# Economy stayed 'flat' from July-September

WASHINGTON (AP) Revising its national growth figures downward, the government said today the national economy stayed flat in the July-September quarter rather than inching upward as first estimated.

The Commerce Department report also said U.S. corporations' profits rose slightly in the quarter. However, they remained at a low level.

Neither piece of news was likely to surprise government officials and private economists, who are generally agreed that the recession moved into a 16th month in October and may well be continuing yet.

The inflation-adjusted, or

"real," gross national product staved at an annual rate of \$1.478 trillion, the same as in the second quarter, the new report said.

Commerce Department economists had estimated last month - before all

economic data for the third quarter was in - that there had been a gain at an annual rate of 0.8 percent. Since then, officials said newer reports - especially one showing the foreign trade

for the quarter - made it likely real GNP would be revised downward.

Real GNP - the broadest measure of U.S. economic activity - is a figure designed to include all goods and services produced in a given

Before adjustment for inflation, the GNP rose 4.7 percent to a rate of \$3.081 trillion in the quarter.

The profits picture improved only slightly. In the third quarter, the report said:

# Agents break up huge 'speed' ring

(AP) - Federal agents say they have broken a ring that was manufacturing, and distributing millions of dollars worth of methamphetamines, also known as 'speed," in Texas, Louisiana and New Mexico.

Carter said Charles G. Davis, Michael N. Oberski and Norman Richard Epperson were among the defendants arrested Thursday Names of the other defendants would be withheld until all the arrests were made, he

Carter said DOPEC operated since 1978 in Texas, New Mexico and Louisiana and "was formed solely for the purpose of trafficking in the lucrative methamphetamine business.

'It was a close-knit and highly skilled criminal organization consisting of about 50 members throughout the three-state area." Carter

## 'Bunching' plan likely for MX missiles

WASHINGTON (AP) President Reagan is likely to unveil on Monday a longawaited basing plan for the MX missile that calls for bunching the huge weapons closely together in superhardened silos to protect them against a Soviet strike.

The announcement is expected to be made in advance of Reagan's address to the

nation, at 8 p.m. EST Monday, on arms control and defense issues

An administration official, speaking privately, said the MX decision would be announced at the White House and Pentagon, and then Reagan would refer to it during his speech in the context of the administration's overall arms reduction plan.

The president is expected to say the MX is necessary because of a massive Soviet arms buildup over two decades, the official said:

In advance of his speech, Reagan was due to meet today with the general advisory committee of the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency

Officials at the White House and Pentagon said Reagan probably will follow the recommendation of Pentagon research chief Richard DeLauer and the Air Force that 100 MX missiles be deployed in silos spaced only about 1,800 to 2,000 feet apart.

That plan, known as "dense pack," is based on the theory

that the blast and radiation from the first attacking enemy missiles would destroy or disable the trailing missiles in a phenomenon. called "fratricide

Supporters of the plan say the mutual self-destruction of enemy missiles would spare most of the MXs.

Although the White House committed itself to an announcement Monday, there were some indications that the final form of the deployment was still under discussion and that the last wrinkles in the plan might not be ironed out until sometime over the weekend.

Officials who have been working on the MX proposals have been asked to look at varying options for deploying the MX with "deceptive features.'

What this means, said officials who asked to remain anonymous, is that consideration still was being

## Retired retailer 'thanks' employees

ST. CLOUD, Minn. (AP) - A retired department store owner wanted "a nice round number" to thank the employees who helped build his company. He came up with two - 100 checks of \$1,000 each.

What good is money if you don't spread it around and give it to people who have done something good for you?' said 78-year-old G.R. Herberger, who sent out the \$100,000 to current and former employees this week. Herberger, who now lives in Paradise Valley, Ariz.,

founded the St. Cloud-based clothing store bearing his name in 1927 and guided its growth until he sold it to several company executives in 1972. The Herberger's chain grew to include stores in several cities in Minnesota and in North Dakota, South Dakota

Herberger said he thought about thanking his former workers for some time, but said the timing of the checks. mailed Monday and Tuesday, was not significant.

"I've been thinking about it for quite some time and I didn't want to make it a Christmas deal or a Thanksgiving gift or anything like that. I have been awfully close to the people in my organization since its inception," he said

Herberger said he chose 100 as the goal for his thankyou list because "I wanted a nice, round number."

