The UWDSC drive, with a goal of \$150,000, will actually begin Monday when board members, division leaders and representatives of agencies which are beneficiaries of the United Way will meet.

Don Cumpton, Hereford assistant superintendent and the former athletic director and head football coach here, will be the campaign chairman this year.

"We're enthusiastic about the job we know Don is going to do for us," said Kyla McDowell, UWDSC's executive director. "We know that at the very least he will have all of us enthusiastic and raring to go for this year."

Josserand, head of AzTx Cattle Co. of Hereford, is a past president of the National Cattlemen's Association and has long been active in regional, state and national agricultural issues.

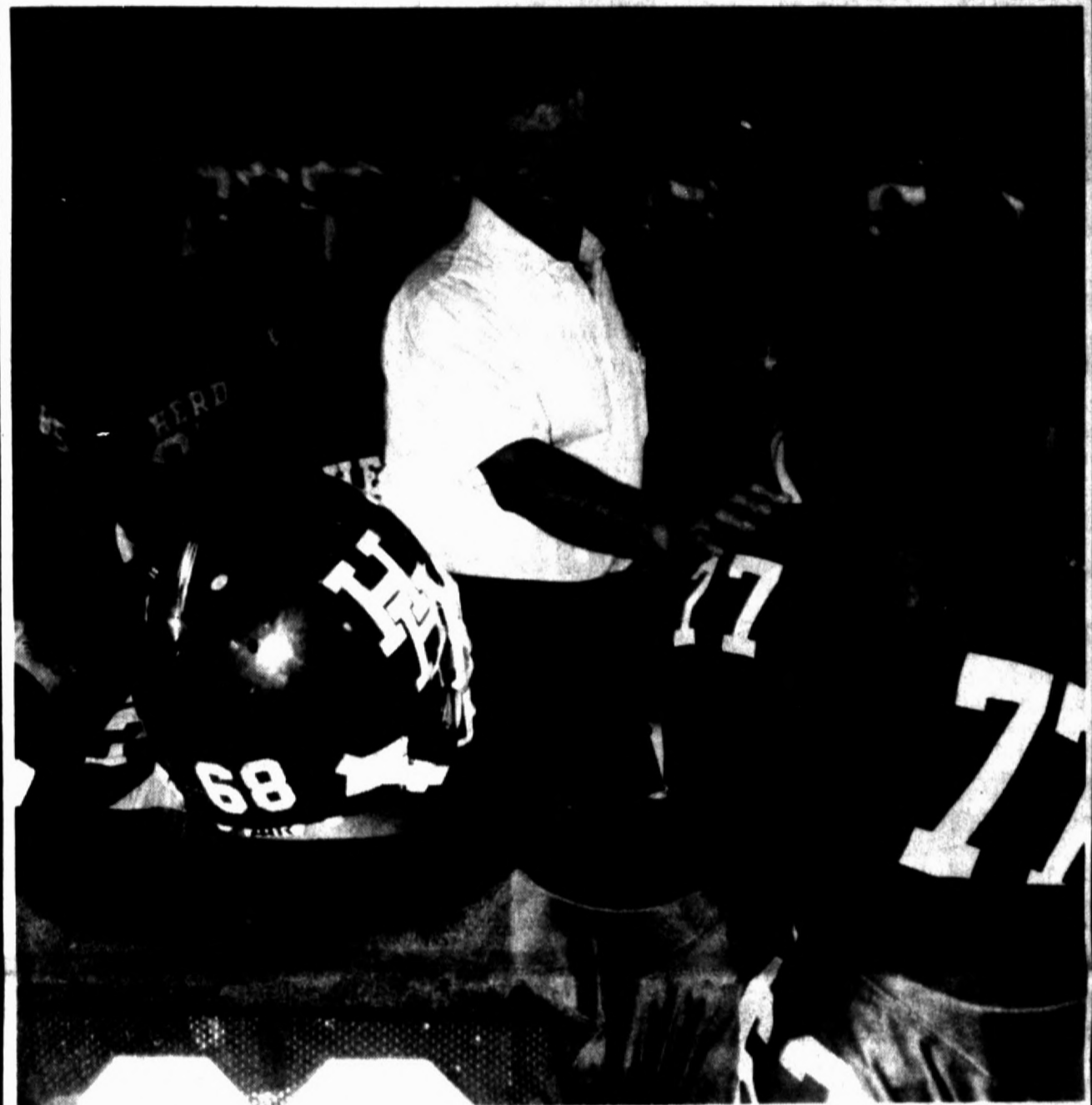
"I think a lot of people know Bob, but not a lot of people have heard him speak," said McDowell. "He is an excellent speaker and we're looking forward to his keynote address."

## Fiestas Patrias events set

Three days of activities will highlight the annual Fiestas Patrias celebration in Hereford on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

The celebration commemorates Mexico's cries for independence on Sept. 16, 1810.

On Saturday, Isabel Rodriguez will be crowned as the Fiestas Patrias queen at a special ceremony at the Bull Barn. She is the 39th queen crowned in Hereford, and will succeed 1990 queen Rachel Alaniz.

The weekend's events will begin with a cultural fair Friday at the Hereford Community Center from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The community center will feature a fiesta of color, aroma, movement and sound. Among the exhibits and demonstrations will be traditional dance, ethnic costumes, cultural crafts and foods and Spanish music. The Hispanic culture's deep family traditions and meaningful celebrations will be explained, and a storyteller will introduce dramatic personalities throughout history.

Traditional foods will be prepared at several booths, with samples available. Hereford schools have been invited to have classes make field trips to the fair throughout the day Friday.

Saturday will begin with a parade at 11 a.m., going from Hereford High School to Park, then down Main Street. The parade will feature bands, floats, prized cars, charros and other entries. Persons wishing to enter the parade may contact Lupe Chavez at 364-2727. Cash prizes will be awarded to top entries.

The evening's activities will begin at 6 p.m. with a eucharistic liturgy at San Jose Catholic Church. Rodriguez and her court will be presented and honored. The guest homilist for the mass will be the Rev. David Cruz of

## Assessments help, but vandals damage parks

Utility customers of the City of Hereford are doing their part to upgrade the city's park system.

In three months' time, the park development fund has grown to \$12,720 through a \$1 voluntary assessment program on city water bills.

But even as citizens contributed to improve parks, unknown persons took a swipe at facilities at Veterans Park, causing damage in two areas.

City officials call the vandalism "disheartening" at a time when the park department is attempting to make needed improvements.

"It's hard to justify spending the money if it's going to be torn up," said City Manager Chester Nolen after the Veterans Park damage was discovered.

While not extensive, the damage was symptomatic of an attitude, Nolen hinted.

A portable rest room was knocked over and the sides kicked in. "wheelies" were turned on grass and a street light was knocked out.

Tire tracks indicated the vehicle probably was a motorcycle.

Still, the city is moving ahead with park improvements. A project in Dameron Park is nearing completion.

Playground equipment was moved from an area in the park so the ground could be reconditioned and gravel spread before a concrete curbing was poured.

Park and street department workers cooperated in the venture, reported Nolen.

Some playground items were worn out, he added, and will not be re-installed. Others were worked on.

A concrete contractor, Garcia Brothers, was awarded a contract for the curbing on a bid of \$2,275. Other work in the park, considering equipment, manpower and materials, will bring the cost of the project to about \$7,000, Nolen said.

Future projects are being studied for Dameron and Veterans Parks as well as a park on the west side of Hereford that awaits development.

A beautification committee of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce has made suggestions and citizens have asked for some specific

improvements, particularly in Dameron Park, one of the most-used in the system.

A stage or platform is an improvement requested for Dameron. Not only would special events, such as Town and Country Jubilee, benefit from such an improvement but other activities would make use of the facility.

Earlier this year, the Hereford City Commission voted to place a \$1 park department fee on city water bills for customers to pay, if they wished.

Nolen reported that the special charge, earmarked for capital improvements in the park system, has been very successful.

"We have better than 80 percent participation," he said, observing that the last billing netted \$4,043 for the fund, from 5,023 city water customers.

In the three months since the fee was put on water bills, Hereford citizens have responded with \$12,720, almost equaling the amount earmarked for park development in the current budget, \$15,000.

## Book details Lucas' murderous roots

"They think I'm stupid, but before all this is over, everyone will know who's really stupid" - Serial killer Henry Lee Lucas recanting his claim that he committed 360 murders.

DALLAS (AP) - Branded by some as "America's most notorious serial murderer," Henry Lee Lucas was also one of history's least concerned and utterly remorseless killers.

And surely its most pathetic and pathological. Less monstrous than moronic, Lucas, a one-eyed drifter, killed his mother, his teen-age wife, an old woman who befriended him and perhaps another hundred or so innocent victims.

No one knows for sure, although a new book by Texas author Mike Cox suggests that Lucas killed more than many believe and less than he claims.

In a paperback original, "The Confessions of Henry Lee Lucas," Cox offers a new dimension to the bloody misadventures of Lucas and his equally disordered and deranged traveling companion Otis Toole.

Cox, who first encountered Lucas as a reporter for the Austin American-Statesman, provides a chilling account of the homicidal odd couple's quest for sex, money and blood and their random choice of targets, usually women in the wrong place at the wrong time.

They included Lucas' mother Viola, a woman with the societal graces of a viper, and his wife Becky, who, if not evil, was misguided.

That's not to say either deserved killing, but innocent they were not.

Not surprisingly, Lucas is on death row in Texas. Toole is in prison in Florida and likewise bound for execution, a fate neither seems overly upset about.

Both men readily admitted crime and killing sprees conducted jointly and separately and Lucas confused investigators no end by confessing to misdeeds he apparently did not commit.

The mystery in cases such as this is not so much what happened as why.

In addition to talking to Lucas, Cox went back to the mountains of Virginia to examine Lucas' Depression-era childhood as the son of a legless, drunken father and a boozy, whoring mother.

"She was mean as a rattlesnake," said one who knew Viola Lucas, and many did.

One of Viola's retarded bedmates, Bernie Dowdy, who may have been Henry's real father, Cox says, introduced young Lucas to perverse sex.

After the first experience, Cox wrote, "the young boy could hardly believe how good it had made him feel."

That may explain in some sick way why Lucas later preferred sex with his victims after he killed them, although some he assaulted before as well as after.

On Jan. 11, 1960, Lucas graduated from killing animals to people, and his mother was the first to die. He slapped her around, choked her and plunged his pocketknife into her neck.

Convicted, Lucas, then 24, spent half his 10-year prison time in a Michigan psychiatric hospital after two halfhearted suicide attempts.

Once freed, he resumed his animal antics, bungled two attempts to kidnap young girls, married a woman named Betty, sexually abused her daughters, fled in the night and wound up at a mission near skid row in Jacksonville, Fla.

By a cruel twist of fate, Lucas stumbled into Otis Toole, whom he'd met once in a Pennsylvania bar. Toole not only was a psychopathic mental midget but also a dedicated homosexual.

Unlike Lucas, who mostly killed women, Toole's victims usually were men.

Toole introduced his one-eyed drinking buddy to his 12-year-old niece, Becky, whom Lucas found sexually irresistible. They ran off and later wed.

Lucas swears he loved Becky, even though he butchered her.

Criscrossing the country, Lucas surfaced in the early Eighties in Montague County, north of the Dallas-Fort Worth area, where he killed 80-year-old Kate Rich.

That was in September 1982, a year before Lucas and then Toole began confessing to most of America's unsolved mysteries and the whole sordid affair spun out of control.

Law enforcement officers in 40 states and Canada tumbled over one another in an effort to talk with Lucas about their unsolved homicides.

To accommodate them, the Texas Department of Public Safety created a task force to "coordinate the exchange of information among ... agencies investigating cases in which Lucas or Toole might have been involved."

Texas Ranger Sgt. Bob Prince was assigned to supervise the task force, based at the Williamson County Jail in Georgetown, north of Austin.

However noble the intention, the endeavor was doomed from the start.

Cox, now a public information officer for the DPS, persuasively maintains that neither the Rangers nor the state police encouraged or embraced the fiasco triggered by the task force.

What happened, of course, is that every law enforcement agency with an embarrassing unsolved slaying on its books used Lucas as an escape route.

"It was definitely in the best interests of the law enforcement agencies to solve these crimes, many of which had been on the books for years," Cox points out.

