

Danger of Fire Is **Greatly Enhanced By Christmas Tree** THE AVERAGE CHRISTMAS tree can go up in smoke in only two minutes. That doesn't leave much

time for the fire department to get A live tree with roots packed in a bucket of earth is the safest. Be sure and keep the dirt moistened. A

small tree is safer than a large one and festive trimmings can make up what it lacks in size. Keep the tree outdoors until you are ready to set it up inside. When

you bring it in, keep it in the coolest part of the house with the radiator nearest it turned off.

Uso noninflammable aluminum ot cotton or paper-to conceal foil not cotton or paper-to conceal container in which tree is "planted." noninflammable trimmings on Use

Don't use lighted candles. (This may seem an unnecessary precaution in this day of electric lights, but lighted candles contribute to

tragic fires every year.) Check the wiring for the tree to see that it's got frayed and is in perfect condition. The switch for turning off and on electric lights should be at some distance from the tree. Don't plug or unplug lights beneath the tree.

Don't leave tree lights on when it isn't necessary and especially when the family is away from home. From time to time, check over the tree and see if needles near the lights are turning brown. If they have, move the lights.


Watch the calendar. New Year's is the day for the tree to go down. If you should extend the time, don't leave the lights on the tree for more than a half hour at a time.

in the case of surface water". Water users on the High Plains began fighting the move from the beginning and have continued to do so, Duggan said.

"Folks decided we needed to do something constructive to win our point," the attorney said. He explained that the High Plains Water association had composed and had passed a law which vested control in underground water in the people and which provided for the formation of water districts for conservation of the water.

The law, now on the statute books, provides for the re-charging of underground reservoirs, spacing of wells and proper construction of wells, Duggan pointed out.

Latest Danger

The spokesman said the state-appointed Texas Water Code committee had prepared a report for submission to the legislature. The recommendations of the report, if adopted, would effect underground water as well as surface water. Duggan said the committee was appointed to study only surface water.


