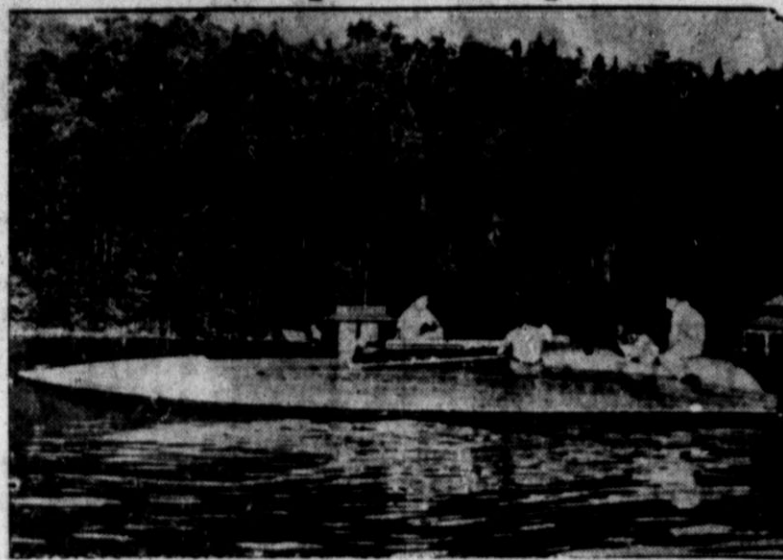

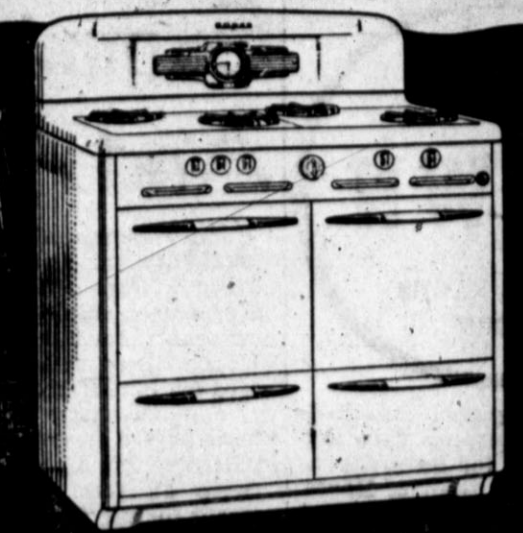

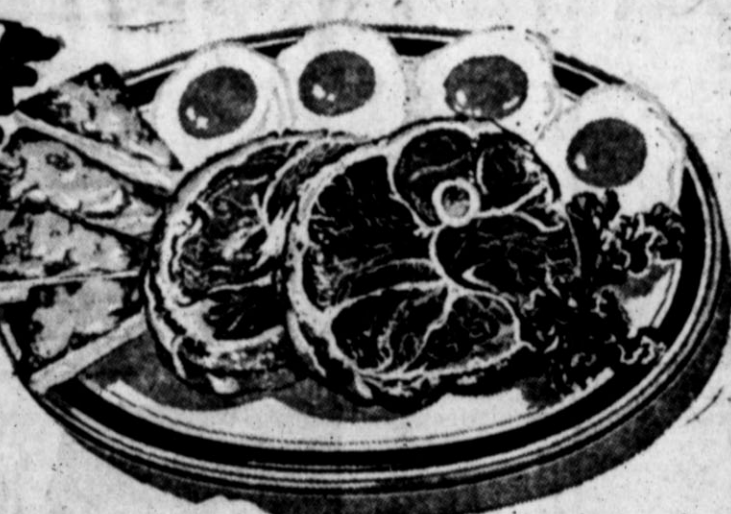

Young Fathers, old Fathers, wonderful Fathers love rice pudding for dessert. And here is McCall's, and the world's best rice pudding!

1/2 cup seedless raisins
2 tablespoons rum
1 teaspoon lemon juice
Grated rind of 1 lemon
1/2 cup rice
2 cups milk

1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons butter
2 eggs, separated
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Let raisins, rum, lemon juice and lemon rind mellow together for 2 hours or better still let stand overnight. Put rice, milk and salt in top of double boiler and cook for 1 hour stirring frequently but gently with a fork.

When rice is done take off stove and stir in butter. Beat egg yolks slightly and pour a little of the hot mixture onto them, stirring constantly (this way you have a smooth pudding). Mix the two mixtures and add sugar and nutmeg. Cool before you fold or gently stir in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into greased casserole. Set casserole in pan of hot water and bake 30 minutes in slow oven, 325°F. Makes 4 people want Father's Day every day.

Vanilla is head and shoulders above the other flavors in popularity. People eat it plain and drowned in sundae sauces such as chocolate, strawberry and butterscotch syrups. They eat it in malts and on pie a la mode.

But chocolate, strawberry and the marble varieties tie for runner-up position.

Sherbert Is Cooler
Sherberts are particularly popular during the summer. Because they contain less butterfat, they are more cooling. Also they are less fattening, and hence its generally the women who eat them; not the men.

Whether or not women eat them because they prefer them to ice cream or because they can eat them and still keep their waistslines is a mute point that will probably never get answered. Waitresses are not prone to shove a dish of sherbert in front of a waiting customer and sneer, "What's the matter, scared you'll get fat?"

So June, the dairy month goes rolling along, paying its homage to Bossie and recognizing her as one of America's most important animals, and calling to the attention of the people of America that the dairy industry, though often overlooked, is in reality one of the most important in the United States.

"Photomontage comes from the French word which means 'to join' and is the name of the operation of joining or combining two negatives so they produce one picture." "A good example of this process is the picture Henry Stahl made of Kenneth Coker in the drug store, when he super-imposed a shot of a fisherman on the original picture, so that in the finished product Kenneth is standing in the drug store surrounded by bottles and business while dreamily thinking of going fishing," said Sappington. This is the process people use for trick shots, putting animal heads on human bodies, etc, and is also what happens in trick shots of one person in two poses.

Cotton Classing News Service Is Offered Farmers

Farmers interested in the free cotton classing and marketing news service were this week given an outline of plans for handling the 1949 service.

Nell C. Buchanan, head of the Amarillo office of the Cotton Branch of the Production and Marketing Association, said farmers should apply for these services just as they did last year. The news will be available without cost to growers under the Smith-Doxey act.

To be eligible for the free cotton classing and market news services, he pointed out that farmers must meet these requirements: 1. belong to a group of farmers organized to promote the improvement of cotton; 2. plant part of his acreage in the variety of cotton adopted by the group; 3. file an application as soon as the cotton is planted.

Groups in this area should mail their application to their local County Agent or 1701 Avenue H, Lubbock, Texas.

"To make sure farmers secure all the benefits due them under this program, their group application should reach our office by July 1," Mr. Buchanan said. However, applications will be accepted until August 15, 1949.

Garden Study Club Mrs. A. O. Thompson Addresses Newest

The proper proportions are 1 teaspoon lysol to each quart of water and from 3 to 6 hours soaking is necessary.
