The good insurance rating is the result of the fact that Hereford has had no serious fires within the city limits for the past year, and amounts to a one-quarter saving on all fire insurance policies on city prop-

Rains measuring from .60 of an anch in Hereford to more than an inch in some rural areas fell here nearly all day Sunday to bring relief from severe blowing damage caused by winds last Friday and Satur-

The moisture was sufficient to stop wind erosion for a time, and farmers are hopeful that wheat and other crops will soon provide sufficient cover to stop blowing.

Because of neavy rains in other sections of the state, very little corn and feed crop acreage has been planted; and farmers in this area are now going forward with plans for what may be a record row crop planting in view of the expected heavy demand.

Last Sunda, 's rain was reported general over the Panhandle territory with amount in most places about the same as that reported in Hereford. Most rural communities near here reported about one-half inch of moisture, but in the Summerfield territory one and three-quarters inches was reported.