"...Once a confession was obtained, the police could go home and mark the case closed, which was often of great consolation to the victims' families."

Stranger still, Lucas was willing, even eager, to accept the blame. He was having the time of his sordid life traveling around the country confessing to one slaying after another.

One such case earned him a death sentence, which took some of the fun out of his confessional escapades.

With scant evidence, a San Angelo, Texas, jury convicted Lucas solely on his statement that he killed an unidentified woman whom authorities called "Orange Socks."

During the trial, prosecutors introduced a videotape in which Lucas claimed to have killed 360 persons in some 22 states. Jurors did not see and hear all the tape but reporters did.

"There's no way possible that anybody in the country could do what

me and Otis have done," Lucas said.

He bragged that he and his murderous crony "killed 'em most every way there is except poison...shooting them, hanging them, running them down with cars. We've beat them to death. There's crucifixions, filleting people like fish, people have been burnt, shot in their cars."

But outside the courtroom, Lucas denied killing "Orange Socks."

One who believed him was Hugh Aynesworth, then a reporter for the Dallas Times Herald. Aynesworth was in fact working on a story designed to show that much of the Lucas affair was a sham.

That story soon appeared under a headline that implied as much: "Henry Lee Lucas: Mass Murderer or Massive Hoax?"

The page-one story maintained that Lucas confessed to far more slayings than he committed and that the DPS task force "ignored or failed to pursue leads that would have proven the deceit of his confessions."

Lucas told Aynesworth and others that all but three of his confessions were lies designed to "show that law enforcement doesn't do its job."

Cox writes that the revelations and subsequent controversy unfairly cast the Texas Rangers and the DPS in a bad light by implying that they embraced some purported fraud.

At the very least, however, it does appear that state police permitted other law enforcement agencies to use Lucas as a convenient if sometimes illogical solution to their homicidal puzzles.

## 'Minorities' become majority in schools

AUSTIN (AP) - Minorities have become the majority for the first time in Texas public schools, state education officials said Friday.

Based on October 1990 figures, minorities accounted for 50.47 percent of the 3.38 million students, while Anglos made up 49.53 percent.

The total growth in enrollment represented a nearly 2 percent increase since the fall count for the 1989-90 school year. Since 1985, enrollment increased by slightly more than 9 percent.

Hispanic enrollment growth is the primary reason for the increase in minorities, according to the Texas Education Agency.

An additional 47,864 Hispanic students enrolled in fall 1990 than the previous year. That number is more than the increase for all students in 1989.

Of the minorities, Hispanics total 33.88 percent; African-Americans, 14.41 percent; Asians and Pacific Islanders, 2 percent; and Native Americans, nearly 0.2 percent.

"Everyone expected that we were

going to get to this point, the way growth was going," TEA spokesman Joey Lozano said.

Of the eight major urban school districts, nearly 80 percent of the students are minority, while in rural areas, Anglos make up over 70 percent of the student population.

The evening's activities will conclude with a dance featuring Burt Zuniga and Tentacion. Tickets for the coronation and dance are \$7.50 in

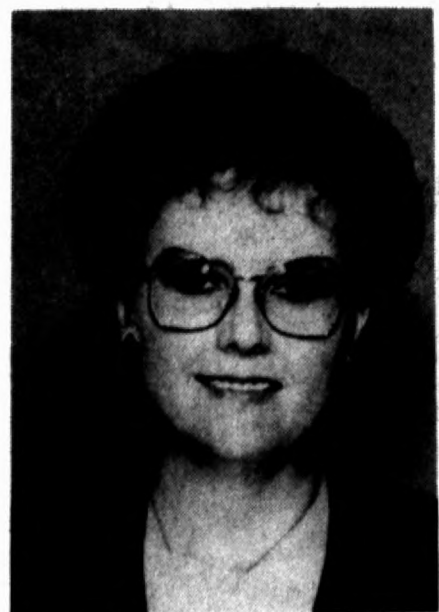
advance. Tickets at the door will be higher, so persons attending are encouraged to buy their tickets in advance by calling San Jose Catholic Church at 364-5053.

## County to study districts Tuesday

A new proposal for realigning Deaf Smith County commissioner precinct boundaries will be studied at a special meeting at 10 a.m. Tuesday.

A representative of the consulting law firm, Allison and Associates, will present the proposal at a special meeting of Commissioners' Court.

County Judge Tom Simons reminded that the meeting in the county courtroom is open to the public.

The first proposal for re-drawing the precinct lines, reviewed in public meetings on Aug. 7, drew fire from representatives of Texas Rural Legal Aid who asked for two precincts with heavy minority voting potential.

The consultants drew lines giving three precincts minority advantages. Precinct Two would have 63 percent minority; Precinct One, 57 percent; Precinct Four, 55 percent, and Precinct Three, 18 percent.

Rodolfo Mares Jr., TRLA representative, asked commissioners to consider drawing lines that would give one precinct a 77 percent minority voting potential and another precinct, 75 percent.

Simons said that the consultant requested data from the TRLA to feed into the computer.

"All the TRLA had were numbers," he said. Other data, such as addresses, that would be needed was incomplete.


Federal law requires that new boundary lines be drawn, based on the U.S. Census figures of 1990, to stay within one-man, one-vote guidelines.

Once the boundaries are adopted by the Commissioners' Court, the plan must be submitted to the U.S. Justice Department for approval.

There is some urgency in finishing the project because new precincts must be in place by the time filing begins for public office before the first of next year.

Simons said the new boundary lines should be sent to the Justice Department by early October.

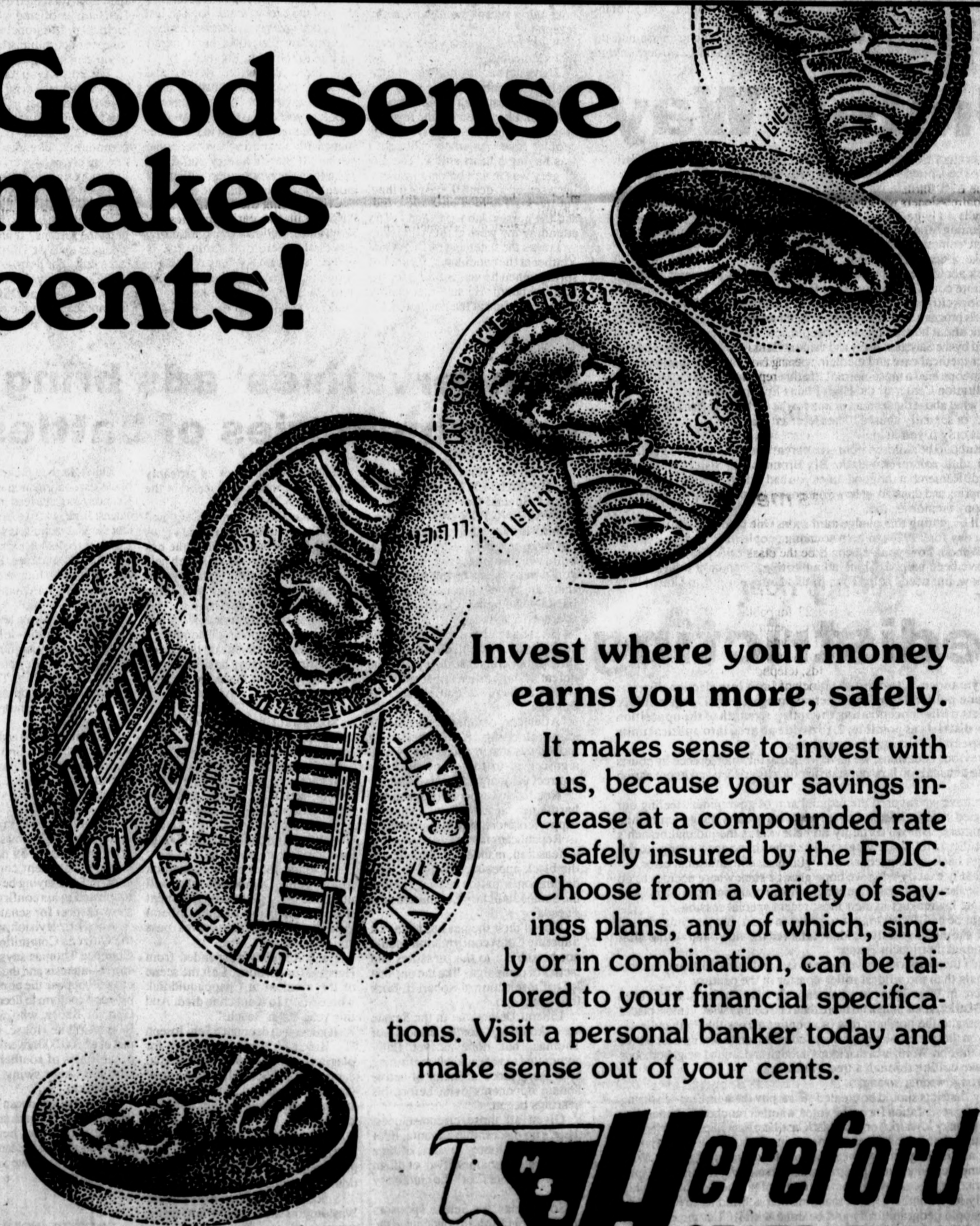

The power of accurate observation is commonly called criticism by those who do not have it.

Lawmakers and agency heads in Austin are as nervous as a truckload of hens parked at a fried chicken stand as newly created County Education Districts set tax rates across the state under the Senate's Robin Hood bill.

Lawsuits have been filed in the Miami School District in the Panhandle, in the Dallas area and elsewhere against implementation of the tax levies. If one of them succeeds in obtaining an injunction against the process, the whole public education system in Texas could come tumbling down...again.

Here in Deaf Smith County, the CED set a rate of 80.9 cents per \$100 valuation. Hereford Independent School District is expected to add 30 cents to that rate when the board meets Tuesday night.

What that means is that last year the school district had a rate of 91.43 cents and this year it could be \$1.109. That's an increase of 19.5 cents.

This is a larger increase than was first projected. Before the CED elections on taxing authority and exemptions, it was believed the HISD rate would be between 95 cents to \$1.03. But less than five percent of the eligible voters approved

additional exemptions locally, thus wiping out about \$26 million from the tax base.

This required a higher tax rate to bring in the same revenue as last year. Business and industry will absorb a larger share of the increase. And all taxpayers are going to be facing increases over the next four years. The bill creating the CEDs has mandated that the minimum rate must rise to \$1.00 by 1994.

The CED rates are not subject to a rollback election, and HISD's rollback total is 31.8 cents. If the rate is increased less than that, voters cannot call for a rollback election.

In some areas of the state, there is a distinct possibility of school taxes more than doubling in the next four years. With the added threat of more lawsuits, plus the fear of the smaller schools of forced consolidation, and one can readily understand why those new bumper stickers are popping up around the state. They read: "Don't reelect anybody!"

## Redistricting

Gerrymander: 1. to divide a territorial unit into election districts to give one political party an electoral majority in a large number of districts while concentrating the voting strength of the opposition in as few districts as possible; 2. to divide an area into political units to give special advantage to one group.

On previous occasions, we have wailed at the interference by courts in making demands on how our state handles its prisons and its education system.

Never have we favored the judicial arm of government feeling our duly-elected state legislators how to establish or carry out governmental policy matters. But we certainly do believe it is the judicial branch's responsibility to tell the lawmakers when they have done wrong--to tell them to go back and correct an unlawful or unconstitutional error.

And that is exactly what we hope a judge somewhere decides to do when he or she takes a look at the congressional redistricting bill approved by our state lawmakers in their most recent special session.

It might be a different matter to prove in court, but gerrymandering pure and simple is grossly evident all over the new map of the U.S. congressional districts in Texas.

Some of those districts have more twists and turns, dips and bumps, ins and outs than the wildest roller-coaster in the century.

Out here in West Texas, it's bad enough what the legislators did to the 19th District, stretching it no more than one county wide in most places from Odessa to the northern row of counties across the Panhandle.

But even that mess pales mightily in comparison to one district we've noticed in the Fort Worth area that loops through and around neighborhoods like a snake coiling through a tree's branches.

