# Water Erosion Now Number 1 Problem

The heaviest streak seemed to be from around the Bootleg-Garcia section- northwest toward Ford school. Rainfall in this area ran from 6 or 7 inches up to as much as 11 inches in the two days and three nights.

Light to moderate gullying

and sheet erosion (sometimes called silting) is widely prevalent as a result of the heavy rains. Most of this occurred on cultivated land with slopes of one per cent or greater.

Pevehouse said the very same practices which help in the prevention of wind erosion also aid in the combatting of water erosion. Heavy vegetative cover, beginnig with good naeive grass as the best, protects the soil from blowing and also retards water run-off. Any kind of growing stubbles left on or near the surface all aid in the fight against both blo-wing and washing of the soil.

Mechanical structures, or the permanent soil conservation practices, such as contour guide lines, terraces, diversions, dams dikes, ridges, spreaders, etc. not only aid in the prevention of washing and gullying but also conserve moisture on crop lands which in turn assures the growth of crops with their resulting heavy stalks and stubbles to leave on

In the recent heavy rains, many terraces in the district were damaged because the

And, it is much more economical to build these permanent structures to withstand the 20-30 year frequency rains AND repair the damage when we get these extra heavy rain storms.
