

Piled On Ground Just what percentage of that will be shipped in the near future is still an unknown factor. At least one elevator-Pitman's - reported all of their storage facilities. as being full, and grain is being piled outside on the ground. Hereford Grain Corporation, which is co-operatively owned, reported that they are shipping some grain to Amarillo, and some has been piled outside because they did not want to fill all their storage facilities yet.


Looking back over the years, the earlier days are the ones that they recall most easily, but they are likely to get into a brotherly argu-ment over the date of certain events.
