WASHINGTON (AP) - Financial agriculture has been widepread during some parts of every decade since World War I," says Terry Townsend of the Agriculture Department's Economic Research Service. "The Great Depression began for agriculture in 1920 and continued until World War II."

He added: "During the late 1940s, the 1950s and the 1960s, two-price programs, acreage allotments, marketing quotas and the Soil Bank were used in various times to help improve life on the farm while disposing of surpluses and limiting government outlays. Even the boom in exports in the early 1970s provided only temporary respite.

And by 1978, long before the current slide in land values and farm assets, some disgruntled farmers were protesting government policies by parading their tractors along Washington streets and picketing on Capitol Hill.

Thus, the financial stress in agriculture during the 1980s, while severe, continues a decades-old trend," Townsend said.

"Events such as government agricultural policy, the relative strengths of currencies, oil prices, or droughts and floods do influence financial conditions," he said.

'However, the persistent causes of financial stress are agricultural labor productivity, which is rising faster than consumption, and too many resources devoted to global agricultural production in relation to effective demand."

While Townsend's observation is not new, it does help point out the nagging agricultural problem faced by farmers and policymakers. And there is much more evidence of trouble down on the farm - historical and recent - if more is required.

For decades, he said, the average disposable per capita income of Americans in general has exceeded that of farm people.

"The gap between these two incomes averaged about \$2,500 (in 1982 dollars) during the 1930s, and has widened by about \$100 per year since then," Townsend said in a forthcoming report. "In 1986, disposable income per capita in the United States climbed to about \$10,800 (in 1982 dollars), while net farm income per farm resident was only about half of

It was the income gap that has contributed to the farm exodus since the start of World War II, he said.

"With a diminishing farm labor

#### Mayor fishin', city disincorporates

CRYSTAL BEACH, Texas (AP) - Unless Mayor Bill Stirling returns from a fishing trip by noon today it may be too late to save his city from being dissolved by voters in an April election.

While Stirling is casting away somewhere, Mayor Pro Tem Al Altemus Wednesday instructed City Clerk Lynda Hodges to place on the April ballot a proposal to disincorporate.

Furthermore, Altemus instructed the clerk to make the proposal a

binding issue and send the ballot to the printer in Houston by noon. Three weeks ago, a group of citizens favoring dissolving the town gave Stirling a petition signed by about 450 of the town's approximate 1200 citizens. The petition called for the mayor to place the

proposal on the ballot immediately. Stirling agreed to put the issue on the ballot, but only as a nonbinding referendum that council could choose not to enact.

#### Overcrowding closes Texas prisons

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) - For the sixth time this year, the Texas prison system's gates are closed after a flood of new inmates pushed the population over a state-mandated cap, prison officials

The closing may force Gov. Bill Clements to declare another state of emergency, which would grant up to 90 days of "good time" to about 200 non-violent inmates and enable the prisons to slip beneath the 95-percent mark.

Clements' actions under the Prison Management Act last week allowed 187 convicts to be released Sunday to halfway houses throughout the state.

"The ball's in his court," prison spokesman David Nunnelee said Wednesday. "But it looks like we're going to have to use it again."

A spokesman for Attorney General Jim Mattox said prison officials notified Mattox of the shutdown Wednesday, and he in turn officially notified Clements.

The latest headcount in the 26-unit Texas Department of Corrections showed 38,496 inmates, or 95.20 percent — 82 inmates over the

#### Bush advocates alcohol-based fuels

WASHINGTON (AP) - Vice President George Bush supports development of a long-range energy policy, including a switch from gasoline to alcohol-based fuels to address environmental, economic and national security problems.

Bush envisions a day early in the 21st century when the nation's transporation system will operate almost exclusively on alcohol fuels, either methanol, made from natural gas and coal, or ethanol, distilled from corn and other crops.

"EPA has studied for several years the use of alcohols instead of gasoline or diesel fuel as a way of achieving significant reduction in air pollution." Bush said in a letter sent this week to Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Lee M. Thomas.

"The use of ethanol blends, for example, can produce significant reductions in carbon monoxide. Moreover, expanding commercial fleet use of methanol in cars, diesel trucks and buses could similarly provide significant reduction in ozone and fine particulate matter emissions, especially in California."

#### Reagan comeback only on first step

WASHINGTON (AP) - Supporters and critics alike say President Reagan has taken only a first step along the comeback trail with his acceptance of full responsibility for the Iran arms deal that eroded faith in his leadership.

