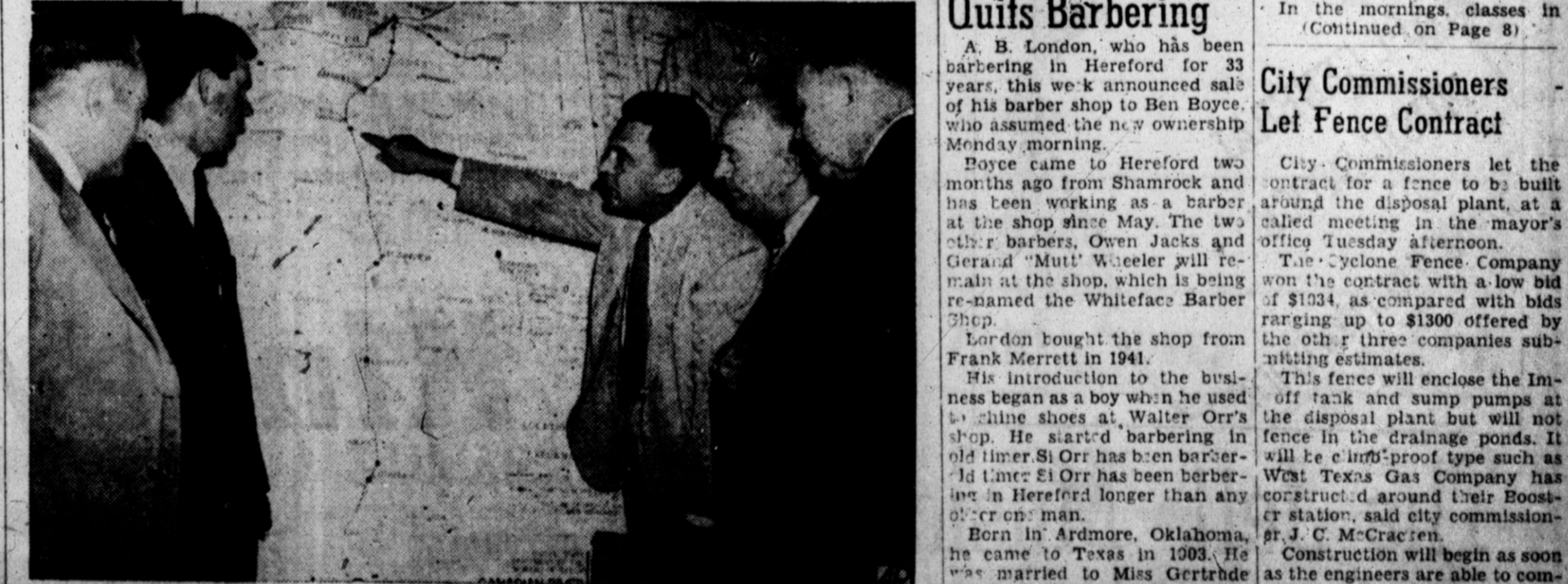

### Contract Is Let, Work Starts Soon On New First Presbyterian Church

Members of the First Presbyterian Church agreed at a congregational meeting Sunday morning to submit the contract for their new building to George Woodhouse of Pampa who scheduled construction to begin sometime this week.

The contract was for a \$75,000 building and calls for a 150 working day schedule. "We should be in our new building by the first of the year," said Will S. Kerr, chairman of the building committee. "There are no delays called for in the contract. Our only bottleneck was brick, and since we agreed on the type of brick we want and have already chosen it, they

assure us delivery by the time it is needed." This new building, which goes up on the southeast lot at the intersection of Seventh Street and Lee Avenue, will be built of light colored brick. Woodhouse was to be in Hereford either Wednesday or Thursday for the preliminary work on the building.

