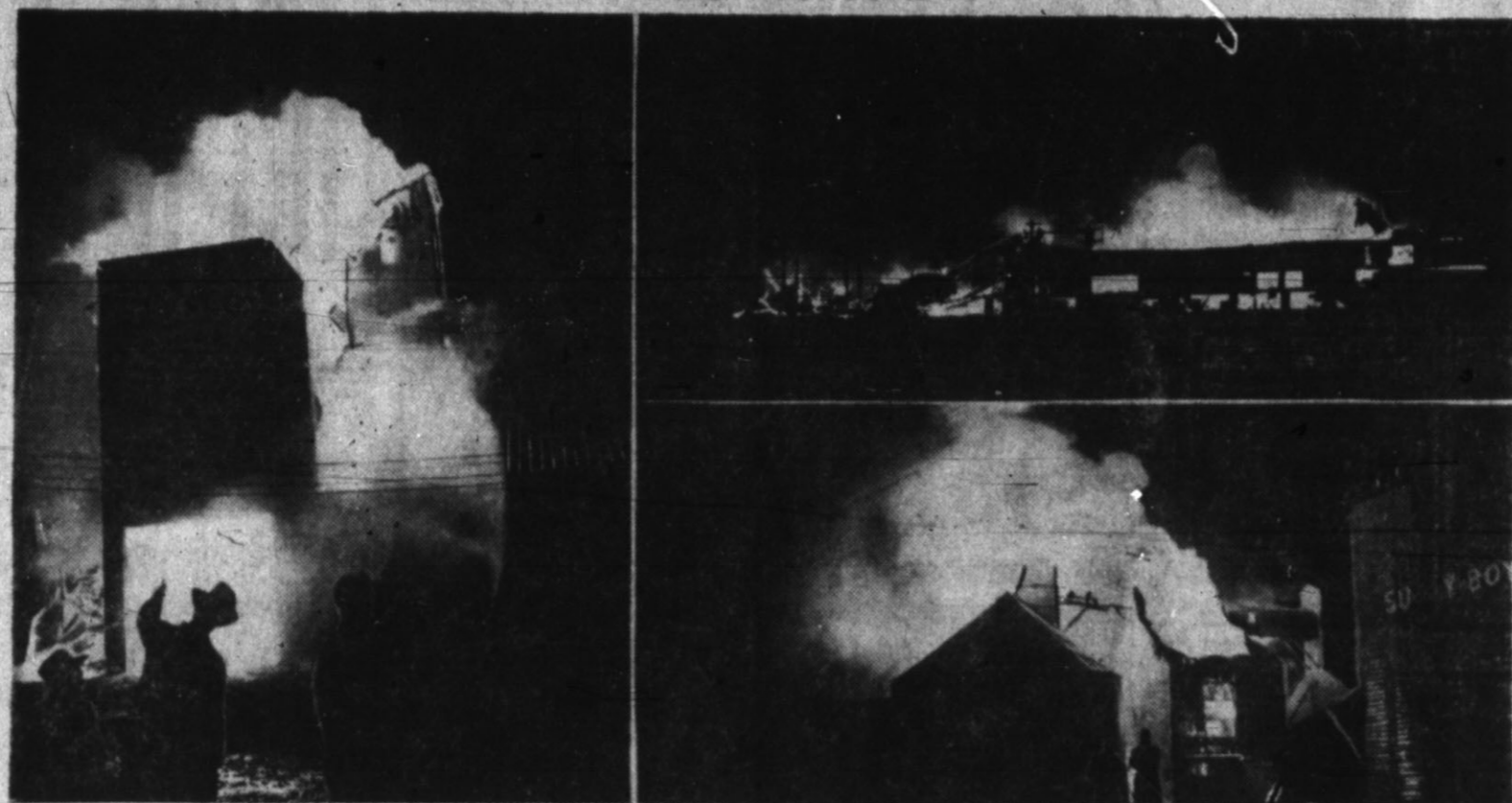
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## Heavy Snow Blankets Panhandle-Plains on New Year's Day

#### EVENTS

In the files of The Hereford Brand, history was written in the headlines of an eventful year.

