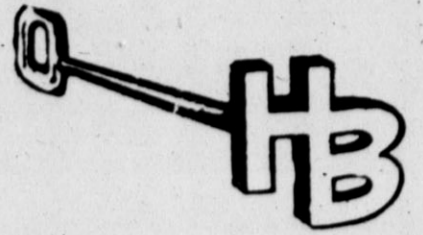

## Reagan defends arms deal policy, ignores criticism

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, at a news conference judged by Democrats and Republicans alike as a deft performance, ignored criticism from the Tower commission and defended anew his arms-to-Iran policy as being "right in the beginning."

Reagan left the impression Thursday night that he and Vice President George Bush disagree over whether Bush had opposed the covert sales of arms to Iran.

Bush has said key officials knew he harbored "certain reservations" about the deal, but Reagan used a single word — No — when asked if Bush had ever voiced an objection.

Reagan's news conference, his first in four months, was considered crucial in his campaign to regain his footing after the Iran-Contra uproar shook his administration and caused his popularity to plummet.

"He was his old self," enthused Sen. Alan K. Simpson, R-Wyo., who a day earlier had berated the news media for questioning Reagan and trying "to stick it in his gazo."

Sen. Howell Heflin, D-Ala., said Reagan was "calm, cool and collected," and Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., said the president "was much better prepared than he was at his last news conference. I think that helps him a great deal." Heflin and Nunn are on the Senate committee investigating the secret sale of arms to Iran and possible diversion of payments to the Nicaraguan Contras.

Reagan appeared at ease and in control throughout 30 minutes of questioning.

While not offering any revelations about the Iran-Contra affair, Reagan acknowledged his policy amounted to an arms-for-hostages swap.

"I would not go down that same road again," he pledged.

However, he said it was not until he read the Tower report — released

Feb. 26 — that he realized his strategy for the Iranian initiative "had disappeared completely, and led by the Iranians, the conversation was totally arms-for-hostages deals."

Reagan insisted his policy was intended to open a channel for better relations between the United States and Iran. The Tower commission had rejected that rationale, saying, "Whatever the intent, almost from the beginning the initiative became in fact a series of arms-for-hostages deals."

The president said there was no mention of the hostages originally and that they entered into the picture only when the Iranians requested arms from the United States.

Reagan added, "We weren't going to overlook an opportunity if we could get those hostages back. And we're not going to overlook an opportunity in the future."

He said he was not aware until last November that payments from the arms sales may have been diverted to the Contra rebels in Nicaragua. "And I still do not have the answer to (what happened to) that money," Reagan said.

He said he had been aware that private groups were providing assistance to the rebels but said his meetings with Contra supporters were with people who merely were raising money to buy television advertisements on behalf of the rebels.

Under questioning, Reagan acknowledged that at his last news conference he made "a misstatement" when he denied — several times — that Israel had shipped U.S. arms to Iran. He said he did not realize he had said it, and had directed that a correction be put out when told of his mistake.

"I'm not going to tell falsehoods to the American people," Reagan pledged. "I'll leave that to others."

## Senate asks court to force Secord to open Swiss bank account records

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate, exerting pressure on a major figure in the Iran-Contra affair, is asking a court to compel retired Maj. Gen. Richard Secord to produce records of secret Swiss bank accounts he is said to control.

The Senate began the process Thursday evening, voting without debate to cite the former Air Force general for contempt and to ask the U.S. District Court to jail him if he refuses to cooperate.

Secord refused a Feb. 23 order by the Senate select committee investigating the sale of arms to Iran and possible diversion of payments to Nicaraguan rebels that he waive his rights under Switzerland's bank privacy laws and turn over records of accounts suspected of serving as channels for the arms proceeds.

The investigators said in a report that Secord's refusal to cooperate has "frustrated the committee in its efforts to answer critical questions relating to the flow of funds from the sales of arms to Iran to the Nicaraguan resistance forces."

The report noted that some \$20 million from the transactions remains unaccounted for.

It said there was little prospect that formal negotiations with the Swiss government would produce the records soon.