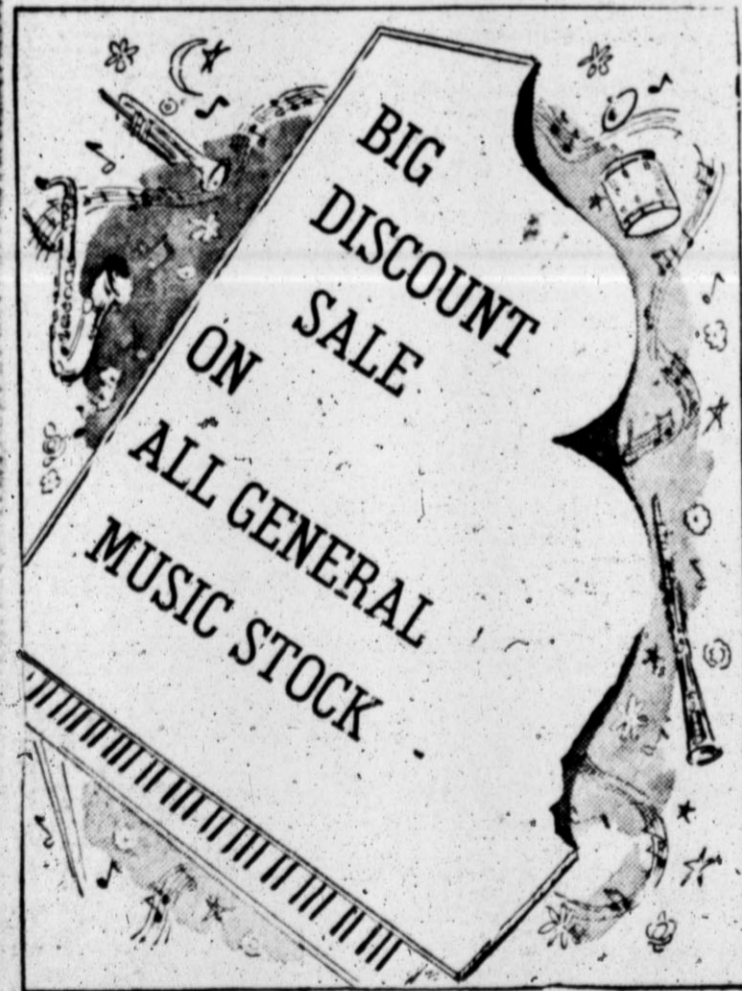

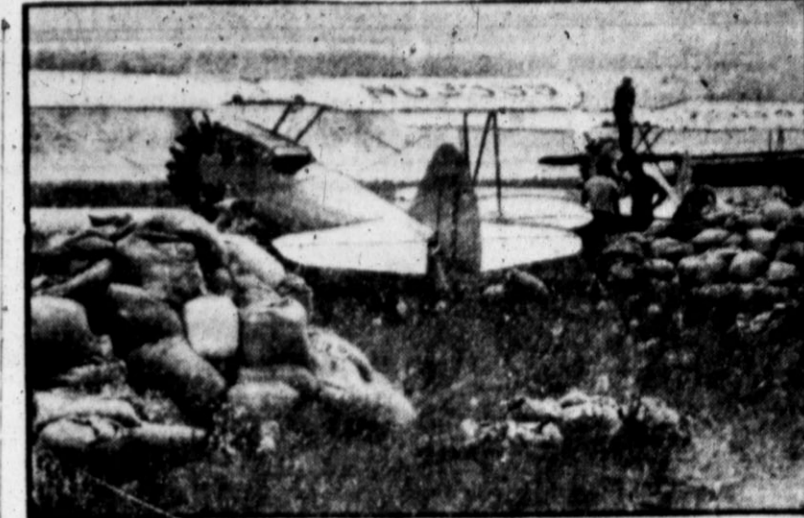
**Two Persons Treated For Burns This Week**

Deaf Smith Wheat Spotlights By Healthiest Variety Furor



This is the man who did it. He began eating whole wheat 15 years ago on his doctor's advice, and ordered it from Deaf Smith County.

He claims that whereas he was underweight, had low blood pressure and suffered from a heart murmur, he is now sound enough to get into the Marine Corp—all because of this wheat.

That of course, isn't too unusual. The trouble started when Strom declared that it was the black-hull or slick headed wheat that seemed to be the most healthful. While he was visiting here he noticed that cattle grazing on the young wheat shoots seemed to prefer this kind, which were incidentally the same varieties that were anathema to the millers.