The top news stories of 1946, rated on the basis of general interest and importance to the greatest number of people, concern Politics, Disaster, and Progress.

Inevitably in this agricultural area, the Weather played a big part in making news of the year. A 12-inch snow on January 14-15 proved a tremendous boon to 1946 crops. A disastrous hail storm on May 19 wiped out an estimated half million bushels of prime wheat in a three-county area, causing damage at more than \$1,000,000.

Disaster made the headlines again on June 14, when fire destroyed part of the Fraser elevators, causing damage estimated at \$160,000.

Disaster of another sort was tempered by governmental mercy when, on July 16, the bottom dropped out of the potato market in mid-harvest, and hundreds of growers rushed to sell surplus spuds to the government at life-saving support levels.

Elections came thick and fast in 1946. Topping the election news was the Democratic primary on July 27, when J. C. Reese won a landslide election to the office of sheriff, and Leonard Foster went into a run-off with W. H. Rensell for the office of county judge, with Foster winning the contest on August 23.

Biggest upset of the year was the school board election on April 6, when a surprise write-in campaign sent Leo Forrest, Sylvester Single, and Henry Sears into office as new board members.

The City Election on April 2 placed W. E. Dameron as Mayor, J. C. McCracken and Lyle Blanton as commissioners, at the head of the city government.

Proposed consolidation of schools came to a vote on August 21, after heated pro and con discussion, and was defeated by the rural districts.

A \$50,000 swimming pool bond issue on April 30 carried the city by a 2-1 majority, but turned out to be the flop of the year as bonds remained unsold, swimming pool un-built.

A Tax Survey, completed August 8, raised city and school district valuations 60 per cent, and brought slight cuts in tax rates.

#### New County Officers Are Sworn In

New county officials were sworn in at formal ceremonies in the county court room at 10 o'clock in the morning on New Year's Day.

Retiring County Judge Fred W. Baird administered the oath of office to his successor, Judge Leonard Foster, and Judge Foster presided at the swearing-in of other officers.

The county courtroom was comfortably filled by members of official families, a sprinkling of photographers, and several interested by-standers.

Judge Baird made a brief introductory talk before turning the duties of office over to his successor.

Taking the oath of office for the first time were Sheriff J. C. Reese and his three deputies, Neal Young, Worth Covington, and Miss Bess Hagar; and County Commissioner John I. Morris.

The only other new face in the official line-up, Commissioner-elect J. T. Guinn from Precinct 3, was absent from the swearing-in ceremonies Wednesday morning. Commissioner Guinn was in California at mid-week, and unable to be present.

Other officials, all re-elected to their respective offices, who took the oath of office Wednesday were County Clerk Robert Thompson, County Treasurer Velma Hodges, County Attorney Carl Gilliland, Commissioners Troy Moore and Jeff Roberson, Justice of the Peace Andy Thomas; County Surveyor Alex Thompson, and Hide and Animal Inspector J. W. (Uncle Walk) Brady.

#### Schools Will Remain Closed Until Monday

Three to four inches of snow blanketed this entire area on the afternoon of New Year's Day, and according to radio reports this morning, snow has covered the entire north and south plains.

Opening of Hereford schools, scheduled for this morning, has been postponed until Monday, Supt. George Graham announced.

Practically all schools in the Panhandle are closed today as heavy snowfall blocked roads and made travel hazardous over all highways.

Supt. Graham contacted Amarillo radio stations early this morning and had announcements broadcast that Hereford schools would remain closed until Monday. Other school heads over the Panhandle were issuing similar announcements.

Rail and highway transportation has not been seriously interrupted, but driving conditions throughout the Panhandle-Plains area are reported to be hazardous.