In other developments:

—Senior CIA officials told The New York Times they gave the White House intelligence reports in 1985 that indicated little prospect for improving U.S. relations with Iran, even as the Reagan Administration began its covert Iran initiative. The officials said they also repeatedly advised the White House then that there was no imminent threat that the Soviet Union would gain significant influence in Iran, the newspaper reported.

—The Washington Post reported today that retired Army Maj. Gen. John K. Singlaub, involved in the Contra fund-raising effort, solicited donations from Taiwan and South Korea, suggesting he could help them conceal their contributions. The scheme involved overcharging them on an arms deal and diverting the profits to the Contras, much as the purported scheme that eventually was said to have taken place with Iran. Singlaub's plan, however, was rejected by both countries, the Post said.

—A spokesman for Vice President George Bush denied a published report that Adnan Khashoggi, a Saudi Arabian financier who served as a middleman in the Iranian arms sales, sent Vice President George Bush a check for \$1,000 for the Con-

tras in 1985. "The vice president has never solicited funds for any Nicaraguan resistance effort" and "doesn't even know" Khashoggi, press secretary Larry Thomas said.

—A congressional source, speaking on condition he not be identified, confirmed reports that before former National Security Adviser Robert C. McFarlane attempted suicide last month, he wrote letters to congressional investigators saying he had failed to disclose earlier that Saudi Arabian Ambassador Bandar bin Sultan had volunteered to secretly provide money for the Contras.

—Sources told The Associated Press two previously unidentified witnesses granted limited immunity by the House and Senate committees were Tomas Castillo, the alias of a CIA station chief in Costa Rica; and Cynthia Dondlinger, an accountant for Richard Gadd, a retired lieutenant colonel who is president of a firm linked to the Contra resupply effort. Castillo has been disciplined by the CIA for his role in aiding the Contras during the congressional ban on such aid.

The House and Senate panels earlier this week, according to congressional sources, granted limited immunity to Gadd, along with Robert Owen and John Cupp, who investigators believe could help trace

weapons funneled to the Contras during the aid ban.

Also granted immunity was Robert Earl, an aide to fired NSC aide Oliver L. North, the sources said.

—Senate Democrats sought to reopen debate on the question of sending to the Contras the last \$40 million of \$100 million approved by Congress last year. The Senate voted 52-48 on Wednesday against holding back the money.

## 17th Texas bank shut in 1987

DALLAS (AP) — Texas, which had a record 26 bank failures last year amid faltering agriculture and oil industries, has racked up 17 bank closings so far this year.

The Red River National Bank in the Northeast Texas town of Clarksville was closed Thursday and its deposits and liabilities assumed by the State Bank of DeKalb, said a spokesman for the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

The Sweeny Bank in Brazoria County, south of Houston, was also declared insolvent. The FDIC approved assumption of that bank's deposits by The First State Bank of Louise.

The decline of oil and agriculture, coupled with a soft real estate market, has again put Texas in the lead in the nation's bank failures, said FDIC spokesman Alan Whitney. The FDIC reported Thursday that nearly one in five U.S. banks lost money last year. The figure was one in 12 banks in the East, but one in four west of the Mississippi River. Western banks are more closely tied to the resource industries now in a slump.

There have been 46 bank failures nationwide and two assisted transactions, said FDIC spokesman Bill Olcheski.

Red River's two offices were to reopen today as branches of the State Bank of DeKalb. The failed bank had assets of \$22.6 million, according to the FDIC, which was named receiver after Robert J. Herrmann, senior deputy comptroller of the currency, closed the bank at 3 p.m.

The Sweeny Bank's only office was to today as a branch of First State Bank of Louise. Its depositors will automatically become customers of the assuming bank, subject to court approval, he said.

### Burglaries, break-in reported

Two burglaries and an attempted break-in at Winn's was reported to Hereford police Thursday. At the Winn's store the door was jimmied, but no entry was made. ### Chopper to check after explosion

A helicopter from the Department Public Safety will glean an area northwest of Summerfield today to check for possible remains from a mysterious explosion early Sunday, according to the Deaf Smith County Sheriff's Department.

The aerial flash, seen by a farmer in Summerfield, was reported about the same time of complaints of a strong natural gas smell. But, Energas officials checked the area and found nothing.

Hereford Fire Marshal Jay Spain has speculated that it was a small meteorite.

