It is a violation of the law, McNeill, says, for a dealer to split or divide commission with any one who is not a licensed dealer or salesman, and the license of any dealer or salesman will be cancelled upon proof that this part of the law has been wilfully violateed.

Application forms and copies of the law may be had by making request on Post card addressed to Floyd McNeill, Investigator, 203 West 6th Street, Amarillo.

McNeill is at the service of all dealers or applicants for license at all times, and may be called on when his service is needed. A directory of the dealers is in the course of preparation, and every dealer in his district will be supplied with a copy at the earliest possible date.
