38th Christmas Seal Campaign The Red Cross has received a Now Underway

The American People week were urged to enlist in the which the boys take part under front enemy - tuberculosis by the generous purchase of Christmas seals.

Supporting the drive which opened Monday, President Roosevelt stated this week that this country "cannot afford to permit the strength of its people to be sapped by the insidious di-sease, tuberculosis." The President's statement fol-

"Tuberculosis is today taking

a tremendous toll in the wartorn countries of Europe and Asia. We must not permit this to happen here.

"Knowing that tuberculosis has increased after all past wars, we must act now to prevent its spread. We can do this by joining with the medical profession and with official and voluntary agencies in their fight against tuberculosis.

"It is none too soon to act, I am informed that last year, tuberculosis took 56,000 lives in the United States and that the death rate from the disease in-creased in 21 industrial states, even though the rate in the na-tion as a whole declined slight-

"Tuberculosis is a commun-icable disease, but it is also a controllable disease, but it is also a controllable disease. Cooperation between the American people and the agencies devoted to spreading knowledge on the prevention of tuberculosis will result in victory against this great menace to mankind."



Big Business

LOT of the writing and talking that's going on these A days about "big" business seems to miss one pretty important point. In judging bigness solely by such things as number of employees, size of payrolls, or volume of sales, it overlooks the size of the job the particular business is required