## State

### Is \$1 billion budget deficit legal?

AUSTIN (AP) — Attorney General Jim Mattox says he believes Texas' founding fathers didn't intend for lawmakers to end a biennium in the red, but he doesn't know yet if that means it's illegal.

Mattox said Thursday he has dedicated about half of his opinion-writing staff to the task of determining if lawmakers are constitutionally bound to pay off the \$1 billion budget deficit.

Last week, state Comptroller Bob Bullock said the deficit must be paid off and asked Mattox for his legal opinion. He also asked if he can legally certify the 1988-89 budget if a deficit exists.

The state will finish the fiscal year, which ends Aug. 31, with a \$1 billion deficit because of a shortage of revenue caused by the decline in oil prices.

The Texas Legislative Council, a legislative research agency, said Thursday the Texas Constitution does not bind lawmakers to balance the books at the end of the fiscal year. It also said Bullock could certify the 1988-89 budget.

But the final decision rests with Mattox.

"(Bullock's) correct on asking the question and he's even more correct in indicating that he has a heavy responsibility in directing the Legislature in bringing our budget into balance," Mattox said.

Mattox called Bullock the "conscience of state government."

### School bus seat belts discussed

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas school boards and administrators are opposing seat belts on school buses because they say the belts could cause even more injuries to students in bus accidents.

"Some studies indicate that seat belts on large buses are not only unnecessary but may be dangerous," Johnny Veselka, executive director of the Texas Association of School Administrators, told the Senate Education Committee on Thursday.

The measure to require seat belts and 28-inch padded seat backs on new school buses, by Sen. Gene Green, D-Houston, was left pending until the committee's meeting next week.

A similar bill is pending in a House subcommittee.

Rozanne Rubin, Houston, speaking for the Coalition for Seat Belts, said school districts pay as much \$100 each for helmets to protect their football players, but balk at \$16 per student for seat belts.

"It seems to me it would be worth \$16 a year to protect students," said Rozanne Rubin of Houston, speaking for the Coalition for Seat Belts.

Veselka said Texas Department of Public Safety statistics show there have been no students killed in school bus accidents in Texas since 1983.

## National

### DOE letter was 'badly edited'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Energy Secretary John Herrington says he wants to renew sizable depletion allowances only on new oil and gas production and not on all production as proposed in a letter he sent to President Reagan.

One official says the letter was "badly edited."

The mistake is causing confusion as Herrington begins a campaign inside the administration to win support for the allowance which it opposed in last year's tax debate.

Herrington has said he sees it as the best way to help domestic well owners battered by the oil price collapse of 1986.

Trying to clear up that confusion without releasing his letter to the president, Herrington told reporters Thursday: "A reasonable depletion proposal should be on new oil and gas discoveries and the enhanced recovery projects. ... I don't know that depletion allowances on all oil and gas would be something we should do, that letter notwithstanding."

After the meeting, an official who spoke on condition his name not be used said the still-unreleased letter to the president had been "badly edited."

The secretary today briefs the Cabinet's Domestic Policy and Economic councils on a huge study of energy industries directed by Deputy Secretary William Martin and released Tuesday.

### U.S. warships may escort tankers

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. Navy warships may soon begin escorting foreign-flag tankers through the Persian Gulf as a warning to Iran not to escalate attacks on shipping as part of its war with Iraq, administration officials say.

In the meantime, the officials add, the Navy has moved elements of an aircraft carrier battle group deeper into the Gulf of Oman at the mouth of the Persian Gulf, while posting the carrier — the Kitty Hawk — nearby in the northern Arabian Sea.

That position places the carrier's warplanes well within the 50-mile range of new Iranian missile batteries that are described by U.S. military analysts as a potent new threat to commercial ships plying the gulf.

The Kitty Hawk and its battle group have been operating in various parts of the Arabian Sea for more than a month now.

But the sources, who agreed to discuss the matter only if not identified, said Thursday the detection of the new missiles had contributed to a decision to extend the carrier's deployment in the area and to move the battle group's operations farther north.

The United States has at least 18 warships either inside or near the Persian Gulf, the officials added.

