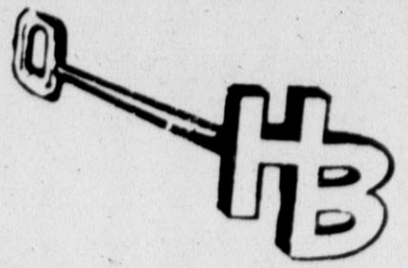

## City election draws most voters

More than 2,000 voters went to the polls Saturday in the city and county elections, and the hospital district balloting drew 1,716 voters.

Voters returned five of six incumbents to office on the three local governing bodies, and increased the size of the Hereford City Commission

to seven positions. The city election drew the most voter interest as 2,196 voters cast ballots Saturday.

Mayor Wes Fisher easily won reelection over two opponents. Silvana Juarez won the Place 1 seat to become the first woman elected to the commission. Tom LeGate nar-

rowly retained his seat in Place 3, and Jerry Walsh and Paul Hamilton won the two at-large seats.

Boyd Foster, who lost the Place 3 election by just 14 votes, announced today that he will file a petition for a recount in that race. "With the race being that close, I would always

wonder about the results if I didn't ask for a recount and some of my supporters have urged me to do so," Foster said.

Foster said he planned to file the petition with the mayor today. A panel would be appointed to count the ballots in the Place 3 election with LeGate and Foster, or their representatives, allowed to witness the count.

In the hospital board election, Dr. Gerald Payne was reelected and Ralph Detten and Dr. Jim Herbertson took the other two seats from a field of six candidates. Herbertson had just a 29-vote margin over fourth-place June Rudd.

The special county election on authorizing a one-half cent sales tax carried by an overwhelming margin, 1,522 to 566. The new sales tax will go in effect on Jan. 1, 1988. The new law making the tax an option also provides that revenue be used to decrease property tax values.

The 2,088 votes cast in the county election represented about a 23 percent turnout of registered voters in the county. The total number of registered voters in the city is not known, but the 2,196 votes cast in the city elections is thought to be about 33 percent of the registered voters.

The nuclear waste repository issue and a concerted effort by Hispanics to get representation on the commission helped draw more attention to the city race. Several city candidates had campaigned for a tougher city stance against the repository and site characterization, and there were Hispanic candidates in three of the four city races.

Mrs. Juarez, a 24-year-old clerk at a discount store, was the only Hispanic candidate to win. More historic, however, was the fact that she was the first woman elected to the commission and thought to be the youngest person ever elected to the city board. She had 207 votes to 169 for appointee Lorin Nixon.

Foster won election to a third term as mayor in convincing fashion, polling 1,122 votes to 673 for Jim Steiert.

and 376 for Sylvia Flores. Steiert had emphasized a tougher stand against the repository and site characterization issues.

LeGate won reelection by just 14 votes in the Place 3 race. Boyd Foster had also taken a strong stand against the DOE project in this race. Walsh garnered 1,064 votes to lead the at-large race for two commission seats. He, too, campaigned against the DOE project. Hamilton took the second seat with 728 votes, and former commissioner Paul Abalos drew 527 votes, and Ed Wuerflein completed the field with 290 votes.