This was carrying things to far, decided Keats E. Soder of Oklahoma City, director of the Texas-Oklahoma wheat improvement program.

"Any story which influences growers to return to the totally undesirable varieties from a baking standpoint is a disservice to all growers, handlers and processors of wheat in Texas," he wrote the News.

He said he had no quarrel with Strom's statement that Hereford wheat contains higher mineral contents than that raised in other areas, but he did object to Strom's claim that one variety contains more or less minerals than another when both are raised on the same ground.

"Millers and grain men as well as leading farmers have been instrumental in reducing materially the undesirable varieties of wheat raised in Deaf Smith County," said Soder.

Deaf Smith's present rate of desirable wheat is about 85 per

## Canadian Dam Situation Clarified By Anarillo Mayor At Lions Club

Speaking at a meeting of the local Lions Club yesterday noon, Gen. Klein, Mayor of Amarillo, clarified some of the features of the Canadian River Dam project which was presented to a sub-committee of the Congress on July 8.  
 Commenting that "water is the economy of the Panhandle" Mayor Klein outlined the three areas which the dam project will include—the Borger-Pampa area, the Central area, of which Hereford is a part, and the extreme South Plains region surrounding Lubbock. Cost of the dam and reservoir, including the rights-of-way, said Klein, is figured at \$27,800,000, and the cost of the aqueduct system will be \$54,300,000. A fifty-year period for repayment is designated, and \$77,000,000 will be repayable to the Federal government through repurchase by the eleven cities involved in the project. 84 percent of the water stored will be used by Borger, Amarillo, Pampa and Lubbock.

**Top Didn't Leak**  
 When they got to Butte, they decided to take a short cut through the mountains, which turned out to be an error of judgment. They drove all night after they left Yellowstone, deserting the 33 cent gas area for the 27 and 25 cent districts.

And so finally they got back home. Maybe they'll go east next year—if the Model A holds out.