While stressing no orders had been issued to prepare for a military operation, one source said the presence of the Kitty Hawk and its warplanes was meant to convey a simple warning to Iran: "If they shoot at anybody with those (new) missiles, they can be eliminated."

## International

### U.S. troops increase in Honduras

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) — Honduras has agreed to buy advanced U.S. jet fighters and American troop strength here will reach a record level this spring, sources said, as Washington moves to strengthen a key regional ally.

U.S. and Honduran sources told The Associated Press on Thursday more than 7,000 regular and reserve Air Force, Army and Navy personnel will be in Honduras in April and May to take part in overlapping air, ground and amphibious exercises with Honduran troops.

The largest U.S.-Honduran joint exercise to date was the 1983 Big Pine II, with about 5,000 troops.

Sources in Tegucigalpa and Washington also said Honduras agreed to buy 12 F5-E fighter planes from the United States. The jets first were offered last year in what was seen as a major reversal of U.S. policy and an escalation of the arms race in the volatile region.

At that time, U.S. officials privately said the move was aimed at maintaining air superiority in the face of a steady military buildup by neighboring Nicaragua. U.S.-supported Nicaraguan rebels called Contras are fighting to overthrow that country's leftist government.

The United States had followed a policy of not being the first to introduce advanced jet fighters into Central America, but made the offer after Israel offered to sell Honduras its Kfir combat jets.

## Companies underreporting injuries

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thousands of on-the-job injuries are going unreported every year because of a Reagan administration policy limiting inspections to companies and industries with higher-than-average accident rates, Congress is being told.

The effects of that policy were dramatized in a hearing Thursday before the House Government Operations subcommittee on employment by meatpacking industry workers who have suffered injuries disabling them for life.

Even after acknowledging that the testimony may have arisen out of a current labor dispute at an IBP Inc. plant in Dakota City, Neb., several members of the House panel expressed outrage at the conditions that packinghouse employees work under.

"I have a feeling that progress has bypassed this industry," said Rep. Joseph J. DioGuardi of New York, the subcommittee's ranking Republican. "I've never had such a

graphic description of what happens in a meatpacking plant. This sounds like a story out of Charles Dickens."

John A. Pendergrass, the assistant secretary of labor in charge of the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, acknowledged that meatpacking has the highest injury rate of any industry in the country.

He disclosed that his agency launched a formal investigation Thursday into alleged unsafe working conditions at the Dakota City plant of IBP, a subsidiary of Occidental Petroleum Co. and the nation's largest meatpacker.

The last time the IBP plant was given a wall-to-wall OSHA inspection was 1983, he said.

Pendergrass disputed a statement by the subcommittee's chairman, Rep. Tom Lantos, D-Calif., that OSHA's enforcement policies are allowing companies that underreport their injuries to the government to escape wall-to-wall job safety inspections.

One of every 10 manufacturing

plants with below-average injury rates is chosen at random for further inspection so that no company or plant can be assured that it will not be further inspected, Pendergrass said.

Citing fines totaling more than \$1 million that OSHA levied last year against 14 companies — among them Chrysler Corp, Union Carbide Corp., and Monsanto Co. — for injury reporting violations, Pendergrass said his agency is taking steps to discourage underreporting.

The General Accounting Office, a watchdog agency of Congress, has begun its own investigation of OSHA's reliance on employer records for targeting inspection forces, Pendergrass said.

Lantos cited studies that use death certificates indicating that OSHA is recording only one-third of the estimated 11,000 job-related deaths that occur annually.

Bureau of Labor Statistics officials testified they have been concerned for years that the OSHA-required employer statistics inadequately reflect the number of job-related injuries and deaths occurring in the nation.

## Combust award recipient

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Larry Combust (R-Texas) has earned the "Guardian of Small Business" award from the National Federation of Independent Business for his work to promote and enhance America's small businesses.

"Congressman Combust has demonstrated his strong support for one of the most important segments of our nation's free enterprise system," NFIB President and CEO John Sloan said in presenting the award. "Small business is on the economic cutting edge of this country's future. Mr. Combust's voting record is an outstanding tribute to our small business communities and to entrepreneurship."

NFIB, the nation's largest organization representing small business, selects the "Guardian" award winners on the basis of their votes on issues deemed crucial by its 500,000-plus members across the country.