He picked the recipients himself from lists of long-time non-management employees provided by store officials. "When I review my own personal accomplishments,

growth and success over the years, I fully realize the tremendous amount of credit has to be given to people such as yourself," Herberger told one recipient in a letter accompanying the check. Robert Sullivan, the current president of Herberger's,

said more than half the recipients were retired. Although there were no specific criteria, he said none of the employees had worked for the company less than 15 years and some had 40 years of service. Financial status was not a factor, and executives and managers were not included. "It was his gift, not a corporate gift," Sullivan said. One recipient worked with Herberger when he founded

the store in 1927 and retired about 40 years ago, Herberger recalled. Like many other employees, the woman helped him through tough times, Herberger said. 'If somebody gave you a lift way back, then it's

something you should never forget," he said. "I'm trying to show how grateful I am to all of them for what they have done."

'The response has been just sensational," Sullivan said. "One of the gals who's a current employee said, 'I want to buy something that I can look at and remember was a gift from Mr. Herberger. All these years, all I've had in my apartment was a black and white television. I'm going to buy a color TV."

Sullivan said another employee had turned down an in-

vitation to attend a wedding in the South because she couldn't afford it. Now she's going to go, he said.

He said the responses have been "very emotional." "It's emotional for us, too," he added.

### Police to investigate gaps in accounts

LONDON (AP) - Northern Ireland police are investigating the accounts of John De Lorean's bankrupt auto plant in Belfast because funds allegedly are missing, the London Times reported today

It said Sir Kenneth Cork, who was appointed receiver for the plant last February, "has identified several areas from which funds have been lost.

The newspaper said Sir Barry Shaw, Northern Ireland Director of Public Prosecutions, was being kept informed about the investigation.

A few hours before De Lorean was arrested in Los Angeles on Oct. 19, the British government announced it was shutting the De Lorean Motor Co. down. De Lorean, charged with cocaine trafficking and racketeering, is now free on a \$10-million bond.

The company's private debts are estimated at between \$58 million and \$64 million.

The biggest private creditor is the Renault Motor Co. of France, which is owed \$16.4 million for engines.

The British government's investment since 1978 when the company was founded totals \$121.6 million. The plant, which produced futuristic, stainless steel sports cars with gullwing doors, formerly employed 2,600 Irish workers.

The Times said the police investigation was instigated by the Northern Ireland Industrial Development Board, the government agency responsible for monitoring De Lorean

The Times said it did not know the amount of money alleged to be unaccounted for, "but the amount is believed to be large."

Cork announced Oct. 30 that an American firm, Consolidated International Inc., based in Columbus, Ohio, had bought an option to restart production of the sports car at the Belfast

#### Talks resumed in 8-month strike

PORT NECHES, Texas (AP) -Negotiations between union leaders and officials of the B.F. Goodrich synthetic rubber plant are "moving forward" after several weeks away from the bargaining table, officials say.

Talks resumed Wednesday aimed at ending the 8-month strike by 400 pipefitters and machinists, said Bob Straface, manager of employee relations for Goodrich.

"I think you could say we are moving forward," Straface said.

The company held negotiations with machinists last week, but had not met with the pipefitters' union for several weeks.

Straface said no new negotiations were scheduled after Wednesday's 212-hour meeting.

"Right now, we're studying what we talked about yesterday," he said Thursday

Meanwhile, Goodrich officials planned to shut down the plant from 6 p.m. Nov. 20 until about the same time on Nov. 28 because of poor "business conditions," Straface said.

The shutdown also will give supervisory employees a break from their 12-hour-a-day, 7-day-a-week strike schedules.

The plant was closed twice over the summer because of a high inventory, and decreased demand for synthetic rubber compounds.

#### Supply company to close plant

WICHITA FALLS, Texas (AP) - A Johnson & Johnson Inc. subsidiary will shut down its plant here and lay off all 195 employees because of poor conditions in the surgical supply industry, a spokesman said.

Surgikos Inc., which manufactures disposable surgical gowns, surgical supply packs and other surgical items, will transfer operations from its 43,000 square-foot plant here to facilities in El Paso, Texas, and Juarez, Mexico.

