How Can I?

Q. How can I make fabrics fire resistant?

A. Soak the material in a solution of five parts of boric acid, six parts of borax and 100 parts of water. After soaking, the fabric should be squeezed out and

hung up to dry.

Q. How can I polish silverware if I have run out of silver polish?

A. Try using a little of your toothpaste on a soft cloth. It will clean the silver beautifully. Rub to a polish with a clean cloth.

Q. How can I make a good filling for tea sandwiches?

A. Try making them with cold salmon, cream cheese, and olives. Make a smooth paste of the cheese and salmon, and then add stuffed olives which have been cut in halves.

Q. How can I thin cake batter when it is found to be too stiff?

A. Beat an egg and add a bit at a time until the right consistency is reached. Never pour in milk for the purpose of thinning a batter, as it will result in a poor cake.

Q. How can I get relief from cold feet?

A. Relief from cold feet can often be obtained by cutting

pieces of paper the shape of the soles of the shoes, and placing them in the shoes.

Q. How can I quickly remove smoke from a room?

A. Dip a towel into equal parts of vinegar and hot water, wring it, and then wave it overhead and around the room.

Q. How can I cause paint to adhere to new tin?

A. Rub the surface of the tin first with pumice powder, or sandpaper, and apply shellac. Be sure the tin is free of grease before beginning the work.

Q. How can I help my child when he wishes to blow soap bubbles?

A. Add a few drops of glycerine to the soap and water, and the bubbles will not burst so easily and will have a more brilliant color.

Q. How can I brighten the red files of the porch or fireplace?

A. Try rubbing with a cut

piece of lemon and a little salt. Then wash with warm, soapy water.

Q. How can I treat laryngitis?

A. When a cold, or laryngitis, has caused you to lose your voice, try taking a dose of bicarbonate of soda several times a day; it will aid wonderfully in regaining your voice.

Q. How can I remedy ink that has become too thick?

A. Add a little vinegar to it, and the ink will be usable again.

## Red Cross Gives Details On POW Mail Procedure

Mail to American service men now in Communist prisoner of war camps will be carried in military aircraft to Korea via Japan, according to information received by Mrs. Dyalitha Bradley, secretary of the American Red Cross here.

Previously, the mail was brought in commercial airliners

and delivered at Hong Kong, for eventual distribution through Communist channels.

The new system is designed to expedite deliveries during current truce negotiations and will entail no change in the existing method of addressing mail, according to Mrs. Bradley.

The mail should be addressed as follows: Grade, name, and service number of the individual, c/o Chinese Peoples Committee for World Peace, Peking, China; name and number of prison camp, if known. Place the letter in an envelope addressed as above.

No postage is necessary. In the upper right-hand corner of the envelope write the words "Prisoner of War Mail" and in the upper left-hand corner the name and address of the sender. Drop the letter in any U. S. mail box.

In the event of a truce negotiation, breakdown, the mail will revert to the original channel of distribution and no change of addressing will be necessary.

The full text of the Red Cross directive dealing with POW mail is at the Red Cross office in the courthouse.

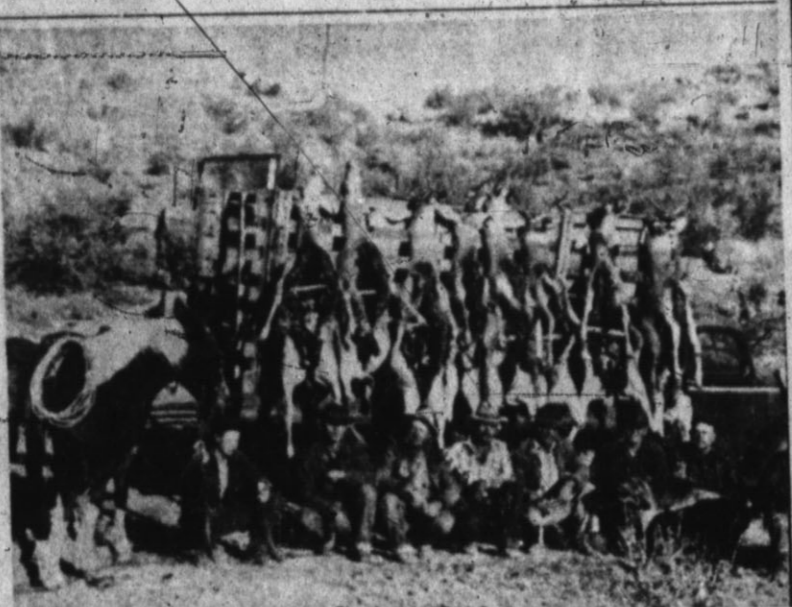
# Deer-Hunting Trip Into San Andreas Mountains