Rated on 17 recorded votes during the 99th Congress, U.S. Representatives faced a wide range of key small business issues including: balanced budget amendment to the Constitution, repeal of contemporaneous record-keeping requirements for automobile use, deficit reduction, and improving access to federal contracts. To qualify for the award, a Member of Congress had to vote favorably on at least 70 percent of the issues rated.

## Popeye statue in Texas, label canned in Arkansas

ALMA, Ark. (AP) — Popeye's statue may be in Crystal City, Texas, but cans of spinach bearing his name are filled at Alma, Ark.

Crystal City has called itself the spinach capital of the world since the 1930s and celebrates its main crop with an annual festival.

But Alma, where 56 percent of the country's canned spinach is produced, has claimed the title for itself and is planning both its own spinach festival and an 8-foot statue of Popeye.

The Spinach War is on.

The Alma-Crystal City dispute arose after a Texas newspaper publisher saw a story about Alma in the Southwest Times Record at Fort Smith, Ark. Zavala County Sentinel publisher Dale Barker then sent a letter to the newspaper, along with an information packet about the town in the Rio Grande valley.

According to that information, Crystal City, population 8,334, built its statue of Popeye in 1937 and had a cartoon by Popeye creator E.C. Segar created especially for its annual spinach festival.

But merchants of Alma, in the Arkansas River valley in western Arkansas, say they're tired of Crystal City claiming spinach superiority. About 60 million pounds of prime, curly leaf spinach is grown each year in Alma, population 2,755, and they've proclaimed the Arkansas town spinach capital of the world.

In jest, Barker invited the Alma Area Chamber of Commerce to challenge Crystal City for the title.

So far, the Alma Area Chamber hasn't responded formally to the challenge, but downtown merchants have taken the cause to heart.

George Bowles of Alma, owner of Kustom Kaps, has sent Crystal City a message. Bowles packed some Arkansas River bottom soil, a can of Popeye brand spinach and curly leaf spinach seed — Crystal City grows the slick-leaf variety — and sent the box to Crystal City.

Meanwhile, other downtown merchants are completing plans for Alma's first spinach festival and the Rev. Henry Williamson of the local Presbyterian church has given his "spinach blessing" to all the proceedings.

## 78 arrested in drug bust

WACO, Texas (AP) — Two undercover agents posed as high school students in a year-long drug sting operation that netted the arrests of 78 people, including 35 students, police say.

Unsuspecting students from Waco and University high schools were called from first-period classes Thursday and loaded onto city jail-bound buses as more than 100 law officers participated in the roundup dubbed "Operation Gemini."

Police said more arrests were expected today. Charges included sale of narcotics such as marijuana, cocaine and its derivative crack, and the psychedelic drug LSD.

The two agents who had been posing as transfer students since last fall were picked from applicants from the Waco police academy. While not police officers, they had been schooled in police procedures.

The festival will feature a Popeye lookalike contest, a Popeye Classic 10K run and 5K walk, a spinach-cooking contest and other activities.

On Thursday, a sign was posted at the end of Main Street on the site of the planned statue of Popeye. Those plans call for the statue to be unveiled and dedicated in time for the city's May 16-18 Spinach Festival.

Such as continuation of NFL's instant replay

## What Rozelle badly wants, he gets

KAANAPALI, Hawaii (AP) — The law of the NFL remains the same. What Pete Rozelle wants badly enough, Pete Rozelle gets.

In this case, what Pete Rozelle wanted was a continuation of the NFL's instant replay officiating system.

Rozelle stepped into a heated 2½-hour debate on the replay extension Thursday and effectively saved the replay system from being scrapped with a strong argument for its continuation.

"It wouldn't have happened if it hadn't been for the commissioner's role," said Tex Schramm, president of the Dallas Cowboys, chairman of the Competition Committee and the most ardent proponent of the system.

As it was, replay barely was extended for another year, getting the minimum 21 of 28 votes necessary.

One negative voter, St. Louis owner William Bidwill, said he would have switched if necessary to save it.

The seven negative votes were three more than last year, when replay was approved for the first time by a vote of 23-4 with one abstention.

