

Conference of Churches joins dump fight

The Nuclear Waste Task Force announced here Monday that the Texas. Conference of Churches has joined the NWTF's efforts to oppose the testing, construction, and operation of a high-level nuclear repository in Deaf Smith County.

The announcement came at a news

chairman of the NWTF. Eloise McDougal, a Hereford resident and member of the board of the Texas Conference of Churches, announced the conference unanimously approved the resolution against a repository last week during an annual meeting in Austin

"We are pleased to actively join in

conference called by Delbert Devin, this effort," stated Mrs. McDougal. "Our faith calls all of us to affirm the natural world as God's handiwork and dedicate ourselves to its preservation, enhancement, and faithful use by humankind. This concept of the Deaf Smith site being chosen indicates how little regard the DOE has for these principles. Site characterization must not and will

not happen," she concluded.

The Texas Conference of Churches includes 16 major church bodies of Lutherans, Disciples of Christ, Church of the Brethren, Episcopalians, Religious Society of Friends, Greek Orthodox Church, Presbyterian, Roman Catholics, United Church of Christ, and United Methodist.

Jim Conkwright, a spokesman for a newly-formed opposition group in Hereford, also spoke at the news conference and joined Devin in urging citizens to attend a DOE public meeting here Tuesday and voice opposition to the entire project.

We must speak out in loud and clear terms that we will not tolerate any further intrusion of our area by DOE personnel intent upon making us the dump ground of the nation,' said Conkwright. "We have let Dimmitt and Tulia carry the burden too long in this fight," he added. The new group has yet to adopt a name, but Conkwright said it could decide to join one of the other oppsition groups or work under a new name.

Asked by a newsman if the group would "shun workers" who are scheduled to move here from DOE and Battelle offices in Ohio, Conkwright said, "We hope that is not necessary. The last thing we want to do is hurt people. Our farmers have learned to be stewards of the soil, and they have also learned to be stewards of people."

He added that the workers will "probably get a chilly reception but we're not planning to promote that." Conkwright said his group has not accepted the idea that a site characterization is "inevitable." As a former president of Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, Conkwright said he and others felt "betrayed" that the chamber has not opposed the DOE project.

The chamber has not taken a vote on the issue, said Conkwright, but he said he interpreted the chamber as

being supportive of the proposal by assisting a group of Hereford business people in making a presentation to workers in Columbus last week. "The chamber needs to reflect the thinking of a majority of its members, and I don't think they're doing that on this issue," said Conkwright.

Devin also announced that the fledgling National Nuclear Waste Task Force will be meeting at the Episcopalian Conference Center near Amarillo Thursday and Friday. He said representatives of citizen groups from 13 states and Washington, D.C., have been invited to the conference on nuclear waste problems.

He added that some of the representatives will be attending a

meeting at Hereford Community Center Friday, beginning at 7 p.m.

Devin said the representatives who have responded to the invitation to the Amarillo conference include "the best informed citizen group minds on the problems of storing nuclear waste." He added that they "give up their time and have nothing to gain financially by working on this issue. Their only concern is a safe, secure solution to the problems."

Devin said the NWTF contends there is no safe site at present for the first repository. He said the group has tentatively endorsed "dry cask storage." Contrary to a statement made in Washington, D.C., "farmers here are not lining up to sell their

Citizen group to review Hispanic dropout rates

Concerned Citizens of Deaf Smith County wants to find the causes of a high Hispanic drop-out in Hereford and use that to work toward encouraging Hispanic students to stay in school

At a meeting in the Hereford Community Center on Saturday, about 150 Hispanics and Anglos heard a report which showed that 72 percent of the drop-outs who quit high school last semester were Hispanic surnamed. School district figures show that about 49 percent of the total number of students are Hispanic.

Concerned Citizens asked for the information from the Hereford Independent School District at a board meeting last month in an effort to focus on the problem at this month's Concerned Citizens meeting.

Of the 115 students in grades 10-12 who quit, 83 were Hispanic. Records from the past five years indicate a slight increase in the dropout rate for Hispanics and Anglos. The lowest year for both groups was 1982-83, when 10.08 percent of the students dropped out. The highest was 1985-86, when 14.09 percent of the students quit school. Hispanic dropout rates ranged from 65.26 percent in 1984-85 to 1985-86 when the percentge for Hispanics was at 73.01 percent.

In a film "Hispanic Dropouts: America's Time Bomb", the top five reasons for dropping out of school were listed. Poor grades was the primary reason, followed by quitting school to go to work, having problems at school, getting married, and pregnancy. Helen Cruz of the League of United Latin American Citizens in Amarillo came to present the film. Amarillo schools also are becoming concerned with high Hispanic dropout rates.

