Funeral services for Fred Kimmins, principal of the school at Black, who was killed in a train wreck on a grade crossing Sunday afternoon at Black, were held at 3 o'clock Tuesday, December 5, in the Hereford Church of Christ with Minister L. C. Chapin officiating, assisted by Minister Hugh G. Murray, and J. Ramey, a life long friend of the family. Pall bearers were Mitchell Jones and E. W. Woods of Canyon; Clyde Hays, Jess Hines and Tom Pressley, trustees of the school at Black and E. Ramey of Hereford. Interment was in West Park cemetery.

Mr. Kimmins was born in Annin County, Texas near Bonham, Jan. 12, 1887, being 52 years, 10 months and 21 days of age when his tragic death occurred. He was married to Miss Annie Barnett, December 5, 1909. To this union were born four sons and one daughter. Three of the sons are teachers in the public schools of Texas and John R. is a junior student in W. T. S. C., Canyon. Mr. Kimmins has been a teacher in the public schools of Texas for 30 years. The operation followed at 6 o'clock the same morning.

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon, December 4, from the first Christian Church at 3 o'clock; Rev. H. M. Redford, pastor officiated, assisted by Rev. Jas. Aiken, Jr., pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Hereford, and by Rev. W. P. Jennings, pastor of the Christian Church in Plainview. Both local pastors were close friends of Mr. Streu, and Rev. Jennings had long been a close friend of the family, having performed Mr. and Mrs. Streu's wedding ceremony and having acted as their pastor during their residence in Amarillo.

Hundreds upon hundreds of former friends and associates crowded into the church in final tribute to Mr. Streu, who during 15 years of residence in this community had come to be one of its outstanding citizens. The entire church was crowded to capacity as persons thronged the isles and stood in a long line around the balcony of the building. The crowd included men and women from all walks of life, who had come to look upon Mr. Streu as a friend and many of whom he had assisted and advised from time to time.

August H. Streu was born in Kewaunee, Wisconsin, on October 13, 1889, and at the time of his death was 50 years, one month and 19 days of age. In 1912 he accepted a position with Morrow-Thomas Hardware Co. (Continued on Page 12)

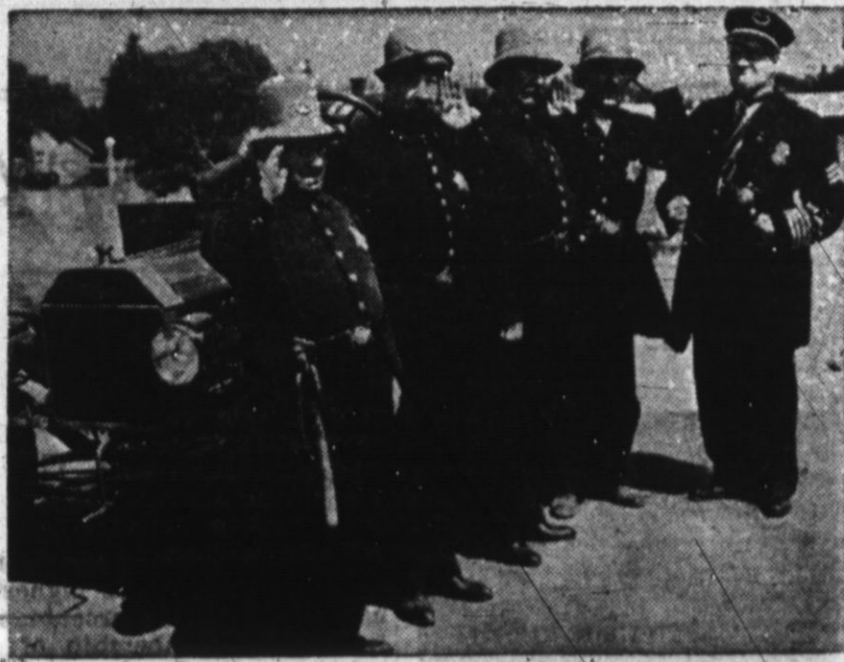

Did you ever walk along the street as a glorious West Texas sun sank beyond a West Texas horizon? When shimmering reflections cast beautiful, rich colors from an azure shield of the heavens and the quiet rustling of Autumn leaves suddenly bring you back to such things as life and reality?

