

Officials of PCCA say that forward contracts that have already been sold will be honored. "However," according to one official of the PCCA, "no more of the contracts will be sold." eliminates side effects COLLEGE STATION -Medical researchers at Texas A&M University have successfully used a mirror image of a popular glaucoma drug to de-

velop a new treatment that apparently eliminates dangerous side effects. The new drug is D-timolol. Its structure is an exact mirror image of Ltimolol, an agent first marketed under the trade name Timoptic.

Glaucoma is caused by a buildup of pressure in the chambers of the eye and primarily affects persons over age 40. People can develop the ailment as young as age 20, said Dr. George C. Y. Chiou, head of medical pharmacology. Untreated, the pressure deadens the optic nerve end and causes

Timolol inhibits formation of aqueous humor, a transparent liquid contained in the chambers of the eye, and reduces intraocular pressure, said Chiou. But large scale clinical studies have revealed that Ltimolol eye drops can cause cardiovascular disturbances in patients with a history of asth-

According to the researchers, D-timolol does not appear to cause such side effects.

Melody James is another "normal" kid. She wears glasses, and has four brothers who tease her a lot. Melody enjoys playing checkers with Mark.

Mandy Puccini is deaf. She knows sign language and loves to dance. She has two sisters who can hear and a cat named Sneakers. Mandy taught the teachers at the program some sign language.

The "Kids on the Block" are a group of incredible puppers, some handicapped and some not, which help kids to understand different disabilities, and what it's like to have them.

Created by Barbara Aiello, a former teacher of handicapped children, the "Kids on the Block" are three feet tall and wear real kids' clothes and shoes, helping children relate to them and talk to them more freely than they would with adults or other children with disabilities.

According to Ms. Aiello, there are two important goals for the "Kids on the Block." She wants to teach children about handicaps in a "non-threatening and unpreachy fashion." Second, she wants to show

unpreachy fashion." Second, she wants to show non-handicapped children how to develop positive relationships with their handicapped peers. The puppets show them how they can be friends.

The puppets come as a

kit including the puppets, props, scripts, and cards. Ms. Aiello writes all of the scripts for the puppets which are developed from the questions and concerns of non-disabled kids. All of the script material is critiqued by disabled children, adults, and parents of disabled children before being incorporated into the kit. The Region XVII Service Center has purchased a kit and they now do programs for schools in the district on Wednesdays. The program is in such demand that they are currently booked into the 1983-84 school year. Ms. Aiello's "Kids on the Block" have appeared on ABC's "Good Morning America," as well as on a CBS television special featuring Gary Burghoff (Radar of M*A*S*H

fame). The Kids are truly animated, entertaining, and appealing. They show that it's okay to be friends with disabled kids, and that the disabled kids have many friends, not just other kids with the same disability. Helping children to develop positive attitudes toward people with handicaps is not an easy job, but thanks to Barbara Aiello and the people at the Region XVII Service Center, it is easier now for local and area educators who have access to the "Kids on the Block.'

County Soil Maps Now Availible

A second round of snows have helped create nearly excellent soil moisture conditions in the upper 3 feet of most soil profiles throughout the area. The annual soil moisture survey measurements taken by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service between February 14 and 23 of this year, generally indicate the top two feet are at 90% field capacity and the third foot is at nearly 75% of capacity. However the fourth and fifth feet are generally much dryer. This is especially true for marginally irrigated and dryland portions of the Southern High Plains.

Deep soil moisture reserves were depleted last summer and the area has received an average of only 4 to 6 inches of precipitation since harvest, only enough to wet the top two and a half feet of the soil profile. Where plow pans are present they did not appreciably affect the moisture penetration because the snow melt was slow enough to allow infiltration with no runoff.

Even though this year's soil moisture deficits are similar to last years, conditions are better now because 65 to 70% of the moisture is in the top three feet of the profile where the plants need it. Most of the deficit is in the fourth and fifth feet of the profile.

Plant response during the early growing season should be good. However, once the plant uses the upper level moisture, there is currently no reserve deep soil moisture to carry it through an extended dry period.

The soil moisture deficit map is published as a tool to give producers a better picture of soil moisture reserves over the entire area. It can help them make more informed irrigation decisions and help avoid both over and under irrigating in the Spring. It can also give an indication of

potential production. The map's soil moisture deficit readings are a measure of how much water is still needed to wet the soil in the crop root zone to field capacity. The sample indicates general trends over the area, but does not predict exact soil moisture conditions on any given farm. Each landowner needs to check his individual farm soil moisture to determine its water

needs. The survey is a cooper-

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

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

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

Department of Agriculture. Assistant Secretary Mary C. Jarratt said the new application forms resulted in 10 percent fewer applications approved for free meal benefits in schools taking part in the study. In addition, reduced-price eligibility was about 15 percent lower in schools using

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


