Veteran Bonus In Some States

Ralph Smith, Deaf Smith county veteran service officer, warned this week that the last possible date for filing applications for veteran's bonuses was drawing near in several states. Urging all residents of those states, who are now in Hereford, to make application im-

mediately, Smith listed Iowa, Minnesota, Deleware, Indiana, and Louisiana as the states whose deadlines are nearest. The final date for filing in Iowa and Minnesota is December 31, 1950, Smith said, and

the application date in Delaware, Indiana and Louisiana expires January 1. March 20, 1951 is the expiration date in Michigan and June 30, 1951 in Connecticut and

Illinois. North Dakota veterans need not apply before February 17, 1954. Three new states, Montana, Oregon and West Virginia were listed among the states provid-ing bonuses for veterans of

World War I veterans. Smith said he was uncertain about the possibility of a bonus for Texas veterans, but said it may be discussed in the next Wrestler Killed session of the legislature.

The public is invited to witness the celebration, Mrs. Brumley said, and everyone wanting to see it should arrive "about 8:30."





Farmer Deferment Is Only In Some Cases

Deaf Smith County farmers and farm workers were advised this week by local Selective Service officers that the draft law provides no blanket deferment for farm workers and that the board is required both by law and regulation to consider each agricultural worker's case individually, just as other men's cases are considered.

General Paul Wakefield State Director, said that regulations issued by the President provide for a deferred classification for farm workers only when the following conditions are met to the satisfaction of the local

1. The man must be "employed in the production for mar-ket of a substantial quantity of those agricultural commodities which are necessary to the maintenance of the national health, safety, or interest."

2. "The production for market of a substantial quantity of agricultural commodities should be measured in terms of the average annual production per farm worker which is marketed from a local average farm of the type under consideration.

The production of agricultural commodities for consumption by the worker and his family, or traded for subsistence purposes, should not be considered as production for market. Production which is in excess of that required for the subsistence of


the farm families on the farm under consideration should be considered as production for market."

The state draft director observed that "this still doesn't give the complete picture," and added that a man, to be eligible for farm deferment, must also meet the requirements in the section of the Selective Service regulations defining necessary employment.