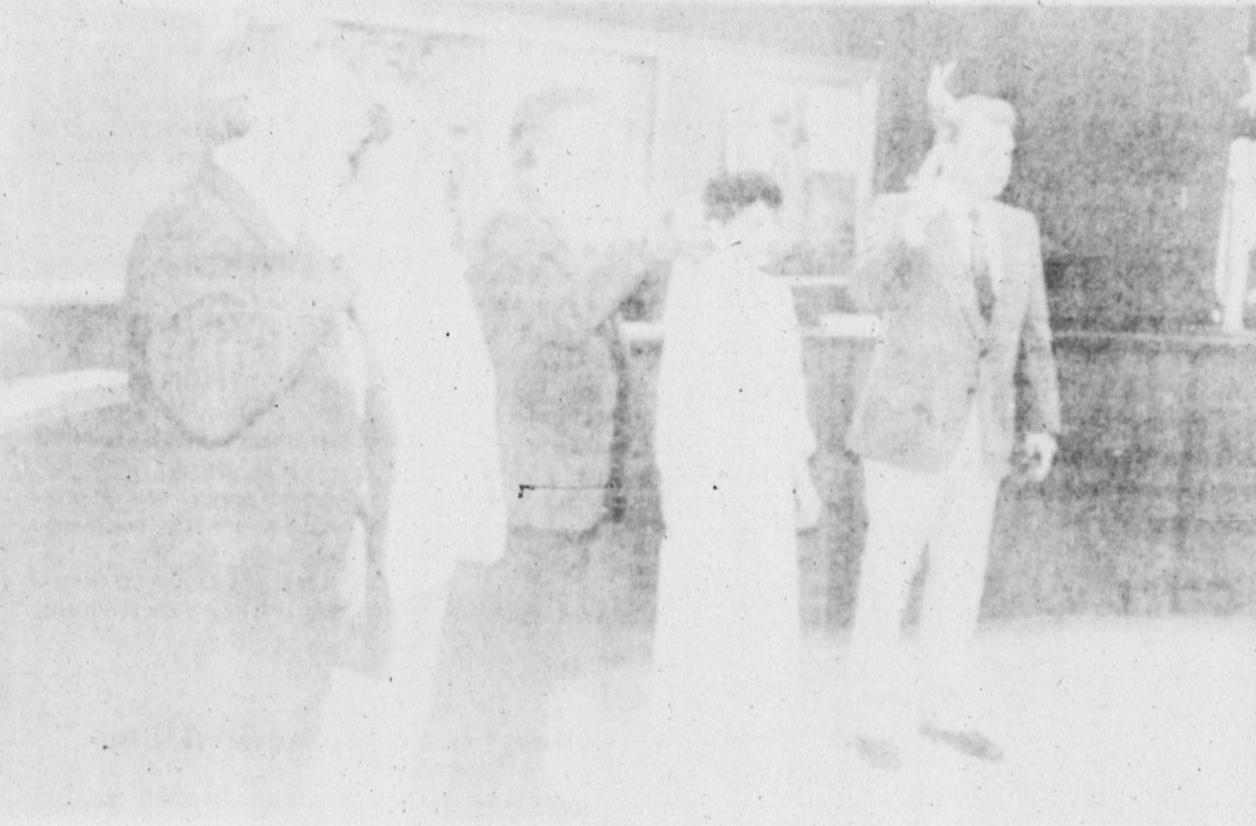
In the school race, Fuston led the ballot with 1,673 votes to take one at-large seat, and Dennis Newton captured the other place with 1,366

Trailing wife Delia Griego with 596 and Demetrie Zuniga with 373. Fuston was the current school board president and was reelected to that position Monday.

Despite the confusion created by boundary lines on single-member districts, the elections were conducted without much difficulty Saturday. County Clerk David Ruland said he had received a number of complaints, all from Anglos, on clerks in the city election giving them the wrong ballots. Ruland is actually responsible only for county elections.

Incumbent Dr. Gerald Payne led the hospital ticket with 1,021 votes. Two new members are Ralph Det-

## First woman takes office on Hereford city commission

The mayor and four city commissioners took oaths of office Monday night, increasing the size of the commission from five to seven members under the new single-member district system.

Mayor Wes Fisher and Place 3 Commissioner Tom LeGate were reelected to office, while Silvana Juarez took the Place 1 seat, all for two-year terms. Jerry Walsh and Paul Hamilton won one-year terms to the Place 5 and 6 at-large positions.

As the election winners prepared to take oath of office, Mayor Fisher noted that it was an "historic occasion" in that Mrs. Juarez was the first woman ever elected to the city commission.

In other business Monday night, the commission approved amendments to the comprehensive zoning ordinance, approved a resolution in support of locating a TSTI branch in Hereford, approved bids to repair

the incinerator stack and to purchase trash containers, authorized bids for the annual seal-coat program, appointed the auditor for fiscal year, and heard a request from the Amstad Housing Authority.

Charles Ruiz appeared before the commission to seek support of a housing project which has been proposed two blocks west of K-Bob's Restaurant by the Amstad Housing Authority. Ruiz had presented the project a year ago, but the pre-request application to FmHA was turned down because of the small number of responses from prospective renters.

Ruiz said the project had been trimmed from a \$3.5 million program to a \$1.5 million project. In a survey of migrant farmworkers and feed yard employees last year, only four responses were received. Ruiz explained that the people did not understand the questionnaires, and that he now had about 170 people signed up. City commissioners reminded Ruiz that another

drawback last year was that Bluewater Garden apartments showed a number of vacancies.

The mayor and commission asked Ruiz to get more detailed information to prove the need of the housing and present it at the next commission meeting.

Commissioners approved a bid of \$28,225 for 125 "dumpster" containers for the city. The placement of the containers would virtually do away with trash barrels in the city, said City Mgr. Darwin McGill. Futrell Enterprises of Cleburne was awarded the bid. Low bid was submitted by a Plainview company, but McGill said the bid did not meet specifications.

Commissioners also approved a low bid of \$11,160 to Allied Millwrights for the repair of the incinerator stack. The city manager was authorized to seek bids on a suburban vehicle used by the fire department. It was believed the sale of the vehicle would be better than using it for a trade-in. The annual seal-coat program for city streets was authorized, and it includes a Union Street project.

Brown, Graham & Co. was again appointed as auditor for the current fiscal year. This will be the third consecutive year for the firm to handle the audit. Cost was presented at \$13,500 to \$14,500, which is less than the first year.