"This isn't behind him yet, but it's a start," Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., said of Reagan's 12-minute, nationally broadcast address Wednesday night. The speech was part of a campaign to revitalize Reagan's presidency with new aides, an olive branch to Congress and a promise to pay closer attention to running the government.

In his first response to the Tower commission report on his management of the National Security Council, Reagan expressed anger, disappointment and distaste for the Iran-Contra affair but offered no new insights into how it happened. And he said others will have to find answers to the whereabouts of payments from the arms

"As the Tower board reported, what began as a strategic opening to Iran deteriorated in its implementation into trading arms for hostages," Reagan said. "This runs counter to my own beliefs, to administration policy and to the original strategy we had in mind.

"There are reasons why it happened, but no excuses. It was a mistake," the president said.

Reagan acknowledged some of the harsh criticism the Tower commission leveled last week at his hands-off management style.

"Let's face it, my style didn't match its previous track record," Reagan said. "I have already begun correcting this."

Nonetheless, members of Congress said misgivings may linger

about Reagan. "The American people are forgiving, but I'm not sure they're going to change their perception of his ability to run the country," said Sen. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark.

Others said this speech should have been delivered long ago. Indeed, the address indicated how far Reagan's position has changed since last Nov. 6, when he declared that stories about secret arms sales to Iran had "no foundation."

#### Proof of age required in bars

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Mexico (AP) - Bar patrons in this border city will be required to show proof of age as officials here mount a campaign to crack down on liquor sales to minors.

Beginning Friday, some 30 plainclothes inspectors will be asking customers in the city's 460 bars, discotheques, nightclubs and liquor stores for identification that shows they are over the legal drinking age of 18.

'We hope to obtain two things - tranquility and safety," said David Martinez, director of the Juarez Commerce Department.

For years, young people have crossed over from El Paso, Texas, to patronize Juarez nightspots because the drinking age was rarely

When New Mexico raised its drinking age to 21, students from the New Mexico State University in Las Cruces would drive 45 minutes south to El Paso bars. But when Texas raised its drinking age from 19 to 21 last fall, New Mexico and El Paso youngsters simply hopped across the border to Juarez.

Not only is Juarez easy accessible, the exchange rate between the Mexican peso and the dollar makes it very cheap to spend a night on

The patrolling inspectors will visit all establishments, including those in the tourist zones, Martinez said. Bar and nightclub owners face stiff penalties and possible closure if they violate the law.

Juarez Mayor Jaime Bermudez said last week the city was conidering restrictions on alcohol sales since much of the crime occurs after 2 a.m and is often alcohol-related.

AUSTIN (AP) - A bill that would make it a minor crime to drink while driving has cleared a Senate committee again, with sponsor Bill Sarpalius hoping the third time is a charm.

> The State Affairs Committee sent the measure to the Senate on an 8-0 vote Wednesday.

> Sarpalius, D-Amarillo, said a similar bill had been approved by Senate committee in two previous legislative sessions and once was OK'd by the full Senate.

Representatives of Mothers Against Drunk Driving, Students Against Drunk Driving, Texas PTA, Texas Medical Association, Texas Baptist Christian Life Commission and law enforcement organizations were among a dozen witnesses supporting Sarpalius' bill.

No one testified against the proposal, which provides a fine of up to \$200 for the offense of drinking while

"This state will never get serious" about drunk driving until we make it against the law to drink and drive," Sarpalius said.

He added that there are very few countries in the world that allow drinking and driving, and in some the penalty is life in prison, "but in Texas it's legal to drink and drive so long as your seat belt's on."

Director Jim Adams of the Department of Public Safety said Texas traffic deaths reached an all-time high of 4,701 in 1981, and a task force was appointed to bring that figure down. By 1985, after stronger DWI laws were enacted, the number of traffic deaths dropped to 3,682, and a further reduction - perhaps 3 percent - is expected for 1986.

#### Kids learn CPR as part of class

Health and safety are usually part of fifth and sixth grade lesson plans, however, those students at St. Anthony's School went a bit further and learned to save lives.

Most of them are now cardcardio-pulmonary carrying resuscitators

They are the youngest and largest group that Deaf Smith County Red Cross director Betty Henson has ever taught a complete CPR lifesaving course.

"Kids are always receptive to new

ideas," Henson said. She gave the students the same course taught to adults and administered the same standard written test required to obtain the official CPR card.

The children all had to be examined in action with baby, child and adult dummies used in the course.

"I thought it might be hard to hit a

baby," commented Chris Kimball, a sixth grader in Mrs. Beth Igal's class. "I never thought I'd pass."

