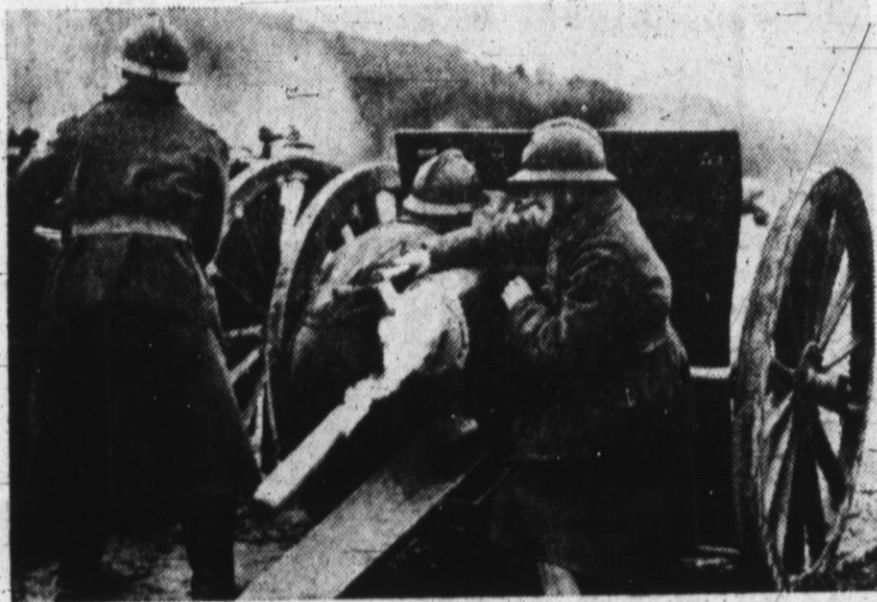
Completion Of New Postoffice Set For May 25

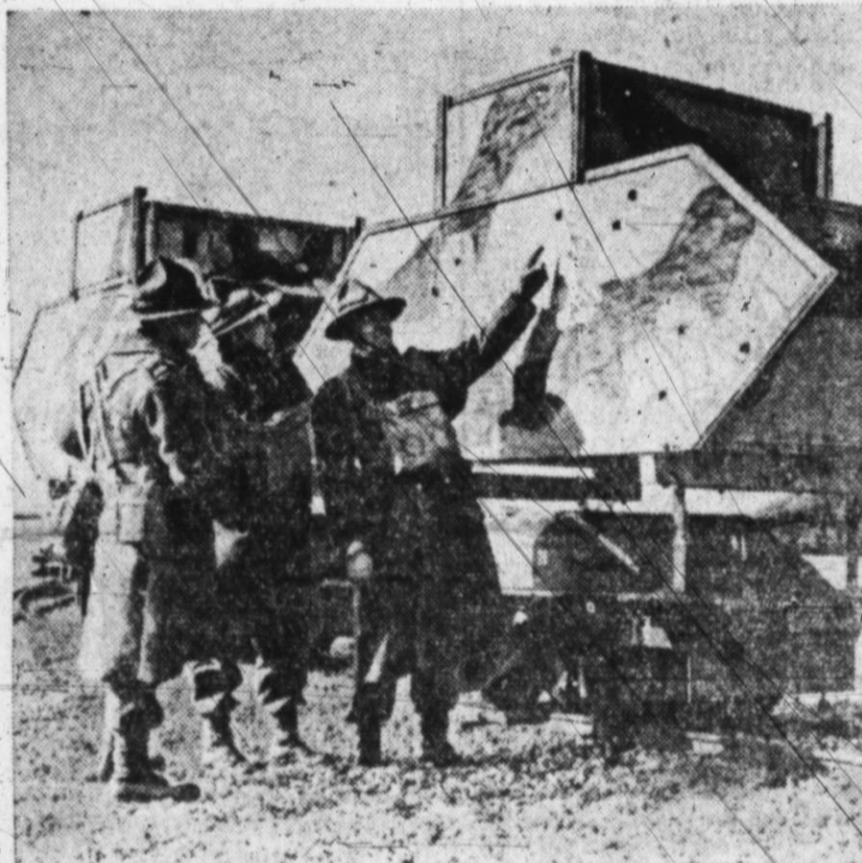

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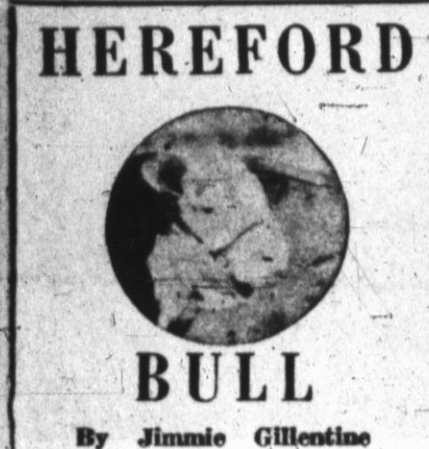

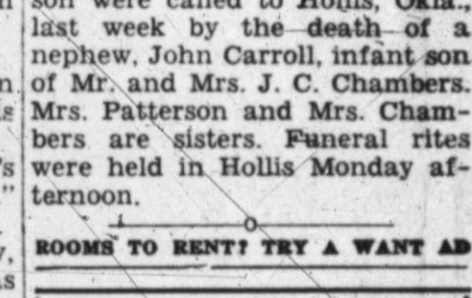

**Census Takers Find Job Is No Easy One**

Work of taking the Federal Census in Hereford and Deaf Smith county is not a bed of roses enumerators report.