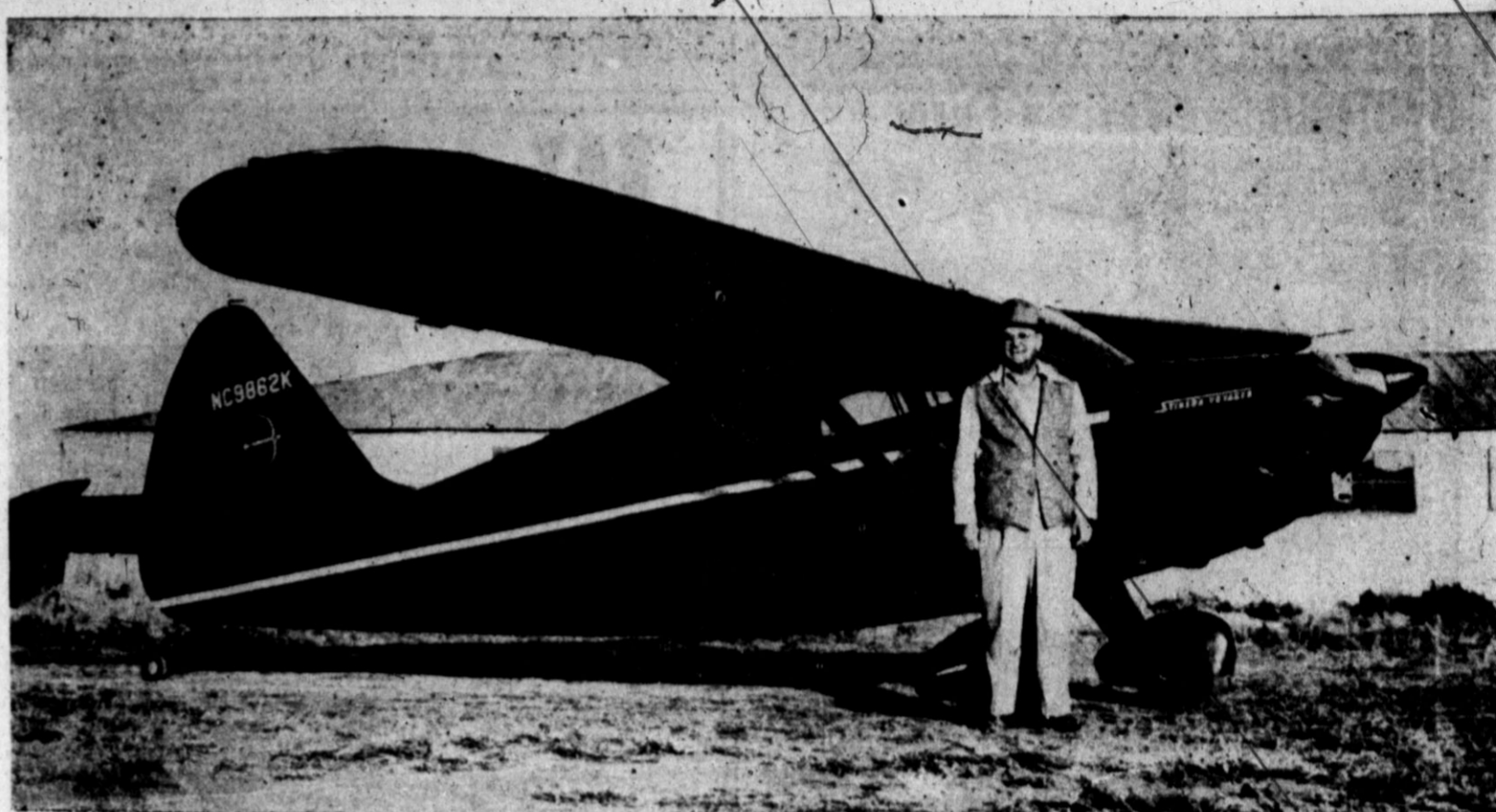

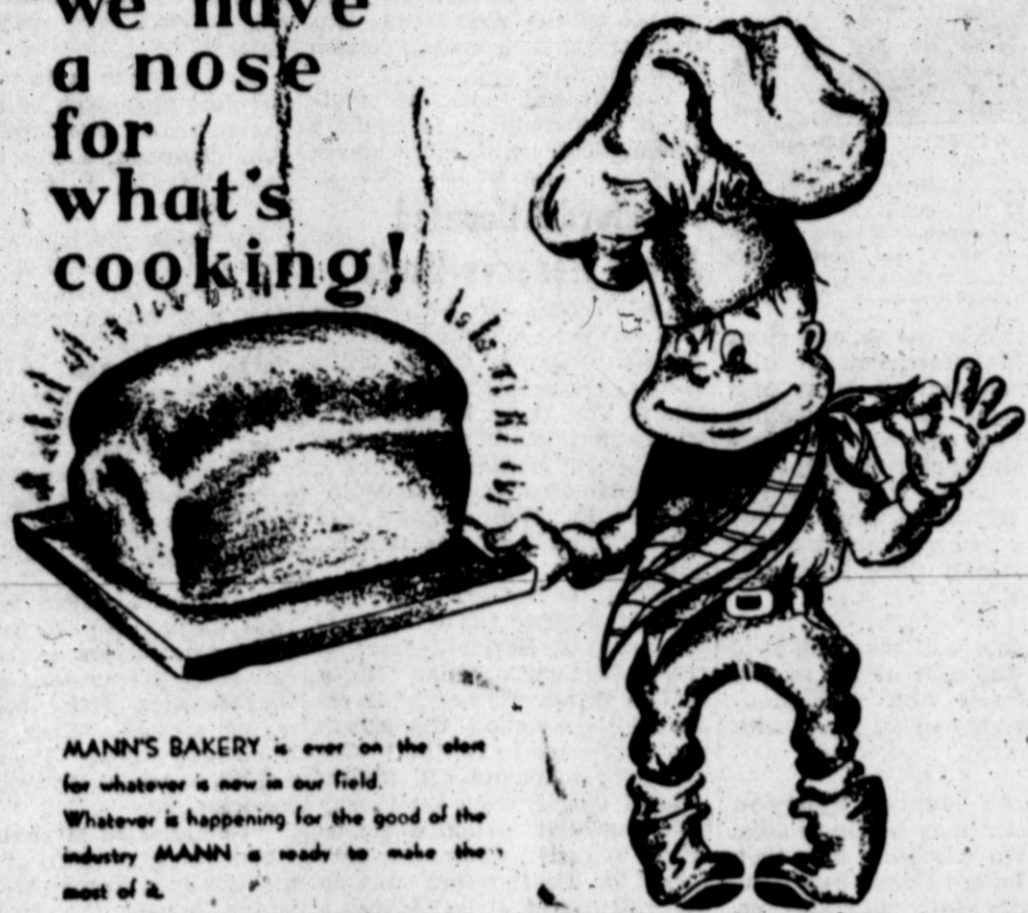
Oklahoma Baptist University, Hockaday College, Baylor University, Southern Methodist University, Texas Technological College, and Oglethorpe University in Georgia.