The snowfall began on the south plains, and moved north. Snow began falling in Hereford at mid-afternoon, and continued through early evening. The snowfall here reached a depth of between three and four inches.

At Hereford schools, scheduled to re-open Monday morning after the prolonged Christmas holiday, the new Junior High School will be occupied for the first time. Seventh graders, which have been in the First Baptist building, will be at the new building Monday.

Formal opening of the new Junior High School will be held Monday, when six classes will be in session. The building will be open to the public.

#### Irrigation Groups Form High Command to Fight Pro-Ration

##### Water Users Seek More Memberships

A drive to secure additional members to aid in the fight against pro-ration of Plains irrigation water supplies is being launched by the Deaf Smith County Water Users Association.

Howard Gault, chairman of the recently organized association, issued a call this week to all business men, as well as farmers and well owners, to support the fight, pointing out that every person in business on the Plains is affected by the proposed legislation.

County Agent Hugh Clearman is secretary of the association, and is receiving new members at his office in the court house.

The High Plains Water Conservation Association, composed of representative county organizations, formed a high command to fight pro-ration of irrigation water.

The organization, as an over-all "command" plan and direct strategy, to defeat any legislation which may be proposed by the Texas Legislature to control the use of irrigation water on the high plains.

W. O. Fortenberry of Monroe was elected president; A. B. Tarwater of Plainview, vice president; and Jess Osborn of Muleshoe, secretary.

Howard Gault, chairman of the recently organized Deaf Smith County Water Users Association, and Lyle Blanton, appointed official delegate from the local association, were among local members attending the Plainview meeting.

Other county organizations represented in the Association include those from Lamb, Farmer, Hale, Floyd, Dallam, Bandall, Castro, Swisher, Lubbock, Hockley and Bailey counties, as well as the tri-county Petersburg association.

At a meeting in Plainview Tuesday, Fortenberry, Lyle Blanton, and Capt. Winfield Holbrook were named as an executive committee to direct the fight.

"The organization is already at work on the fight to defeat control legislation," Gault reported. "Pointing out that there will be a hard fight ahead to keep the proposed bill from being passed by the Legislature, Gault urged every person interested in the future of irrigation in this area to join the Deaf Smith Association and lend their support to the effort."

The local association was chartered two weeks ago with 64 members, the majority of them farmers and well-owners.

"Well owners and prospective well owners, as well as all business men in the area, are vitally affected by this proposed control legislation," Gault pointed out.

#### SPORTS

Highlight of the year in sports came on November 15, when the Hereford Whitefaces met the Tulla Hornets on the gridiron at Tulla and lost a heart-breaking 14-13 decision in a game which settled the District 1-A championship. The defending Whitefaces became 1946 co-champions but the Hornets won the right to represent the district in bi-district play-off.

Other sports highlights of the year:  
In February, four members of the Hereford High grid team were named on the 1945 All-District Football team. They were Lueb at end, Oakes at Tackle, Easley at guard, and Worrell at fullback.

On February 25, the Whiteface basketball team, plagued by resignation of coaches, disbanded on the eve of the District 1-A tournament.

On March 1, at the annual football banquet, Johnnie Rogers was elected captain of the 1946 football team.

On March 30, the Whiteface track team won the district 1-A Track and Field meet at Canyon.

On May 13, the Softball season opened in Hereford, and the Municipal League was off to a fast start. On September 10, the VFW entry won the Mundy title by defeating High School in three straight games in the finals of the Shaugnessy play-off.

#### Bruce Scroggins Killed Instantly In Hiway Crash

Bruce Scroggins, about 30, of Hereford, was killed instantly last night in a highway crash on Highway 60 just west of Summerfield.

The accident occurred shortly before six o'clock. Scroggins was driving a pick-up which crashed head-on into another pick-up driven by a man from Mountain, New Mexico. The other driver, whose name was not available, and E. S. (Jud) Ragland, who was with Scroggins, escaped with minor injuries.