Mike Carr, executive vice president of Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, appeared at the meeting to request the city's support of a branch of TSTI in Hereford. Four officials of the Texas State Technical Institute from Amarillo accompanied Carr at the meeting. Carr explained that the chamber felt that an extension center of the campus here would aid in upgrading skills for ag workers and others, help the dropout rate in high school, and provide additional training for jobs outside the ag sector.

TSTI officials said the school now has about 1,000 students at the campus on the old air force base in Amarillo. There are some 26 programs at TSTI, with many of them offering associate degrees in two years. Some students from Hereford are already being served, but officials think there could be many who are not able to make the trip to Amarillo.

An extension center is an off-campus facility at which technical and vocational programs are conducted to provide accessibility to

## Oaths taken, school board reviews new gym plans

Two incumbents and a newcomer to the Hereford Schools board of trustees were sworn into office Monday and the same slate of officers were re-elected for another term.

Jo Garcia took the oath for her District 2 seat on the board, and Dennis Newton joined incumbent John Fuston for at-large representation.

Re-elected as officers were Fuston, president; Bud Patterson, vice president; and Steve Conaway, secretary.

County Clerk David Ruland swore in the three during a 7 a.m. meeting Monday.

## Option open on acid rain talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House says President Reagan's offer to Canada to talk about an acid rain accord "leaves both sides all their options," while U.S. and Canadian environmentalists say it will do no good.

"It appears to be an attempt to allay public concern in Canada and convince the American public that the administration is taking action," said Michael Perley, a spokesman for the Canadian Coalition on Acid Rain.

"This bilateral process will not save a single life or lake," said Daniel Weiss, a Washington representative of the Sierra Club.

The environmentalists commented after Reagan, winding up a 24-hour visit to Ottawa, agreed to consider Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney's proposal for an agreement between the two countries on acid rain.

White House Chief of Staff Howard H. Baker Jr., briefing reporters aboard Air Force One on the president's flight back to Washington, said, "We're not committing ourselves to negotiate a treaty. It leaves both sides all their options."

Reagan, meanwhile, also pledged continued support for free trade talks between the two countries, saying, "A comprehensive, balanced agreement that provides open trade and investment on a comprehensive basis — an agreement in which both sides are winners — that is our goal."

U.S. and Canadian negotiators, facing a deadline this fall, are working on a free-trade agreement that would eliminate most remaining trade barriers.

## 'Make My Day' bill passes

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Although opponents claimed it would lead to wholesale killing, the Oklahoma House nonetheless approved a bill that would give homeowners the right to use any force to protect themselves from intruders.

Backers of the bill said opponents were "bleeding heart do-gooders" who were fighting the rights of citizens to protect their homes and families.

The bill, which had already passed the Senate and was unchanged by the House before its 70-26 vote Monday, now goes to Gov. Henry Bellmon for his consideration.

The bill would provide that homeowners can use any degree of physical force, including deadly force, against people who made an unlawful entry to their homes. That force, under the bill, would be legal if the homeowners had a "reasonable belief" that they might be threatened by any physical force, however slight.

Opponents said that provision meant a simple slap to the face could be an act of physical force and could make a murder justified.

Opponents also complained about a provision of the law that would give immunity from criminal prosecution and from civil liability to homeowners for their actions under the law.

But Rep. Wayne Cozort, R-Tulsa, the House author of the bill, said state law does not presently give such immunity/protection to homeowners.

"The person has to have made an unlawful entry. I would assume that to be a break-in. A judge would have to decide. The bill just gives them the right to protect themselves," Cozort said.

Rep. John Monks, D-Muskogee, said Americans have the "God-given, constitutional right" to protect their property and families.

## Soviets say U.S. invented AIDS

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. government says the Soviet Union is engaging in a campaign intended to plant the idea that AIDS was created in a biological warfare experiment at Fort Detrick in Maryland.

The Pentagon believes the Soviets have succeeded in keeping their allegations alive because Fort Detrick — until 1969 — was the Army's biological warfare development center and today is the site for some AIDS-related research.

"The facts have been distorted to support the false charge," the Pentagon stated in a recent background report on the affair. The State Department has also protested against the Soviet accounts.

First carried in October 1985 by the Soviet weekly "Literaturnaya Gazeta," the Soviet claim was immediately denied by the State Department and dismissed as propaganda.

Over the past 17 months, however, the Russians have mounted what the Pentagon calls "a continuing disinformation campaign," embellishing the story while citing alleged scientific experts to lend weight to the charges.

By the Pentagon's count, the story has been reported since Oct. 30, 1985, by the news media of more than 60 countries, including the United States, in more than 30 different languages.