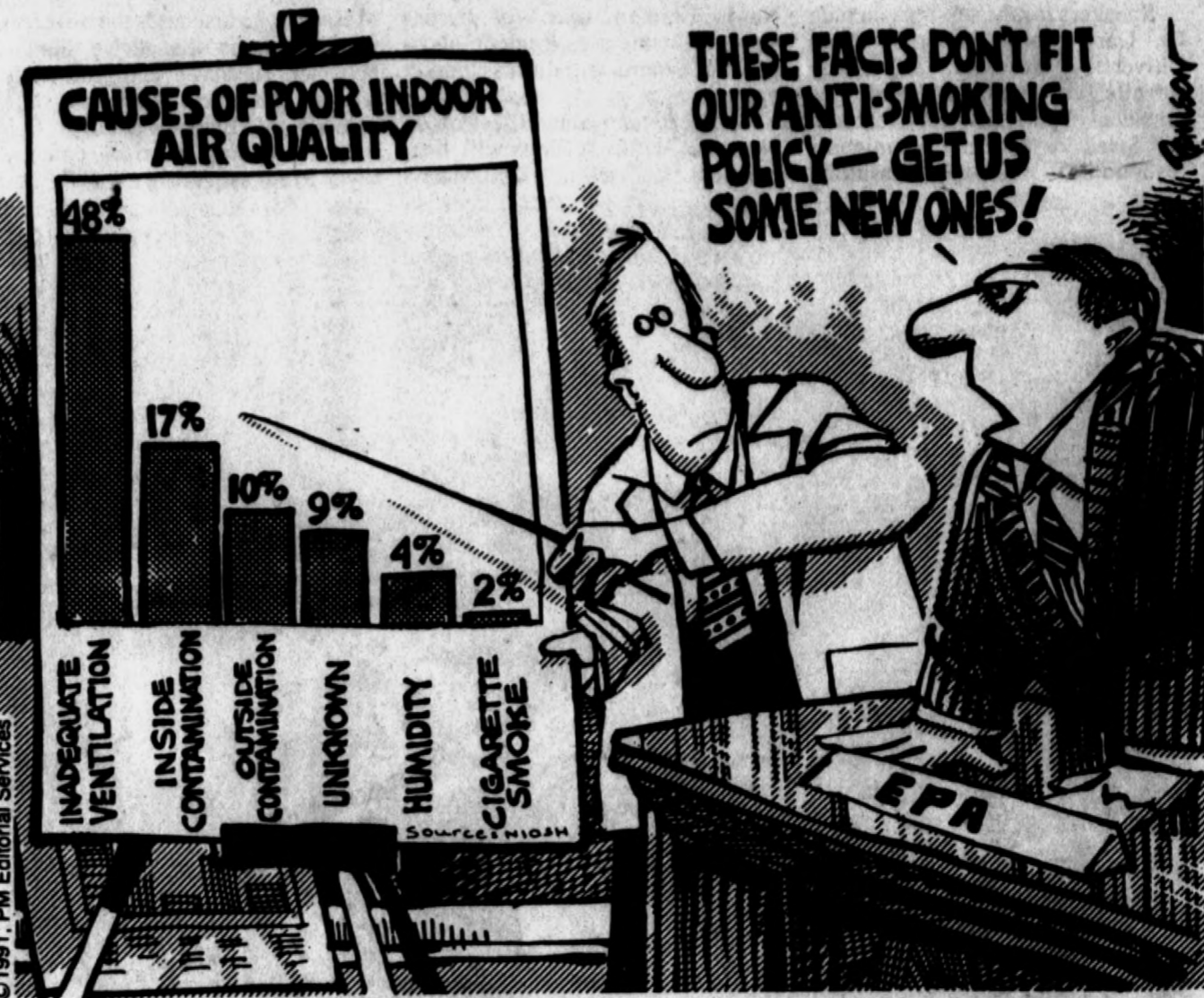
It's wrong, wrong, wrong!

Ideally, districts should be created strictly by the numbers--ensuring the proper representation for every voter, whether rancher or farmer, city dweller or country lover, rich or poor, black or white, Republican or Democrat. Creating a district that strengthens one group's voting power is just as wrong as drawing lines to weaken or exclude another group. With all the computer power and programs now available, it's time we take the redistricting process away from the realm of political gamesmanship and simply feed numbers into a machine that is blind to any bias.

Link people geographically and be done with it. Let the computer digest numbers only--no racial quotas, no addresses of incumbents, no political voting patterns--then spit out a map with the districts drawn in the most geographically sensible manner.

Only then can there be any true lack of gerrymandering.

members of the hospital staff to visit with our older citizens.

The Senior Center would be a good place to do that. Solicit their business. Visit with them. Get to understand them. Get to know what their needs are, then try to meet them. Let's not go off and willy-nilly get a medical professional in here, only to discover six months later there was never a niche for them in the market.

We know, you know, everyone knows that we need more general practitioners. Let us know how we can help you. Surely you could use some help from persons in the community, like the chamber, the newspaper, whoever. I hope we can help you, and the offer's there.

## Conservatives' ads bring back memories of battles

An AP News Analysis By WALTER R. MEARS AP Special Correspondent WASHINGTON (AP) - There's a political adage that counsels: Don't get mad, get even. Better still, get both, which is what grudge-carrying conservatives are trying to do with their angry television commercial backing Supreme Court nominee Clarence Thomas.

In one negative campaign ad, the conservatives coupled an attack on three Democrats instrumental in the defeat of an earlier court nominee with a demand for confirmation of this one.

After one day, they said they'd stop televising it if "left-wing individuals and organizations" would sign a deal to forgo any direct or indirect campaign against Thomas.

Not likely, especially when the hard-line ad worries Thomas supporters more than his opponents.

Republicans have been conducting a measured, mannerly campaign for the black appeals court judge, who begins confirmation hearings before the Senate Judiciary Committee next Tuesday.

One of their themes has been that Supreme Court confirmation should not be subject to the pressures and tactics of campaigns like the one that led to the rejection of Robert H. Bork four years ago.

Liberal Democrats in the Senate are skeptical, some critical of Thomas, but none is yet flatly committed to vote against confirming him. Bork faced a lineup of active Senate opponents even before his hearings began.

Given all those circumstances, there's no discernible advantage for the Thomas lobby to attack three Democratic senators, two of them senior members of the judiciary panel.

So Thomas, his Senate sponsors and President Bush all condemned the commercial unveiled Tuesday and to be run on Washington television channels. Bush called it "totally counterproductive."

In the end, the attack ad probably won't make much difference in the outcome on Thomas.

Thomas faces controversy and critical questioning about his views on affirmative action, which he has opposed, and abortion, on which he's said little. But there's no sign yet of the concerted opposition it would take to block his confirmation.

Liberal, civil rights and women's rights groups opposing Thomas are trying to rally their side on the eve of the hearings. But they have managed nothing to match the drive against Bork.

Sponsors of the disputed commercial said they produced it to make sure there is no replay of the campaign against Bork. "This time, we're not going to sit back," said L. Brent Bozell III of the Conservative Victory Committee. Bozell said his group and another called Citizens United are spending \$100,000 to broadcast the commercial.

"Thomas faces bitter opposition from liberal Democrats who will judge the judge," the advertisement says. "How many of these liberal Democrats could themselves pass ethical scrutiny?"

"Ted Kennedy, suspended from Harvard for cheating. Left the scene of the accident at Chappaquiddick where Mary Jo Kopechne died. And this year, Palm Beach."

It goes on to denounce Sen. Joseph R. Biden Jr. of Delaware for plagiarism in the 1988 presidential campaign, and Sen. Alan Cranston of California, awaiting Senate judgment in the Keating Five savings and loan case.

The ad then urges viewers to call their senators in support of confirmation for Thomas.

Since it is being shown only in the Washington area, that's not many senators.

Bozell called it a shot across the bow to put liberals on notice that conservative groups are ready to fight.

The fight they picked was an echo of the last confirmation war, over Bork. Kennedy took the lead in the campaign against Bork, who wrote after his defeat that the Massachusetts senator worked "with three other extremely liberal Democratic senators, Joe Biden, the chairman of the Judiciary Committee, Howard Metzenbaum and Alan Cranston."

In that struggle, the liberal opposition waged a million-dollar national advertising campaign against Bork, seeking to persuade voters to pressure senators to vote no. This time, the organizations lined up against Thomas are relying on a more traditional lobbying effort.

The administration and Thomas have been conducting their own, guarding against the kind of opposition barrage that caught the last administration unprepared on Bork.

The constituency in this campaign is 100 senators. Thomas, who has paid courtesy calls on 59 of them so far, issued a statement condemning the attack ad and saying he hoped groups interested in his confirmation would show respect for senators.

Another television ad produced by the Citizens Committee to Confirm Clarence Thomas says that "liberal special interests and the soft-on-crime crowd" oppose the nominee because he won't conform to liberal litmus tests. Gary L. Bauer, who worked in the Reagan White House, said it will be part of a \$300,000 advertising campaign in the states of southern Democrats who are likely swing votes on the nomination.

While that one doesn't mention any Senate names, Thomas supporters have argued from the beginning that television advertising campaigns aren't the right way to debate Supreme Court nominations.

# Medically underserved fear immigration cuts

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - A clerical error in transcribing the Legal Immigration Act of 1990 has created a loophole that physician-starved rural American hospitals are fighting to keep open so they can hire foreign medical graduates for the first time in more than a decade.

Lawmakers already have begun closing the loophole, scheduled to go into effect Oct. 1, but some are having second thoughts now as physician recruiters argue that this wrong is right.

The omission clears the way for foreign medical graduates to qualify for a six-year work visa for the first time since 1977. Under the old provisions, they had to get a regular visa or "green card" which can take years to obtain compared to weeks for the six-year visas.

Sens. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., and Alan Simpson, R-Wyoming, have introduced a technical amendment bill to correct the mistake, which originated from a clerical error in which several sentences were omitted from current law while rewriting the act.

Hospital administrators' facing perpetual staff shortages are outraged that Congress wants to repair a mistake that they claim will help medically underserved areas.

"Tell Sen. Kennedy to come down here and try to recruit a physician to a town of 3,000," said Ron Rives, an assistant vice president in charge of recruiting physicians at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. "The overall rural health care issues have got to be a priority in America or access to health care is going to be completely annihilated."

Sens. Kennedy and Simpson did not return repeated phone calls to their Washington offices by The Associated Press.

Texas has led the nation in hospital closures for the past five years. And of the 126 hospitals that have closed statewide since 1980, 70 of them have been in rural areas. Fifty-seven of the state's 254 counties have no hospitals.

"Most of the hospitals that closed in the rural areas had less than three physicians, which is really tough because you work the physician to death," said Marvin Cole, a spokesman for the Texas Hospital Association.

Half of the 422 hospitals that have closed nationwide since 1986 are in rural areas, according to the American Hospital Association in Chicago.

"There is no way to quantify how many of those hospitals closed due to doctor shortages," said Kim Byas, a rural hospital specialist with the AHA. "But the loss of physicians in rural areas due to retirement, migration and burnout have been critical factors in hospital closings across the country."

Despite the time needed to get doctors through immigration procedures, rural hospitals look for doctors overseas because American graduates simply aren't practicing in small towns.

According to a 1990 survey of more than 11,000 medical school seniors by the Association of American Medical Colleges in Washington only 1.5 percent of the students would prefer practicing in a rural setting upon graduation.

"A large percentage of our recruiting efforts are already spent on the foreign professionals," Rives said.

"I specifically recruited a physician out of Israel, and it took me three years with immigration laws as they stand to get him here."

"If the credentials are checked and the person has finished their residency and qualifies for a license then why should doctors be denied access to the states? We need the help," said Rives, whose hospital network recruits doctors to 15 rural hospitals sprinkled throughout West Texas.

Maria Beleda, a graduate of the University of the Philippines with a

medical degree in psychiatry, is dependent on the change in the Immigration Act to fulfill her contract with a rural hospital in south West Virginia. The hospital has been searching for a psychiatrist for three years.

"If I could get the work visa, I could be there in two weeks," Mrs. Beleda said. "Otherwise it would take six years because the Philippines is six years behind in their immigration quotas."

Rep. Lamar Smith, R-San Antonio, who was the ranking Republican on the House Subcommittee on International Law, Immigration and Refugees when the act was drawn up, said the provision allowing foreign medical graduates six-year work visas was an error that blindsided lawmakers.

"The ... Was not intended to change the law with regard to foreign medical school graduates," Smith said. "It was clearly a typographical error. The technical amendment would return the provision to current law."