Icy highways and poor visibility due to the heavy snowstorm were blamed for the crash.

The New Mexico pick-up, east-bound on Highway 60, had just passed another car and went into a skid when the pick-up which Scroggins was driving, west-bound, crashed into it.

Scroggins suffered severe head injuries which were believed to have caused instant death. He was brought to Hereford in an E. B. Black ambulance.

Funeral arrangements had not been made this morning, awaiting the arrival of relatives. No further details were available as The Brand goes to press.

Camp to Have Site Sale

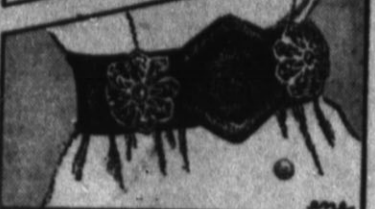

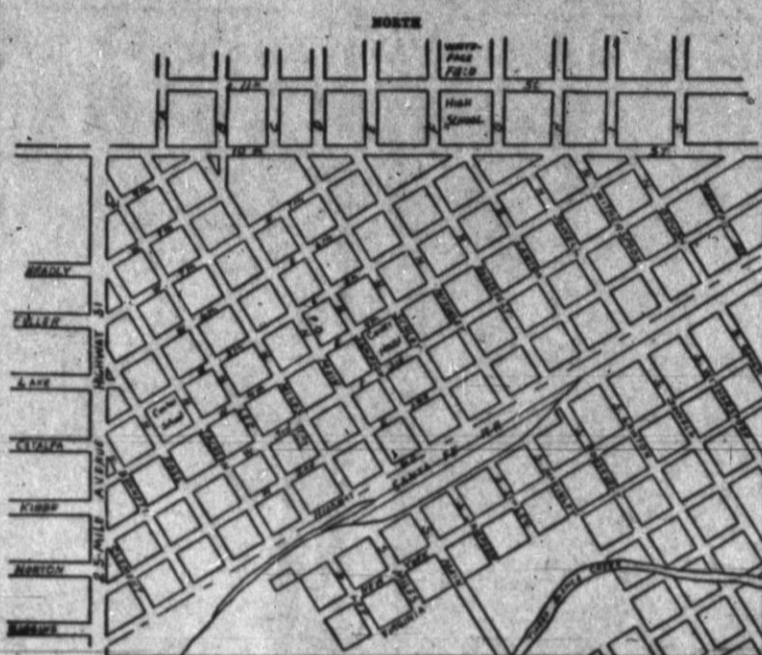

### MARKETS

Holiday dullness held both trade and offerings of southwest farm products at low levels during Christmas week, reports the Production and Marketing Administration. Price trends were strong on cotton and most livestock, slightly lower on eggs and grains, very weak on citrus, and about steady for other products.

Important factor in continued strength on cotton is the comparatively small supply in this country although world supplies of foreign cottons are high. Sales in ten designated markets totaled 103,334 bales compared with 208,800 in the previous week and 66,200 a year ago. Friday's spot prices for middling 15-16 inch were 33.10 cents a pound in Dallas, 33.05 New Orleans.

Wool went through one of the quietest periods of the year as most mills preferred to withhold purchases until after inventories are taken. Only small weight of revalued wools sold. Fair sales of the lower grades of mohair brought improved prices.

Fresh fruit and vegetable interest centered on citrus, with grower prices very weak and movement drabby. Vegetable de-

mand was slow to fair, and prices changed little. South Texas shipping season on tomatoes and peppers is about over, but beets, cabbage and carrots are increasing. Friday's prices f. o. b. Lower Rio Grande Valley shipping points were mostly \$2 per half crate for beets, \$1 per 50-pound sack for domestic round-type cabbage, and \$2.25 per crate for bunched carrots—all extra for top icing. Spinach in the Winter Garden area brought \$1 per bushel. Other southwest shipments in carload lots included sweetpotatoes from Louisiana and Texas, spinach from Oklahoma, onions and potatoes from Colorado.