Employees were informed several weeks ago the company was considering closing the plant, and were told Thursday the facility would be shut

"It is with regret that we take this action, in light of the splendid cooperation the company has received throughout the years from our employees, local officials and the business community," said Surgikos President Ernst Tanner

We are especially concerned because the effect of this action on our employees, and our first priority is to provide job out-placement assistance," Tanner said. "We will continue our efforts to find new work for employees until the plant is closed.

The company cited "intense" competition and "the difficult general economic climate" as forces behind the closing of the plant, which opened



Games in Los Angeles. 'I have never seen a

foreign team as fluid as these guys. They have excellent agility. Their movements are good. They have tall boys who are wonderful athletes very quick, can jump and

## Controversy over MX missile fired up again

The MX missile controver- according to Defense Departsy has fired up again, this time in Clovis, N.M., where a reported 100 farmers and ranchers gathered Wednesday night to discuss latest developments about a new development system.

The Clovis area has been prominently mentioned, along with a Wyoming site, as the possible location for 'a "dense pack" method of placing the weapons.

About two years ago, residents of Eastern New Mexico and West Texas protested the possible location of an MX system using underground railroad tracks. That proposal failed to materialize

The new deployment idea calls for placing 100 MX missiles about a third of a mile apart, in steel-andconcrete silos. The missiles would be arranged in a rectangle, about one mile wide and about 12 miles long. It up for the missile system.

ment estimates.

At the Clovis meeting, April Moore, coordinator of the Washington-based National Campaign to Stop the MX. said that if the missiles are deployed near Cannon Air Force Base, this area would become a "Nuclear sponge" for the rest of the nation.

Miss Moore added that such a plan would create a hair-trigger response situation, leaving too much chance for an accidental nuclear war, and that she does not believe it is a valid defense system. "We should be spending our money one developing more sea and air-based

Several county Land Owners Associations sponsored the Clovis meeting, and they were opposed because of economic reasons. They don't want to see valuable land torn would cost about \$35 billion. Some were critical of the

area businessmen who support the MX on the basis of the economic impact to the area.

According to the new "USA Today" newspaper, Sen. Ernest Hollings (D-S.C.) will lead a new fight to block funding for production of the MX missile. And Hollings thinks he has enough votes in the Senate to do that.

The newspaper also reported that Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger is expected to back the plan, though he may modify it, and President Reagan has a Dec. 1 deadline to make a recommendation to Congress.

The MX missile is a 98-ton, seven-story intercontinental missile that will carry up to 10 nuclear warheads, each able to strike different targets. It is intended to counter Soviet advances that have produced more accurate and larger missiles.

# Capital is invaded, surrenders to nostalgia

WASHINGTON (AP) -Washington was invaded by foreign armies today. All who saw the columns of troops were immediately overcome by nostalgia and surrendered to childhood memories.

The invaders - 12,000 strong - are antique toy soldiers from the collection of millionaire magazine publisher Malcolm Forbes, 63, who said he bought a squadron or two at an auction 15 years ago and "I just kept adding more, I couldn't resist.

Forbes' battalions went on display in the National Geographic Society's Explorer Hall, where they will remain until Easter.

His collection of 80,000 toy soldiers, the world's largest, is usually kept — "permanently garrisoned," he said — in a palace in Tangier. Morocco, where the Arabic edition of Forbes is publish-

Those troops bivouacking in Washington this winter are displayed in realistic panoramas and dioramas: Aztec warriors in feather regalia battle Cortez' invading troops. The armies of Alexander the Great are locked in combat against the Persians. Rommel's 'motorized

Afrika Korps roars through

the desert. A Norwegian polar expedition, complete with huskies, battles the snow and the cold. Hitler and Mussolini take the salute as the Nazi Wehrmacht parades past the

Fuhrer's mountain retreat.

William Tell takes arrow in

hand to shoot the apple off his

son's head. The collection is under the care of Britons Peter and Anne Johnson. Mrs. Johnson was an antique dealer from whom Forbes bought soldiers. They now spend part of their lives as curators, assembling the collection in

Forbes adds to it, "but by now it is a highly selective draft," says Johnson, who turned his acquired expertise; into a book, "Toy Armies," published last year by Doubleday.