Main difficulty encountered is in finding husbands at home, one enumerator reported, since most of them are engaged in business or work downtown. Since the census is supposed to be taken in the home, several husbands have been called from their business.

Enumerators recommend that husbands leave desired information at home with their wives so that it can be given to the enumerator when he calls. Items listed include age and grade of school completed, number of weeks worked and wages for 1939, average monthly utilities bills given separately, value of home if owned, if mortgaged—outstanding loan, amount and frequency of payments, interest rate and if principal reduction and taxes included, holder of loan.

Persons living on farms should have the following information ready: 1939 taxes, expenses for hay, grain, mill feed, and other products for domestic animals and poultry, expenses for purchase of farm machinery, fuel, gasoline, distillate for farm, and building materials; how much cream sold, how many dozen eggs. Irrigationists should know the yearly electric bill, how many hours run in 1939, lift of pump, and power of motor.

Enumerators this week said "We certainly appreciate the fine cooperation given us so far in enumerating the citizens of Deaf Smith county. We in the city want especially to thank the business people who have been so thoughtful as to leave their businesses for a few minutes and come home to give us the information and those who have so promptly filled out the blanks left for them."

### Pontiac Sales Continue Climb

Retail deliveries of Pontiac cars for the first ten days of April were 7170, a gain of 39.5 per cent over the 5138 cars delivered during the same ten day period of April, 1939 and an appreciable gain over the corresponding ten day period of March this year, according to D. U. Bathrick, general sales manager. It was the third highest first ten days of April in Pontiac's history, being topped only by 1929 and 1937.

Unfilled orders on April 10 were 4.7 times greater than they were a year ago and also higher than they were one month ago by 960 cars.

"The way April business has started, with sales and unfilled orders both continuing to increase, our deliveries for the month should be around 24,000," said Bathrick, "which will be a 50 per cent increase over April 1939.

Used car sales by Pontiac dealers for the ten day period were 13,369 an increase of 50 per cent over the same period of 1939 and above the record high sales hung up the first ten days of March. This represents a 30.6 day turnover in used cars nationally.

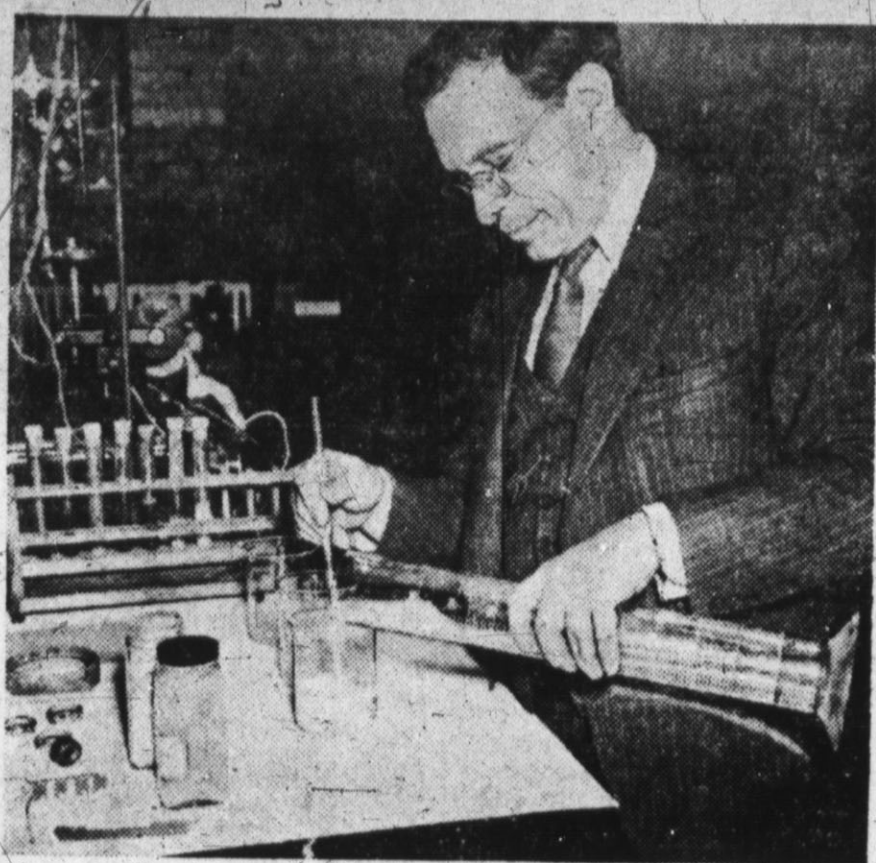