The technical amendment bill introduced by Kennedy and Simpson was passed by the Senate with a voice vote on Aug. 1, 1991. The House will likely vote on the bill later this month, Smith said.

But after hearing about the groundswell of support for freer access to foreign graduates, Smith said he would attempt to bring the amendment bill up for debate in the House.

"It is possible that we could now go back and review the change and see if it is meritorious or not," said Smith, who has had three hospitals close in his district recently. "If there is a proven need for foreign doctors to enter and we can insure their

competency, then we ought to consider the change."

Some foreign medical students are permitted to receive their education and training in the United States, but they must return home to practice for two years before being released to practice elsewhere.

Officials at understaffed hospitals say acceptance of foreign medical graduates would greatly increase the recruitment of Canadian doctors, whose licenses are readily accepted in the United States.

"The U.S. suffers from a severe maldistribution of physicians, and from a serious shortage of primary care practitioners," said James Merritt, president of Merritt, Hawkins and Associates, a national physician search firm based in Dallas.

"We have hospital and clinic clients in states as disparate as

California and Oklahoma who would be thrilled to hire qualified Canadian physicians. The new law would help extend medical coverage yet would not displace U.S. practitioners."

The American Medical Association, the nation's largest society of professional physicians with 280,000 members, has not voiced a position on the freer acceptance of foreign medical graduates, according to John Kasper, the director of international medical graduate services for the AMA in Chicago.

The Educational Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates in Philadelphia, which administers competency tests to international medical graduates, "does not oppose the entry into the United States of

foreign medical graduates on the ... temporary work visa to engage in patient care," said Marie Shafron, vice president for operations at ECFMG.

"The person coming in for employment would still have to be licensed by the state in order to practice, so we do not see any problem," Ms. Shafron said.

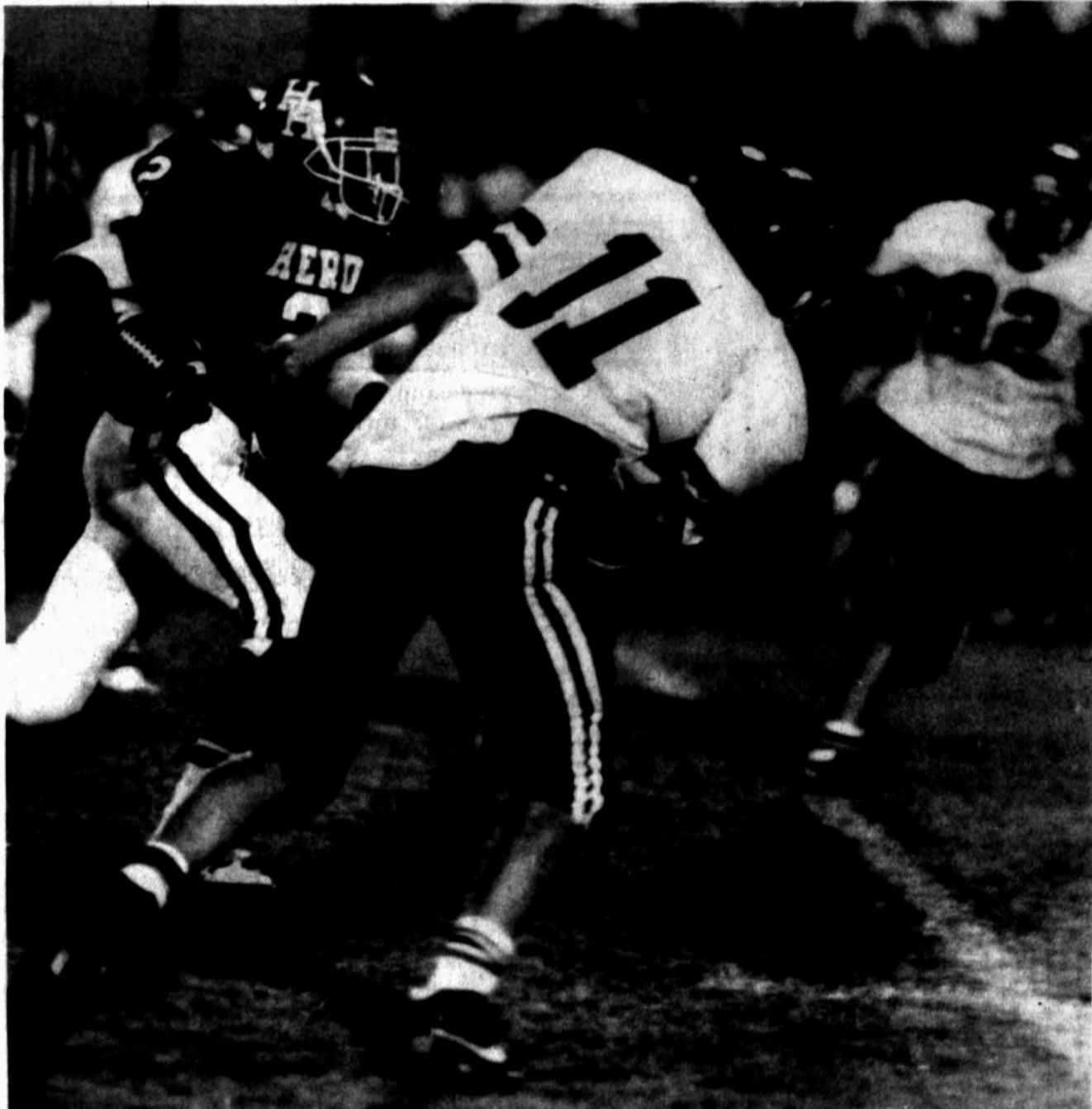

Hereford got two touchdowns from tailback Leo Brown in less than five minutes of the second quarter to pull away from Tascosa Friday, finally winning 20-7. The game in Whiteface Stadium was the season-opener for both teams.

Brown rolled to 162 of Hereford's 181 yards on the ground, including his 73-yard dash which put the Whitefaces up 20-0. Petey Colvin, another tailback, ran for the Herd's first score, a 13-yarder in the first quarter.

The Rebels did not score their touchdown until late in the fourth quarter.

Hereford's Great Starting Quarterback Mystery was solved--at least for a week--when Chad Sandoval came out for the first play. Richard Sanderson, who started at safety, played quarterback throughout the second half.

Between the running game's success in the first half and terrible field position in the second half, neither quarterback got much of a chance to loosen up his arm.

Sandoval was 2-for-8 for 29 yards; Sanderson was 1-for-3 for six. Neither threw an interception.

While the offense powered through the first half, the defense was the star of the entire game.

"The defense played great the whole game," said Danny Haney, who is now 1-0 as head coach of the Herd. "Tascosa can play football. They had, what, 185 yards total offense? That's not too good. We gave them the ball in good position and they couldn't do anything with it."

The Herd limited Tascosa's two speedy running backs, Stephon McQueen and James Mitchell, to 73 and 44 yards rushing, respectively. Neither really got untracked until the second quarter: Mitchell was dropped for a loss on his first carry, and McQueen totaled 10 yards for his first five carries. The longest run either broke was a 17-yarder by McQueen.

Neither team gained a first down with its first possession. Tascosa gained two first downs on its second possession, but stalled and had to punt. Hereford took over on its own 31-yard line, and the offense started to click.

The Herd got two first downs on penalties: the second pass interference call which put Hereford on the Rebel 39.

Brown ran for seven yards, then fullback Kyle Hansen ran eight for a first down. After an incomplete pass, Brown ran for six, then three, then, on fourth-and-inches at the 15-yard line, he got two yards.

A play later, Colvin ran to his right, hesitated a split-second for the blocks to develop and darted past the goal line.

"I had Stephen Blea in front of me," Colvin said. "When Stephen's in front of you, you don't have anything to worry about."

Sanderson kicked the extra point, giving the Herd a 7-0 lead with 3:11 left in the first quarter.

Hereford gained a 14-0 lead after Brown's first touchdown, a 3-yarder on the third play of the second quarter. The six-play drive started at the Tascosa 34 after a 14-yard punt and included a 20-yard pass to Sean Smith from Sandoval down to the 14, and a 9-yard pass to Brown down to the 5. Hansen ran two more yards, Brown scored and Sanderson kicked the extra point.

The momentum-change of the game came a few moments later.

The Rebels got a touchback on the ensuing kickoff and started driving the ball. They made three first downs on their first extended drive of the game.

The third first down came after a 17-yard run by McQueen brought the Rebels to the Hereford 33. On the next play, McQueen carried the ball nine yards before Hereford rover Alvaro Avila knocked the ball loose and Chris Brummett fell on it at the Hereford 23.

Brown ran for four yards on the next play, but on the play after that, he went 73 yards. He took the ball from Sandoval, ran to the right, cut inside a block by tackle Michael Campos and outraced the one last defender between him and the touchdown.

"Michael Campos really worked hard on his block," Brown said. "I just had to cut back and we were off to the races. He made an outstanding block."

That back-breaker came with 6:43 left in the first half and made the score 20-0.

Most of the second-half action took place in Hereford's half of the field. The Herd started its possessions on its own 14-, 15-, 34-, 15-, 49- and 25-

yard lines, and the 49 was when Richard Rodriguez fell on Tascosa's inside kick.

The Rebels had numerous chances to score, and the Herd defense met all but one challenge.

Late in the third quarter, the Rebels had the ball first-and-5 at the Hereford 16 after an offside penalty. Tascosa's Jody Hickox ran for four yards, then was stopped for no gain. On third-and-1 at the 12, quarterback Brian Patton fumbled but recovered the ball at the 15. On fourth down, Hereford linebacker Joel Gayton hit Patton as his arm started forward, and the ball fell for an incomplete pass.

"I had a straight shot at the quarterback," Gayton said of his drive-stopping play. "It was pretty clear."

Later, with just less than eight minutes left in the game, a holding penalty and two incomplete Sanderson passes put the Hereford offense in a fourth-and-19 hole at its own 25.

Hereford lined up to punt, but Andy Kalka's snap went over Derek Mason's head. Mason scooped the ball inside the 5-yard line and ran it out only to the 14.

Tascosa took over and Mitchell ran five yards to the 9-yard line on the first play. On the next play Herd tackle Monroe Timberlake came up with a big tackle for a 6-yard loss.

"They were running a counter sweep. I shot into the backfield, somebody evidently filled the hole and (Patton) didn't have anywhere to run," Timberlake explained.

The next play was just as big. Brummett deflected a Patton pass in the corner of the end zone.

"(The receiver) got a little head start on me," Brummett said. "It was a good pass. I jumped as high as I could and barely got a piece of it."

Patton's next pass, on fourth down, fell incomplete, and the Herd took over at its own 15. However, on the next play a pitch-out was fumbled, and Tascosa's Michael Deeter recovered on the 9-yard line. Three plays later, McQueen ran it in from 9 yards out, and the kick made it 20-7.

Timberlake didn't seem disappointed that the shutout was lost, since the game was won.

"Can't blame it on anybody; it's just a turn of fate," he said. "We're all a team, and that's how we played tonight. Sure feels good to win."

## First-game jitters hit Haney

High strung.  
Jittery.  
Anxious.  
Overwrought.  
Tense.

You can look it up.

They're all synonyms for nervous. They all sum up Hereford Coach Danny Haney's feelings before, and at times during, Friday night's 20-7 win over Amarillo Tascosa at Whiteface Stadium.

Haney has won every game in which he's been the head football coach. One-and-oh.

"Yeah, I was nervous, but I've always been nervous," Haney said after Friday's game. "Shoot, sometimes in the past while I was an assistant I was so keyed up that I had to throw up before a game. So being nervous hasn't been anything new."

"But this was a different deal because the scope of the thing is so much greater. The responsibility is so much greater... Sometimes you think the responsibility is all on you, but it's not. You've got your staff working for you and you've got your kids working for you. You've got to try to keep that in perspective before a game."

Haney enjoyed himself during the first half of Friday's game, when the Herd racked up a 20-0 lead. After the Herd's first touchdown drive, quarterback Chad Sandoval trotted to the sideline where a Haney hug awaited him. Haney congratulated him, told him what a good job he had done on specific plays during the drive.

Haney was able to put his nervousness aside. With four minutes left in the first quarter, a Hereford drive looked like it was going to stall at the Tascosa 15 on fourth and inches. It looked like a perfect time for a quarterback sneak.