It is at times like these I shall remember a fellow citizen whom it was once my privilege to call my friend, just as thousands of you have been also glad and grateful to consider him, Gus Streu is no longer with us as a man, but his kindness, his faith and his understanding have taught many of us lessons which we shall never forget. In many ways he was a most remarkable man. Certainly few more righteous or more charitable men ever lived—and yet he found time to enjoy life. To point out his many accomplishments would be a gigantic task, and I am sure that it would displease him for Gus was a man who gave of his time, of his efforts and of his worldly goods without thought of reward or of recognition.

To be sure, he will be sorely missed by hundreds and hundreds of persons, by men and women in all walks of life. And with equal forcefulness he will be remembered for the things by which he lived: Love for his fellow man; home, his community, and his Maker.

Gus possessed a faculty for making friends. His acquaintances soon came to appreciate and to love him. I think that he had more real, deep friends than any man I ever knew. In late afternoon as I walk along the street Gus keeps coming to my memory, and with him comes the words of Sidney Smith: "Try to make at least one person happy every day, and then in ten years you may have made three thousand, six hundred and fifty persons happy, or a small town brightened by your contribution to the fund of general enjoyment."

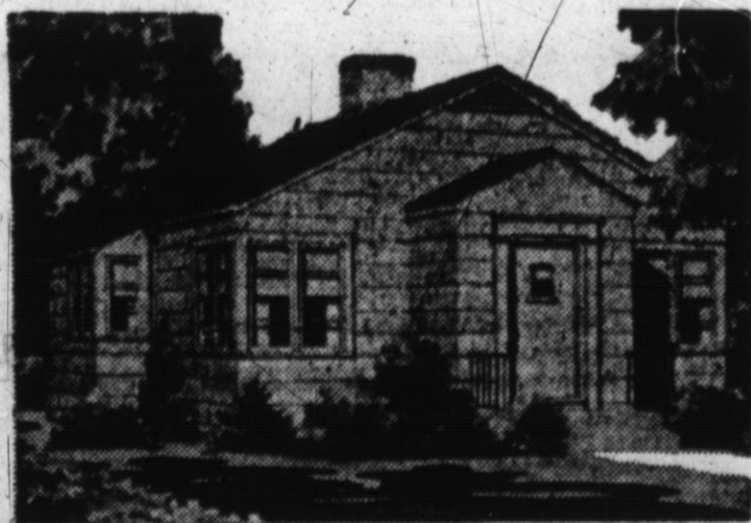

Shoulder Arms And Squads Right Not All Of Modern Army

It never rains on the army—at least not enough to cut into a soldier's pay. Sergeant Jackson, United States Army recruiting representative stationed at Amarillo, pointed out today that young men from this area who enlist in the army will not lose time because of bad weather or sickness. The pay goes on just the same.

"And the pay," Sergeant Jackson declared, "is a lot better than some people think it is. It varies from \$21 to \$157.50 a month, but that is only part of the picture.

"A soldier doesn't worry about the cost of clothing, food or rents. Neither does he have to think about doctor's or dentist's bills—Uncle Sam takes care of all that. Out of his regular pay the soldier pays only for his haircuts and laundry—leaving a pretty neat net."

The recruiting representative, who has been around the army many years and knows most of the answers, can't figure out why young men worry along with hardly a dime in their pockets when vacancies exist in various branches of the army.

"Any enlisted man may learn a trade that would bring him a good income if he left the army," he explained.

"Much of the army is motorized today. There are excellent schools for radio operators, motor mechanics, and numerous specialists schools for the air corps. The medical department will train men as X-ray, dental or general laboratory technicians. There are dozens of other opportunities open—and the soldier gets paid while he learns.

"There's a lot more to our modern army than shoulder-arms and squads right."

