One Minor Car Wreck But No Deaths Reported Here

Hereford, a town, like most, in which many innocent women and children have died during the past year, still through the most dangerous time of the year—the Christmas holidays—with one wreck and not one person killed.

A car-pickup collision at the intersection of Highway 60 and Park Avenue was the only accident of the holidays. No persons were seriously injured.

The toll of death in other parts of the country was not so light. A total of 724 persons died during the three-day holiday.

An estimated total of \$350 damages were done to a car and pickup, but no persons were seriously injured in Hereford's lone traffic accident during the Christmas holidays.

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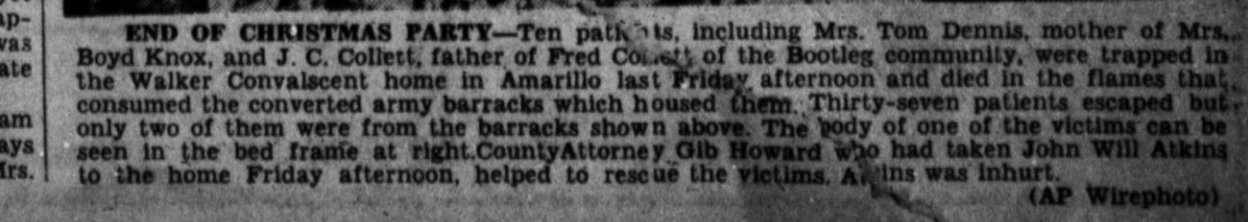

Hardin - Simmons Choir Give Concert Here Jan. 9

The Hardin-Simmons university chapel choir composed of 55 voices and directed by Euell Porter, chairman of the voice department of the H-SU School of Music, will give a concert at the First Baptist Church in Hereford Tuesday, Jan. 9 at 7:30 p. m.

The choir making its second annual tour, sings selections from the most devout church music of Palestrina, Bach, Billings to Jerome Kern melodies. Modern folk songs and negro spirituals are also on the pro-

gram.

The choir is one of two which are directed by Porter. Its sister organization is the Cappella choir which made a tour through South Texas in November, has sung for the past two years at the Southern Baptist convention, and appeared at the Texas Baptist convention in 1948, 1949, and 1950.

There are more women voices in the choir than men. There will be approximately 20 men and 35 women in the concert.

All performances are given from the phalanx position, thus permitting a crossing of voices, making a better blend of tone.

Choir members are dressed in white flowing robes with purple trimming. Shoes of comparable color are worn.

Although many of the singers are students in the School of Music, some of them are from other departments on the campus. Requirement for being in the choir is "a desire to sing." As a result science, history, education, and government students take time out from their school work to join the choir.

Two special groups will accompany the choir. They are a women's trio and a freshmen quartet. The trio, which has

been singing together during their high school days in Huntsville are Jean and June Hardy and Doris Adler.

The freshmen quartet consists of Davard Tyler; John Burgess, Humble; Ronny Bates, Brown and Roy Lowe, Amarillo.