Chuck Lindeman, a fifth grader, thought babies were the easiest, though. The only complaint was that the alcohol, used to clean the dummy mouths between each person using it, tasted terrible.

And the thought of putting a mouth over a baby's nose wasn't very desirable either. But that might not be necessary after going through all the steps to look for obstruction of the airway, checking for breathing and giving the baby a certian kind of hit on the back to clear the throat.

Henson said she gives two to three CPR classes a month and wants to emphasize the importance of it during March, since it is Red Cross Month. For information on the classes, contact Henson at 364-3761.





Michael Jordan says Wilt Chamberlain's NBA record of scoring 100 points in a game is still an impossible dream. But the Chicago Bulls' star does feel he's capable of scoring more than the 61 points he ran up on the Detroit Pistons.

Jordan lit up the Pontiac Silverdome Wednesday night, setting an arena record and breaking the Bulls' regular-season single-game scoring mark as Chicago pulled out a 125-120 overtime victory over the Detroit

It was the second time in one week that Jordan broke the Bulls' singlegame scoring mark. He had 58 points Feb. 26 against New Jersey. His alltime NBA high is 63 points against the Boston Celtics last April 20 in the playoffs.

The previous Silverdome record was 56 by former Piston Kelly Tripucka against the Bulls on Jan. 29, 1983.

Jordan said he is capable of doing

"I hate to put a limit on what I can do," he said. "I just want to improve

But despite his recent outbursts, both Jordan and Bulls Coach Doug Collins said the Chicago guard is not a threat to match Chamberlain's

mark, set 25 years ago. "That's impossible with the way the game has changed," said Jordan, the NBA scoring leader, who has scored 40 or more points 27 times this season, "Scoring whatever I scored tonight was tough enough," Jordan

'Nobody's going to score 100 points today, not with the way defenses are," said Collins.

Jordan scored a club-record 26 points in the fourth quarter, breaking his old mark of 22.

He scored Chicago's first 13 points in the fourth period and had 57 by the end of regulation time, which ended in a 111-111 tie.

Jordan made 22-of-39 field goal attempts and was 17-of-18 from the free-throw line.







## Here's what new W-4 form is all about

one tax-withholding form that every taxpayer can use is akin to making a suit of clothes that fits everybody, the head of the Internal Revenue Service says.

It can't be done, the IRS has concluded. As a result, taxpayers soon will have a choice of withholding forms: the imposing four-page W-4 that was made public last November and the semi-sleek W-4A that was unveiled Monday by Commissioner Lawrence B. Gibbs.

Here are some questions and answers about the forms:

Q. What was wrong with the November version?

A. Everything, critics say. It was too complex, written in legalese, with a mind-boggling 24-columnwide table of figures.

Q. And the new one?

A. Simpler and shorter. The IRS says half of all wage-earners will be able to fill out the form in as little as five minutes. They won't have to go beyond six brief paragraphs of instructions, a seven-line worksheet and the seven-line form itself.

Q. So why didn't the IRS give us the W-4A to start with?

## Accent on Health

Some 10,500 animal specimens, the disease, and it is remotely possifrom armadillos to zebras, were tested at the Texas Department of Health (TDH) for rabies last year. Of these, 470 were found to carry the

disease. Although no human cases of rabies were reported in Texas during 1986, Dr. Foy V. McCasland, chief of the TDH Bureau of Veterinary Public Health, said the disease is a continuing threat to people. He warned that anyone with pets, or who frequently works with domestic animals, should see that the animals are vaccinated annually, as the law prescribes.

He also warned against adopting wild animals as pets. Wild animals are the most frequent carriers of rabies, and there are no approved rabies vaccines for them, Dr. Mc-Casland explained. He said that although a wild animal may be vaccinated with the same shots used for dogs and cats, the vaccine may or may not be effective. "A wild animal, sooner or later, is likely to bite or scratch its owner," he added.