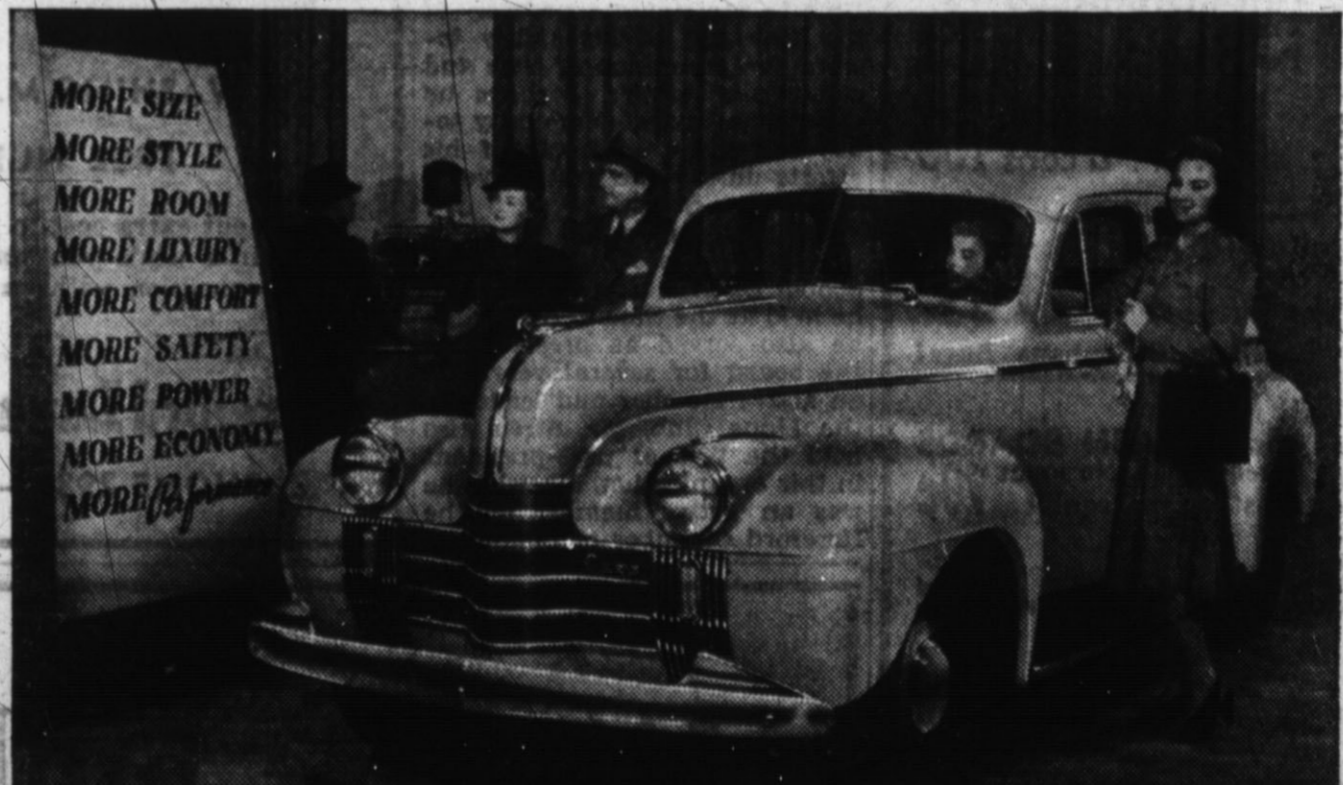

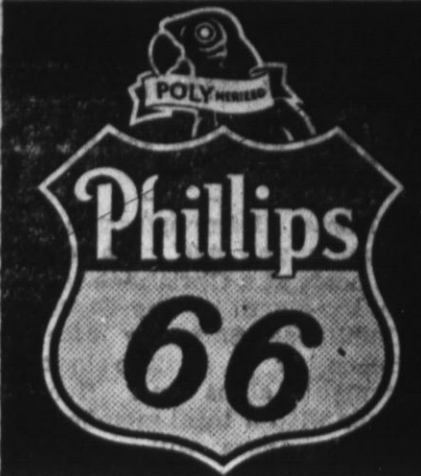

in Amarillo, and continued with the company until February, 1924, when he came to Hereford and purchased the old C. O. Lee Hardware Store. Streu Hardware was first located in the building now occupied by Alderson Variety Store and in 1927 moved to the present location of Ireland Motor Company; in 1930 the business was moved to its present location at 219 Main Street.

Mr. Streu was a hard and tireless worker, but he also found time to contribute generously of his time and of his ability toward the promotion of civic and community affairs. Perhaps no other man in the community today has given so freely of his efforts during the past 20 years as has Gus Streu.

For 12 years he had served as trustee of Hereford Independent School District, a position which he held at the time of his death; he also served as president of the board for several years.