## Pension guarantee proposed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Companies shortchanging their pension funds in search of easy cash could have to start paying the government up to \$150 a year for each worker to guarantee their employees will get promised retirement benefits.

The Reagan administration asked Congress on Monday to establish variable, risk-based premiums for insuring the retirement benefits of 30 million workers covered by single-employer, defined-benefit pension plans.

About 92 percent of the nation's 110,000 pension plans are solvent and would not have to pay the new variable premiums. But the other 8 percent covering some 10 million workers would, administration officials said.

According to government figures, those 10,000 underfunded pension plans currently are running deficits totaling \$45 billion.

Under the administration proposal, the annual premium charged by the Pension Benefit Guarantee Corp. (PBGC) for insuring retirement benefits would remain unchanged at \$8.50 per worker for the 100,000 well-funded plans.

Company sponsors of the 10,000 pension plans with insufficient assets would have to pay an additional charge of \$6 for every \$1,000 of underfunding, up to a maximum premium of \$100 a year for each employee or retiree.

## Juarez vows to end bribery

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Mexico (AP) — The time-honored tradition of police officers extracting bribes from people suspected of breaking the law has been stopped in Ciudad Juarez, officials say.

From now on, any police officer who solicits a bribe — or anyone who offers a bribe to an officer — will be jailed, a Juarez official said Monday.

The unwritten accepted custom of paying off Juarez officers to avoid going to jail or paying a fine isn't going to be tolerated anymore, said Jose Arturo Ramos, director of the newly combined Juarez transit and city police departments.

Ciudad Juarez is across the border from El Paso, Texas.

The new policy comes a week after the entire patrol division of the Transit Police Department in Juarez was laid off. In the past, tourists from the United States have complained that transit police agents extract bribes from motorists who are stopped on the streets.

"We have a bad image and we are going to change it," Ramos told the El Paso Times. "We want people to know that it is safe to travel in Juarez. We want people to come to us for help, not run away. As of today, everyone, police included, will have to abide by the law."

As of Friday, Ramos said, six Juarez traffic police officers have been jailed for accepting bribes and 25 people, including some U.S. citizens, have been jailed for offering bribes.

## Certificates can be traded for cash

WASHINGTON (AP) — Original holders of so-called generic commodity certificates that expired in the first three months of 1987 can apply to trade them in for cash, the Agriculture Department says.

Undersecretary Daniel G. Amstutz said Monday that holders of the certificates must return them by May 15 to the county office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service where they were issued.

Amstutz said the county committees will review the requests and, if they approve, will authorize payment. The expired certificates will be redeemed at face value minus 15 percent for handling and another 4.3 percent required by the balanced-budget act of 1985, the Gramm-Rudman law.

Holders will not be able to exchange the certificates for commodities held by the department's Commodity Credit Corp., as they were intended initially.

Amstutz said the offer to pay

original holders of expired certificates is being made one time only. Because the use of commodity certificates is relatively new, he said, some original holders were unaware that they should use them before the expiration dates.

Officials said they did not have an estimate of the dollar value of expired certificates but estimated that their total was small, perhaps a fraction of 1 percent of all certificates issued.

Nearly \$3.9 billion worth of generic certificates were issued from April 1986 through December, mostly as deficiency payments and diversion payments to farmers for participating in commodity programs.

The certificates can be redeemed in CCC-owned commodities or sold for cash by the holders. They are good for eight months.

## Clements defends education reform

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Bill Clements says he is puzzled by the U.S. education secretary's charges that Texas is "backsliding" on education reform.

"I don't understand them. I think he must have been given some misinformation somewhere," Clements said Monday.

Education Secretary William J. Bennett, who made the remarks over the weekend, was in Texas last month to address a joint session of the Legislature.

"He just recently spent a couple of days here. He didn't have those comments to make then. I don't know why he has to go out to California and make those comments. I don't think they have any foundation in fact, and I'm surprised he made them," Clements said.

On Sunday, Bennett told the National Education Association meeting in San Francisco that he was distressed because the Legislature had abandoned plans to test teachers on knowledge of the subjects they teach.

He also complained that "Texas officials also are calling for reconsideration of the state's teacher appraisal system. The state may abandon its teacher career ladder."

Texas Education Commissioner William Kirby said Bennett is wrong in criticizing the subject matter testing decision. He said Texas simply decided on another way to make certain teachers are competent to teach their subject specialties.

All current teachers and administrators were required last year to take the TECAT basic skills test. Those who failed twice lost their teaching certificates.

Rather than administer another

test on subject knowledge, Kirby said the state Board of Education decided to rely on teacher appraisals done in the classroom.

"We've put into place a comprehensive appraisal system," Kirby said. "We really felt that was the way to eliminate from the classroom anybody who was incompetent."

In addition, Kirby said, new teachers coming into Texas schools face "the most comprehensive testing program in the country."