Wild animals, chiefly skunks and bats, constitute about 90 percent of all rabies cases confirmed by THD. Dr. McCasland said that most cases of domestic animal infection can be traced to contact with rabid wild animals

Testing for rabies in Texas is conducted exclusively in health department laboratories in Austin, Houston, San Antonio, and El Paso. In 1986, these laboratories confirmed rabies in 275 skunks, 132 bats, 14 dogs, 14 cows, 13 cats, 11 foxes, three bobcats, three horses, two coyotes, a raccoon, a goat, and a sheep.

other rodents are not considered to

be rabies threats to humans because of their characteristics. "Although

they may not bite, they may carry

rabies by handling them," Dr. Mc-Casland explained. Most areas of Texas have effective animal control units to enforce vac-

ble for a person to be exposed to

cination laws for domestic animals. These units also care for or remove sick and dangerous wild animals. But some rural counties and those bordering Mexico, where vaccination laws are less stringent, are the most frequent areas for rabies outbreaks. In these areas, Dr. Mc-Casland cautions all pet owners to keep vaccinations up-to-date and all persons to avoid any animals unlikely to have had shots.

He added that veterinarians usually take rabies immunizations every two years because of the likelihood of their exposure to the disease, and TDH further urges trappers, who may skin a variety of wild animals, and spleunkers, who may encounter bats in caves, to be immunized, also.





#### Surgery didn't correct problem

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT - My gallbladder was removed 10 years ago. The surgery was supposed to correct the "instant diarrhea" problem I had. It didn't. What could cure this?

DEAR READER - Sudden, uncontrollable diarrhea usually is due to a bowel disorder rather than to gallbladder disease. It can be caused by intestinal spasm, infection, colitis, medications and diet - to mention a few possibilities. Check with your doctor (or, if necessarý, a gastroenterologist) to find out why you still have problems.

DEAR DR. GOTT - What can one do for a spastic esophagus? Mine was seen "reaching out and grabbing"

during X-rays DEAR READER — The esophagus is a muscular tube that transports material from the mouth to the stomach. The esophagus contracts to propel food downward. Like any muscular organ, it can sometimes go into spasm and cramp. This causes indigestion, a "lump in the throat" or difficulty swallowing.

Spastic esophagus is common, troublesome and often worsened by stress and emotional tension. Treatment is directed toward helping patients to relax. Doctors may use anti-spasmodic medications to relieve esophageal cramps. Patients may be helped by avoiding very spicy food and learning to tolerate the occasional disturbing sensation produced by this functional disorder.

DEAR DR. GOTT - I have a nephew, 26, who is quite handsome but allows his lower jaw to drop. I can understand this in a small child but not in an adult. I haven't mentioned it to him, but once I read your recommendation, I will bring it to his attention so he can take the necessary corrective action.

DEAR READER - I'm not sure how much effect my comments (or your urgings) will have on a handsome 26-year-old. However, if he is like the rest of us, he probably will make an effort to tighten up his slack jaw if he is told that his habit spoils his appearance.

I'd approach this problem gingerly by saying something like "Look, I don't want to make a big issue out of this, but I've notice that you tend to let your jaw drop. You're an attractive guy, and I just thought you'd like to know that this habit detracts from your good looks." It seems to me that he needs less "corrective action" than some good old-fashioned feedback that will make him aware of a problem. Whether he does anything about it is his business

DEAR DR. GOTT - Does heavy lifting cause hemorrhoids? What What specialist should I see about hemorrhoids?

DEAR READER - A hemorrhoid is a stretched (dilated) vein in the anal area. The vein may have a blood clot within it (thrombosis) that causes pain. When an anal vein distends, it causes discomfort or itching and can be seen (and felt) as a firm lump. Sometimes hemorrhoids bleed.

Hemorrhoids are caused by excessive straining, chronic bowel problems and irritating effects (such as sitting for prolonged periods on cold, hard, surfaces).

Your family doctor is your first resource for hemorrhoidal diagnosis and treatment. He or she can refer

DEAR DR. GOTT - What could cause bright red spots on the tongue? DEAR READER - Red spots on the tongue occur with certain infections (including herpes and typhoid), in malnutrition and in blood disorders (such as leukemia). Red spots also can have common causes: mouthwashes, cinnamon or peppermint gum, spicy

foods and the use of tobacco products. DEAR DR. GOTT - I took Norinyl for 17 months while breast-feeding my first child 10 years ago. Could this have caused any problems then or

DEAR READER - Norinyl is an oral contraceptive; its manufacturer says that it - like all oral contraceptives - should not be taken by nursing mothers. The drug can interfere with lactation, alter the quality of the milk and be excreted into the milk. There have been no reports on the effects that this practice might have on breast-fed infants.

DEAR DR. GOTT - My mother has a lump on the top of her right foot that causes pain when she walks. The orthopedist says the lump is too small to treat. What can she do for the pain? DEAR READER - If your mother can feel a lump and it is painful, it is not too small to treat. This might be a cyst or an infection that can be injected or easily removed surgically.