The film, produced by Southwestern Bell Telephone, said parents and schools must have the same goals - keeping students in school - to succeed.

Concerned Citizens had also asked the school board to recruit more Hispanic counselors in order to encourage students to stay in school and provide proper motivation.

Concerned citizens also reported that a voter resgistration office had been set up at 206 W. 8th, phone 364-5272, and that 30 voter registrars had been deputized. Bessie Mendoza, making the committee report for Rosalee Salinas, reported 18 candidates had filed in the city and school elections April 4. Voter deputies are also setting up tables throughout town to encourage registration.

Nuclear waste studies only small part of Battelle Institute work

The Hereford delegation which made an informational trip to Columbus, Ohio, was surprised at the huge scope of activity in which Battelle Memorial Institute is involved. As residents of a county which is regarding the possible future placement of a nuclear repository site, we have become familiar with the Battelle name in connection with a sometimes negative image.

Battelle is the research company contracted to perform the site characterization study in Deaf Smith County, however, that is only a small part of what this multi-national company does.

Battelle Memorial Institute began operations in 1929 with 30 employees under the interpretation of a will left by Ohio industrialist, Gordon Battelle. Battelle established a fund to mankind and the Institute is still operated under the instructions found in Gordon Battelle's will.

Today the Institute employs a worldwide staff of 7,716. With operating divisions located in Columbus, Ohio; Frankfurt, West Germany; Geneva, Switzerland; and in Richland, Wash. The Institute also manages specialized facilities in Florida, Massachusetts and Washington. Internationally, Battelle has facilities and consultants in Bonn, London, Milan, Paris, Brussels, The Hague, Rio de Janeiro, Riyadh, Stockholm, Tokyo and Vienna. Battelle specializes in research and development for companies which contract their services in 40

The Battelle Institute operates as a non-profit organization and makes charitable considerable donations-\$959,000 in 1985-to a wide range of educational and community service organizations such as soup kitchens to feed the needy, playground equipment for a children's center and the purchase of equipment needed in diagnosing disabilities for a handicapped children's center.

countries.

The company also encourages the civic mindedness of its employees. Battelle employees are volunteers in United Way, Big Brothers-Big Sister, YMCA, Boy Scouts, and in preparing food baskets and operating drives to collect Christmas gifts for less fortunate families.

Among Battelle's technical contributions to modern day life are the development of the Xerox copier, which is operational and on display at the Columbus office, and the plastic rings which hold your six pack of canned Cokes together.

In 1985, two Battelle Developments- a coating process for the pharmaceutacal industry and a oftware program designed to assist in genetic engineering, were listed in Science Digest magazine as two of "100 Top Innovations." That same year Battelle also received awards ssing now in commer-

cial use for manufacturing alloys and ceramics. Battelle staff patented over 104 inventions in 1985.

Their problem-solving research has led to the development of BASIS software program which automates the storage and retrieval of information. Other Battelle research is concerned with laser processing of metal-forming tools, a multisolid fluidized bed steam generator, an abrasion-resistant coating to protect automobile surfacies, a biobarrier

Court rejects housing proposal

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas prison system cannot temporarily house inmates at three sites that include a National Guard camp, the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals has ruled.

The decision came Monday as Texas Department of Corrections officials announced the prison system was back below the 95-percent capacity limit and would reopen today. The prisons had been closed since last Thursday.

Texas sought permission last fall to move inmates from overcrowded cells to the Fort Wolters National Guard camp near Mineral Wells, a prison hospital unit at Galveston and to exceed 95-percent capacity at the Wynne prison unit at Huntsville.

U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice refused to grant permission, and the appeals court agreed with him.

"Of course, we are disappointed that the court disallowed the temporary use of these facilities, but we knew there was a strong likelihood the court would rule as it did," Attorney General Jim Mat-

He added, however, that the New Orleans appeals court did have some good news for Texas in its opinion.

Mattox said Justice Robert M. Hill, in a concurring opinion, suggested that federal courts "should be more flexible in allowing modification of consent decrees in ongoing prison reform litigation."

Mattox said the ruling will have no effect on the state's appeal of a Dec. 31, 1986, contempt citation against Texas by Judge Justice, who has threatened to fine the state \$800,500 a day unless prison reforms

National² Study warns of danger from Israel

WASHINGTON (AP) - Israel may have acquired enough nuclear weaponry "to level every urban center in the Middle East" with a population of over 100,000, according to a study released today.

The report also cautions that if rebel governments take power in either South Africa or Pakistan and gain control of existing nuclear technology, the result could be "one of the gravest dangers of the

The warnings are contained in the third annual report on global nuclear proliferation by the Carnegie Endowment for International

Written by a Carnegie associate, Leonard S. Spector, the report also discloses that the shah of Iran, shortly before his ouster in 1979, initiated work on a nuclear weapons research program that presumably has been inherited by the government of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini.