College sophomores must pass a basic skills test before being allowed to take teaching courses, and graduates must take a subject matter test before being certified, he said.

Bennett voiced concerns that the Texas budget crisis might see money taken away from the "career ladder" that was created to award bonuses to outstanding teachers.

Kirby said he, too, is concerned that Texas might not continue to fully fund education reform.

"I would absolutely support the secretary's position on current budget problems and that we need to be careful about backing off reform due to budget considerations," he said.

## Fire under investigation

Hereford firemen are investigating a possible arson fire which burned part of a two-story vacant house at 500 Union.

A suspicious person was reported in the vicinity and the house was broken into before the fire.

Other weekend fire alarms were of a dumpster fire and a smoke scare.

## Dow Jones average sets new record

NEW YORK (AP) — The Dow Jones industrial average has set its 33rd record-high closing of the year, this time breaking the 2,400 mark in a session that also saw the broader stock market move moderately higher.

The widely watched average of 30 industrial stocks on Monday rose 15.20 to 2,405.54, topping Friday's record close of 2,390.34.

Gains were milder in the broader market, where about six issues rose in price for every five that declined on the New York Stock Exchange.

The Dow has risen 509.59 points, or

26.9 percent, since Jan. 2. It passed its last century mark, 2,300, on March 20 when it closed at 2,333.52.

Although the Dow industrials posted a healthy gain, analysts characterized Monday's session as lackluster following Friday's torrid rally. In that session, the Dow industrials jumped a record 69.89 points on the heels of a bond market rally that pushed interest rates lower.

Lower interest rates improve the outlook for corporate profits, and mirror investor sentiment that inflation will remain subdued over the

## Test shows exposure to AIDS virus

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** I simply had to thank you for printing that wonderful letter from the grieving mother whose son died of AIDS and tell you how much I appreciated your compassionate response.

That woman really told it like it is. In September, 1982, I returned to Michigan after retiring from my job in San Francisco. At that time very little was known about AIDS. The gay press printed a few articles on the subject, but I had no idea it would mushroom into the international health crisis that we may be facing very soon.

When AIDS tests became available early in the summer of '85, I immediately took one. Results: "Positive." I then took the definitive test, the double-check Western Blot. Results: "Positive."

Knock on wood, I'm not yet the least bit sick. My major worry, when

the "deadlines" catch up with me, is not about myself but the effect it will have on my family. I now have a very good relationship with all of them. Although a few may suspect I am gay, no one has been anything but warm and loving.

Would it be better for my family if I took my life when the symptoms of the disease begin to be obvious to me? I don't want my loved ones to go through what I know will be inevitable. Please advise—Troubled Mind

**DEAR TROUBLED:** You may NEVER come down with AIDS. Approximately 20-30 percent of those who test positive actually get the disease. The test indicates only that you have been exposed to the AIDS virus.

Lead a normal life, but please opt

for sexual abstinence. If you find abstinence impossible, I implore you to be extremely careful about any sexual contact you may have. This means using condoms at all times. Some authorities recommend two, just in case. If you use drugs, and I have no reason to assume you do, don't share needles. And please tear up your donor card.

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** Every time my husband sneezes we get into an argument. He subscribes to that old wives' tale that a person's heart stops when he sneezes and he is near death. Whenever I fail to say "God bless you" I am accused of being "uncaring" or "hostile."

I am not a religious person and I was not raised in a family of Gesundheiters. When I sneeze, I merely say "excuse me" and don't await blessings from anyone.

When my husband sneezes it is always the start of a fight.

Will you please tell me if a person's life is in danger every time he or she sneezes? I am a registered nurse and have never heard of anyone dying from this—Ka-Choo in Connecticut.

bleeding, you should get a second opinion from another urologist.

**DEAR DR. GOTT** — I had a hysterectomy more than four years ago. Now I experience pain during routine vaginal examinations and while having intercourse. One gynecologist said the pain was from the scar. Where is the scar? Why hasn't it healed, and what can I do about it?

**DEAR READER** — The scar from an abdominal hysterectomy — when the uterus is removed through the lower abdominal wall — is obvious, and it usually causes no problems.

On the other hand, a vaginal hysterectomy — when the uterus is removed through the vagina — can produce internal scarring that causes painful intercourse.

The uterus itself is a muscular organ that is shaped like an inverted pear. Its narrow portion connects to the deepest portion of the vagina. This tip of the uterus is called the cervix. It is firm, round and feels like the tip of your nose. A cervical smear, the Pap test, is used to detect early cancer in women undergoing a pelvic examination.

Surgeons often prefer to remove the uterus — cervix and all — through the vagina. The procedure is technically easier than abdominal hysterectomy and leaves no external scars.

**DEAR CHOO:** I have never heard of anyone dying from a sneeze either, but I HAVE heard of marriages that go pffft because of some darned fool thing that doesn't amount to a hill of beans.