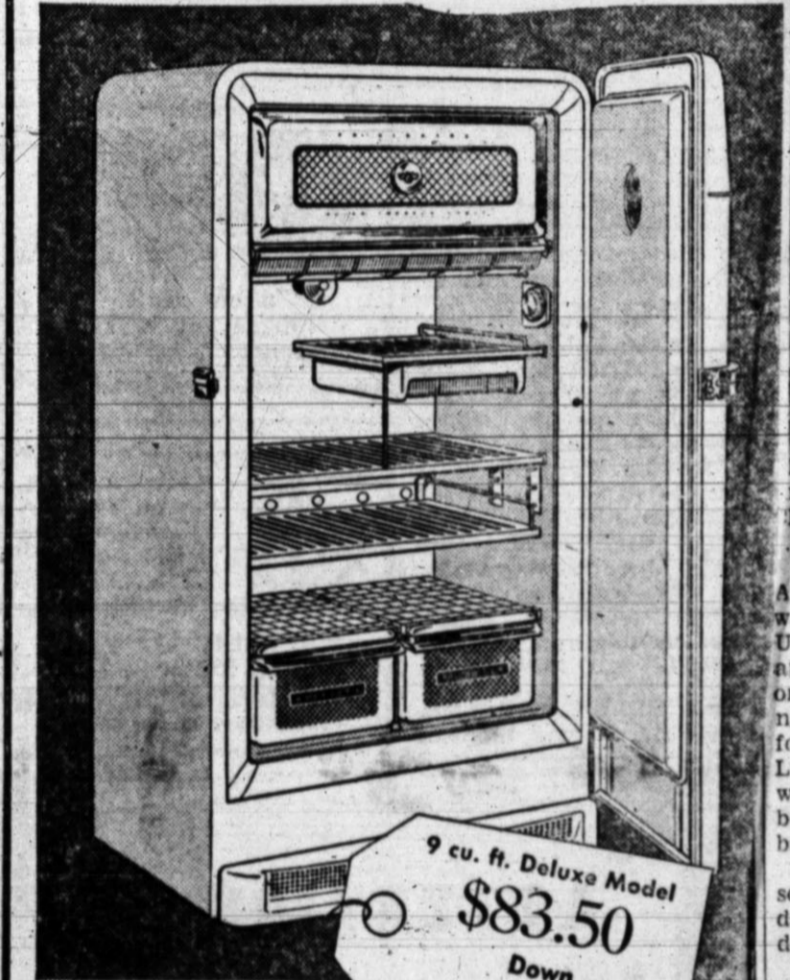

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BOOKS ON PALE

"Masked Gods" Is Study Of Indian Dances And Songs

By Frank W. Waters
University of New Mexico Press
440 pp.—\$6

This brilliant student of Indian ceremonialism shows how to be done with in his fascinating subject. MASKED GODS combines a and unobtrusive learning profound insight and a poetic gift. The result is a compelling examination of not only of what makes the Indian tick but of the role played by Indian culture in the larger American culture.

The book opens with a history of the Indian on the American continent. From the cliff dweller and nomad to the highly integrated city, from the Four Corners to the great empires of the Incas and the Aztecs, the successive encroachments of the Spanish conquistadores, the missionaries, the soldiers, and the settlers, the story unfolds with a majesty and sweep. Mr. Waters writes a passion—his moving record of the great tribes, of something out of Homer—yields to a prairie and easy appeal to sentiment. The story of the Indian through centuries is dramatic and without any touching up. It took a poet to realize this. This is a fast-moving account of a series of brilliantly illuminated glimpses that have an emotional quality and carry authority.

Mr. Waters proceeds to the history of the real heart of the matter: the exploration of what the Indian believes, of his attitude toward the universe, of that complex of attitudes which the Indian has inherited from his death—Indian religion. Here Waters attempts to enter into the soul of the Indian. Lovingly he examines one by one the various creation myths, those explanations of which man everywhere and forever finds of how he came to be on earth, and the various ceremonies by which the Indian reconciles his universe, invokes the forces

of life, reconciles the contradiction of life and death.

Read merely for its masterly descriptions of the major dances and songs—the Navaho Yellow Chalk, the Taos Deer Dance, the Zuni Shalako—this section of the book provides an enthralling experience. But Waters has gone much further. He has probed deeply into the meanings of these dances and ceremonial recaptulations of ancient myths. The intuitive bases of Indian culture are laid bare; and it is in the Indian's reliance on intuition and instinct that Mr. Waters finds the source of the richness of the Indian's relation to nature, of his reverence toward life and the earth, of his tough-fibered serenity in the faces of disaster.

In his final section, Mr. Waters contrasts this intuitive culture with our own; with its dangerous reliance on reason alone, following the precept that "by their fruits ye shall know them." He examines the White Man's culture through the eyes of the Indian, turning a powerful spotlight on many things that we have taken for granted.

Mr. Waters does not cast himself in the role of the prophet. He merely states; but he states brilliantly. He shows that a man is more than the capacity of his intellect and that the adding matter; the microscope here is the exploration of the human mind, of the problems of life, and of the human condition. He shows that man is also composed of heart and intuition, and that he should be reverent, and that he should be aware of his peril.

It is not the least distinction that MASKED GODS has, quite apart from its arresting approach and its engrossing subject matter, its style makes it an excellent reading. Descriptions of various dances are among the finest prose writing done in recent years. The chapter on "Cowboy versus the American Mortar" reaches a climax of few works of Negro history. Mr. Waters manages

an intimate touch that charms the reader. MASKED GODS is a great book as well as a great contribution.







