NEW TELEPHONE ROUTES FOR THE WEST

carry vital calls for the Pacific war

Right after Pearl Harbor the Bell System began planning and building for the day when the West Coast would become the chief base for the all-out war in the Pacific. The result of that building program is an expanded cross-continent network of long distance telephone lines, ready now to carry a growing load of calls to the West by the armed forces and war industries.

"Trouble-free," Coast to Coast
Especially vital in preparing for the increased volume of war calls to the West Coast was the laying in 1943 of a 1,600-mile telephone cable from Omaha to Sacramento. Buried in deserts and blasted into the solid granite of the Sierras, it provides the last link in a practically stormproof cable from the industrial centers of the East to the ports of the West.

Coaxial cable construction speeded
Construction of the Bell System's coaxial cable, suitable for both telephoning and television, has been speeded be-

cause of the need for more talking circuits between the nation's far-flung war centers. By the end of this year at least 1,500 miles of the network—extending from the East to beyond Dallas—are expected to be in the ground.

A third major project—until recently one of the nation's war secrets—is a 1,300-mile long distance line stretching from southern California almost to the Canadian border. It extends over mountains and through lava-boulder country between the Sierra Nevadas and the Rockies, and provides an alternate north-south long distance route at a safe distance from the sea.

3. With the release from rationing, even distribution will be a thing of the past and the stores near the manufacturing districts will be the first to get the new goods — we are a long way from

the nearest factories.

So . . . we will have to ask folks to bear with us — we will get things as fast as possible.

We would advise all local people who are going to need gas heaters this winter to buy them now — we have a complete line from which to choose, but it looks from here as though there will develop a very acute shortage before winter is over.

We do have a few automatic water heaters and a couple of gas ranges on hand.

Those Scrap-Traps are going fast — they surely do fill a demand for clean, efficient scrap disposal — the doll situation is getting worse — we have sold a lot of the nicer dolls and so far have not been able to replace them. Better do that Christmas shopping early. Gift Goods — the nicer items are going fast and will be hard to replace.

Sure am glad gas rationing is over — now we can go swimming at Canyon, Dimmitt or Clovis.

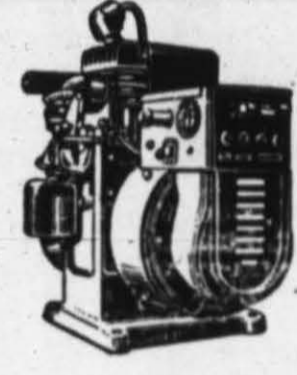

Works at Bomber Conversion
SECOND BASE AIR DEPOT, Blackpool, England—From this war, Johnny comes flying home, thanks to Sgt. Arthur Tiefel of Hereford, and his fellow aircraft maintenance specialists at the Air Service Command's Second Base Air Depot in England, who are converting hundreds of battle-tested bombers into 20-man troop-transport carriers.

At Sgt. Tiefel's depot the bombers are given a complete overhaul, their engines changed, bomb-bay flooring installed, and extra fuel tanks added. Before a plane leaves the depot for eastern seaboard airports in the States, it is given a two hour test flight to check its rate of fuel and oil consumption. Special weights and balances tests, to allow for the added passenger load have been devised, along with the standard trans-ocean flight inspection.

Sgt. Tiefel is the son of Mrs. Alvina Tiefel of Hereford. He joined the army in October, 1942, and has been serving overseas 24 months.