Memories of an unusually pleasant and profitable deer-hunting expedition into New Mexico's rugged San Andreas mountains still linger with Leroy Packard, who with his mother, has lived in the Northwest Hereford community for slightly more than a year.

Making up the party for the thrilling adventure in addition to Packard were: Joe Teen Miller (the only feminine hunter in the crowd), her father, "Brother" Miller, Deputy Sheriff Jim Ayer, Herbert Carter, and Ewing Miller, all of Green Tree, N. Mex.; B. V. Paden, Spring Lake; and H. H. Miller, Hollywood, N. Mex.

On November 8 the group was off for the San Andreas mountains with their pots, pans, Dutch ovens, bedding and horses. After a long day's travel, the group reached the big canyon where they wanted to make camp. The country was very rough. There were miles and miles of rimrock, broken now and then by canyons. It is the most perfect deer country in the state of New Mexico, a part of the country that a very few people ever get to see because of the lack of roads.

The group took one large truck loaded with saddle horses, and three pickup loads of camping equipment and chuck. By late evening, the group was pitching camp with everyone glad to be there at last.

Joe Teen Miller, the only lady of the group, proved to be the best hunter of the party. She killed the largest buck, a 12-pointer. She rode her pet horse and went just as high into the hills as any of the party.

We helped her pack her deer on her horse and she led him to camp, which was several miles away", Packard said. "Joe Teen was a good hunter as he had been hunting with her father since she was 12 years of age," he added.

Leroy reports that all nine of the group brought in very large bucks, the smallest set of horns were eight points. He says that they were all very uniform in size. The largest deer killed weighed 200 pounds.

Everything about the hunt was enjoyed, reports Leroy even the fireside stories at night — of how that big buck was just barely missed as he went over the rim.

Another thing enjoyed by all was the coffee, brewed by Jake Silas, who was up before everyone else getting that five gallon pot on the fire.

Then the end of a perfect hunting season came to the nine hunters on November 14 when the group broke camp.

Everyone was happy because they had their deer, but the idea of breaking camp and leaving didn't seem so good. However, they all planned to meet again next year at the same time for a similar hunt.

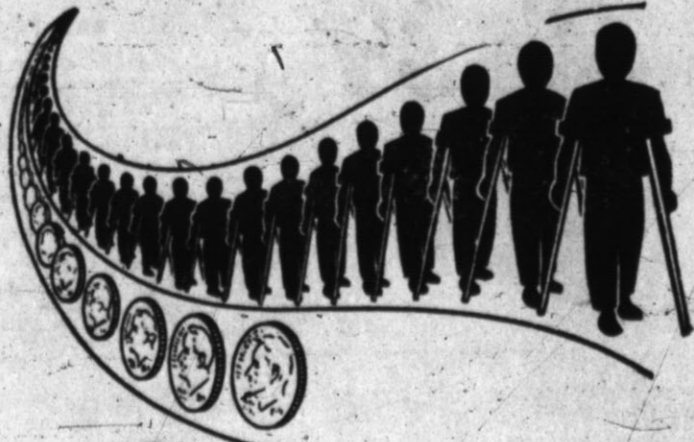

## Better Hunting Seen In Future Years For Texas

AUSTIN — Those Texas sportsmen discouraged by the 1951 hunting seasons were consoled by the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

He said that while "the luck of many hunters was very bad because of a game shortage, conditions are not so dark that they cannot be improved by two or three good years of weather."

