Sgt. Ford Receives Silver Star for Mop Up of Nazi Gunners

sgt. Henry C. Ford, who already holds the Purple Heart Bond Queen Contest for wounds received in action, has been awarded the Silver Standings Listed Star for gallantry in battle on Apr. 17, 1945 near Wippra, Germany, according to an official citation received here last week

Entering the town ahead of their battalion, Sgt. Ford and another member of his motorized combat patrol were subjected to intense enemy small arms fire. Opening fire with their machine guns on the well- defended entrenchments, they forced 12 Germans to leave their dugouts and surrender; then, when the prisoners pointed out the approximate location of a nearby enemy anti-tank gun emplacement, Sgt. Ford and his companion voluntarily exposed themselves to heavy fire to find out the exact location of the gun.

While moving forward they surprised and captured two rocket launcher gunners and upon discovering the anti-tank gun and demanding the surrender of its crew, they killed one of the enemy who attempted to escape and captured the two remaining members.

As stated by the citation, "Sgt. Ford's aggressiveness, initiative, courageous action and devotion to duty contributed materially to the success of the of the United States."



HOW and WHY CHIROPRACTIC METHODS are **DIFFERENT**



Chiropractors use the word adjustment" instead of 'treatment," because the word "adjust" exactly expresses what they do. It means "to make accurate; to bring into a true relative position." Though there was not much to do in the prison camp, Dowell points out that American ingenuity helped solve the problem, with some of the boys, college graduates, teaching courses in their special fields. Also, there was a good library at Stalag Luft III—and then, Lieutenant Dowell adds, "There

was always sleep." "I don't know whether I lost weight or not; the Germans didn't furnish any scales," says Dowell, "But I gained 20 pounds in a hurry after I was released." The liberation of Dowell's camp took place on Sunday, Apr. 29, when units of Patton's Third Army came into Mooseburg.

Following a 60 day leave in Hereford, Lieutenant Dowell will report to Miami Beach, Fla. for reassignment.