West Texas State's terrific Wright-Cross ground punch which will be on exhibit in El Paso's Sun Bowl New Year's Day against Cincinnati is the rushing prize of the nation. The new 'Mr. Outside and Mr. Inside' of football are in the personages of 195-pound Charlie Wright and 150-pound Bill Cross who combined to roll up 2400 yards rushing this season to break the old mark of 1861 set by the fabulous Doc Blanchard and Glen Davis for Army in 1945.

Big Charlie, hometown product, for Coach Frank Kimbrough, rolled up 1203 yards with his barrel-house tactics through the middle of the line to jump into second place in the nation in the rushing department. Cross, little 5'6", 150-pound fullback, hurdled his way to 1197 yards to trail his counterpart by only six yards yards in third place.

Both players are figuring high in Coach Kimbrough's plan of attack when the Border Conference champs take on the powerful Bearcats from Ohio. However, the Buffs will offer a versatile, gaining combination aside from the two brilliant runners in their bid for their first post-season victory in the history of the school.

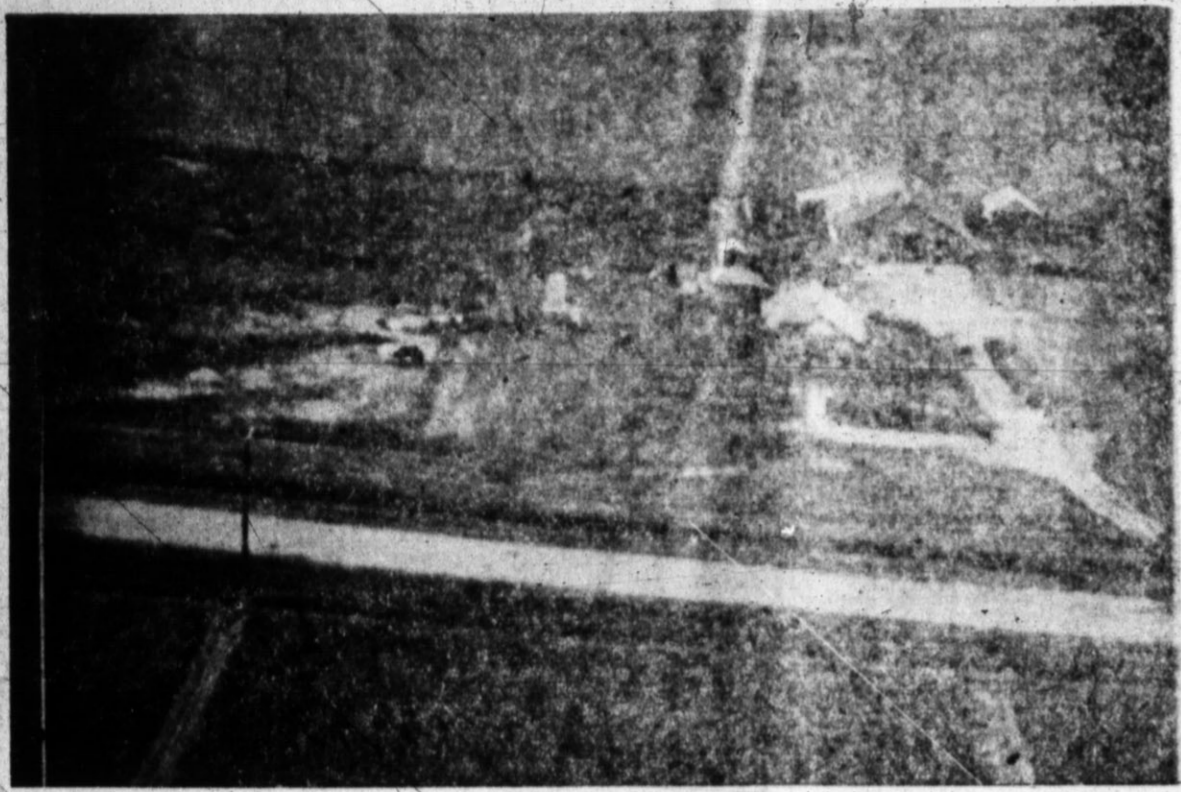

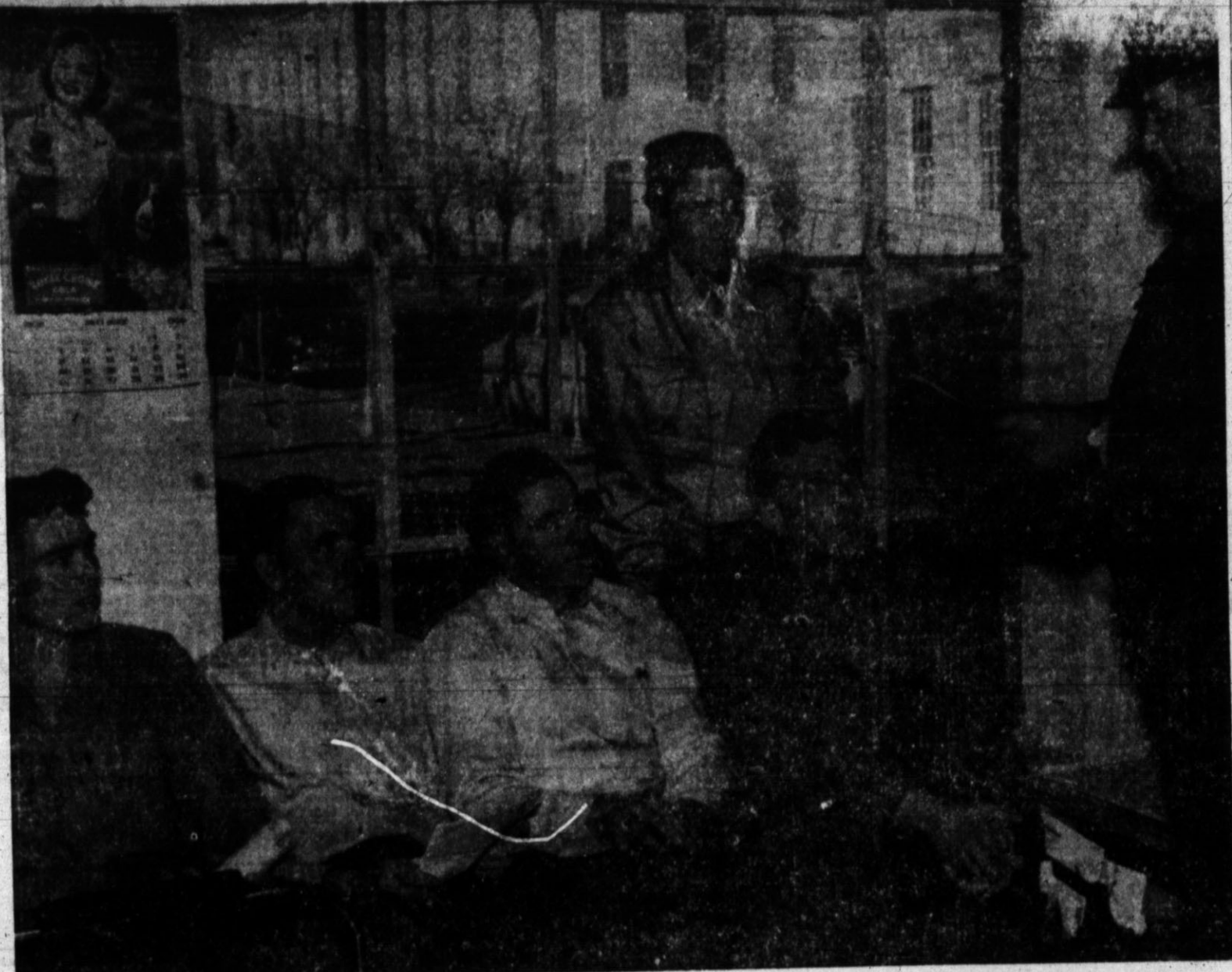

Farmer Deferment Is Only In Some Cases

Deaf Smith County farmers and farm workers were advised this week by local Selective Service officers that the draft law provides no blanket deferment for farm workers and that the board is required both by law and regulation to consider each agricultural worker's case individually, just as other men's cases are considered.

General Paul Wakefield State Director, said that regulations issued by the President provide for a deferred classification for farm workers only when the following conditions are met to the satisfaction of the local board:

1. The man must be "employed in the production for market of a substantial quantity of those agricultural commodities which are necessary to the maintenance of the national health, safety, or interest."

2. "The production for market of a substantial quantity of agricultural commodities should be measured in terms of the average annual production per farm worker which is marketed from a local average farm of the type under consideration."

