### Ace Pilot Switches To Farm

The third "hottest" fighter llot of World War II is here doing chiseling work on county

Although you probably won't ause he is so busy he has to get around as fast as he used to in his P-51 to take care of all his ousiness; he lives with his wife on West First Street in their trailer in the 700-block.

Right now he is working on the Barrett farm about six or seven miles southwest of Hereford. His work is all land work now and he hasn't flown since about five months ago when he resigned the job of private pilot along with his wife for an oil company executive.

"There is lots of work here to do," his wife revealed Wednesday. "We will probably be here until enough rains come to make our job unnecessary. We will be here longer if there is something to do," she added.

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





By BOB KIRK DO YOU KNOW whether "finders keepers, losers weepers" is egally correct?

It is not correct. The true owner is entitled to the return of his property. The finder may keep the property until the true owner is found, but when the true owner of lost property be-comes known to the finder, he

must return it to the owner. DO YOU KNOW whether or not you could be charged with theft of lost property, which came into your possession?

An early case in Texas involv-

ed a trunk sold by one party to another. Inside the trunk were some goods belonging to the seller. Neither the buyer nor the seller knew at the time of the sale of the trunk that the goods were inside the trunk. The matter came before the Court, and in arriving at its decision in the case, the Court said that if at the time of finding the goods in the trunk, the buyer had a reasonable means of knowing or ascertaining the owner, and he kept the goods, intending to appropriate them to his own use, that under these circumstances the buyer of the trunk could be held liable for the theft of the



Millions of flies help to cause the illness and death of thousands of children and adults each year in the United States. Hundreds of these casualties may be i nthe State of Texas this year if residents fail in their responsibility for developing the best possible sanitation measures in the area where they reside. Typhold fever, summer complaint, and other intestinal diseases can be traced to the common housefly as the carrier of infection.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, speaking in this con-nection recently said, "Be sure that your windows and doors are tightly screened so that stray flies from a careless neighbor will not endanger your family. Be sure that flies are kept away from food, drink, and utensils used in the preparation of food. Make sure, if you live in rural districts, that outside privy would are tightly covered so as

vaults are tightly covered so as not to permit the entrance of flies. Infection from this source can be picked up and spread to human beings through contact with food, drink and utensils. Keep all garbage covered until collected or buried. Eliminate all breeding places for flies and you will be helping your community in its work of controlling communicable diseases and preventing unnecessary illness."



### Give Your Pecan Tree An Even Chance At The Start

can become a monument to you 50 years from now, that is, if you give it the start in life it needs. After transplanting, the pecan tree develops new roots very slowly and the top of the tree must be reduced in size to balance this root system, says J. E. Hutchison, associate extension hosticulturist of Texas A&M College. This usually means removing about a third of the top growth of the transplanted seed-

During the first growing season, a vital factor in the growth of the tree is plenty of moisture. The soil around the tree should never be allowed to become dry and if the season is dry, Hutchison recommends soaking the ground around the tree, to the full depth of the root system, once every two weeks.

He says newly planted pecan trees that are making little growth are likely to sunscald at the ground line unless protected. He points out that it is best not to water during the heat of the day. The wet soil should be covered with dry soil or a straw mulch. A straw mulch helps to conserve moisture and also to cool the soil. Sunscald can also be prevented by loosely wrap-ping the lower part of the trunk with burlap or paper soon after transplanting.