But Iran is still far short of a nuclear weapons capability, partly because the United States rejected the shah's request for enough research reactor fuel to build at least one bomb, the report says. A State Department official said he had no information about that

Spector, who has worked on nuclear issues for more than 10 years, discusses the proliferation question in apocalyptic terms.

The study, titled "Going Nuclear," says at the outset, "Like the superpowers' nulcear arsenals, the continuing spread of nuclear weapons to additional nations poses incalculable risks to the world community."

Racist sentenced to 18 years

SAN DIEGO (AP) - A white man who admitted burning a cross on a black family's lawn and sending it racist hate mail has been sentenced to 18 years in prison under federal civil-rights and drug

Michael Eugene Maas, 28, was also fined \$800,000 on Monday by U.S. District Judge Earl Gilliam.

Maas pleaded guilty in October to five federal charges, four of them stemming from harassment which drove the black family from its Normal Heights home.

Under terms of a plea bargain, Maas admitted putting a burning cross on the family's front lawn, setting fire to their pickup truck, leaving a racist hate letter in their mailbox, and threatening to kill his ex-girlfriend if she revealed his role in the incidents.

In addition, Maas pleaded guilty to a charge of possessing and manufacturing methamphetamine.

"Being sorry is not enough," Maas said in a statement before the sentencing. "I realize I need help. I wish to become an asset to society rather than the deficit I have been."

Maas is already serving a nine-year sentence for breaking his exgirlfriend's arms with a spiked baseball bat and attacking a black man with a machete.

International = Militias evacuating in West Beirut

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Warring Druse and Shiite Amal militias evacuated west Beirut today and Syrian peace-enforcing troops moved into their abandoned strongholds under a truce reached among militia and government leaders. A long truck convoy carrying fighters of Druse warlord Walid

Jumblatt's Progressive Socialist Party rolled out of their Jall el-Bahr main barracks at first light. They headed for his stronghold in the Chouf mountains southeast of Beirut. Truckloads of militiamen of Justice Minister Nabih Berri's Shiite

Moslem Amal were seen leaving the 40-story Morr Tower overnight and heading southward, presumably to Shiite suburbs.

The Syrians completed their deployment in the unfinished skyscraper at daybreak, police said.

The building, the capital city's tallest, commands the Green Line that splits Beirut into Moslem and Christian sectors. It long had been Amal's main base in the city.

Latin countries rethink policies

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) - Latin American nations, which owe a total of \$350 billion to foreign creditors, are rethinking their debt policies in light of Brazil's suspension of payments on most of its \$108 billion foreign debt.

Even the most moderate governments are coming to the conclusion long expressed by Cuba's president Fidel Castro that the Latin American debt is simply unpayable.

President Jose Sarney of Brazil, a centrist civilian, announced Friday his government was halting indefinitely its loan repayments to foreign banks. He said this was necessary to avoid "political instability, recession, unemployment and social chaos."
Brazil is the Third World's biggest debtor.

Sarney insisted his action was "not confrontation." He argued his country must buy time to negotiate more favorable repayment terms, mainly with about 750 American, Canadian, European and Japanese private banks that hold more than \$70 billion of the Brazilian debt.

In Mexico, Latin America's No. 2 debtor with about \$100 billion in tstanding loans, Treasury Secretary Gustavo Petricioli defended Brazil's action as a "perfectly valid, accepted clause in financial

and debt restructuring agreements."

Petricioli warned that if the international financial community does not "cooperate" with Latin debtors, the entire lender-borrower

"We can't wait forever to have a national debate and go through congressional action," Clements said. "I think this has to be done by executive order."

Americans' consumption of Persian Gulf oil grew from 6 percent in 1985 to 15 percent last year, the highest percentage since 1981. Foreign oil imports accounted for 36 percent of consumption in the U.S. last year.

In addition, the price of oil has dropped by nearly two-thirds in the last year, devastating the economies

of oil-producing states and driving many oil-related industries out of business

"I think the issue that is concerning the people across the country on a national basis is a stabilized (oil) price," Clements said. "The wild gyrations - from \$25 to \$9 - it's not good for anybody. It's not good for us in Texas, it's not good for the fuel users on the Northeastern coast, it's not good for industry."

Clements said his floor and ceiling plan would help stabilize prices and go a long way to solving the nation's dependence on foreign oil.

DR. GOTT Going beyond appearances...

No matter how bad your problem is, it could be worse. Some people just can't win for losing. For instance, consider the most recent case of espionage in France. 

