#### **Phillips Wins Bronze Star**

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, TALY—Staff Sgt. Wayne E. Phillips of Hereford was recently awarded the Bronze Star for heroic achievement in action on the Fifth Army front in northern Italy.

Maj. Gen. Paul W. Kendall, commander of the 88th "Blue Devil" Division, on the day following a night raid in which the action occurred, personally decorated Phillips and 34 other men who had participated in the

As Phillips' platoon advanced against the enemy, it was subjected to intense mortar and artillery fire, which inflicted casualties upon this platoon and disorganized it. Phillips immediately took command of the platoon, reorganized it and continued the advance. When a man in his group was severely wounded, he carried the man through the barrage back to a point where he could be evacuated.

#### Deposits, E **Bonds Make Huge Total**

With almost six million dollars in individual deposits in Hereford banks and with E bond sales since the beginning of the war totaling more than one and one-half million dollars, there is more money in Deaf Smith County today than ever before in history.

Actual figures on bank deposits, show \$5,924,258.53 on deposit in the two Hereford banks as of last month and the total in E bonds sold since the start of "Defense Bond" sales in 1941 is \$1,693,392, making a grand total of \$7,617,650.53 for both bonds and cash.

Some bonds have been cashed, but County War Finance Chairman J. C. Ricketts believes that this figure is not more than ten per cent of total sales, leaving individual bond holdings at a minimum \$1,524,052.80. Bond sales in all series, including E bonds, come to a total of \$2,810, 738.33, but as some of the other bond sales were in tax savings certificates and other shorter maturity bonds, there is no accurate way of knowing how much of the total is still in the hands of the investor.

An engineer-gunner aboard a B-24 Liberator with the 15th Air Force in Italy, the Hereford airman wears the Silver Star in addition to the Air Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster, the Purple Heart and the European theatre service ribbon with two Bronze

Sgt. Fangman was awarded the Silver Star for "heroism beyond and above the call of ordinary duty." On his 20th and last mission, while his group of Libs was raiding enemy installations in the Balkans, his bomber was attacked by more than 50 German fighters over Yugoslavia. In the ensuing battle, Sgt. Fangman shot down one Me-109. The enemy fighters killed two of his crew members and crippled the plane by shooting away the control cables and knocking out two engines. The remaining members of the crew bailed out and along with Sgt. Fangman, fought with Marshal Tito's forces for three weeks before returning to their base in Italy.

Sgt. Fangman was engaged in farming and ranching prior to entering the AAF on Oct. 22, 1942. He served overseas for eight months.

#### **City Bond Vote Set for Tuesday**

Hereford voters next Tuesday, Apr. 10, will accept or reject a bond issue for \$40,000, proposed to finance improvements to the city water system.

According to the proposal of the city commission, the bonds would mature in not more than 40 years and would bear a maximum interest rate of three percent, the interest to be paid semi-annually. If the bonds are approved, the city commission proposes to levy a tax sufficient to pay interest on the bonds and create a sinking fund to redeem them at maturity.

All qualified voters who are owners of property in Hereford will be allowed to vote in the election which will be held at the City Hall.

The proposed bonds would finance improvements to the city water works, including a new well and pumping equipment in the north part of town. Some extension of the sewer system is also planned, the commission-

#### SWP Co. Plan Ready for **Veterans Aid**

Smaller War Plants Corporation, counting strongly on Con-gressional blessings for an exnded life, is ready with a longrange program pledged to bene-fit veterans, Morton Harrison, Dallas, regional SWPC director, said Tuesday.

While Harrison outlined the agency's veteran's loan program and an over-all advisory service to returning GIs, a teletype message from Maury Maverick, na-tional head, came to his desk. It gave the promise of a future to the plan with the news that a House committee had unanimously reported out a bill extending the agency eighteen months to Dec. 31, 1946.

And SWPC officials count on a much longer life for the agency set up to safeguard little business. They expect it to continue either in its present setup or as a branch of the Department of Commerce.

SWPC is ready to help veterans to loans through three programs - recommendations for private business loans to GIs, approval of SWPC loans for manufacturing and food processing, and granting of loans for veteran purchase of surplus government properties.

Heavy Business Seen. Although the agency has made no loans to veterans to date, Harrison anticipates a big money-exchanging business as soon as the inflation block on GI Bill of Rights loans is removed and when veterans are directed to the easy-term SWPC business and surplus property

loans. Under the GI Bill of Rights SWPC recommends veterans for all business loans except day. those handled by banks and loan associations through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. The agency will process about 80 per cent of all such loan recommendations, Harrison pre-







#### Infant's Leather Shoes On Ration List

Shoe rationing will be extend-ed May 1 to include the entire size range of infants' leather shoes—an action taken to help build up critically needed supplies of infants' leather shoes in larger sizes already ration-ed, District OPA Shoe Rationing Officer Oscar J. Walker has an-

At present, rationing covers infants' leather shoes in sizes 4 1-2 to 8, the size range most babies need when they begin to walk. There is an acute shortage of these sizes in many sections of the country. The new provision will put the smaller sizes 0 to 4, which are in relatively plentiful supply and are worn chiefly by infants in arms, on the rationed list beginning May 1.

Largely because sizes 0 to 4 have not been rationed, demand for them has soared out of proportion to actual needs. The result has been that these shoes have absorbed too much of the manpower and production facilities and too much of the scarce types of leather suitable for making the much more urgently needed toddlers' sizes, Walker explained.

It was emphasized that only infants' shoes using leather will adequate to take care of the vet at the walking stage.

Walker also stated that inclusion of the infants' smaller size leather shoes on the rationed list was suggested by the indus-