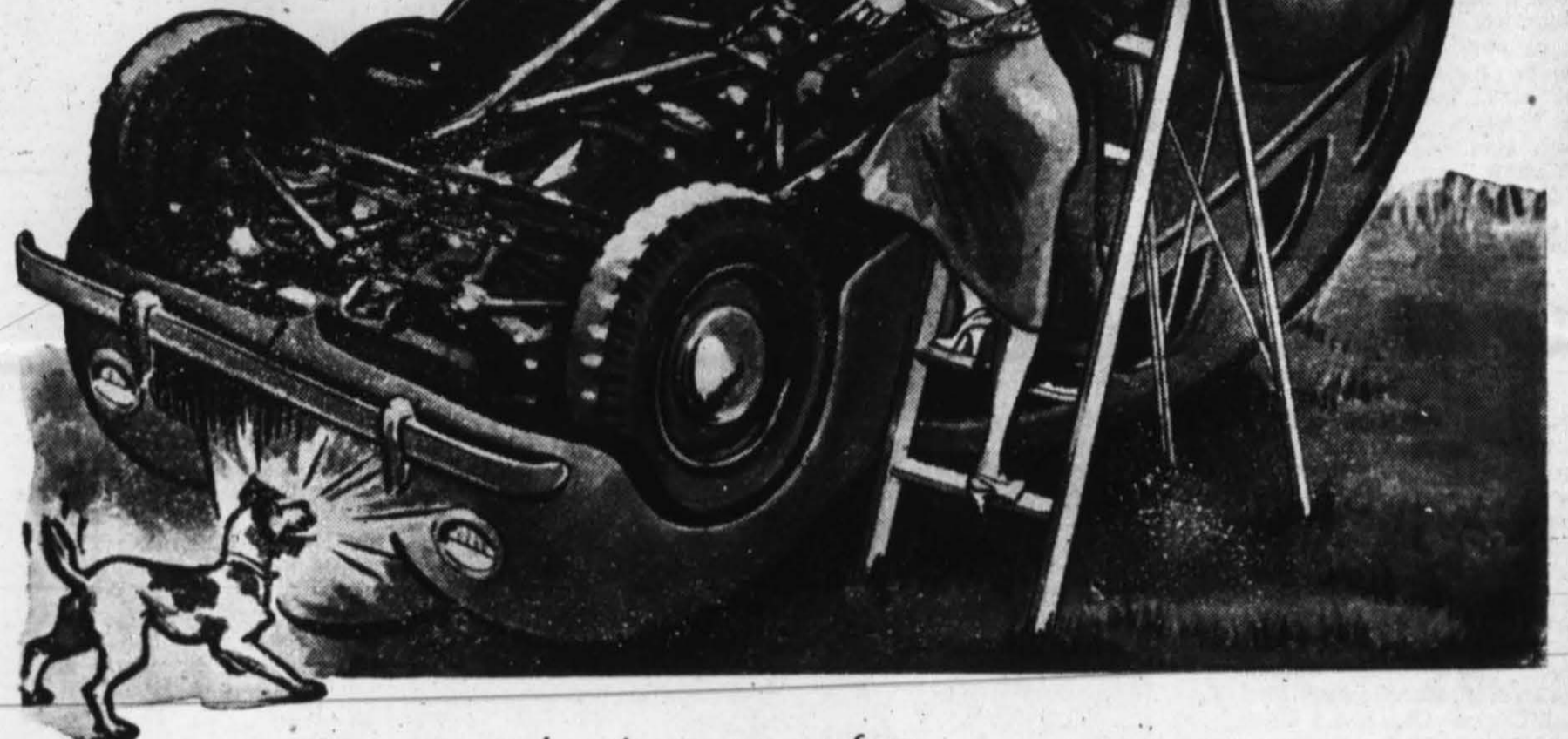

This year our domestic supply of fats and oils will be approximately one and one-half billion pounds less than last year. Right now, we are facing our worst fat shortage since the war began. To make up for this staggering loss, the government is depending on the women of America—and particularly women on farms and in smaller cities.

Every spoonful, every drop of fat is needed to help make battlefield and homefront essentials. So roll up your sleeves and do an all-out job, won't you? Clip this checklist and pin it up in your kitchen as a reminder.



- FRIED SALT PORK**—with milk gravy. Salt pork yields so much grease, you won't need it all for gravy. Pour the rest into the salvage can.
- DEEP FAT FRYING**—use the fat over and over, but when it's too dark and smelly to use any more, don't forget Uncle Sam wants it!
- ROASTS AND CHOPS**—save all trimmings (scraps from plates, too.) Keep them in a small bowl; once a week melt them down.
- SAUSAGES**—they're better if you parboil them first. Skim the fat off the cooking water—scrape the fat from the frying pan.
- CHICKEN SOUP**—chill it before you use it. Scoop off the hardened grease (soup tastes better, too!)

When the salvage can is full, take it to your butcher promptly. He will give you 7 red points and up to 4c for every pound of used fat you turn in.

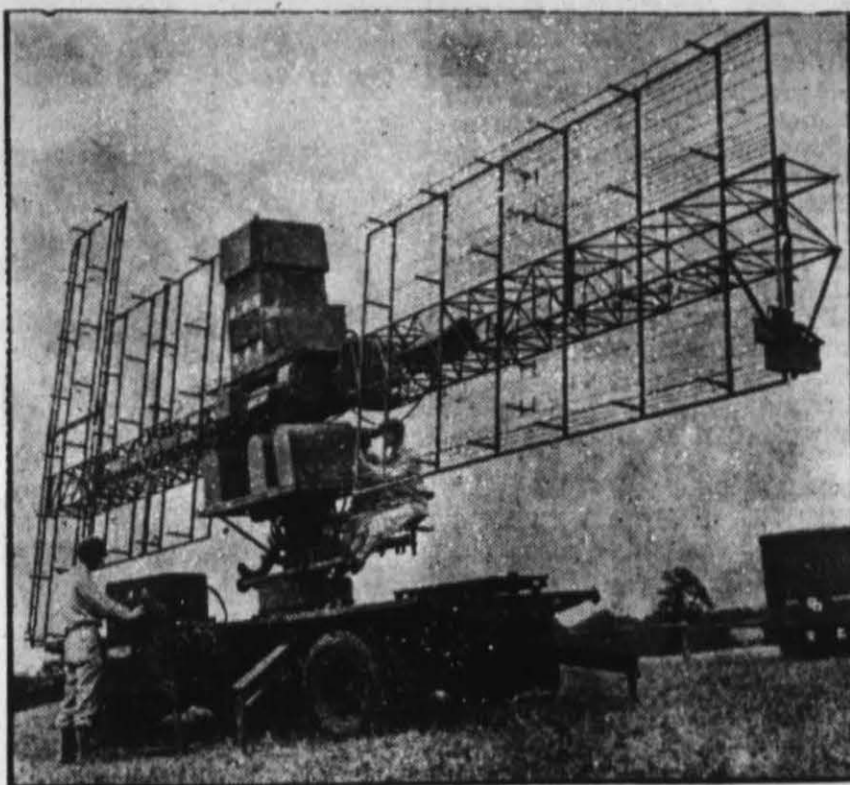
