

Each week, the greatest of the old and the finest of the new talent are assembled for presentation to televiewers everywhere by famous emcee Ed Sullivan.









Early Molting Hens Cut Into Egg Profits

Even with low summer egg prices, tens can make money when the hens can make money "quitters" are taken out. At usual summer prices for feed and eggs, there's a fair profit spread for hocks laying at a 50% rate. This means the farmer must gather half as many eggs every day as there are hens in the laying house.



MOLTING occurs early in the poor layer. She drops one or two wing feathers at a time. Hens that stert molting in June, July and in early August should be culled. They'll usually take two to four months to complete the molt and come into full proete the molt and come into full production again.

Good flocks can be kept well above this level when the "quitters" are taken out—hens which have gone into molt and stopped producing.

These early molters are the poorest producers. They take longest to molt and usually won't be back into full production until early winter.



The tidelands area embraces 2,608,774 acres of shallow, submerged lands which have been legally within the boundaries of Texas since the first session of the Congress of the Republic of Texas in 1836. The tidelands were specifically given to Texas for all time in the Joint Resolution annexing Texas to the United

In 1933 Mr. Harold Ickes, then the Secretary of the Interior, stated that tidelands generally could not be appropriated except by authority of the sovereign

In June, 1944, he reversed himself for the third time and tried to move in on the tideland States. At this point the States went to Congress and sought relief. The House passed a resolution on September 20, 1945 favoring the tedielands states by a United States government, given vote of 105 to 11. The Senate passed a similar resolution on July 22, 1946 by a 44-34 vote. So There is a bill which would President Truman vetoed the Bill on August 1, 1946. The House failed to override the veto by a mere 17 votes, 139 to 95.

United States government, as a condition under which she joined the Union. The United States Attorney General's office chose to consider the solemn word of the United States as unimportant, and sued Texas anyway. The Supreme Court, on Black Monday, June 5, 1950 also decided that the solemn word of the United States government isn't worth the paper it's written on.

The decision simply "legalizes" theft. It also leaves all of us Texans with the problem of raising a billion dollars in tax money over the years to support our public schools. That money would have been forthcoming from the revenue from oil-reproducing wells in the tidelands area.

But there are other implications. The decision gives the Federal Government the green light to move in on anything it wants within the sovereign states Mr. Phylip B. Perlman, the United States Solicitor General who is so fond of quoting Communists and fellow-travellers as authorities in his briefs, was asked recently if the tidelands decision would affect the Great Lakes. "I don't know," he said. "Let's find outif there's anything in the Great Lakes the government wants."

If the Federal Government, in its greedy quest for control of every natural resource in the country, can claim that the Mc-Clellan Creek (which is four inches deep in some places) and any other stream in which you can float a log is "navigable" it can also declare that the Canadian River or even our Panhanfield tanks are technically "tidelands" and thus subject to Federal ownership and control.



the sign, it is possible for you to tell whether it is a REGULA-TORY sign intended to inform you of a law or regulation enacted to promote safety and convenience upon the streets and highways, whether it is a WARNING sign erected to tell you of a hazardous condition either on or beside the .oad, or whether it is a GUIDE or DI-RECTIONAL sign to lead you to your destination.

This is one in a series of artieles designed to make Mr. and Mrs. Average Driver more familiar with traffic centrol signs, which when properly understood and obeyed, make our highways a safer place to be. This is the story of the REGULATORY sign.

It is important enough to repeat that the REGULATORY sign is used to inform you of certain laws and regulations enacted to promote safety and convenience on streets and highways. A violation of these rules is a misdemeanor

Generally, the REGULATORY sign is rectangular in shape, and it is mounted with the longer side up. The letters and border are black, and the background is white with only the following exception: (1) Night speeds which have wante letters on a black background; (2) Parking signs which have red or green letters on a white background: and (3) top signs which are so important as to merit a full de-

The top sign is the outstanding exception to the usual shape and color combination of the REGULATORY sign group, and it needs no explanation to most motorists. It is the only standard sign which has an octagonal (eight-sided) shape, and it sually has black letters and border on a yellow background

Unless they are illuminated by a fixed source of light, the REGULATORY signs are always reflectorized to improve night visibility by using reflector buttons to outline the message or symbol or by covering the cntire background with a reflective