The production of agricultural commodities for consumption by the worker and his family, or traded for subsistence purposes, should not be considered as production for market. Production which is in excess of that required for the subsistence of

the farm families on the farm under consideration should be considered as production for market."

The state draft director observed that "this still doesn't give the complete picture," and added that a man, to be eligible for farm deferment, must also meet the requirements in the section of the Selective Service regulations defining necessary employment.

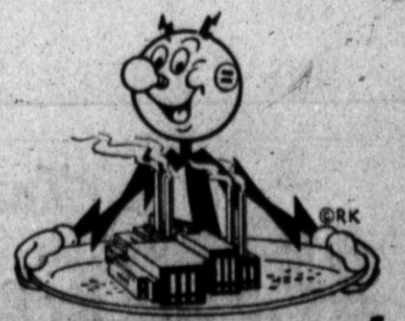

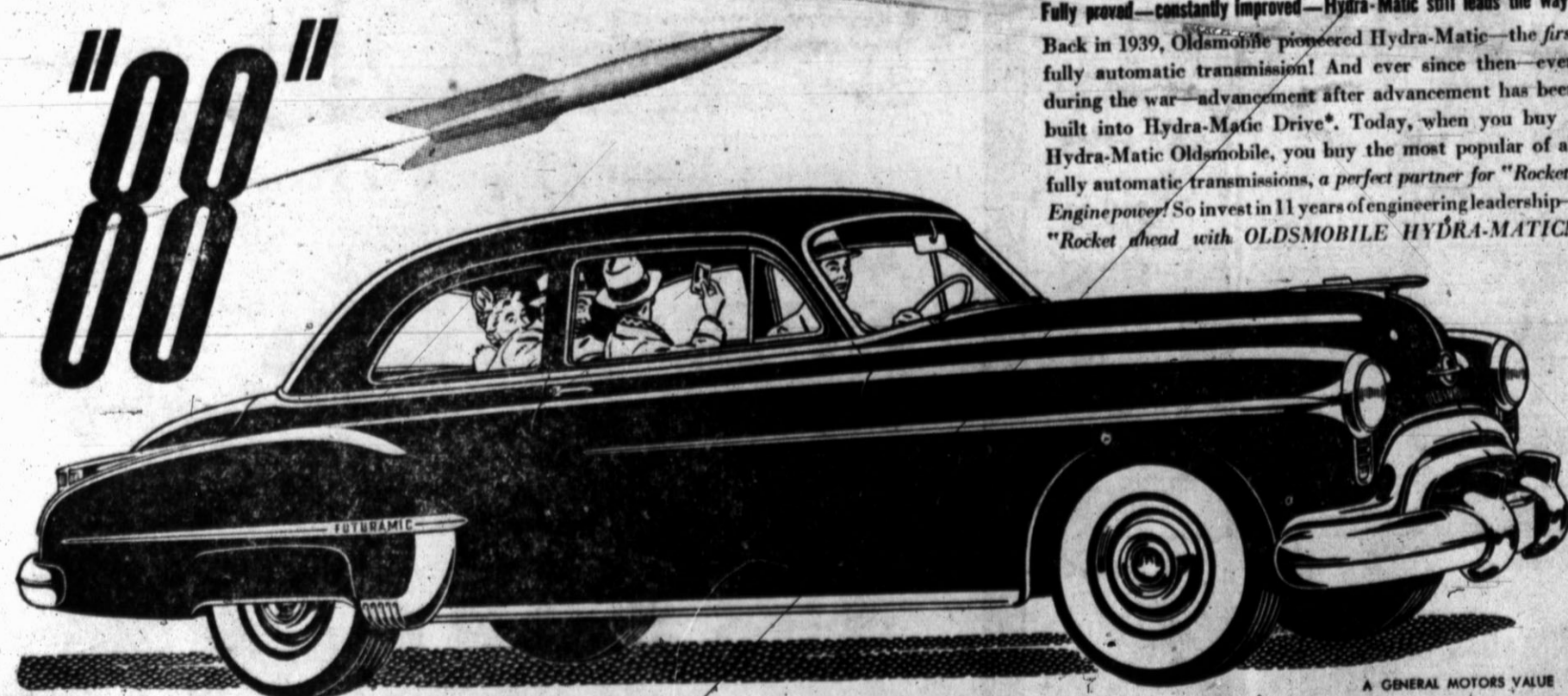