Wrong.

Haney ran his favorite play, 28 Toss, and Leo Brown picked up two yards and the first down. Petey Colvin scored two plays later.

"I never even considered not going for it on fourth down," Haney explained. "We look to the toss as being the play that's going to carry us on short yardage situations. We teach our kids from the eighth grade, seventh grade on up that play, and we get them to do it right."

One of the questions Haney still has to answer is his starting quarterback. Chad Sandoval drew the nod Friday night, but played only the first half. Richard Sanderson went all the way in the second half, plus doubling up in the defensive secondary.

For Sandoval, his first varsity snap was taken at 7:37 p.m. Friday. Sanderson played five games last fall before suffering a broken hand.

"Chad was just as nervous as I was," Haney said. "He missed some receivers early on passes but he came back and calmed down and really did do a good job."

"The evaluation of the two I'm not going to base on one game. Circumstances in the second half, penalties and things, killed some promising drives for us. Richard made a couple of plays that I thought were excellent."

Haney was disappointed that the

Herd couldn't shut out the Rebels, and hopes the Herd learned to play with a little more intensity for the whole game.

"One of the things we've got to do is learn from every game," Haney said. "What I hope we learn from

tonight is that you have to try to maintain the momentum you have at halftime. You can't ever be satisfied with where you are at halftime. We've done it before from the other side of the scoreboard, and come back on some people in the second half."

It's only opening weekend and already the mighty have fallen.

Huntsville, Dallas Roosevelt and Navasota, pre-season powerhouse picks to win it all in their respective classes come December, failed to make it past the first of September's fourth-quarter guns.

Huntsville, the top-ranked team in Class 5A, escaped Waco with a 29-29 tie Friday night as the 1991 schoolboy football season kicked off with a spate of surprises.

In Class 4A, the top three teams fell, including top-ranked Roosevelt, which lost 26-15 to Wilmer-Hutchins. Second-ranked Austin Reagan fell to Austin LBJ, 20-14, and in the year's first big bully matchup, 4A's

McKinney, ranked third, lost 14-13 to No. 8 Waxahachie in a wet, fumble-filled game.

A 32-yard run by Dennis Walker and two-point conversion by Lamont Moore gave Waxahachie a 14-7 lead with 6:11 remaining.

Walker fumbled on the Waxahachie 1 less than a minute later. After Lions' quarterback Max Knake recovered his fumbled snap at the 2, Tyrone Hollins scored to make it 14-13.

McKinney went for the tie, but holder Ron Boyd couldn't handle the center snap and was swarmed under by the Indians defenders.

Roby Dunahoe attempted a 41-yard field goal with 1:32 left, but it was wide right.

There were 14 fumbles in the game.

Navasota, No. 1 in 3A, was drubbed 35-0 by 4A foe A&M Consolidated, a 14-1 semifinalist a year ago.

In other games, No. 1 Schulenburg whitewashed East Bernard 26-0 in Class 2A, but No. 2 Grovetown, the defending state champion, fell to unranked Coldspring 10-0. Also, No. 9 Manor lost to Burnet 14-7. There were no upsets in Class 1A, where top-ranked Garden City smothered Forsan 49-0, and No. 2 Thorndale shut out Franklin 23-0.

In 5A, seventh-ranked Longview fell to Killeen 27-7 and No. 8 Arlington Sam Houston was beaten by Grand Prairie 27-7. On Thursday,

Cypress Creek shocked No. 5 Houston Lamar 10-0.

Sam Houston played without tailback Jeff Godley, its leading rusher last season. Godley was arrested in midweek on a charge of walking out of a store with two VCR's and was suspended.

In 4A, because the top three teams lost, fourth-ranked West Orange Stark was in a position to move into No. 1 with a victory Saturday over Bay City.

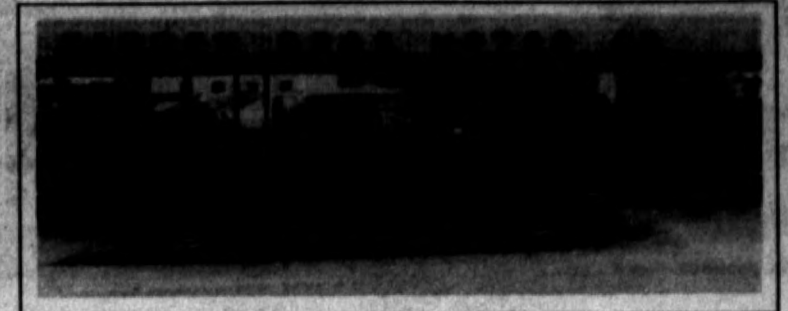

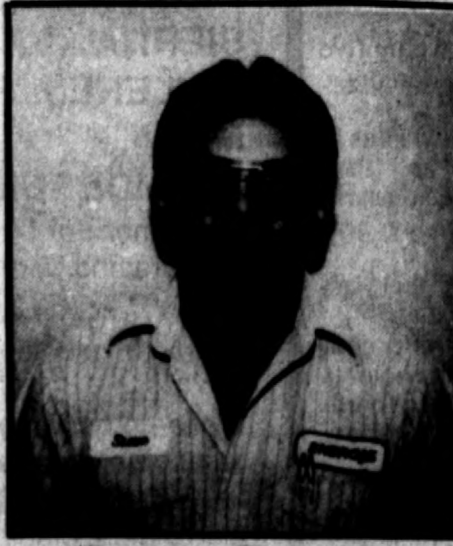

# Bragan enjoys making people smile

The Dallas Morning News ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Bobby Bragan is 73 and holds the official title of assistant to the president, special projects for the Texas Rangers Baseball Club. He might better be described as goodwill ambassador, baseball in general. He knows plenty about both - goodwill and baseball.

Bragan hasn't managed a major league team in 25 years but still thrives on his involvement in the game as a speaker, entertainer and organizer. Turn Bragan loose on a fantasy baseball camp or a charity golf tournament and you have a hit on your hands. Need a speaker? Bragan, to borrow one of his favorite adjectives, is excellent.

He still smiles after all these years around the Dallas-Fort Worth area, ready to create and motivate. For a good time, call Bobby Bragan. Robert Randall Bragan works an audience the way he once filled out his lineup card. He sizes up the situation and puts together what he believes will win.

He thrives on standing before 1,500 Rangers fans in a banquet hall and leading them in "Take Me Out To The Ball Game." Naturally, he likes what he hears and waves a salute to the happy crowd.

"Outstanding!" he exclaims. Or "great," "tremendous," "terrific." Bragan loves one-word critiques, as long as they are positive and uplifting.

His ability to adapt to the chemistry and character of his audience is, well, tremendous. Also great, excellent and outstanding.

He spoke to the Society of American Baseball Research's local chapter on a recent Rangers off night in the Stadium Club at Arlington Stadium with an audience of maybe 40. They mostly were hard-core baseball people in some form, but one man brought his three young sons. They sat on the front row.

Bragan strolled about with a shiny new bat over his shoulder, talking ball and testing his audience with trivia. He rewarded an occasional correct answer by presenting one of several Rangers souvenir items from a nearby table.

Then he leaned toward one of the boys on the front row and grooved one. As soon as he heard the answer, Bragan beamed and handed the bat to the kid. The smile he received was outstanding.

This was the same Stadium Club dining room where Bragan once charmed and entertained a crowd of 125 at an Arlington Newcomers Club luncheon. The audience that day was more than 90 percent female, so he didn't try to dazzle with his baseball knowledge. He talked briefly about the sport, then delighted the crowd by describing how he wooed and won his wife Roberta several years ago.

Both were widowed after long marriages, their children were grown, and Bobby was smitten with Roberta after their first evening out at the Rangers' annual staff Christmas party. He believed Roberta was destined to be the next Mrs. Bragan but quickly found himself stalled on the road to romance.

Bobby kept calling Roberta, trying to make some weekend plans, but Roberta told him weekends were taken by a doctor she had been seeing for some time. The doctor, Bragan said, wanted to monopolize Roberta's time but wasn't interested in marriage. Bragan kept calling.

By the third weekend of this, Roberta told Bragan she was getting ready for a trip to Acapulco, so he sent her a dozen roses. She called to tell him how much she liked the roses.

"Make sure the doc gets to smell 'em," Bragan said.

Right after they hung up, the doctor walked into her kitchen with some groceries and told her she could fix them dinner while he went to pick up their itinerary for Acapulco.

"You needn't bother," Roberta told him. "I'm going to marry Bobby Bragan."

Bragan grinned and continued in a soft voice of satisfaction.

"Next weekend, I was in and the doc was out," he said. "Six weeks later, we tied the knot."

The women laughed and applauded. Bragan had won another one.

Blackie Sherrod, now a columnist for The Dallas Morning News, met Bragan in 1948, when legendary Brooklyn general manager Branch Rickey sent Bragan to manage the Dodgers' Texas League club in Fort Worth. Sherrod wrote for the Fort Worth Press. Bragan, 30, had spent seven undistinguished years with the Phillies and Dodgers as an infielder and catcher, and Rickey sensed his man had a brighter future as a manager. As Sherrod watched Bragan handle the Cats over the next five years, he agreed, but he also came to admire him in other ways.

"He's the best man I know in sports," Sherrod said. "He's honest, totally lacking in ego, religious. Tommy Tatum was a coach for Bragan with the Cats and his roommate on the road. He marveled at how Bobby could wake up in such a good mood, singing and whistling."

"Tatum said, 'He must have the clearest conscience in the world. Nobody can sing before breakfast with a guilty conscience.'"

Bragan did display common human qualities when he believed his team was being hurt by bad sportsmanship

or poor umpiring.

Sherrod recalled Bragan's teams as stealing a lot of bases but having a tough time at Oklahoma City, where the owner, Jimmie Humphries, left a lot of loose dirt on the basepaths.

Once, Fred Stark slid and stopped a foot short of third base. Bragan was in the coaching box, so he got a little shovel and sand bucket, filled it and took it to fans in the third-base seats, Sherrod said. And when Bragan really got down on the umpires, he put on dark glasses and stumbled out on the field with a white cane.

Bragan was tossed from that game, but people remembered him. Within the Dodgers' organization, or course, he already had made a strong impression.

In January 1947, Branch Rickey invited all of the Dodgers' minor league general managers to a meeting in Brooklyn, said Howard Green, then GM of the Dodgers' Abilene Blue Sox. At the meeting, Rickey went around the room, asking each GM of his needs.

Marcel Dufresne of the Class C Three Rivers club in Quebec spoke up.

"First of all, Mr. Rickey, I need a manager," Dufresne said.

"Who do you have in mind?" Rickey asked.

"I'd like to have Bobby Bragan," Dufresne said.

Said Fresco Thompson, the Dodgers' farm director: "Well, Marcel, why don't you just go ahead and ask for Leo Durocher?"

Bragan was too early in his managing career to get a shot at succeeding Durocher in '48, when Durocher left to manage the New York Giants. But in 1956, Bragan secured his first big league job at Pittsburgh, where Rickey had moved as general manager. It was not a good place for a debut. The Pirates had been National League doormats for years. Bragan was fired after 104 games in '57 after Rickey already had left.

A brief stint with the Cleveland Indians in 1958 also ended dully after 67 games. Five years later, Bragan received his best opportunity with the Braves.

He managed three years in Milwaukee, finishing better than .500 but off the winning pace each season,

and then moved with the Braves to Atlanta in 1966. The Braves struggled their first season in Atlanta and were 52-59 when Bragan was fired for the third time.

He returned to Fort Worth, his permanent home since 1948, and threw himself into a new job selling mobile homes.

"I can sell one to every manager I know," he said.

For a while, Bragan was considered a good candidate to manage again if the area landed a major league franchise for Arlington's Turnpike Stadium, the first stage of what eventually became Arlington Stadium. Bragan said he liked the idea.

"Then when I get fired again, I'll just be 20 minutes from home," he said.

By the time the Rangers arrived in 1972, Bragan was well into a career as an administrator. He served as president of the Texas League in 1969-76 and president of the National Association of Professional Minor Leagues in 1977-80. He left that president's chair to work in public relations and direct the Rangers' speakers bureau but quickly settled into another presidency.

