

City Officials Say No Rate Increase

No definite action on the part of the City Commission came out of the Telephone Rate Hearing Tuesday morning, despite pleas of Southwestern Bell for higher rates immediately. Mayor W. E. Dameron and Commissioners S. O. Wilson and Don Zimmerman told A. O. Thomas and John Cornell of Southwestern Bell before they can be favorably disposed to the raise in rates, the telephone-company must improve local service and also enter into written agreement to enlarge

Mr. Thomas stated during the hearing that the company has plans drawn to extend the building 15 feet in front and 45 feet back toward the alley. This was the enlargement the city commission referred to.

Mr. Thomas also was quite surprised at the fact that Hereford citizens are not satisfied with telephone service they are now getting. He said Here ford has fewer people asking for telephones than any other town in the Panhandle. However the telephone company plans to survey the local situation and remedy service discrepincies.

A Maine Joke

EAVESDROPPING is an old family pastime with Maine's Sen. Owen Brewster who, as this column revealed, tapped the telephone wires of California airplane manufacturer Howard Hughes.

More than three years ago February 18, 1947, Senator Brew. ster appeared before a judiciary subcommittee to oppose the ap pointment of John Clifford as US district judge for Maine. The sen ator explained that Clifford came to Brewster's hotel room to discuss a local housing problem.

the appointment of this committee, in October, 1947, Senator Tobey of New Hampshire, chairman of the banking and currency committee, turned up with the proxies of four senators in his pocket. All four would have voted against Mc-

Carthy. Whereupon McCarthy moved that the committee refuse to honor proxles. Such a refusal is almost unheard of in congressional committees. However, McCarthy had a scant ma-jority of the committee with him, and got away with it. He then obtained the appointment of New York's Congressman Gamble, a foe of housing, as chairman of the housing committee, with himself as vice-chairman. It was as vice-chairman that McCarthy spent the taxpayers' money to tour the country studying housing, and later cashed in on that trip by getting \$10,000 from the Lustron Corporation.

" Though McCarthy now states hesold his article to the highest bidder, actually, according to Lustron officials, McCarthy pleaded for more

His income tax for 1948 may show the reason why. As filed in the state of Wisconsin, Mctotal income was \$28,947, inplus the \$10,000 from Lustron, plus \$4,535 in dividends from the Milwaukee and the Central of Georgia railroads.

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



Both libel and slander refer to

Libel is the expression in printing or writing or by drawings tending to blacken the memory of the dead, or injure the reputation of one alive, or to expose a person to ridicule.

Slander is the malicious and falsely imputing to a female a want of chastity. One guilty of slander or libel

may be punished under the criminal statutes of the state. Also one who commits libel or 'slander may be sued, and civil damages recovered by the injur-