These toys, each individually painted, cost a penny apiece when Forbes was a boy. New ones of comparable individuality might sell now for \$8 each, but rare antique soldiers can command \$200 apiece, Johnson





Construction halted on nuclear power plant

MOSCOW, Ohio (AP) -More than 10 years after construction began, the William H. Zimmer Power Station sits silent on the banks of the Ohio River, a \$1.7 billion nuclear power plant that still isn't finished.

Building the facility has been a decade-long headache for Cincinnati Gas & Electric Co., the plant's manager, and for co-owners Dayton Power & Light Co. and Columbus & Southern Ohio Electric Co.

CG&E has sunk \$680 million into Zimmer, Dayton Power & Light \$535.5 million and Columbus & Southern Ohio \$484.5 million.

And the costs could go even higher, especially after the Nuclear Regulatory Commission last week ordered the utilities to halt all key plant construction because of design flaws.

The NRC said construction can resume only after the commission's regional administrator, James Keppler, is satisfied that design and construction defects have been corrected and that there is little likelihood new ones will be found.

The order is only the latest in a series of problems that have plagued the plant since it was first proposed by Cincinnati Gas & Electric in 1969, with a cost projected at \$240 million.

Utility officials say that since then, the company has been picked to death because the NRC keeps changing its rules. They complain of a change in national attitudes about nuclear power - from an era of naivete during the first generation of nuclear plants to what they call the paranoia that surfaced in the late 1970s.

In May 1971, when site preparation for Zimmer began some 30 miles up the Ohio River from Cincinnati, there were 21 nuclear generating plants operating in the United States, 56 under construction and 37 more planned, according to the Atomic Energy Commission.

Today, there are 76 plants licensed, 74 being constructed and fewer than a half dozen on the drawing boards, the NRC says. Of the 11 plants granted construction permits in 1971-72, all except Zimmer and two other complexes are We were caught, I think,

damaged by being passed through one of these machines. However, excessive exposure to X-ray machines can cause

### How aging changes you

DEAR DR. LAMB - I have read bits and pieces about antisenility drugs. My mother seems to be acquiring symptoms of senility as she forgets more and more, especially short term things. This annoys her but she attributes it to getting old. She lacks appetite at times and feels sad for no apparent reason. It would be nice if life didn't have to be that way for her.

I have read that a person shouldn't accept all sorts of symptoms as just getting old as often there is something in a person's system that is not produced anymore. Are there drugs to replace what a person's system is not producing? What sort of tests does a person have to

DEAR READER - There are lots of exciting things happening in our understanding of aging but we are a long way from being able to stop the changes.

It is quite true that many people have medical problems that are simply glossed over as "senility." That is why a good examination is important. Depression from psychological factors can produce symptoms that can be confused with aging. So can salt and water balance disturbances. And rarely a person may have a vitamin B-12 deficiency. A good place to start is with the family doctor but sometimes it is necessary to see a psychiatrist and a neurologist as well.

There are no magic medicines for aging. If a person is depressed, some medicines help a lot. Gerovital is not a youth drug but does effectively relieve depression in some cases.

The most exciting thing I have seen in research recently is the possibility of grafting cells in the brain that produce acetyl choline, a substance the brain needs for recent memory. Unfortunately, just taking medicines by mouth doesn't guarantee they get to the brain. a "blood-brain" There is barrier that makes this uncertain.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I love yogurt and eat it every week. What are the advantages of it, healthwise? I read an article that said people who eat lots of yogurt live longer. That is not why I eat it. I love it. My husband, who is 72, will not eat it because he thinks it is named after people who practice yoga. Is this true? He is a very dedicated religious man and therefore will

not eat yogurt. DEAR READER Yogurt has been around for centuries. It was made from the milk of sheep, goats and camels before Christ was born and evidently not long after man first was able to become a herdsman. It is not named after people who do yoga. The word yogurt comes from the Turkish language while yoga comes from the Hindu.

It is good food but don't expect yogurt alone to prolong your life. Think of it in the same category as cottage cheese. It has the same values to your health as milk. Some has had some of the fat removed. So it is a good source of complete protein and the calcium so many people need from milk or milk products.