"Bobby has been permanent president of our Sunday School class, the Wesley Bible Class," said Green, like Bragan a longtime member of First United Methodist Church in Fort Worth. "He does such a good job, no one has mentioned electing a new president for years. Bobby is a great cheerleader. If you say anything in that class, Bobby says, 'Let's give him a hand!' and starts applauding."

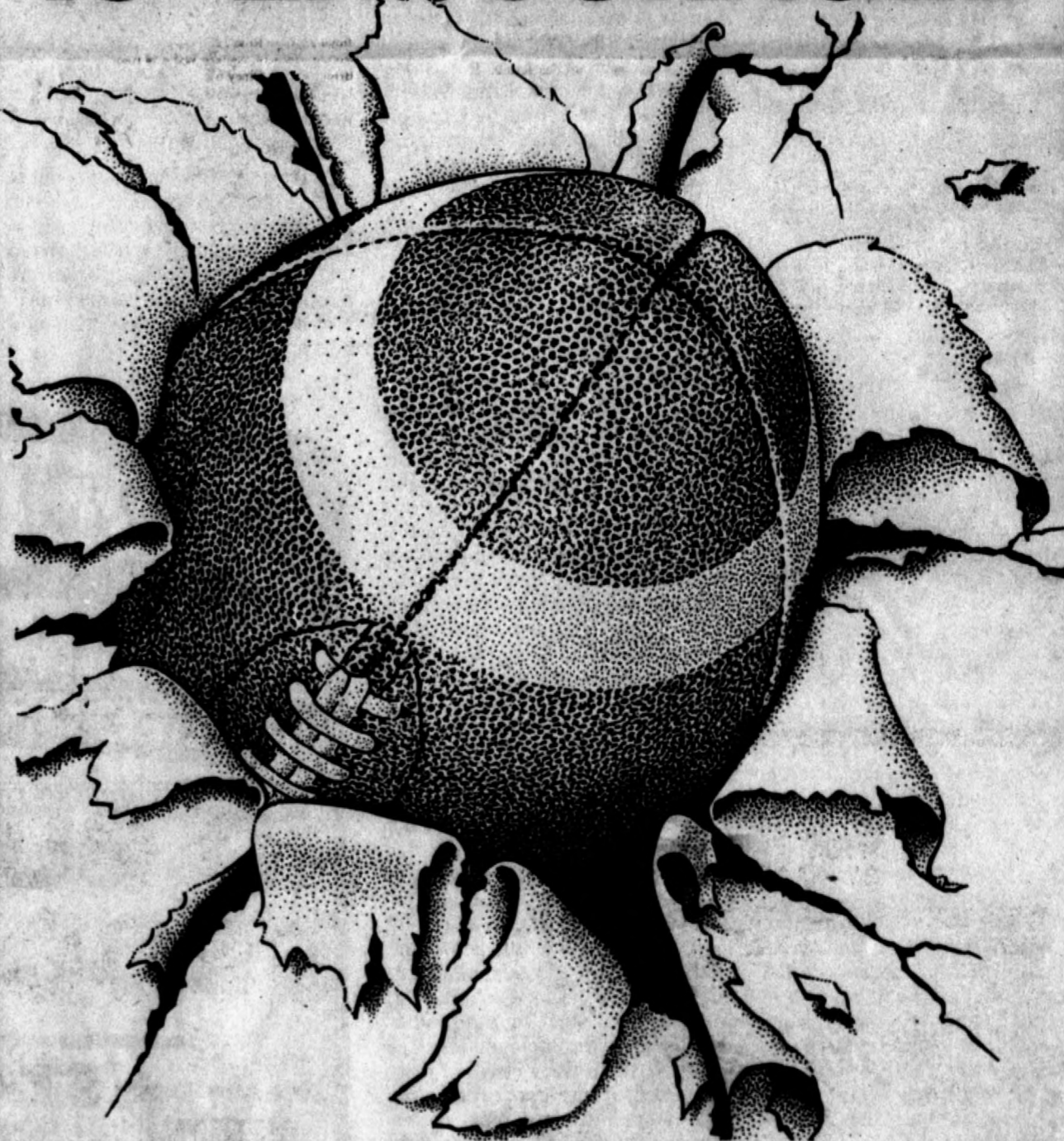
Every Rangers home game finds Bobby and Roberta Bragan at Arlington Stadium. While Roberta watches intently, Bobby moves back and forth, visiting with old friends and new as he follows the action. He glances fondly at Roberta and smiles proudly.

"When we got married six years ago, she had never been to a baseball game," he said. "Now, she keeps a scorecard every night."

Well, give Roberta a hand. And one for her husband, too.

# Moon remembers last Ohio trip

**CINCINNATI (AP)** - Warren Moon vividly remembers his last trip to Riverfront Stadium. It was one of the worst afternoons of his career.

The Houston quarterback was reduced to walking the soggy sideline with a dislocated right thumb, watching the Oilers' high-powered run-and-shoot offense blow up in backup Cody Carlson's face. A year so full of promise ended with a 41-14 playoff drubbing by the Bengals.

"It's just a real helpless feeling to be on the sidelines and be a cheerleader," Moon said, his voice still tinged with disappointment. "You can't find enough words."

"When things are down, you can usually make things happen with your physical ability. But at that point, I was not able to do that anymore. That was a tough pill to swallow for me."

These are the memories Moon and the Oilers bring this Sunday to the stadium that has become their

"House of Pain." They've lost their last four games there by a combined 186-62, and have won at Riverfront just once in their last 11 games.

"You never look forward to coming up there, believe me," Moon said. "It's a tough place to play."

It was never tougher than last year. Moon's season ended two weeks before the playoffs when he hit his passing thumb on a Bengals' helmet late in a 40-20 loss at Riverfront. The ringmaster of Houston's aerial show was grounded after passing for an NFL-high 4,689 yards and 33 touchdowns.

The Oilers made the playoffs for a fourth consecutive year, but were overwhelmed in their least-favorite stadium without Moon.

"It was pretty demoralizing to me," Moon said. "This team relies on me a lot to perform and make plays. All of a sudden, you're in a position where you can't do that."

Moon hasn't completely recovered from his nightmares at Riverfront. He

threw for 250 yards and a pair of touchdowns last Sunday in a 47-17 victory over the Raiders, but his hand isn't completely healed.

"It's still a little stiff," he said. "I still don't have my full flexibility back in it. But I'm able to throw the ball. That's all that really matters now."

That's all the Bengals' beleaguered defense needs to know. John Elway ripped their defense apart in Denver last Sunday as the Bengals suffered their worst season-opening defeat, 45-14.

They were able to confuse Carlson during the first-round playoff loss last year by showing him a variety of formations and taking away the short pass. Moon's not such an easy touch.

"He's probably the best pure passer in the league," cornerback Eric Thomas said. "He can throw off one leg, off the other leg, while he's leaning ..."

And the Oilers' opening win

showed he has a few more options. Houston rushed for 219 yards, with Allen Pinkett carrying 26 times for 144 yards, the most by an Oiler since 1987.

"The thing that's happening now with Houston is they're developing the run and shoot and moving into another level," coach Sam Wyche said. "The evolution's taking place right in front of us. The run part is becoming very sound and a very productive part of the run and shoot."

But it all goes back to Moon.

"He is one in a handful of quarterbacks that you least like to face because he's so explosive," Wyche said. "He can do everything. If things break down, he's got the mobility to scramble."

A big game from Moon could help the Oilers get over their Riverfront pain.

"The last two outings, the Bengals mistreated us pretty good," coach Jack Pardee said. "We remember the last two games of last year."

# Weather makes doves act strangely

**GUNTER, Texas (AP)** - It was Sept. 1 but the weather conditions were more appropriate for a dark, rainy November morn.

Doves were flying like ducks. A Stealth bomber couldn't have gotten lower.

They were clipping the tops of headed maize and would dart and dip like a pilot trying to confuse a radar-guided ground-to-air missile system. They were, indeed, gray ghosts, their drab plumage perfectly fitting the conditions.

They stayed close to the topmost leaves of the tree line as they headed to the feeding fields, making hunters get off snap shots at the very best at the fleeting targets.

This opening day of the 1991

Texas dove season was as strange as it gets.

First of all, preliminary scouting found no large concentration of doves in the Celina-Gunter-Tioga area of North Texas.

There were a few pockets here and there but nothing to get excited about. The scouts thought they had opening day pegged as below average to a possible bust.

Then the rains came. And came some more.

Instead of scattering the birds like usual, the rain made them flock together and swept them into new areas.

In our hunting group there were plenty of shots. But the hunting was very difficult because of the rain and the mud and visibility.

Somehow I was elected the designated retriever because I had worn old tennis shoes instead of

hunting boots. It would prove to be a tiring decision.

My promotion to group retriever came because I was able to wade around in knee-high mud easier because the tennis shoes picked up less goo than the cumbersome hunting high tops.

You could see where I'd been in the muddy field. It looked like small bombs had pockmarked the surface.

The shooting was fast and furious. The birds, riding a 15 to 20 mile-an-hour breeze, were more than sporty. It was a day when a .333 batting average was golden.

Everything seemed backwards. Doves were flying just the opposite of their usual north-south pattern in this part of North Texas. And they were wild like the weather was really spooking them.

After we reached our limit, we sat around reviewing the morning hunt.

I broke out a Cuban cigar I'd been saving which a friend liberated during his recent foray to Havana for the Pan American Games.

Everything seemed wonderful. Then the game warden walked up. "Good morning men, any luck?" he said. "I heard a lot of shooting."

It was the first game warden I had ever seen in that part of Texas.

I was happy none of us had forgotten to stop by and get our hunting licenses. Usually there is one in every group who does.


He laughed when he saw my pants and shoes.

# TPWD biologist responds to Phillips

**Editor's note: Mel Phillips, whose column, Southwest Outdoors, runs Fridays in the Brand, has criticized certain practices of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in recent columns. Following is a response sent to the Brand by Joe Kraai, the District Fisheries Biologist for TPWD in Canyon.**

Dear Sports Editor,

Mel has said that no fish are caught at Lake Meredith during summer months. In reality, more than 11,000 game fish were caught and retained by anglers from July 1 to Sept. 30, 1990. That harvest compares favorably with similar-sized lakes throughout Texas and doesn't count released fish.

Mel also said striped bass should be stocked to create good summer fishing. Stripers would have to compete with white bass, walleye and crappie, which sustain their own numbers through reproduction and are the most popular species at Meredith. Stripers have to be stocked every year at considerable expense to fishermen, and for every pound of striped bass established in the lake, there would be one less pound of our other predator fish. Also, sophisticated equipment is the norm for striper anglers—most successful fishing trips involve guides, so the average fisherman would benefit little from introducing stripers.

Mel said fishermen should go to New Mexico or Oklahoma instead of Lake Meredith because they have better fishing. That recommendation will hardly help tourism in the Panhandle. Texas stocks more fish than any other state and our fishing compares favorably with the states mentioned. New Mexico stocks no black bass in any of its lakes and does not stock striped bass or hybrid striped bass in the lakes on the Canadian River.

About TPWD, Mel said: the department should work for tourism at Lake Meredith; if Meredith was located near Austin, the fishing conditions would have improved years ago; cove kills have hurt the fishing at lake meredith; and no cove

kills have been conducted at Lake Baylor.

Regarding tourism: four times during 1987-90, TPWD assisted and guided outdoor writers from such cities as Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, San Angelo, Oklahoma City, Denton and Amarillo. All wrote highly complimentary articles on the fishing opportunity, success and variety available at Meredith and recommended in their columns that anglers should try the lake. We also assisted with the filming of a show aired on "Fishing Texas."

Other examples of our efforts to promote area fishing include: working with the Borger Chamber of Commerce and Cabela's In-Fisherman Professional Walleye Trail to get Lake Meredith on the national walleye tournament circuit; and working with Mercury Marine and nationally-known walleye fishing experts promoting the excellent walleye fishing opportunities at the lake.

About being located nearer Austin, Lake Meredith and the Panhandle's other lakes receive as much or more attention and stockings as any lakes in the state. The department has stocked more than 6.5 million fish in Meredith, including more than 1.7 million black bass.

Cove rotenone surveys are designed to monitor the forage fish population and reproductive success rates of select game fish. They affect less than 0.0019 percent of the lake area and have no impact on future fishing success other than resulting in the collection of useful data for improving fishing at the lake. TPWD has conducted cove kills across the state for the past 15 years, including all Panhandle lakes, even Baylor. Most of the stocking and other management recommendations for Lake Meredith were justified from data collected during cove rotenones.