Ann Landers AIDS

DEAR ANN LANDERS: Can a person get AIDS from being bitten by a mosquito? We know that malaria is transmitted this way. I'm looking to you for a straight answer. Even my own doctor hems and haws Thanks, Ann. - FORT SMITH, ARK.

DEAR F.S.: According to the American Council on Science and Health, there is no evidence that AIDS can be transmitted by mosquitoes, or any other insect. If this were possible, many more cases would show up among school-age children and the elderly.

AIDS, the fatal disease that cripples the immune system, is found mainly among homosexual and bisexual men (about 74 percent). IV drug users account for 17 percent. Hemophiliacs who picked up the virus in tainted blood transfusions make up about 5 percent. Heterosexuals who are not drug users or hemophiliacs account for 4 percent of all AIDS cases.

The Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta predict that during the year 1991 there will be an estimated 145,000 living Americans with AIDS, and 54,000 will die in one year. This means more people will die of AIDS than in automobile accidents. Currently each AIDs patient requires approximately \$147,000 of hospital

The best way to protect yourself against AIDS is to stay away from prostitutes, be monogamous and have a monogamous sex partner. If there is any doubt about the faithfulness of your partner, a contom should be used.



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

Write notes on household chores

DEAR POLLY — To eliminate frustration when doing household chores, write notes! Usually no one is around when you find the wet towel on the bedroom floor or the tissue in the dryer or the faucet that still drips. Writing a constructive note to the person involved frees you to pick up the towel, etc., without feeling resentful and angry.

It's also a good way to remind people of appointments or tasks that come to mind at 10 a.m. when the person involved won't be home until dinner time. You can "handle" situations without waiting. It also makes your message clearer and eliminates nagging and complaining, and it makes you feel better to get things off your chest as they occur.

(Also: To make meatballs without the mess of frying, simply spray a cookie sheet with non-stick cooking spray and place the meatballs on the sheet. Bake at 375 for eight to ten minutes, depending on the size of the meatballs. This will brown them. They can then be added to your sauce and cooked as usual.) — SHEILA

DEAR SHEILA — A calm, objective note can go a lot farther in encouraging family members to change unacceptable behavior than yelling, nagging or sarcastic remarks. Do be

sure, however, that the note is brief, to the point and not nasty, recriminating or accusatory. For example, "Wet towels belong in the hamper" is far more effective than "If you ever leave a wet towel on the floor again, you're grounded for life!" 

In state Special Olympics tournament

Hereford team wins north zone championship

The Hereford Satellite Work Training Center's basketball team won the Texas state Special Olympics north zone championship last Friday and Saturday in Waco.

The Hereford team won the gold medal for the class 2A masters divi-

sion. The 1987 tournament was the largest ever for the north zone, with more than 700 participants on 81 teams, reports Jerry Brock, who coached the Hereford team. The tournament was held at Baylor University.

On Friday, Hereford defeated the Wheeler Bandanas 23-15 in a firstround game, and beat Sweetwater 27-23 in the semifinals.

On Saturday, the championship game was tied 10-10 at halftime before Hereford went on to defeat the Midland Hounds 32-17.

Members of the Hereford Satellite Work Training Center's basketball team are: Mitch Merritt, Jerry Hall, Travis Johnson, Jessie Galan, Roger Garcia, Joe Brown, Mary Ann Brown, and Kip Redwine.

The top three teams from the north zone and the south zone will compete for the overall state championship in May. That tournament will be held at Austin.

Other Texas Panhandle teams that placed in the north zone tournament were Pampa, third in the class 1A senior division, and Borger, second in the class 1A masters division.

In the 25-15 victory over Wheeler, Hereford was led by Garcia with eight points, including four of four free throws. Hall scored six points, Mary Ann Brown scored three points, and Joe Brown, Galan and Johnson each scored two points.

Hereford's semifinal opponent Sweetwater, was the favored team of the tournament, Brock noted.

Hereford trailed Sweetwater 8-6 after one quarter of play, and Hereford moved ahead 15-10 in the second quarter.

Sweetwater closed the gap to two points, 21-19, in the third quarter. The fourth quarter was a defensive

Sweetwater tied the game at 23-23 after stealing the ball from Hereford. With one minute left, Garcia was fouled and made both free throws in a one-and one. A steal by Hereford resulted in the other basketball of the game, giving Hereford its four-po win, 27-23.

Hall was high scorer for Hereford with 12 points. Garcia and Johnson each scored six points, and Galan added three points.

The championship game saw Hereford and Midland tied 6-6 at the end of the first quarter and tied 10-10 at halftime.

game will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for students.

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
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Men's basketball tourney is under way
