Time Is Short For Korean Vets Appointments

Korean veterans discharged pri-or to last July 16 who lost opportunity for probational appoint ment because of military service must apply to the Civil Service Commission not later than Octo-ber 14, 1953, to be eligible for the benefits of Public Law 121, In

H. Figg, Director of the Eighth U. S. Civil Service Region, Dallas, Texas, said that other Korean veterans who lost such opportunity, generally, have 90 days from the date of their discharge to apply.

The law provides that Korean veterans must be restored to job eligible lists from which they lost opportunity for probational apment, and that their names be placed at the top of their respective groups. It also provides that the seniority and the rate of pay of those veterans probationally appointed under this law will be de-termined by the date when another eligible rated lower was appeinted from the same list.

ments in the American economy in recent years is the rapid expansion in scientific research and development in a variety of fields.

Total scientifc research expenditures in 1952 are officially estimated at more than \$31/2 billions, about two-thirds of it for work carried on in facilities owned or operated by private industry. This sum is more than four times the equivalent yearly spending at the beginning of World War I, a rate of growth that is greater than that of the economy as a whole in the period.

National Defense Aspect As is to be expected, Government financing of research and development is high where the national defense factor is paramount. This is notably the case in the aircraft field where U. S. funds represented 85 percent of research expenditures. Electrical machinery and the professional and scientific instrument industries are two others with a big role in defense, and more than half of their research expenditures are Government-financed.

The companies studied in the survey employed 94,000 research engineers and scientists and an additional 140,000 persons as supporting personnel for this work.

This may come as somewhat of a jolt to visitors to the Lone Star State-the Bureau of Census in its detailed occupations for the civil- In the Waco metropolitan area ian labor force in Texas doesn't even list cowboys.

But the Texas labor force-2,121-282 men and 747,324 women when the census was made three years ago-is a varied and versatile army from the 16 lady blacksmiths all of them employed, to the 243,-956 farm owners and tenants. Interesting Things

Some Texans do the most inte resting things at the most unusual places. For instance Dallas, thru which the Trinity River trickles has three employed female sailors and deck hands in addition to 15

area, a few miles upstream has one woman and eight men at work handling its maritime commerce. there are four men and one woman

similarly employed. Fort Worth and Dallas ran neckand-neck when it came to women loggers. Both had two each when the census was made, but a Dallas newspaper was unsuccessful in an attempt recently to locate its female Paul Bunyons in lumbering camps around the city.

Nine women were employed as airplane pilots or navigators and there were 228 women lawyers and judges in the state, By 1950 the number of employed women phisicians, and surgeons had increased to 365, including 10 Negro women.

Truckers Paid \$500,000 In Fines For Driving Overloaded Trucks

AUSTIN-Truckers arrested last year for highway law violations umped to more than 23,000, acording to the annual report released this week by Kent Odom, Chief of the License and Weight Division of the Department of Public Safety.

The report for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1953, shows truck law violators paid \$516,842.00 in fines. This is an increase of more than \$52,000.00 over the previous year. These fines were paid into the road and bridge funds of the county in which the truck operator was arrested.

Sharp Increase A sharp increase in the number of truckers arrested is shown by the report. The 23,319 arrested last year exceeded the previous year consisted principally of operating everloaded trucks, failure to pay sufficient registration fees and operating faulty and unsafe equipment upon the highways of the

State. Of the total fines and additional registration fees of \$1,366,734.00 collected by the counties in Texas as a result of the increased law violations, more than \$849,000.00 was for the payment of additional registration fees.
