Hunters Expect Abundance Game

With thousands of ducks already scattered over ponds and lakes in this area, and a few flocks of geese reported to have been seen, ortsmen are this year looking forward to one of the best hunt-ing seasons in years. Old timers predict that with the coming of the first real cold snap of the year, ducks will literally cover lakes in

this area. this area. Duck season this year opens on Saturday, November 12, and con-tinues through Eriday, December 26; geese may also be shot during the same open season. The bag limits are 10 ducks and five geese. Since ducks and geese are pro-tected under federal laws as well state laws, all hunters are re-red to possess a federal duck mp, which are sold at post-less for \$1. The season is closed wood 'duck, bufflehead, canvasck, redhead, Ross' goose and rans: nearly all of these species nave red markings and may thus o distinguished by hunters.

Rigid Tests On Driver Licenses Under New Law

INSPECTORS WILL VISIT HEREFORD EACH THURS-DAY AFTERNOON

With the new drivers' license aw becoming effective November 15, announcements this week stated that inspectors will visit Hereford from 1 to 3 o'clock each Thursay afternoon to give license exminations.

This issuance of liceness does not affect persons holding valid drivers' license.

Includes New Residents Persons just coming of age, those who have moved to Texas from other states and persons who for any reason do not have valid licenses are required to apply for the license under the new law.

Applicants will be required to stand examinations and prove to the examiner that they are capable of driving a motor vehicle. Tests will include checks for colorblindness, color-ignorance, eye-sight, physical condition and driving machine his ability to drive the car on a test trip with the examiner.

Under the law, licenses can be denied or provisional licenses can be granted. Persons denied licenses will be given a chance to overcome their inability and stand another examination.

Provisional Licenses

Provisional licenses could state that the driver would be allowed to drive a car only in the day time, should the examiner find the applicant incapable of driving night. The law provides many limitations and the decision as to the type of license to be granted is left to the examiner on the basis of the applicant's proven ability. In covering the territory from the various points the inspectors will ride in a white automobile.







During the first six months of the year, Idaho's traffic caths increased alarmingly. Idaho officials didn't attempt to correct the situation with talk and vague suggestions. Instead, the governor ordered the departments of public works and law enforcement to utilize their joint man power, finances and equipment for the purpose of properly policing and supervising roads. Vacations of all patrolmen were concelled, and seven new officers were added. Additional patrol cars equipped with radios, loud speakers and special lighting de-vices, were purchased.

Chief, points out that two-thirds of our annual fire deaths occur in dwellings, mainly because the occupants don't know how to get out. And three-fourths of these victims are trapped on top floors, because they fail to recognize the danger signals of heat and pressure on bedroom doors.

The first thing the householder should do if awakened by fire, is to feel the bedroom door panel. If the wood is hot, don't open the door unless you want to sign your death warrant. If there is an exit via a window or roof, take it. If not, stay in the room with the door closed and call for help.
