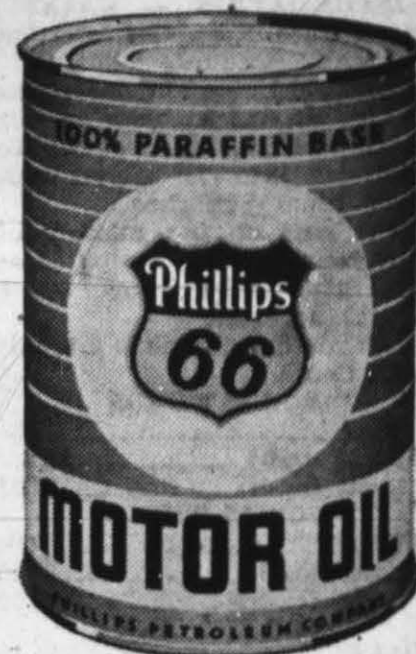

Hereford People Received Account Of Life in Japanese Prison Camp

A first-hand report of conditions in a Jap prison camp in the Philippines has been received by J. G. Fortenberry of Adrian, whose cousin, Mrs. Rolf Hanson, together with her husband, was rescued on Feb. 23 when American troops and Filipino guerrillas broke into the Jap Camp at Las Banos, Luzon.

Mr. Hanson was a mining engineer in the Philippines and the couple had been interned for three years when rescue came. Mrs. Hanson is an aunt of Misses Mattie Davis and Grace Taylor, who teach at the Walcott school in this county, and the account which follows is part of a letter received by relatives:

"We've been through a 'portion of the war' but we weathered it like veterans. But very thin. The last time I weighed I tipped the scales at 125; from then on I stayed off. Rolf looks worse than I do, but you should see him eat! Our stomachs are bottomless, so bear with us if we arrive at your homes starved. We have been living on eight ounces of rice a day, greens from our own little garden, roots and edible weeds since last September. No seasonings, no fats, no sweets—so the Japs really thinned us down.

"Our rescue was timely for we are told that we were to have been executed enmasse. But if I could choose between execution and slow starvation, I would select the quicker... Our troops came into enemy territory just to get us at 7 o'clock Feb. 23, a.m. They arrived three ways and right together. Parachute troops dropped from planes, big tanks drove over camp walls and Filipino guerrillas came down the mountains. The battle was brief. (The Japs were taken by surprise). 2,000 people were cleared out of the camp in two hours time. I looked back to see the camp in flames. Our troops burned it so the Japs couldn't use it. We came across the big lake south of Manila in those big tanks. Japs fired twice, no one was wounded in our tank. A few internees got slight wounds, one American soldier and four Filipinos were lost in the battle. I'm sure it was one of the smallest losses of the war. Our soldiers were so wonderful, so patient, so understanding!

"The majority of those having ration bank accounts abide by regulations and cooperate in every way, but the few who do not are to be brought in line," Fonville stated. Most overdrafts, he explained, are due to carelessness.

In addition to his ranching activities, Mr. Conkwright became a director in the First State Bank Dec. 14, 1927, and today holds this position. He also served as president of the First State Bank from November 12, 1941 to June 19, 1944. He was elected County Commissioner in 1927 and served till 1930. He has also been active in school affairs, serving on the school board for a number of years. In more recent years, he has been a director in the Hereford N. F. L. A. and on the Deaf Smith Selective Service board, a position he held at the time of his death.

Probably no other person has contributed more to the First Baptist Church of this city than has Mr. Conkwright. He joined the church when he was a small boy and has been an active member since. For the past 20 years he has served as Deacon, and has been chairman of the board since 1928. He was active in the state organization, "Texas Baptist Convention," and has been on the board of trustees of Buckner's Orphan Home for several years. For many years he has also been the teacher of a boy's Sunday School

class in the Junior department. An old friend of Mr. Conkwright summed up his character by saying: "Gratz Conkwright needs no eulogy; his life speaks for itself. He was successful in every way; in his business; as a husband and father; he was a true Christian.