"The ravages of the drought have been particularly severe for the deer and turkey," said the executive secretary. He pointed out that the deer toll from the drought will be accentuated by many more winter deaths from starvation.

"One bright spot on the hunting horizon this year," he said, "was the extraordinarily good quail hunting in the Panhandle. And this fine crop of birds will serve to stand as hope for the hunters since the Panhandle situation shows the difference provided by favorable weather conditions."

"While most of the state has been blighted by the dry weather, the Panhandle has had more normal moisture. This is reflected in the splendid quail crop."

In the case of wild turkey which have deteriorated badly in the state, the Executive Director said a change to more favorable weather "should find the turkeys rebounding quickly."

He relayed encouragement for the duck hunters about advance waterfowl prospects, citing that Canadian nesting areas had good fall rains.

"We have strict limitations since our men patrol exclusively for violation against the game law code," said the commission. **Window Cleaning Without Water**  
Cloths for cleaning windows without water can be made with a semiliquid paste of benzine and calcined magnesia. The cloth which should be coarse linen or something free of lint, is dipped into this mixture and hung in the air until the spirits have evaporated and it is free from odor. It may be used again and again and is a great convenience. When soiled, wash and redip.

**A Tight Cork**  
An obstinate cork can be easily removed by first dipping a piece of woolen cloth into boiling water and wrapping tightly around the neck of the bottle. In a few minutes the cork can be removed.

**Apple Pie**  
When making an apple pie, try

grating a little orange rind into the sugar. Sprinkle over the apples in the usual way, and see what a delicious flavor it imparts.

**Raises Nap**  
The legs of heavy furniture often leave a flattened place on the nap of the rug. To remedy this dampen a chamois, fold several times, and place it over the mark. Leave on for several hours, then remove the chamois, and the mark will have disappeared.

**A Deodorant**  
Place a lump of sugar in the vase containing cut dahlias or chrysanthemums. This will prevent the unpleasant odor which the water usually takes on after a while.

**More Legible**  
By heating coins, or medallions

gradually, the dates and inscriptions will, unless entirely obliterated, make their appearance.

**Onion Juice**  
Onion juice blends and flavors food better than chopped onions. The juice can be obtained by pressing a spoon against the cut side of it, or pressing the onion against a grater and allowing the juice to drip through.

**Chapped Lips**  
Make a salve for chapped lips by mixing twenty parts of white wax, forty parts of spermaceti, ten parts of oil of sweet almonds, and thirty parts of perfectly pure fresh lard.

**Curling Feathers**  
To curl feathers or plumes shake the tips through steam from the spout of a kettle, and then curl with a silver fruit knife or a whale bone.

