### **City To Install** Parking Meters, McDaniel Says

### **Commission Will** Make Purchase At Next Meeting

Big Spring city commission will purchase parking meters for installation in the business district at the next regular meeting scheduled for March 12, City Manager B. J. McDaniel said today, as final results of a survey conducted by the chamber of commerce showed 747 votes for meters and 185 against.

Under consideration, are three types of meters, one of which Me-Daniel will recommend to the commission for purchase. Installation probably will be made on either a six months or 12 months trial basis, with different time limits for various areas.

Most meters in the heart of the business section probably will take deposits from one cent to a nickel with time limits ranging from 12 to 60 minutes, McDaniel said. Short time meters with a flat de-Short time meters with a flat de-posit rate are being considered for areas near the post office, banks, etc., and other flat rates of a Meat Raises nickel for one hour and a half or two hours parking in regions on the outskirts of the business section are contemplated.

The city has been studying parking problems for several weeks, and meters have been under consideration since the beginning as a possible solution. The chamber of commerce was asked recently to conduct its survey to determine general opinion of residents.

"I am asking you and a very few other public spirited citizens to meet in the east wing of the White House at two o'clock (CST) Friday afternoon, March 1, to work out means for supporting such a voluntary program. Ex-President Hoover has accepted my invitation and will be there. I count on your support."

### Improved Company, **UAW Relationship**

DETROIT, Feb. 27. (AP) - A new contract, believed by the Ford Motor Co. to herald "improved labor relationships" will go into force between the company and the CIO United Auto Workers as soon as the union's locals give their approval.

Some 103,000 Ford workers throughout the country gain an 18 cent hourly wage increase under terms of the agreement, signed last night by management and union officials. Also included in the contract, to continue in effect unfil May 30, 1947, are clauses providing union and company security.

The Ford wage boost, a compromise of the union's original demand for a 30 percent increase, was agreed to by both parties Jan. 26, but other contract problems forced continuation of negotiations until last night.

Richard T. Leonard, head of the uni n's negotiators, said the agreemert would be submitted to the locais soon.