But a season of well-publicized glitches, gaffes and delays for review of replays made this one much closer and required Rozelle's most persuasive tactics to get even a one-year extension when Schramm and the Competition Committee wanted two. And it will remain in its 1986 form — without the phasing in of a new, on-field official.

Even Rozelle acknowledged the problems. Asked if replay would be extended again next year, Rozelle replied: "Not if it doesn't do well."

The argument of Rozelle and Schramm was that replay, which ap-

plies only to possession and out-of-bounds plays, had worked, particularly in the early part of the season, after the bugs were ironed out.

They argued that nobody was hurt by instant replay — just 38 of the 374 plays reviewed resulted in reversals. And even the obvious mistakes — calls which failed to overturn bad calls on the field — still would have been made without instant replay.

But that didn't mean much to the victimized teams.

Proponents argued that new equipment used at midseason improved the system.

But opponents considered it a waste of time — games were delayed up to five minutes to look at replays — and another slap at the on-field officials.

That led seven teams to vote against replay — the New York Giants and Jets, Kansas City, Cincinnati, Pittsburgh, New England and St. Louis. Moreover, several teams passed on the first roll-call vote, leaving renewal short the first time through.

In his talk to the owners, Rozelle cited polls that showed that fans wanted the system and told the

owners he thought it deserved a second chance.

Rozelle said more preseason time will be spent than last year trying to work out some of the bugs that surfaced.

The owners approved a rule that is designed to speed up games by cutting from one minute to 40 seconds the timeouts in the last two minutes of each half.

They also began studying a change that would substitute a 40-second clock for the present 30-second clock that would start as soon as the previous play is blown dead.

The owners defeated any attempt to cut down on crowd noise, including a measure that would result in penalties against home teams for crowd noise that kept the visitors from snapping the ball. They also mandated an end to experiments with radios in helmets that would help players hear signals in heavy noise.

# Mavericks survive scare from Kings

Dallas coach Dick Motta knows to expect trouble whenever the Midwest Division leaders take on a team with a losing record, such as the Sacramento Kings.

The Kings staged a 14-2 run in the final five minutes to throw a scare into the Mavericks before guard Rolando Blackman hit two free throws with 23 seconds remaining to enable the Mavericks to pull out a 105-104 NBA victory Thursday night.

"We just went cold," Motta said. "I expected a lot more trouble from Sacramento than we ended up giving us. Everyone is gunning for us."

Forward Mark Aguirre scored a game-high 28 points for Dallas, but had just seven in the second half.

"Sacramento did a good job double teaming Mark in the second half," Motta said. "Mark wasn't feeling good before the game."

Blackman added 24 points as Dallas improved to 43-23. Guard Derek Harper managed 15 assists.

Guard Reggie Theus led the Kings, now 20-46, with 18 points. Center LaSalle Thompson added 18.

Sacramento's 14-2 run started with 5:13 remaining and ended when rookie forward Johnny Rogers hit a jumper to give the Kings a 104-101 lead.

But Dallas center James Donaldson hit two free throws with 56 seconds left to cut the deficit to one point, setting up Blackman's game-winning foul shot.

Rogers scored a career-high 12 points in his first game as an NBA starter.

"I thought I was close to having a great game, but I made a few mistakes, especially on defense, and then I missed that last jump shot that could have helped us," Rogers said. "I was shocked when (coach) Jerry (Reynolds) told me I was starting."

Interim Sacramento head coach Reynolds wasn't pleased with what he felt was a non-call by the officials on one of three shots the Kings took in the last eight seconds. Reynolds claimed forward Otis Thorpe was fouled.

"I have a sneaking suspicion that if it had been the Mavericks (fouled) at the end, they would have gone to the line," Reynolds said. "Because we are the Kings, we have to shoot for our points."

"I definitely thought I was fouled," Thorpe said. "I can still feel the elbow."

In other NBA action, it was Washington 111, Seattle 106; New York 111, Indiana 105 in overtime; Chicago 114, Los Angeles Clippers 97; and Golden State 125, Portland 124.

**Bullets 110, SuperSonics 106**  
Without Moses Malone in the lineup, the Washington Bullets simply aren't the same club. They're still a winning team, however, thanks to the recent pick-me-up provided by Terry Catledge and Jay Vincent.