If it makes your husband feel better to have you say, "God bless you" or "Gesundheit" when he sneezes, do it. Actually, what he is looking for is reassurance of your attention. So give already, lady, before this thing escalates into something big.

## DR. GOTT Platelet disease can be treated

**DEAR DR. GOTT** — A friend of mine has a daughter, 8, who had a bleeding disease called ITP. Is this the same thing as hemophilia? I've never heard of a female having bleeder's diseases.

**DEAR READER** — Idiopathic thrombocytopenic purpura (ITP) is a disease characterized by a deficiency in the tiny blood cells (platelets) that are necessary for coagulation. People with ITP bruise very easily. If the platelet deficiency is severe, the condition can be life-threatening.

ITP typically follows viral infection. It is not a permanent affliction and can be treated with cortisone. In severe cases, the patient's spleen may have to be removed.

On the other hand, hemophilia is an inherited deficiency of blood-clotting proteins. The problem is not with the platelets. Some hemophiliacs require replacement of clotting factors, other patients, who have less of a deficiency, do not require treatment, although they must be careful to avoid injury.

**DEAR DR. GOTT** — A few years ago there was blood in my urine. A urologist examined me, said I had blisters in my bladder and gave me some pills. The condition returns every so often. Could it be caused by stress? I don't eat citrus fruit or spicy foods, don't drink caffeine or liquor, and I drink two quarts of water a day.

**DEAR READER** — Blood in the urine is not due to stress or diet. It comes from inflammation or irritation somewhere within the urinary tract. I do not know what bladder blisters are. If you still have recurrent

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## Who gets the last laugh?

NEW YORK (AP) — Some happy procrastinators will be watching with disdain in the next few days as hordes of their fellow taxpayers scramble to file their returns by April 15.

Why are these people smirking? They have put off the day of reckoning with the Internal Revenue Service until as late as Aug. 15 by filing for an automatic extension of the deadline.

But the question of who gets the

last laugh is another matter. In order to take proper advantage of the extension, filers must observe the rules carefully on IRS Form 4868, which is used to request the extension.

The agency says you cannot seek an extension if you are under a court order to file by the regular due date, or if you want the IRS itself to calculate your tax liability.

Otherwise, people seeking extensions in the prescribed manner and filing their Form 4868 no later than April 15 can assume that the request is granted unless they hear otherwise

from the IRS.

A generous arrangement, wouldn't you say? Well, yes, but there is a catch. As the accounting firm of Deloitte Haskins & Sells observes, "an extension of time to file the return is not an extension of time to pay the tax owed."

"For the application of extension to be valid, it must show the full estimated amount of tax due for the year and include payment of any balance owed."

Making an accurate estimate may be no simple job. But it behooves taxpayers not to err very far on the low side.

The IRS can impose a special, nondeductible underpayment penalty if the balance still owed after April 15 is more than 10 percent of the total tax due for 1986. The penalty is set at 0.5 percent of the underpayment per month, up to a maximum of 25 percent.

In addition, underpayers are charged interest at the rate of 9 percent a year, compounded daily. The penalty may be avoided if you can show "reasonable cause" for not paying on time, but the IRS will still demand interest charges in such cases.

Some states require a separate application for an extension of income taxes due them, while others grant extra time automatically with a federal extension.

U.S. taxpayers living or traveling abroad can take until June 15 to file without requesting an extension. If they send in their returns after April 15, they are advised to attach a statement declaring that they were out of the country.

Extensions beyond Aug. 15 are a good deal harder to come by. They require a separate form, 2688, which the IRS says it will accept only in cases of "undue hardship."