DEAR DR. GOTT - I have small white things behind my tonsils. I think that is what causes my bad breath, but the doctor doesn't. What do you

DEAR READER - The "small white things" you describe probably represent exudate (infected material) around or within the tonsils. This is a common problem that can cause horribly bad breath and an unpleasant taste in the mouth. Unfortunately, this chronic tonsil infection does not respond to antibiotics. I think that your doctor is incorrect. Ask for a referral to an ear, nose and throat specialist. Tonsillectomy may be the swiftest and easiest cure for your problem.

DEAR DR. GOTT - I had an aortic-valve implant a year ago. Now I can't pass the driver's license test without glasses, but my ophthalmologist says there's nothing wrong with my eyes. Did the operation cause op-

tic-nerve blockage to one of my eyes? DEAR READER - No, it did not: The aortic-valve replacement did not

cause you to need glasses. On occasion, emboli (small pieces of blood clot) can form around aortic valves, break off and be carried to the brain's visual center. This can cause an unmistakable and profound loss of vision, usually in one eye.

However, the type of eye problem ou describe is most likely due to changes caused by age within the eyes themselves. Ask your ophthalmologist for another opinion or another

examination. DEAR DR. GOTT - Will cigarette smoking cause wrinkling due to capillary restriction in the skin?

DEAR READER Cigarette smoking has been reported to increase the speed and extent of facial wrinkling. Some experts believe that these changes may result from the effects of nicotine on the collagen supports within the skin.

DEAR DR. GOTT - I have been having pain in my left arm, difficulty breathing, pressure in my chest and numb left fingers. Is this angina? It gets worse when I get upset.

DEAR READER - The symptoms you describe could be caused by angina (heart-muscle cramp due to insufficient oxygen). You should be examined by a doctor for two reasons.

First, if you are having angina, you can be helped by medicine. You will feel better and may be able to ward off a more serious heart condition. Angina usually is a warning that a heart attack will occur in the future.

Second, you may not be having angina. Lung problems, pinched nerves in the neck and peptic ulcer can mimic anginal symptoms.

# POLLY'S

Warm up the pot for perfect tea

By Polly Fisher

DEAR POLLY - I received a gift of some imported loose-leaf tea. Since I've never used anything other than tea bags, I'm not sure how much loose tea to use to brew a pot of tea. Can you help? - LINDA

DEAR LINDA - Start with onehalf teaspoon tea per cup. You may find that you'll need to increase or decrease that for subsequent pots according to how strong you like your tea and how strong the type of tea is. Brewing loose-leaf tea is quite simple and many tea drinkers think it tastes better than tea bags. In case you're unsure of the technique, here's a little lesson in basic tea preparation.

Begin with freshly drawn water. If your tap water is laden with minerals or has an unpleasant odor or flavor, use bottled water. Bring the water to a full rolling boil in a kettle. Bring the teapot close to the boiling kettle and preheat the teapot by pouring in a little boiling water, then discarding it. This assures that the water will be at the boiling point when it comes in contact with the tea.

Into the warmed, dry teapot, put approximately one-half teaspoon loose-leaf tea for each cup of water. If desired, you may use a tea ball to contain the leaves, but traditionally, the tea is simply placed in the bottom of the teapot. Again bringing the tea pot to the kettle (so the water doesn't lose its boil), pour in the desired amount of boiling water. Stir once and allow the tea to steep for three to five minutes. Do not let the tea brew too long, for it can become bitter.


You may pour the tea through a tea strainer into the cups if you wish to

estrain out the loose tea leaves. You should then have the perfect cup of tea! - POLLY

DEAR POLLY - I love frozen bananas, but find that they are hard to peel when frozen. Can bananas be frozen after peeling? Will they turn black if peeled before freezing?

ALISON DEAR ALISON - You may freeze bananas either peeled or unpeeled. If wrapped in an airtight freezer-proof plastic bag or foil, the bananas will not turn dark while frozen. It is very hard to peel frozen bananas, so I really recommend peeling them first, then popping them in zip-style freezer

Although frozen bananas are a popular treat, not many people know you can make a really delicious ice cream substitute from them. Cut the frozen bananas into chunks, then process them in a food processor. (You can use a blender as well, but you can only do a small amount at one time in it.) Process the bananas until they are smooth and creamy with a texture similar to soft-serve ice cream. This will take a couple of minutes. It helps to stop the machine occasionally and push the bananas, which tend to clump up on top of the blade, down into the work bowl. When the mixture is smooth and creamy, serve it imme-