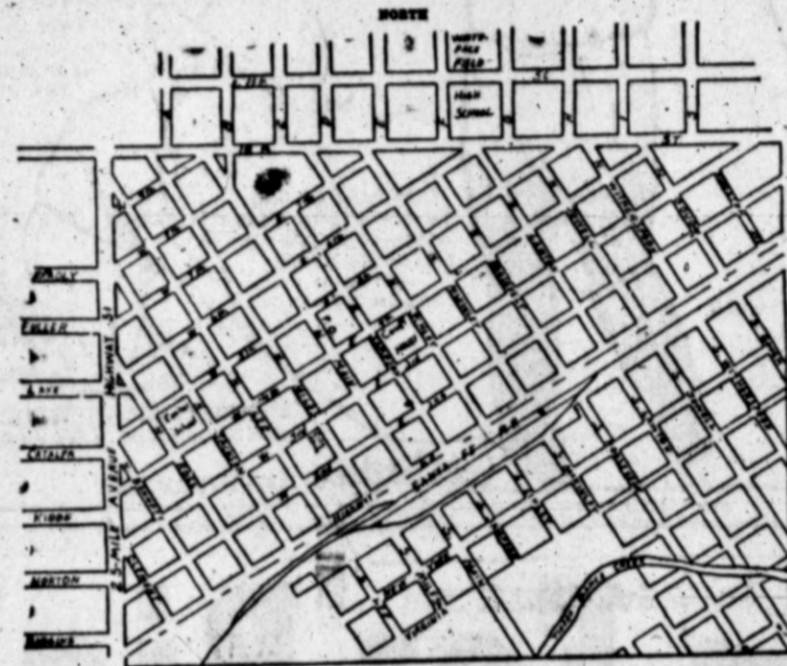

Ferguson, Jr. held the individual record for numbers brought in, with a total of 213, and George McMahon and John Cunningham, working together, had 784.

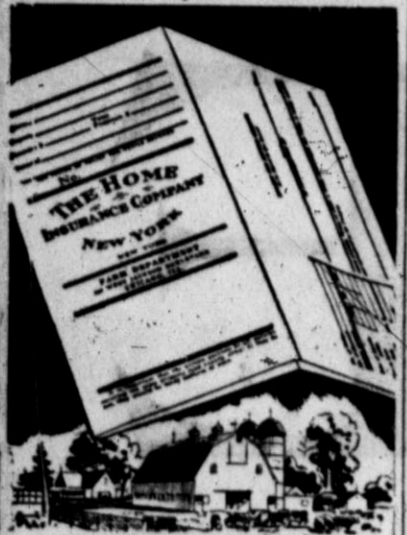

reptions. However, if aircurrents are just right, Lueb explained, they frequently find they are listening in on the one way conversations of power utilities broadcasting from Mississippi and Louisiana.

Most of the Hereford service consists of reports on pressure, line breaks. At present the

pressure station is not in 24 hour operation, and Lueb said mostly they were just "standing by." They close from May 31 to Nov. 1. The radio is on at all times, however to catch any emergency messages.

This power station was opened in the fall of 1947 and serves to pump gas from the natural gas fields near Borger over to the New Mexico towns such as Portales, Tucumcari, Clovis, etc. The Booster Station is not used by Hereford. "It just shoves the gas on over to New Mexico," Lueb explained.

C. W. Spurlock is chief operator, and Lester Arnold Funk, James E. Gallagher, and Henry T. Wedel are other operators at the station.