**To Cut Glass**  
Glass can be cut roughly to any desired shape under water by use of an ordinary pair of scissors.

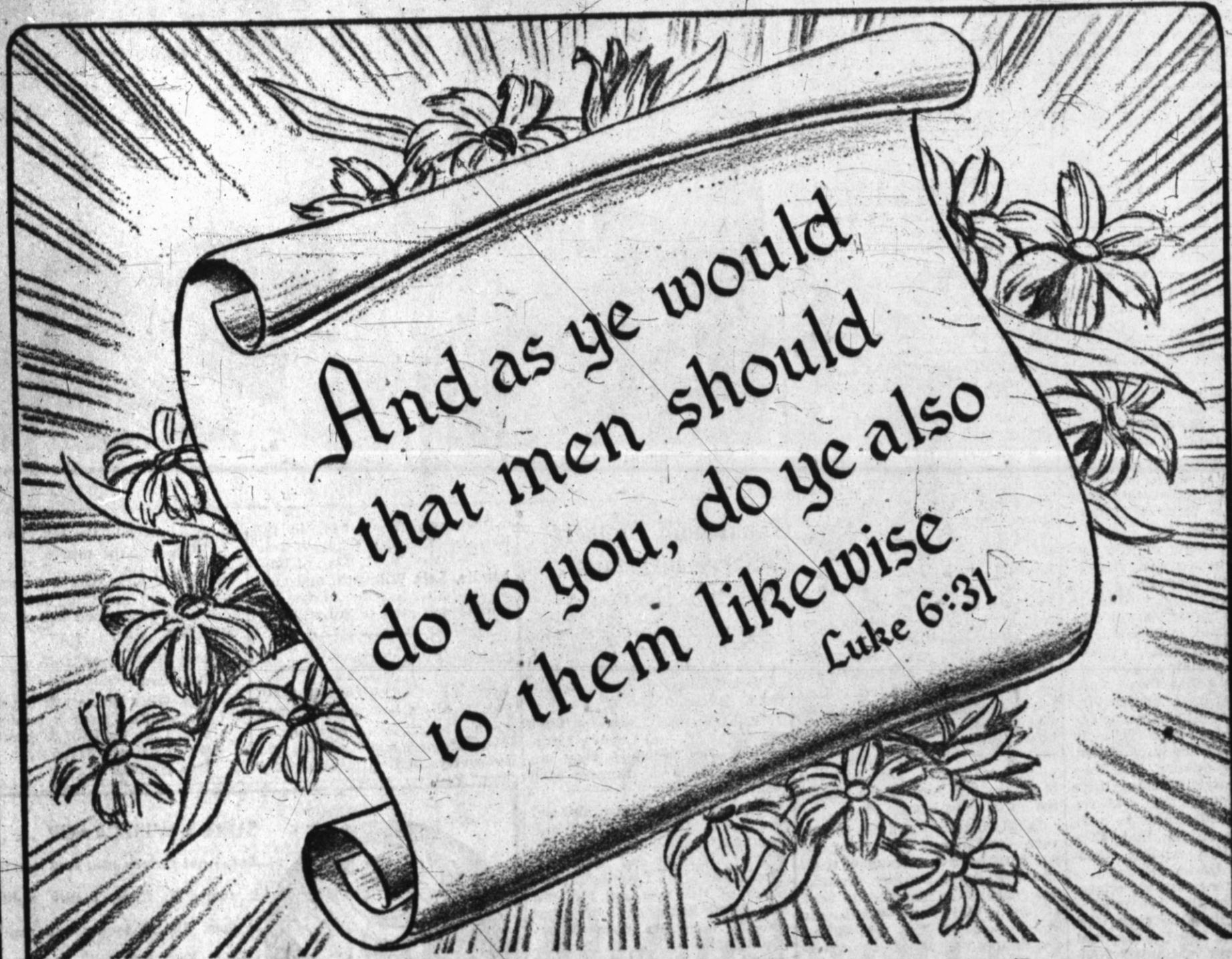

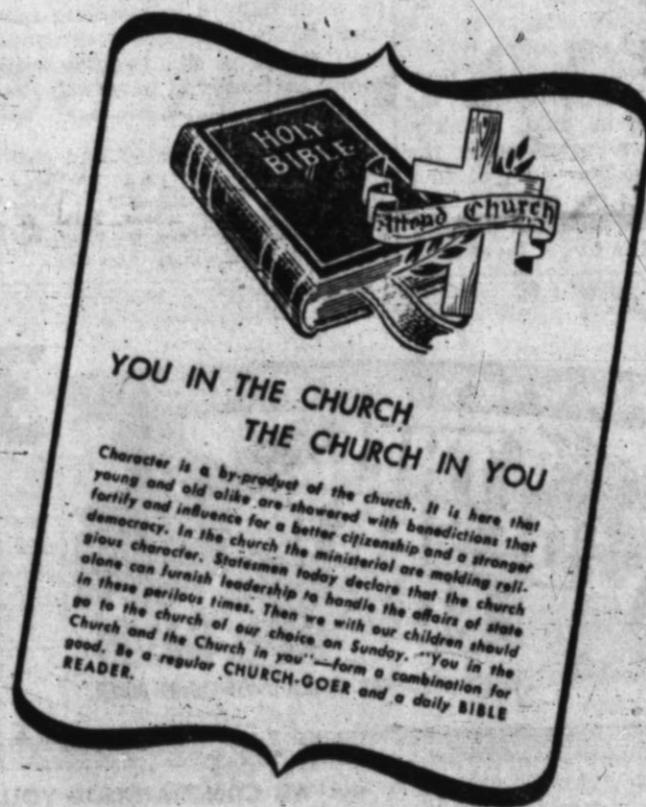

Retaliation For Hungarian Action After American Fliers Released

THE HUNGARIAN EPISODE: Many of you will recall the newsletter of the week of December 10, 1951, which was written by my administrative assistant, Mr. Dee C. Dodson. In this letter he recounted a number of his observations while stationed in Budapest, Hungary, during World War II.

To those of you who read that newsletter, the action of the Hungarian communist officials concerning the four American fliers was not much of a surprise. Although these fliers are not free at the time this letter is being written, it is hoped that by the time it is published those four American boys will be safely on this side of the Iron Curtain. (Letter written December 23). The speedy offer of this Government to pay the fines assessed by the communist court should have resulted in the immediate release of these boys. However, since life is held so lightly by those international racketeers, it probably did not occur to them that we in this country do not hesitate when the choice is between human life and property.

The speedy reply of this government, to gether with the immediate reaction on the part of all American citizens, to this unwarranted, inhuman and inconceivable demand is undoubtedly causing those communist officials to do some thinking. They are either thinking that they should have asked for more, or that they made a very foolish move in asking anything. The folly of their action is already of record, and it is my opinion that they should immediately release these fliers and retract the sentence and try to do something to undo the grievous crime that they have committed against these boys and the United States.

Like most gangsters, racketeers and kidnapers, they are going to find out that the \$120,000 will be the most costly blood money that they have ever extracted from anyone or any people. The action of the communist officials in this case will not be forgotten by the American people. Much has been said as to whether or not the money should be paid. Frankly, I see no other course under the circumstances. The lives of four American boys are at stake, and it seems to me that the primary issue at hand is to get these boys

