



Have you noticed? She shaped it just like an inverted cornucopla. And the abundance of agricultural products grown - there bares out South Texas' resemblance to the "horn of plenty!".

But what first comes to the average Texans' mind when he reads of the Rio Grande Valley is "fruit". The crop suffered a severe setback after two consecutive years of hard freezes. Yet Texas still sends a considerable volume of citrus products to the nation's markets and is more than holding it own against California and Florida competition.

The citrus season opened in ear-October this year when an estimated crop of a million and a half boxes or more of oranges and grapefruit began moving out The crop is short of pre-freeze production but it is greater than in 1951, indicating the citrus industry is getting back on its feet.

Between 3 and 4 million trees are still standing and 1,117,000 excellent trees are in the nurseries this year. Soon the Texas housewife will once more have her pick of fine fruits from our own

Future predictions are based on present nursery stock. This year it is in better condition than usual. Many nurseries report they are sold out and inquiries on sales have increased tremendously since the early rains in the east-