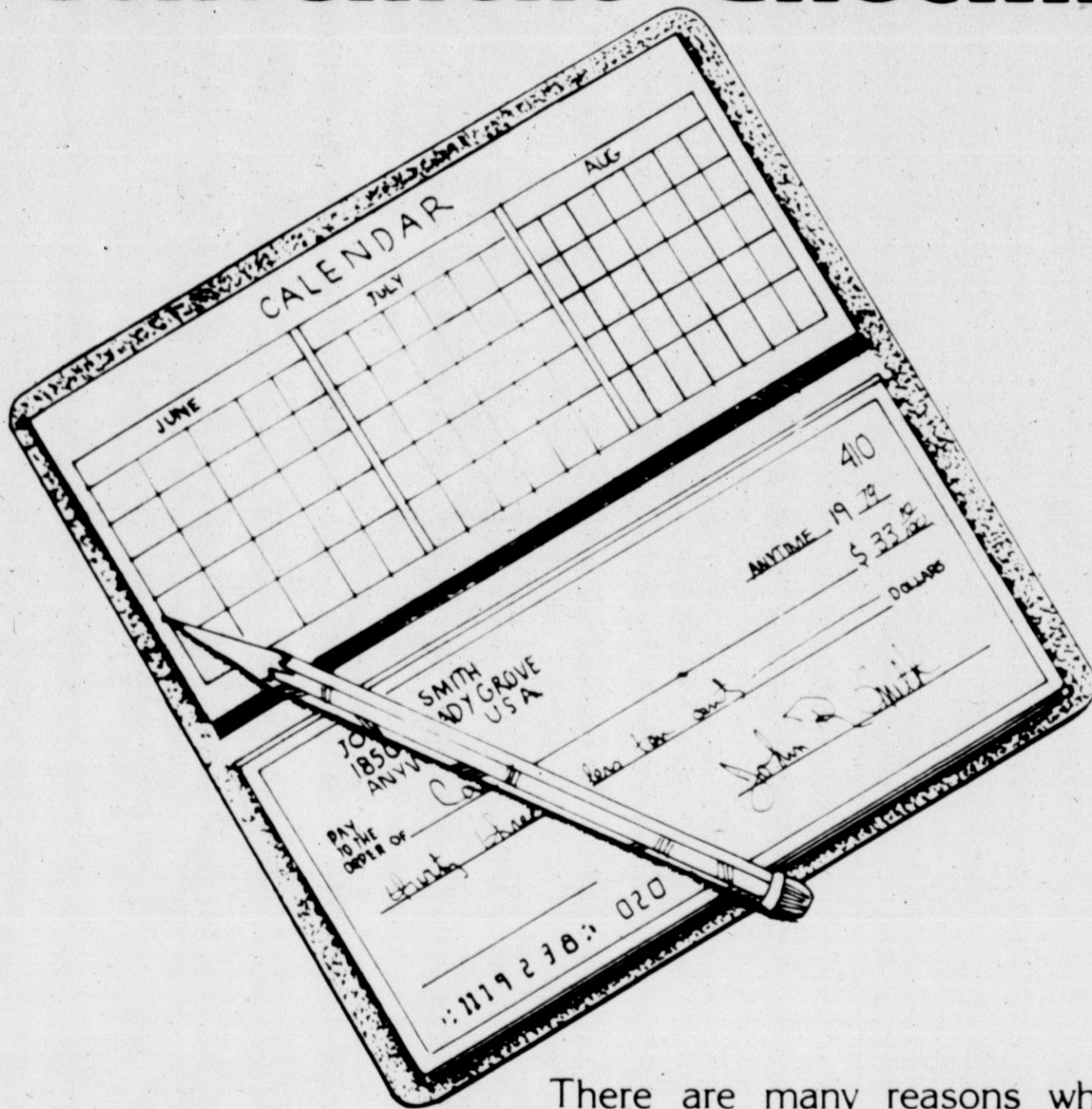

# ABC's 'Dynasty' ratings recover

LOS ANGELES (AP) — When an audience begins to tune out a top-rated show and it nosedives in the ratings, the end is usually at hand.

But for ABC's "Dynasty" it was only the cliffhanger.

Blake, Krystle and Alexis (played by John Forsythe, Linda Evans and Joan Collins) have battled their way back after losing 20 percent of their audience.

The night-time soap is not on top again, but it is beating its competition Wednesday. In the most recent Nielsen ratings, it was 17th, ahead of "Magnum, P.I." on CBS and NBC's two half-hour combatants, "Night Court" and "The Tortellis."

The heady days are gone for all the prime-time soap operas. CBS' "Dallas," which used to be neck-and-neck with "Dynasty" in the ratings, also has slipped. But "Dallas" never

fell as far as "Dynasty," and it consistently trounces its Friday night competition from NBC, "Miami Vice."

Part of the answer was that television's pendulum took another swing, and situation comedies, led by NBC's "The Cosby Show," regained their old popularity.

The other part of the answer is that "Dynasty" began to self-destruct.

"I think the beginning of it was when we launched 'The Colbys' in 1985," said Esther Shapiro, one of the show's executive producers and co-creator with her husband, Richard.

"We should have gotten the show going earlier. It took some of the focus away from 'Dynasty.' Our energy was going in two directions."

Shapiro said some of the fun of doing "Dynasty" evaporated in that period, and she leaned toward stories that were not much fun for the audience.

