DO YOU KNOW what determines where a jury trial is held? In criminal cases the trial is held in the County where the offense occurs, without respect to where the parties live. Under certain circumstances the trial may be removed to another county, but the init'al proceedings must be in the county where the offense oc-

In civil cases, the general rule is that a person must be sued in the county where he lives. However, there are thirty exceptions to this rule; one of the principal exceptions being that where a person has contracted in writing to perform an obligation in a particular county, expressly naming that county, suit upon or by reason of the obligation may be brought either in the named county or in the county where the Defendant resides.

Should a person be sued in a county other than his residence, he should immediately file a properly worded request to the Court to have the case transferred to the county of his residence. The Court will set a time for hearing, and decide from the evidence introduced at