Peanuts held steady despite slow demand. With the crushing season about over, southwest mills reported only scattered receipts from Texas and Oklahoma. Buyers of shelled peanuts filled immediate needs with most users well-stocked.

Holiday dullness had little effect on rice prices. Most mills closed until after January 1, and growers held firmly to remaining supplies of rough rice. Wheat, sorghums, oats and corn, on the other hand, eased under slack demand for fairly large offerings.

Only scattered cars of prairie hay moved from southeast Kansas. Southeast Oklahoma growers reported no carlot shipments, but sold some tracklots at barns for \$20 a ton. Limited offerings of alfalfa brought fairly steady prices.

A let-up in demand following the holidays weakened the egg market. Current receipts on Friday brought 37 to 40 cents a dozen in Dallas, 40 to 42 in Fort Worth, and 36 to 38 in Denver. Interest shifted from turkeys to chickens, and fair receipts of hens and fryers found good demand at steady prices.

Seasonally light livestock receipts kept the trend steady to strong except for some weakness

on cattle. Early week gains on hogs were maintained to the close at Texas points, but were partially lost on Oklahoma City, Denver and Wichita, although all markets closed \$1 to \$1.50 higher than a week earlier. On Friday, good and choice medium weights were quoted at \$21.50 per hundred pounds in Fort Worth, \$21 in San Antonio, \$21.75 in Oklahoma City, \$21.75 to \$22 in Denver, and \$21.34 to \$21.80 in Wichita. About the only changes in southwest sheep and lambs were in Denver and Wichita where gains of 25 to 50 cents were reported. Cattle prices had weak spots on steers, cows and bulls in San Antonio, cows and stockers at Fort Worth, steers and heifers in Denver, and on stockers and feeders in Wichita. These were offset to some extent by strength on calves at Texas markets and unevenly higher prices on all classes at Oklahoma City.

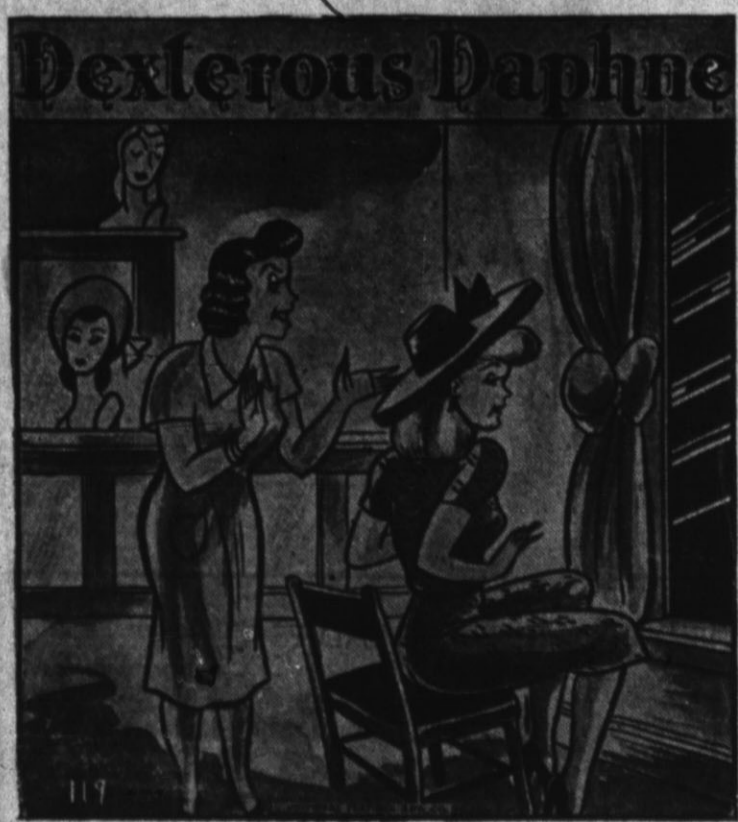