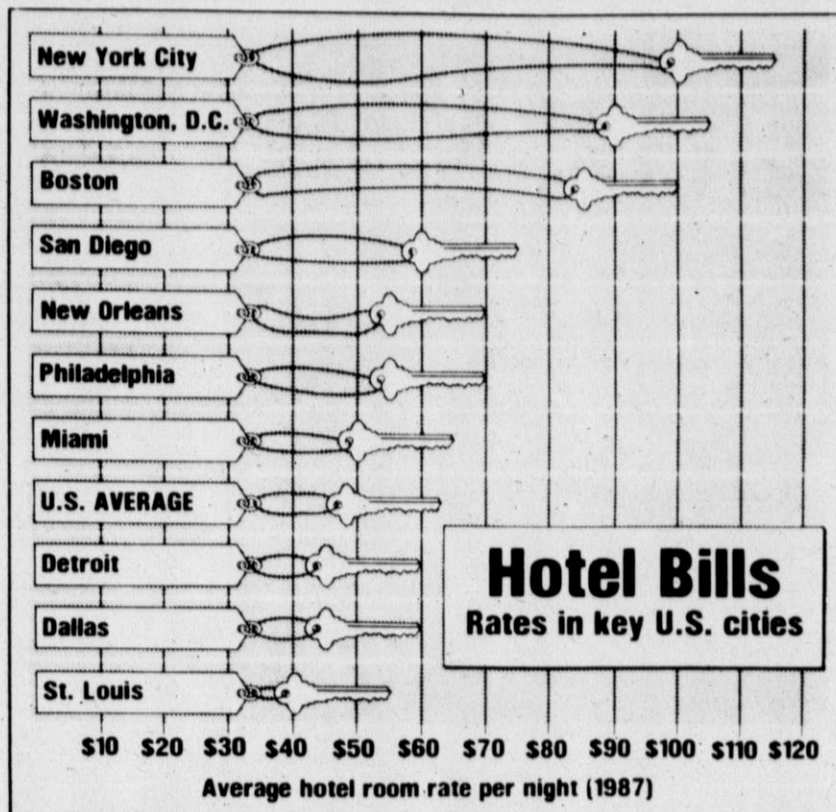

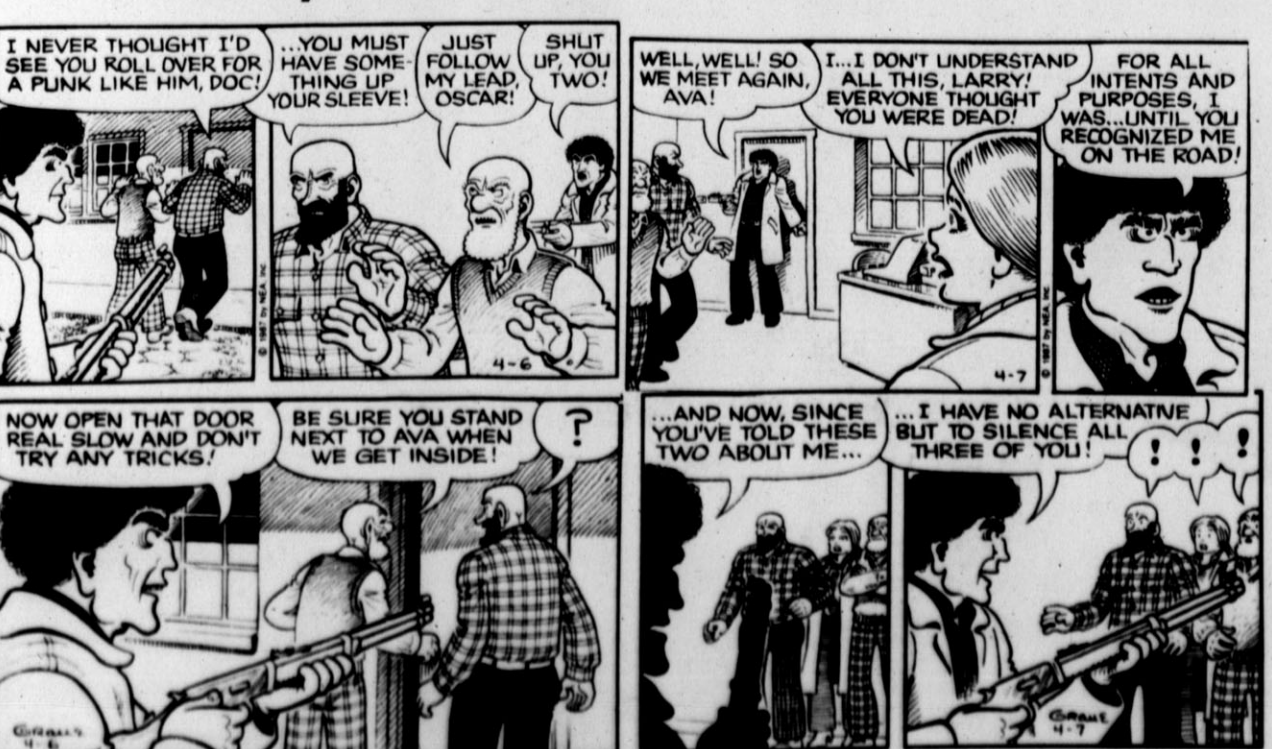