Mel has criticized most of our research studies at Lake Meredith. Research studies have resulted in:

- the introduction of smallmouth bass. Lake Meredith now has the strongest population and the best fishing for smallmouths anywhere in the state.
- the imposition of a 10-inch length limit on crappie. That limit has dramatically improved the population of crappie in the lake and Meredith now provides the best crappie fishing in northwest Texas.
- the imposition of a 16-inch limit on walleye. This limit has resulted in a significant increase in the numbers

of small walleye in the lake. Meredith has the best walleye population in the state and is being strongly considered for the 1993 Professional Walleye Trail National Championship Tournament, the BASS Masters Classic of walleye fishing.

-the imposition of first a 12-inch, then a 14-inch minimum length limit for black bass. These limits have increased the stocks of both largemouth and smallmouth bass in the lake.

Last year, Mel was a proponent of Lake Meredith in his articles, and even bragged about bass tournament success at the lake. His articles spread the word that good numbers of large bass were present in 1990, and that publicity might have resulted in anglers harvesting most of them.

Lakes in the Panhandle are unique and have a lot to offer to hometown fishermen and visitors traveling through our area. The habitat is not always suited for largemouth bass, but when water levels rise and condition are right, good numbers of largemouth bass are produced. Lake Meredith is one of the most intensively-managed lakes in the state. Fishing is extremely good, given the adverse conditions. The lake will never be a Lake Sam Rayburn or a Lake Toledo Bend because conditions are very different.

My job is to make overall fishing at Meredith as good as it can be for the species suited for its environment. If promoting Lake Meredith is your goal, then take advantage of the good things it provides.

## Extension News

For Fall '91, fashion is drawing much of its inspiration by looking back to the '60s and '70s.

Sixties-revisited looks include pantsuits, A-line dresses, shifts, plastic and vinyl. Surfacing from the Seventies are patchworks, batiks, beads, scarf skirts and crochet. But, in true 1990s style, both decades are happily mixed and often garnished with space-age touches. Newest looks include cat suits, spandex leggings and dresses that are nothing but a long jacket over opaque tights and lots of leg. For the young--and daring--there are plenty of Madonna-inspired, pop-pon looks in beaded corsetry that is printed, even feathered, for "outside" dressing.

Other '90s touches include Native American motifs, from fringe to Indian beading, on everything from jackets to cocktail dresses. Popular, too, are quilted motifs in vivid colors based on Amish patchwork patterns. Zippers, functional or strictly for looks, show up on center fronts, adorning wrists, securing pockets, or simply spiraling around the body.

The season is full of color. Greens and blues, especially turquoise, are making it big, as is brown, fuchsia, purple and all the tartan colors. Transitional fabrics have spawned trans-

seasonal colors, with spring-like pastels, often paired to white, showing up for all and winter.

For those with a more classical bent, plaids are prominent, whether fashioned into Scottish kilts, or sequin-adorned for evening dresses and suits. Daytime jackets are often punctuated by velvet collars and brass-band buttons. Suits sport unmatched, but tonally related, plaids for jacket and skirt. For the ultimate in plaid mixing, there are several plaid-patched jackets worn over just about everything.

Watch for skirts with hemlines that slant to one side and poncho skirts created from large rectangles that fall into handkerchief points. There's renewed interest in dirmds and pleated skirts. They look freshest in short versions, such as flirty pleated chiffon with a matching wool jacket, or short, full skirts propped up with petticoats for evening dressing. The trench is reinvented over and over again, as a jacket, coat or dress, in fabrics as diverse as sateen, gabardine, crepe and polyurethane. The bomber jacket is interpreted in even more fabrics than the trench. Consider wool, suede, bright vinyl, fur-trimmed, quilted or sequined.

## YOUR EYES



### PARTIALLY SIGHTED

For some people, visual activity can only be corrected to 20/70. What this means is that the individual — even with corrective lenses — sees at 20 feet what someone with normal vision sees at 70 feet. This individual is considered partially sighted. In some cases, vision can be corrected only to 20/200 or less, or a person may have a field of vision of only 20 degrees; these people are considered legally blind.

Help is available for many of these people who need not give up all of their normal activities. Improved low vision aids can help the partially sighted function in a visual world. Among them are telescopic lenses, microscopic lenses, hand-held and mounted magnifiers, as well as specially designed reading lenses with stronger powers than conventional eyeglasses.

In addition, the partially sighted and legally blind are entitled to special services like large print books and "talking books."

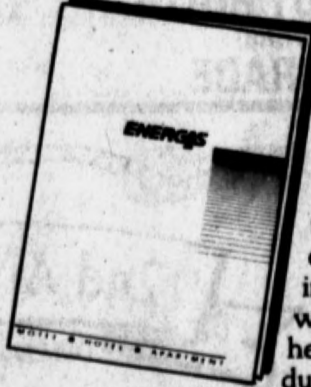

"Former Elizabethtown doctor, Fred Rainey, sentenced last year to 10 years in prison after pleading guilty to 41 counts of sex-related charges, is asking for probation. He was also charged with homosexual activities with teenage boys in the 1980s and the attempted rape of another baby sitter in 1983.

"As a part of the plea agreement, Rainey will never be allowed to practice medicine in Kentucky again."

**DEAR R.L.W.:** I called the American Medical Association and this is what they said: In order for this doctor to practice medicine in another state he would have to obtain a license in that state. This means he would have to fill out forms stating prior criminal convictions. His application would then be reviewed by the state licensing board.

Even though the AMA says they verify general information, I believe that too many doctors who lose their

license to practice in one state do indeed move elsewhere and carry on as if nothing had happened.

In this age of computer technology there is no reason for any doctor to get away with this sort of thing. This is one area of medicine that is in desperate need of fixing.

## TALKING TO YOUR CHILDREN ABOUT AIDS

The following information about AIDS and the HIV virus is from the United State Centers for Disease Control. Some of the information may not be appropriate for your family values and you may not want to include it when you talk to your children. Please remember to be factual when talking to your child about AIDS.

### What is AIDS?

AIDS stands for acquired immunodeficiency syndrome. It is caused by a germ that doctors call a virus. The virus is called the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV). It

works by breaking down the body's immune system, the system that fights off sickness.

The key thing to understand about AIDS is that it is not easy to get through things that you do everyday. You cannot "catch" AIDS like you can a cold or the chicken pox. You cannot get AIDS from doing things like sitting next to someone in school who has AIDS, using a bathroom or riding the school bus. You cannot get AIDS from living in the same house with someone with AIDS, from a mosquito bite, or from touching or hugging someone who is infected.

You cannot tell by looking at someone whether he or she is infected with HIV. An infected person can appear completely healthy.

### How does someone become infected with HIV?

A person becomes infected when HIV is introduced into his or her bloodstream.

There are two main ways to become infected:

- By engaging in sexual intercourse--vaginal, anal or oral--with an infected person;
- By sharing drug needles or syringes with an infected person.

Also, women who are infected with HIV can pass it on to their babies during pregnancy, birth or breast feeding. Some people have been infected through receiving blood transfusions. Since 1985, the American blood supply has been tested for HIV and now transmission through infected blood is extremely rare.

**How can HIV be avoided? DO NOT USE DRUGS OF ANY KIND.** Sharing needles to inject drugs can infect you. Many drugs, especially alcohol, can cloud your judgement and cause you to do things that place you at risk for HIV.

**DELAY SEXUAL INTERCOURSE.** Don't have sexual intercourse. Abstinence is the only sure protection. When you decide you

are ready to become sexually active, do so only with one uninfected partner in a mutually faithful, long-term relationship, such as marriage. Use a latex condom whenever having any type of sexual intercourse, but remember that condoms are not foolproof and may break.

Do not make decisions about sexual intercourse while under the influence of alcohol or other drugs. These substances cloud your judgment and cause you to take risks that could put you in danger of becoming infected with HIV.

**AIDS Testing**  
Confidential counseling and testing is available in Hereford through your family doctor or the Texas Department of Health. Call 364-2401 for more information. Also, AWARE, a program of the Texas Panhandle Mental Health Authority, offers on-site anonymous testing. All counseling and testing services are free.

If you are interested in finding out more about AIDS, you can contact the Texas Department of Health, the American Red Cross, or the National AIDS hotline (1-800-342-AIDS). The Spanish hotline is 1-800-344-SIDA. The hotline number for the hearing impaired is 1-800-AIDS-TTY.

## Asner hopes to color 'Trials' rosier

### Young Lisa Rieffel sees expanded role

The appeal for higher ratings may be the most trying aspect of *The Trials of Rosie O'Neill*, but the defense has not rested. Thursday, Sept. 12, is the appointed date for the fall premiere of the CBS drama, and the cast and crew have been hard at work all summer to ensure their second season summons enough viewers to deliver a positive verdict.

Sharon Gless, a two-time Emmy winner for *Cagney & Lacey*, returns as Rosie O'Neill, a corporate lawyer who becomes a public defender after a difficult divorce from her husband and his law firm. Her series, which is produced by her real-life husband, Barney Rosenzweig, has won critical acclaim for the reality of its situations and portrayals, but its Thursday night time-slot puts it up against NBC's *Cheers*, the leader of the pack.

When *Rosie* went into summer repeats, the show dropped even further behind in the ratings, prompting talk of cancellation.

The call went out for a hired gun, an actor with more Emmys than anyone and a glare that could reduce Mary Tyler Moore to tears. Yes, none other than dramatic heavyweight Ed Asner, two-term president of the Screen Actors Guild and outspoken stalwart of liberal political causes.

Asner comes on board to play Walter Kovatch, a bigoted ex-cop who ended his 35-year police career after arresting his son for selling drugs. Hard-nosed Kovatch had always believed the public defender's office to be his nemesis, but is persuaded to join Rosie's team as an investigator. Asner reports that "the chemistry is working well" on the set, but character-wise, we

viewers know we're in for an explosive personality conflict. He is proud his new series "isn't sugarcoated" and presents life as it really is; this is from a man who tells it like it is.

After having successfully transferred his popular Lou Grant character from a comedy to a dramatic series, CBS canceled *Lou Grant* amid controversy that Asner was perhaps using his fictional-newsman credibility to further his own political causes. Rather than let his spirit be broken, Asner continued his campaigns, even joining a boycott against Maxwell House (which buys El Salvadoran coffee), bringing threats from their parent corporation, the ultra-powerful TV sponsor Procter & Gamble. CBS has forgiven him, proving that when the chips are down, a man's worth is undeniable.

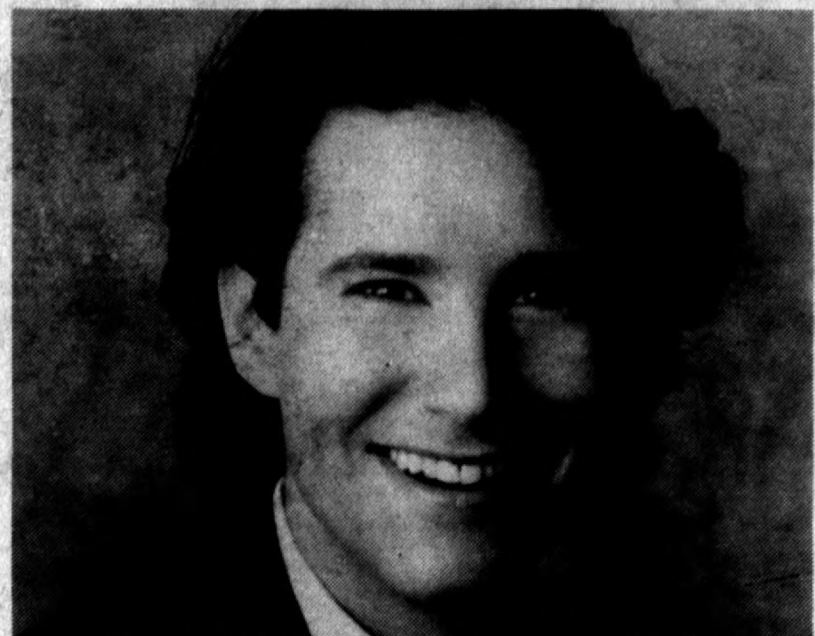
Another change in the series involves an expanded role for Rosie's former stepdaughter Kim Ginty (Lisa Rieffel).