to the safe side of the Iron Curtain. When this is done, retaliation can then come into being. Certainly the loved ones of these boys should be taken into consideration and the welfare of the boys considered, just as any of us would expect if it were our son who was being held in Budapest by an international kidnapper, or our ten year-old child being held in a secret hiding place by some vicious kidnapper criminal in this country. The proper time for retaliation is after the boys are released. Otherwise, their lives and their safety will be jeopardized.

The immediate response of the American people to raise by private subscription all of the money necessary to bring about the release of these boys should be sufficient notice to the Kremlin crawlers that this country is still united and that the American public believes in going to the aid of their fellow man.

THE DOMESTIC ECONOMY: The increased buyers' resistance is having a telling effect and will undoubtedly reduce prices of many items. Although Christmas sales this year were tremendous in all lines, they were not in keeping with the tremendous stocks that had been accumulated by many merchants. The report is that the mail-order catalogs are reflecting reduced prices on many, many items because of surplus stocks. The recent announcements that anticipated shortages in many lines had not developed will also be helpful in curbing the usual buying sprees in materials that might be short. This will of course add fuel to the fire of the buyers' resistance move.

CONGRESS: Congress reconvenes on January 8 for what appears to be a tempestuous session. The recess between sessions has enabled the members to visit at length with their constituents and to more clearly understand the desires and views of the people that pay the taxes. This will be most helpful in avoiding any further tax increases and could well result in the beginning of some much needed tax reductions.