"Everybody has to pick up the slack offensively," Washington Coach Kevin Loughery said after the Bullets defeated the Seattle SuperSonics 110-106 in the NBA Thursday night.

Vincent scored a season-high 29 against and Catledge had 25 for the

Bullets, who have lost Malone to a neck injury.

Catledge had 12 points in the first quarter, as the Bullets opened a 37-7 lead. He picked up eight more before halftime, helping Washington maintain a 65-45 edge.

The victory was Washington's

ninth its last 10 home games and third in five contests since Malone was sidelined. In those five games, Catledge, whose season average is 13.2, has scored 111 points, an average of 22.2. Vincent, who has moved into the starting lineup in Malone's absence, has scored 87

points to raise his average to 11.9.

scored 16 of his 22 in the fourth quarter. Center Benoit Benjamin added 21.

Joe Barry Carroll scored 10 of his 31 points in the final 4½ minutes and made a big defensive play with three seconds remaining, leading Golden State over Portland.

Steve Johnson's field goal with 18 seconds left cut the Warriors' lead to one point, and the Blazers forced a turnover four seconds later. But with Portland playing for a potential game-winning shot, Carroll deflected a pass out of bounds with three seconds to go.

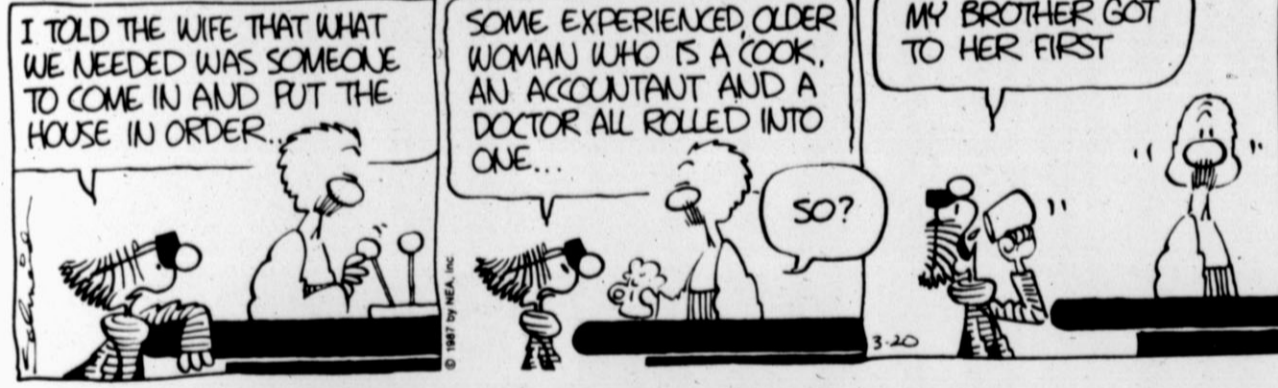

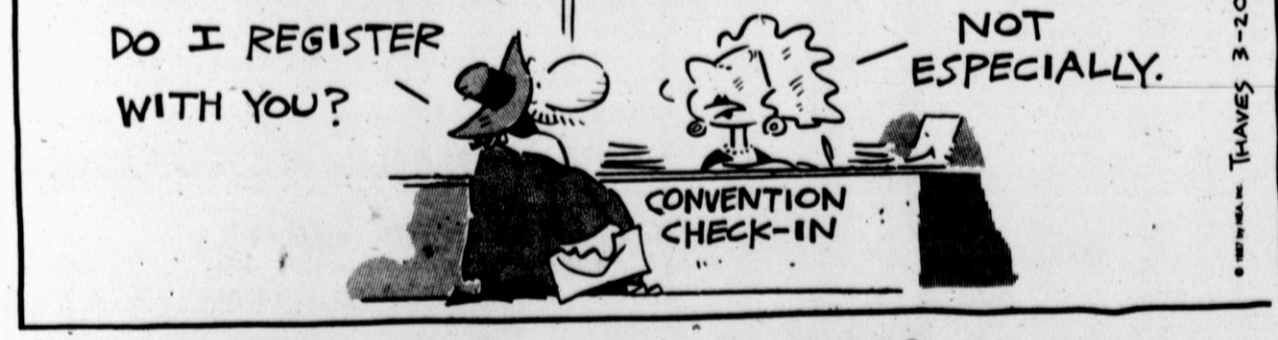

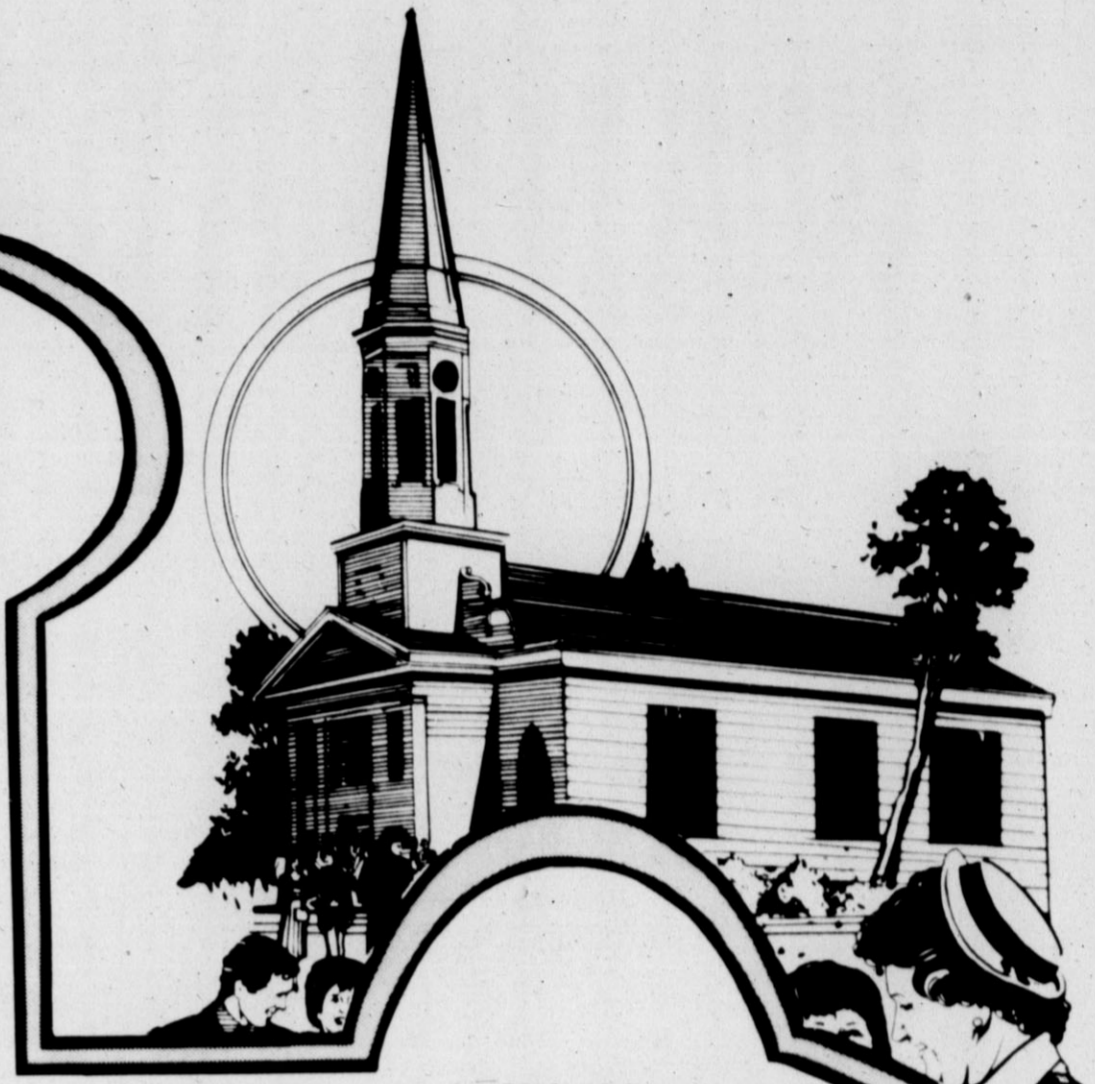