## Fox comedy dares to be different

Of the four broadcast networks, Fox may not be the most endearing, but it is the most daring, fanciful and fun. If you have any doubts about that, tune in, literally and figuratively, to *Herman's Head*, a new "brain"-com, starring William Ragsdale (*Fright Night 2*), premiering Sunday, Sept. 8, on the network.

And, if it'll make you feel any better, take comfort knowing Herman, a 20-year-old nebbish trapped in the dog-eat-dog publishing world of New York, has a few modern-day doubts of his own.

In fact, Herman has exactly four doubts — all personality facets of his own existence knotted together within his own gray matter. Each of these four "characters" is played by a different actor.

In Herman's mind "Angel," portrayed by actress Molly Hagan, serves as his moral backbone and sensitive self; "Wimp" (Rick Lawless) represents Herman's anxious, guilt-ridden side;

"Genius" (Peter Mackenzie) approaches life in a scientific, formulaic fashion; and, finally, "Animal" (Ken Hudson Campbell) is the manifestation of Herman's most primal, hedonistic, and guttural instincts.

But hold on. Things don't end there. Herman has to live in the real world, too, in which he's accosted by his best friend Jay (Hank Azaria), a know-it-all narcissist; beleaguered by a sexy but ruthless female colleague named Heddy (Jane Sibbett); and brow-beaten by his task-master boss, Mr. Bracken (Jason Bernard). Thank God, there's Louise (Yardley Smith) the office's sweet, complaisant assistant.

Sounds schizophrenic? The brain-child of Sigmund Freud? For sure, superego/ego/id-proponent Freud would have loved this mind-bender, but the befuddling challenge is not to confuse the folks down home.

Co-executive producer David Landsberg figures he's the perfect person to keep *Herman's Head* coherent. Why? Because Landsberg's been in therapy for the last 12 years, himself.

In his spare time, the young actor draws cartoons and experiments with graphics on his home computer. He plans to pursue a career as a graphic artist.

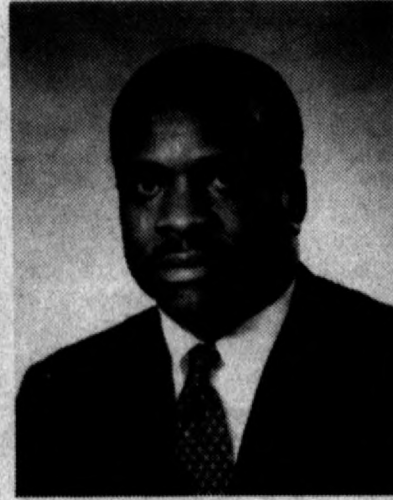

# Garner returns to series

LOS ANGELES (AP) - After a 12-year absence, James Garner, a good-natured actor who can't seem to avoid crises of body or spirit, is returning to series television.

The new show is NBC's "Man of the People," set to premiere Sunday, Sept. 15 at 8 p.m. The main difference between it and "The Rockford Files," "Maverick," or even "Nichols" is in length - the new show is 30 minutes long, his previous efforts were an hour.

And the fact that it's a comedy. Do not, however, say this to Garner. He considers all the above mentioned TV roles comedic.

"I keep getting interviewers saying 'How do you like doing comedy?'" he says, exasperated, between takes of his new series. "This is not a three-wall, three-camera sitcom. It's a little story, with some people and stuff."

The people in this series include Stuart Margolin (his infuriating screw-up friend from "Rockford"). The stuff is Garner's portrayal of Jim Doyle, a con man ne'er-do-well who inherits his dead ex-wife's City Council seat.

Why has Garner, with myriad aches, pains, bum knee and repaired ticker, returned to series television a dozen years after health problems forced the cancellation of "Rockford"?

"I've been playing golf for 10 years," he said. "I really enjoy

working." As for feature films, "the scripts were so bad. I don't know where they get the money to make some of this crap."

But Garner has made some good films, notably the 1981 Blake Edwards movie "Victor, Victoria," and 1985's "Murphy's Romance," for which he earned an Academy Award nomination.

He also took on notable made-for-television films. This year,

he was nominated for an Emmy for the Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation "Decoration Day."

In it, Garner plays a retired judge who comes to the aid of a black childhood friend given the Medal of Honor 31 years late.

There also was "Promise," in 1986 and "My Name is Bill W.," both made with actor James Woods and both produced for Hallmark. For the former, Garner earned an Emmy for producing the TV movie.

In Garner's 35-year career, there have been more than a few unpleasing, highly publicized moments.

There was the \$1.5 million breach-of-contract suit filed in 1980 by Universal Studios for his failure to finish "Rockford" episodes before NBC canceled the series because of Garner's poor health.

In 1988, he underwent quintuple bypass heart surgery, a procedure whose necessity Garner blamed on 45 years of smoking.

And so it is that the man who now returns to television wants to take life a little easier.

"I needed a rest," he said of his absence. "'Rockford' just about killed me. I always said that if I did another show, it would be 30 minutes. The hour-long action series is a killer."

As for his new show, Garner said he hopes it succeeds. If it doesn't, that's fine, too.

"I do my job. I know what I'm doing. I've been doing it a long time and if they don't like it, well, that's the way it goes."

## NEW VIDEO RELEASES

### LA FEMME NIKITA:

(1991/French with English subtitles) Starring Anne Parillaud. Don't be misled if you have not heard of this one. It is a French film that many distributors considered an art film and, as such, was only in limited release in the U.S.

The story concerns a tough French street girl (Anne Parillaud) who has a flair for killing. She is recruited by the Government to be an assassin. (You will be happy to know that, this time, the dirty deeds are being blamed on the French.) In order for her to carry out the assignment she is totally made over into a wily, sleekly turned out-operative (an XXX chromosome James Bond) who then, somewhat incongruously, falls in love with a supermarket clerk.

Luc Besson's film is best appreciated for the taut, high-gloss effectiveness of its pumped-up violence and the sumptuousness of its settings - as well as for its star, Anne Parillaud.

While the script is contrived and somewhat forced, Miss Parillaud does a fine job playing a nimble and dangerous looking assassin. She also has a pair of great-looking

legs. Rated R for violence and sex.

### COME SEE THE PARADISE:

(1990) Starring Dennis Quaid and Tamlyn Tomita. Most of the film deals with the forbidden (by her family) love between an American labor organizer, Dennis Quaid, and a young Japanese-American girl (Tamlyn Tomita), in the early 1940s. The couple defies family and convention, and marries - only to be separated by World War II. Carrying what's left of their possessions, the Japanese-American Kamamura family, along with the now married daughter and her young child, board a train and roll off to the internment camp where they will spend the rest of the war. Dennis Quaid is drafted into the army.

While the story tells only one side of the internment, leaving no emotion untouched in order to condemn the U.S. for this action, it is fairly well told, with a certain tension just below the surface that will capture your attention.

The film did very poorly in theaters but should find a good video audience. The story is a provocative subject at best and should spark some lively debate.

Rated R for mature love scenes.

### WAITING FOR THE LIGHT:

(1990) Starring Shirley MacLaine and Terri Garr. This is another film that did not fare well on the big screen but will find its audience in video. It is not a bad script actually - it just has the feel of being hastily made from a combination of several scripts.

Shirley MacLaine (overdoing it just a bit) plays an eccentric ex-magician living with her straight-laced niece (Terri Garr - definitely cast against character) and the niece's children. The children are supposed to be impish, but on screen their charm is a little less evident.

After the children are kicked out of school for a number of reasons - the paramount one being their imitation of their ex-magician aunt - the family moves to a small town where no one knows them.

As a prank, the children decide to scare a less-than-thrilled-they-moved-next-door neighbor by dressing up as ghosts. They are, however, mistaken for angels and suddenly the town is in an uproar. When tourists by the droves start coming for the angel sighting, Shirley MacLaine has to get out her bag of magic tricks. Rated PG. It's a nice night home at the movies.

Put in the frame of a thriller - and it is a gripping story - what unfolds in the film is not only an excellently stated social protest, but exciting movie-making. It was the 1969 Oscar winner for Best Foreign Film. Not rated. Would be an R for some violence and language.

Dick Schapp, one of the most widely respected and recognized reporters in sports journalism, brings the stories and the celebrities everyone is talking about a step closer to the fans, beginning Monday, Sept. 9, when *Schapp Talk* debuts on ESPN.

Schapp, a six-time Emmy winner, will begin each live half-hour program by interviewing a guest, then will take calls from viewers for the remaining 15 minutes. Schapp's first guest will be professional football and baseball player Bo Jackson, with whom he collaborated on the just-released book, *Bo Knows Bo*.

Schapp, who also hosts ESPN's *Sports Reporters*, has a long list of accomplishments. While with ABC, he won Emmys for his contributions to *20/20* and *ABC's World News Tonight*, and he has authored or co-authored 27 books. His collaboration with Jackson hit No. 2 on the *New York Times* best-seller list, the highest a sports-biography book has ever climbed. *Instant Replay*, the first of four books he co-authored with Green Bay Packer Hall-of-Famer Jerry Kramer, is the bestselling sports book of all time.

Schapp began his career in 1959 as a reporter for *Newsweek*, then worked as a reporter and columnist for the *New York Herald Tribune* from 1964-1966. He was editor of *Sport Magazine* for four years before making his network debut as a correspondent for NBC News in 1971.

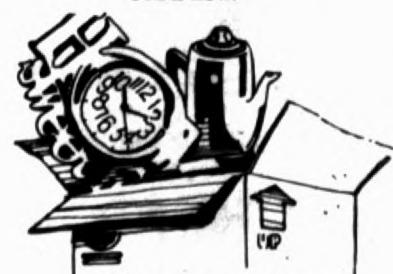

# 'Law & Order' returns to NBC battle

NEW YORK (AP) - "Law & Order," which will start its second NBC season on Sept. 17 by introducing Paul Sorvino as the new detective on the show, almost was a CBS series. And a Fox series. And an ABC series.

But each network passed on it, despite a cast that included Tony and Emmy-winner Michael Moriarty as an assistant district attorney, said Dick Wolf, the show's executive producer.

Then the cavalry arrived in the form of NBC.

It said "go" on the basis of seeing the pilot and six scripts, said Wolf, a graduate of two other acclaimed NBC cop shows - "Hill Street Blues" (script consultant) and "Miami Vice" (co-executive producer).

The result: critical acclaim, respectable ratings, a renewal, and an Emmy nomination for Moriarty.

But the ordeal of three misfires before success "was rough, not only for me, but also because everybody associated with the show believed so fiercely in it," Wolf said. "And then, as the odds got longer, it was just plain enervating."

The one-hour series, airing Tuesday nights, is a literate effort sometimes likened to "Naked City" of TV's old black-and-white days. Like that series, it's filmed in New York. Unlike that show, it's a two-part effort.

In the first part, the cops nab the alleged bad guys. In the second, Moriarty & Co. take the purported

"perps" - as Fun City's finest call suspected perpetrators of crime - into the bowels of due process.

In cop shows like the stylish "Miami Vice," a blast of Uzi seemed a frequent nightcap. But there is virtually no gunfire on "Law & Order." Its stories involve investigations of a crime, then how things are sorted out.

"The show's not to tell the story of a crime, but to have an insight into the emotional and legal aspects of a specific incident," Wolf said.

NBC brass never have urged a change in that philosophy and sought a bit of gunsmoke, he said.

Wolf's biggest gripes are with sponsors who pull out of "Law & Order" when a show's given topic seems too "sensitive," as they say in ad circles.

Though he wouldn't provide details, Wolf said nervous advertisers pulled out of at least six episodes last season, including ones that dealt with

the bombing of an abortion clinic, child abuse, and a sexual murder.

He spent seven years in advertising before getting into the other end of TV. Wouldn't he expect such things to happen?

Not really, Wolf said, because advertisers know the kind of show they're getting - and that it airs in the final hour of prime time, when the wee ones presumably are asleep.

At that hour, he said, "people are not going to turn off their television because they know they're going to get explicit language or explicit story lines."

The Network Television Association, funded by ABC, CBS and NBC, last month sent letters to 7,000 advertisers asking them not to yank their ads from shows that pressure groups deem inappropriate. The association also pooh-poohed the impact of product boycotts by such groups, saying such boycotts don't work.
