs,  
 or similar events, the Office of  
 Defense Transportation said to-  
 day.

Commenting on an increasing  
 number of requests for permis-  
 sion to use school buses for such  
 purposes, all of which have been  
 denied, Nettles F. Nelson, Dis-  
 trict Manager of the ODT, called  
 attention to the ODT's Order  
 10-A, on policy governing school  
 bus services, as follows:

"The use of school buses for  
 school transportation during  
 this emergency shall be limited  
 to the transportation of stu-  
 dents, teachers, and other school  
 employees enroute between  
 their homes and places of regu-  
 lar daily instruction. School  
 buses shall not be used for the  
 transportation of any group to  
 any special event except as  
 otherwise provided in regula-  
 tions of the Office of Defense  
 Transportation, nor for the  
 transportation of pupils to and  
 from home for the noon lunch.  
 School buses shall not be used  
 for the personal transportation  
 of the owner, operator, or any  
 other persons."

Nelson explained that ODT  
 policies governing the use of  
 school buses were designed to  
 assure that transportation for  
 school children would be avail-  
 able for the duration of the war.

"Present equipment must be  
 made to last so that necessary  
 service for the greatest number  
 of children over the longest pe-  
 riod of time is provided. Very  
 little new equipment can be  
 made available. With school bu-  
 ses wearing out, non-essential  
 service at this time, obviously,  
 would be at the expense of es-  
 sential school transportation in  
 the future. The present critical  
 shortage of heavy-duty bus  
 tires, in addition to the scarc-  
 ity of gasoline, parts and the  
 vehicles themselves, makes it im-  
 perative that every mile of un-  
 necessary travel be eliminated.  
 Only through the utmost con-  
 servation can we be certain that  
 children will not be compelled  
 to stay away from school be-  
 cause of the lack of school bu-  
 ses to transport them."

**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

**Rite of Baptism Was Jesus' First Step in Ministry**

The International Sunday School Lesson for Jan. 14  
Text: Matthew: Chapters 3 and 4

THE ministry of Jesus began where all ministries ought to begin—with himself. That is the first fact. No man is fitted or worthy to minister who has not first found the preparation in his own soul.

For Jesus this meant first of all fulfillment of the outward rite of baptism. It was the first step in beginning His public ministry.

The next step was to conquer temptation. Temptation is a lone and individual thing, whether it be in the desert, or in the crowded city. It is the battle in the soul that every man must fight for himself. The three-fold temptation was a part of the preparation of Jesus. As the author of Hebrews tells us, He was "in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15), and "in that He Himself hath suffered being tempted, He is able to succor them that are tempted."

Jesus began His public ministry at home, in Galilee and Nazareth. His fame spread throughout the whole region, and His townsmen marvelled at His words. "Is not this the carpenter's son?" they asked in wonderment. But wonderment turned to derision, and anger, and violence when He declared that the democratic realities of religion that the Prophet Isaiah had declared were being fulfilled in Himself. These fellowtownsmen led Him to the brow of a hill, and would have cast Him down if He had not escaped.

But if the throng, even in His own town, failed Him, there were nobler souls who responded to His teaching and call. It is to them that we owe our knowledge of Him.

But every age needs its helpers and workers to carry on that ministry. Who will respond to the call of Jesus, and be his disciples today?

The chairman of the Negro churchmen was Dr. Benjamin F. Mays, president of Morehouse College, Atlanta, Ga., and now vice-president of the Federal Council.


